SURVIVAL THROUGH FAITH— SARASOTA

We had rented the Manatee High School Auditorium for the Sunday evening. The custodian told us that there were at least five hundred and fifty present. The Holy Spirit was certainly there as Elder Coon presented the subject and made an altar call. At least two hundred people spontaneously started toward the front. The first, was an elderly man who had been a former church elder. He came down the aisle with tears in his eyes but his face lit with the joy of being born again.

On the Friday night of the opening meeting in the church every seat was taken. Elder Coon had been present in the two prayer meetings preceding the opening of the first meeting of the revival series. The first two meetings were primarily for our people, but many others came. The Sabbath school offerings were half again as much on

the first Sabbath. At nearly every meeting, opportunity was given for surrender to Christ, and every time there were many. Our people remarked over and over again, Jesus Christ has become real to me and I know that my sins are forgiven and I am walking in new light and life." "I know that now I have the victory and that I can take the message of Christ to others." "I wish I had realized the wonders of the life in Jesus like I do now."

The training class to help our people learn how to witness for Christ was so well attended that we did not know where to seat everyone. One hundred enrolled and received the text book "Path to the Heart," and 76 graduated and received certificates on the closing night. We are already organized and inspired to follow up these interests, and we know that there will be good results.

We expect to have a baptism of ten or twelve in two or three weeks. These meetings helped to bring some people to a decision who attended our meetings last fall.

The brethren now have a program that is coordinated with all the branches of soul winning. The ability to get names of all subscribers to our periodicals, along with those of the Bible schools, gives a number of names never before realized.

Sister Slaton secured her degree in Boone College in North Carolina and while still a very young lady she began what was to be a long and useful life of service dedicated to the education of the youth. For more than sixty years she devoted herself to this task serving in the public school system of Alabama and later, after acceptance of the Seventh-day Adventist faith, in the church schools of this denomination. She was at the time of her death a devout member of this faith.

Sister Slaton is survived by only one sister, Mrs. Carrie Slaton-Reynolds of Attalla, Alabama. She leaves a number of friends and nephews as well as a host of friends and former pupils to mourn her passing. Services were conducted in the White Chapel here in Montgomery and Sister Slaton was laid to rest in the Greenwood Cemetery.
