

JUNIOR CAMP

PARENTS IN THE ALABAMA-MISSISSIPPI CONFERENCE:

I wish I could talk with each of you personally for just a moment about Junior Camp. If you have never attended camp or if your children have never been there, you may not be acquainted with the type of program we have. I want to say a word about it.

First of all, our prime objective is not to provide a week's vacation for the children; it isn't to provide a place where they can be sent by their parents and thus enable the parents to have a week's vacation. Rather, it is a place where juniors are actually brought in contact with the God of Lature. A

number of our conference ministers will be there for counsel and instruction and guidance. Here in these favorable circumstances lasting impressions are made upon the young minds. They learn to know these spiritual counsellors in a personal way. Opportunity for guided counsel in studying nature and crafts is available. A very carefully supervised swimming period is included daily, where competent instruction is given and where many juniors qualify for their swimming requirements in the MV achievement class work. For this summer's camp we have had requests for an investiture service and a baptism for the last Sabbath. Provided proper arrangements can be made with the local pastors these suggestions will be carried out.

Each day includes morning worship at the flagpole, with prayer bands under the trees; morning recreation period; craft period; and, following lunch, rest period, when MV reading course books and other books are made available for the young people to read. In the afternoon swimming instruction, swimming, and other recreation follow. The highlight of each day is the campfire, with its stories and many innovations, followed by a brief study of the Sabbath school lesson, prayer, and bed. One hour is provided each day for the units to be with their counselors in a chosen project.

In a very brief way this is your Junior Camp program. May I urge you each one to consider the eternal values involved for your boy and your girl, and if at all possible, be sure that they are enrolled in our camp for this year? I'elow is your enrollment application blan'. Sincerely,



TODAYS vs. TOMORROWS

On an old battlefield in North Assam, India, there are two large posts that mark the entrance to the resting place for many American GI's who died in the China-Burma-India theater during the World War II. Between those posts are the words "They swapped their todays for your tomorrows." That is precisely what the Christian teacher is doing. She is trading her todays for your child's tomorrows.

Daily there comes upon the church of God an increased responsibility to provide better education for the youth of the Advent cause. No one can tell how great an influence is exerted upon the youth by his teacher. A teacher is more than a "text-book wired for sound," she is a daily example of Christianity.

Sometime ago I sat with a certain school board and studied some problems that had arisen in connection with the school there. There was some discussion as to the advisability of attempting a school another year. I pointed out some of the dangers of failure to send our children to a Christian school. Suddenly a parent snapped,

"You can't frighten us with the conditions existing in a public school." At the time I made no reply but since then many times I have thought that, even though I was making no studied attempt to frighten anyone, I could not share this parent's complacency. Frankly, I am frightened. I want you to share with me this concern and see to it that we place our children where God has told us to put them—in a Christian school. Are you not willing to swap your todays for their tomorrows?

early life she accepted the truth. While she was attending Southern Training School at Graysville, Tennessee, she met Arthur L. Manous to whom she was married on June 26, 1900.


