Eric Ristau, our own Southern Union publishing secretary, took charge of our instruction periods each day. The first period he laid down the principles of personality development, and in succeeding periods Elder Ristau, in his enthusiastic way, covered the complete mental law of the sale.

The publishing department secretaries and Book and Bible house managers all contributed their parts in the making of this institute highly success-

ful. Doctor Van Blaricum, Collegedale's own doctor, gave a very helpful lecture and answered health questions. Elder Cardey's presence and encouraging remarks regarding the School of Bible Prophecy, stating that about 50 per cent of all baptisms in the Bible school have also read our large books, was indeed thrilling. The Southern Union literature evangelists are determined to greatly increase the number of enrollees for the Bible correspondence course.

As in all great gatherings of our literature ministers, the meeting that we all looked forward to was the experience hour on Sabbath afternoon. Our hearts thrilled again and again as fourteen Southern Union literature ministers related their experiences. And then to climax this great occasion, the glittering Southern Union Honor roll was unveiled. The honor roll was painted with black light paint and lit up with the black light. It was a thing of beauty and inspiration. Out of the darkness each name shone brightly.

Each conference honored the colporteurs who had worked the most hours and who had made the most deliveries, also, the ones who were second in hours and deliveries. ★ Why are we so particular to select a farm site for our boarding academies and colleges? Because Mrs. White set up the pattern under divine direction, and our pattern school was located on a farm in Avondale, Australia.

In various places in Sister White's writings we are told why our schools should be located on farms:

They are to be located in the country away from the contaminating influences of the city, and are to provide opportunity for work and recreation in the out-of-doors.

The land about the school is to become a lesson book from which teachers may draw material for classroom use, and illustrations of the continuous operation of the laws of God in everyday experience.

We are warned not to let difficulties discourage us in our farming and industrial activities, but study our methods, and God will help us solve these

difficult problems.

Our college is located on a thousand acre farm eighteen miles from Chattanooga in the foothills of the Cumberland mountains. Much of the land is too hilly for farming, and is covered with trees and vegetation, making a beautiful site for the college. The college plant itself is built on a hill, overlooking a beautiful valley. This valley comprises the major portion of the tillable land of which there is about two hundred acres, most of which is used for raising forage crops.

Southern Missionary College has one of the finest herds in the vicinity, consisting mostly of registered Holsteins and Jerseys. J. B. Pierson, our farm manager, is a consecrated man, well trained for his work. He and the college administration believe that our school farm contributes very much to the college program as well as being an object lesson to the community.





BOOK-A-MONTH PLAN

No doubt you have heard of the book-a-month plan which is being sponsored so enthusiastically by our churches throughout the conference to help in the raising of funds for our evangelistic program. Following is an outline of the plan as it is being sponsored:

- 1. Our Book and Bible House provides the missionary secretary with the number of *Golden Treasury* needed for the church, and bills these under a special account.
- 2. Every church member is to be encouraged to take at least one of these books, with the canvass provided, to a friend, neighbor, or relative and leave it overnight for examination, inviting him to purchase it for his home, explaining that it is for missionary work.
- 3. Just as soon as the \$10.75 is collected, it is to be turned over to the missionary secretary who in turn sees that it is sent to the Book and Bible House. Then all the profit above cost of book is turned over to the conference to be used in evangelism. (Note: There may be some who will want to take the book but will need to wait until pay day to get it. Make note of this and carry them a book on specified day.)

You have noticed we call this a book-a-month plan. There will be those who will want to continue this each month. While it may not be possible for every member to sell one each month, we believe, if properly promoted the first Sabbath of each month, there would be many who would respond. Therefore, we would suggest that a man with good promotional ability be appointed by the church board to keep this before our people by planning for the missionary service one Sabbath each month giving those with good experiences opportunity to relate them.

After the first shipment of books has been placed with our people, the one appointed by the church board to sponsor this program should find out by a show of hands or in writing how many books the members will need for that month and these can be shipped by return mail.

If our conference church members who are not privileged to attend church regularly want to enter into the program, they can do so by writing to L. E. Aldrich, of the Alabama-Mississippi Book and Bible House, and he will send books direct to them and they will then send the \$10.75 for each book to him, and the profit of \$5.37 will go for evangelism.


The picture on the right shows our



GILMER:—Captain William W. Gilmer, retired U.S. Navy officer and one of the oldest living graduates of the U.S. Naval Academy, died January 8, 1955, at the Mountain Sanitarium and Hospital, Fletcher, North Carolina. He was born May 21, 1863, and would have been 92 years old in May of this year. He had been in ill health since suffering a heart attack last year while on a visit to his sister in Texas.

Captain Gilmer was a native of Chatham, Virginia, a son of the late John and Elizabeth Patton Gilmer. He was a cousin of General George Patton and a descendant of General Mercer. He entered the Naval Academy in June, 1880, from Virginia and was graduated in 1885. At that time the Academy course was for five years and graduates went to sea for two years before receiving commissions as ensigns.

He went to sea for the first time in 1885 in a wooden sailing vessel and during his long career he saw service on all types of ships, from tugs to battleships.

In 1912 he was promoted captain and in 1915, after graduation from the Naval War College, he was Commandant of the 12th Naval District on the West Coast. He visited the district headquarters during a tour last year.

During World War I he commanded the battleship U.S.S. South Carolina in the Atlantic and performed the first crossing convoy duty assigned to a battleship.

After World War I he served as governor of Guam from November 1918 until June

1920. He retired in 1921.

Captain Gilmer accepted the teachings of the Seventh-day Adventist church twenty years ago. He really believed and lived his religion. When he was a young man, starting to the Naval Academy, he promised his mother that he would never use alcohol or tobacco, and he never did.

He was a member of the Hendersonville Seventh-day Adventist church at the time of his death and had been very active in church work. He had held the office of deacon until recently. Captain Gilmer was greatly beloved by all who knew him, in the church, in the neighborhood in which he lived, and his wide circle of friends. He leaves to mourn his sister, Miss Mary R. Gilmer, of Orange, Texas.

Funeral services were conducted in the Hendersonville Seventh-day Adventist church January 11, 1955, with Elders C. H. Lauda, A. J. Clark, and J. L. Everett of-ficiating. His body was removed to the National Cemetery, at Arlington, Virginia, where, with military honors, he was laid to rest beside his companion, who passed away in 1948. A. J. CLARK


