THE 1958 Ingathering in the Southern Union is completed! The Carolina Conference was the first, not only in the Southern Union but in the world, with a total of \$97,900. The second was Georgia-Cumberland with \$120,000; the third, Kentucky-Tennessee with \$129,500; the fourth, Florida with \$192,316.80; the fifth was Alabama-Missispipi with \$85,000. South Atlantic with \$86,279.97 and South Central with \$50,000 finish about the same time.

Many thousands of contacts have been made during this program telling people about the work of our church and giving them literature. All groups and all ages had a part in achieving success. A letter from Elder Elliston, Home Missionary secretary of Alabama-

1958 -- Era of Practical Skills

A NTHROPOLOGISTS tell us that we humans have arrived where we are today largely because it is the good fortune of our species to possess the apposite thumb. Men's ability to use his thumb in apposition to his fingers makes his hand a useful and delicate tool. God created man in "His own image," and through the application of these God-given attributes of intelligence and manual dexterity, humans have been able to greatly multiply their scant physical powers. Examples of these facilities which we take for granted today are giant earth-moving machines, electronic "brains," ocean liners, transport planes, automobiles, atomic and hydrogen power potential, and hundreds of others.

From the beginning of time to the Industrial Revolution almost every man who survived was skilled in the use of his hands. The swift rise of industrialization seemed to ring the death knell for hand craftsmanship as individual artisans became less and less able to compete in the market place with mass production methods.

Today, however, we seem to be on the threshold of a great renaissance of the useful arts. Automation is freeing men from the monotonous routine of the assembly line to more creative and satisfying endeavors. Educational programs everywhere are providing facilities for training people, particularly young people, how to use their native faculties to best advantage. Almost without exception, new schools are being built with particular emphasis and planning going into departments of Home Economics and Industrial Arts; so that no student need suffer the stigma of manual and technical illiteracy.

Southern Missionary College is keeping abreast of this trend. The Industrial Education students are erecting a commodious addition to our present space which will provide a twocar auto mechanics laboratory with a Gilbarco hydraulic lift. The College Board, in full recognition of the increasing importance of Industrial Arts training for our Adventist young people, appropriated the necessary funds for materials and equipment.

Plans are now being formulated which will very definitely link the college industries with the instructional program. Each job area will be considered a laboratory where the student will receive college credit for attending class discussions dealing with his particular work and meeting certain colateral assignments. This places one's job-training on a scientific plane. "Every youth on leaving school should have acquired a knowledge of some trade or occupation by which, if need be, he may earn a livelihood." Education p. 218.

A spearhead class of two young men and nine young ladies are enrolled in the course "Practical Home Arts" this year. They are elementary teacher trainees who are learning to fabricate, assemble, and finish woodwork projects, cut, grind and join metals, set up a small workshop, and make numerous common household repairs that they might have this knowledge to convey to their pupils.

Young ladies particularly of the Southern Union will be happy to know that good progress is being made on the new Home Economics building. It is anticipated that at the beginning of next school year, this department will already be enjoying their new, modern quarters.

A certain Greek philosopher once stated that "whoever neglects his learning in his youth loses the past and is dead for the future." Never feel, young people, that one is wise to quit school in order to get a job and earn money. The U. S. Employment Office has 1,700 branch offices over the country. They are certainly in a position to issue authentic observations on occupational cross-sections. They recently wrote in a report that 90% of the high school "drop-outs" who ap-ply for jobs do not know their capabilities nor what they would like most to do. The old statement is still true that "to make the road to success a little shorter, go to school a little longer." Southern Missionary College stands ready to help you realize your ambitions.

JOIN FORCES TO LAUNCH

Alabama-Mississippi Conference

THIRD ANNUAL

United Crusade

Fifty ministers and laymen gathered in Meridian in a four-day concentrated evangelistic council in preparation for the launching of the third annual conference-wide Crusade. Ninety-two were baptized the first quarter of 1957 as a result of services held simultaneously in twentyseven churches of the conference.

These fifty men will preach over 370 sermons in four weeks' time. Their messages will lift up the truth and present the eminence of the Lord's return in thirty-seven churches.

A full agenda of evangelistic topics was covered during the four-day convention. Counsel came from General Conference leaders, Elders R. R. Figuhr and G. W. Chambers; Southern Union Conference officers: Elders Don R. Rees, S. S. Will, L. M. Nelson, H. S. Hanson, and Eric Ristau; and Evangelist R. K. Cemer.

Great changes are soon to take place in our world and the final movements will be rapid ones. (Volume 9) This was reimpressed very graphically upon my mind the other day on reading a report that came to my desk.

A man, who had been a professional writer for 35 years, said in substance, "I have seen some things come and go," and then he mentioned some of the things that had come and they are all miracles: Radio, TV, regular passenger travel by plane, automobiles in mass, good roads everywhere, trucks—a new way to haul, farm tractors, diesels, earth movers, oil as a fuel, inter-city dialing, jet planes, electronics, man-made fibers, the atom. He said he had seen the significance of some of these; some of them he simply couldn't believe or imagine.

Other items that he mentioned—The rise of the suburbs, shopping centers, supermarkets, streetcar and interurban tracks torn up, decay at the center of cities, women working in droves . . . changing attitudes. Income tax starting in 1917 at 4%; some people fearing they might even go up to 12%, and public men pooh-poohed the fear.

Organized labor was a trifle. He had a vague idea that unions might grow, but never dreamed they would reach present stature.

The public debt was 24 billions, and then it was cut to 16 billions. Then when it reached 40 billions, the expert said if it reached 50 billions it would mean sure disaster. Now we have a 274 billions dollar debt with serious talk of raising the ceiling to 350 billions.

Some of us have been privileged to see the unfolding of all the items mentioned above by this famous writer. The very reviewing of these things is startling. Great changes have already taken place in our world and we may be sure (and we are writing concerning religious liberty) that the very liberties we have cherished so long will just as quickly disappear. In fact, never was there a greater crisis in this regard than now.

Let us all, as Ioyal Adventists and as

Short Church Revivals Bring Success

IN AUGUST we launched out in a new soul-winning program in the Carolina Conference. The first of a series of two-week decision revival services was held in the Spartanburg, South Carolina, church. The results assured us that the Lord was leading in this new endeavor.

We went into this program with a three-fold purpose as a goal—first and foremost, to strengthen and revive our own church members; second, to help those who were interested in the message to make definite decisions; third, to create new interest that could be developed in the future. To date this has been accomplished through each revival.

In one church where the customary attendance at prayer meeting was from six to ten, the attendance since the revival ranges from forty to seventy each Wednesday evening. In another where prayer meeting had been dispensed entirely it has now been resumed with an excellent attendance each week.

We have experienced many thrilling facts by having these meetings in our churches. People do not hesitate to attend services held in our churches; and there is not the tendency for them to drop off as the Sabbath is presented, because they expect to hear it. Our members' faith and courage is increased as they see non-Adventists coming to their church night after night, and in each series attendance has increased nightly. Personal contact is the best and the least expensive form of advertisement, and the expense of these meetings can be cared for from the evening offerings. Above all else, we have found that this is an effectual way to win souls to Christ.

We have started each series on Sun-

day night and run for fifteen consecutive evenings, concluding on the third Sunday night. The central theme of the meetings is the second coming of Christ, and on the second night of the series we start a Bible class which is conducted after the main service. Only those who wish stay for this class, and the central theme of the studies is the true church and the false church. It is during these studies that the more testing truths are presented. It has proved to be amazing the large number of the people who stay for this after meeting, and in this way only those who are actually interested hear the truths that may offend the casual visitor.

To date we have completed six of these short campaigns and forty-nine people have been baptized into the fold of God. Many more made definite decisions and are studying in preparation for baptism. This success could not have been possible without the complete co-operation and interest of the church members and local pastors, and I want now to thank each of them for the tremendous part that they have played in this program.

THE PROOF THEY PAY

Our union evangelist, B. L. Hassenpflug, for the past few months has been conducting revival meetings in various places in the union and he can testify to the effectiveness of that method of evangelism. The picture of his baptismal class in Cleveland, Tennessee, and the fact that he baptized more several weeks later is tangible proof that revivals bring results.

During the month of December of last year he conducted two more meetings in Louisville, Kentucky, where thirty-six took their stand and sixteen were baptized. Others will come a little later.

Let us pray each day that God will guide and will bless our ministers and laymen as they endeavor to reach the honest in heart with the truth of God.
