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Our Only Hope in Finishing the Work



The need of the Holy Spirit in the Church and in the Individual Life

A finished article, a finished work, a finished life are alike the only sources of true satisfaction and reward in life.

Jesus had this sense of satisfaction when He prayed "I have glorified thee on the earth: I have finished the work which thou gavest me to do." (John 17:4) The last agonized cry from the heart of the dying Saviour, "It is finished", reveals to us his satisfaction in a "finished work". His reward was guaranteed. "He shall see of the travail of His soul and shall be satisfied" Isa. 53:11.

History says much about the seemingly undying enmity between the Welsh and the English in feud and war. But a way was found to understanding, confidence, unity and love when the king made his home in Wales for the birth of his son. This prince, born in Wales, was accepted by the Welsh as their own. He received the title "Prince of Wales" qualifying him to ascend the throne as the king of a "United Kingdom."

Similarly Jesus was born of a woman to live among us. He spoke of Himself as the "Son of Man," fully identifying Himself with us. He became tired, He hungered, He suffered, He was tempted just like any of us. This qualified Him to be an understanding and compassionate

Advocate and Mediator on man's behalf at the throne of God. Thus you and I have in Jesus a living High Priest, one who is able to "save to the uttermost."

Having encumbered Himself with a human form in order to come close to us Jesus could not, at the same time, be everywhere present on earth. This is a background to Christ's most arresting words—"It is expedient for you that I go away: for if I go not away, the Comforter will not come unto you; but if I depart I will send Him unto you" John 16:7.

It is also true that while Jesus was with the disciples in person they could not and did not sense their need of the Holy Spirit. Only after the ascension did this "sense of need" drive them to ask and pray for this promised Holy Gift. As they prayed, the Father having accepted Christ's sacrifice for fallen man, the Holy Spirit was poured out in fulness of power upon them. This was the evidence that Christ had entered upon his work as our Mediator, Advocate and High Priest above.

"Therefore being by the right hand of God exalted, and having received of the Father the promise of the Holy Ghost, He hath shed forth this which ye now see and hear" (Acts 2:33).

Pentecost, the promised blessing, endued them with power from on high.

The Holy Spirit, unencumbered with human form, is present at the same time in different places, bringing the fulness of God and the efficacy of Christ's death resurrection and mediatorial work to each seeking, believing heart.

These great facts can be described as a setting up of "diplomatic relations" between heaven and earth.

There is the heavenly court above, at the throne of God, where Christ mediates as the Christian's Ambassador. He is our personal representative. Are our cases in His hands?

There is also the court of the human heart here below where the Holy Spirit, the Ambassador of heaven, pleads the love of God and the grace of Christ. To receive the Holy Spirit as the Ambassador of salvation is to receive God and our Lord Jesus into our lives.

We are now able to realize why the sin against the Holy Spirit is unpardonable and fatal. Because all that God is, and all that Jesus has done and is doing for us is mediated to us through the Holy Spirit, should we not, then, reverently consider a question the apostle Paul once asked certain believers? "Have

A Friendly Chat with your Division President

Dear Ones Who Have Been Called of God:

Last month I wrote to you about great grace that God sends in response to our prayers for an outpouring of the Holy Spirit. This is a tremendously important subject. I want to talk more about it with you this month as well. There are some beautiful and practical lessons for us in Acts 4:33.

Let us read Luke's words again. "And with great power gave the apostles witness of the resurrection of the Lord Jesus: and great grace was upon them all."

Remember I pointed out that great grace, as well as great power, is one of the enabling blessings of Pentecost. We should rejoice rather than become disheartened when God sends the former rather than the latter rain to us in response to our prayers.

Now let us pursue the practical study of the promise further.

Speaking of the work of the Holy Spirit Jesus once said, "He shall glorify me," John 16:14. "In these words Christ declares the crowning work of the Holy Spirit. The Spirit glorifies Christ by making Him the object of supreme regard, and the Saviour becomes the delight, the rejoicing, of the human agent, in whose heart is wrought this transformation." My Life Today, p. 49.

"We need constantly a fresh revelation of Christ," the messenger of the Lord reminds us (The Ministry of Healing, p. 503). Then she describes the Agency which brings this revelation to us. "He who feels most deeply his need of divine aid will plead for it; and the Holy Spirit will give unto him glimpses of Jesus that will strengthen and uplift the soul." The Desire of Ages, p. 436.

Christlikeness—becoming more and more like our Master—is an experience which will become a reality in our lives only through the work of the Holy Spirit. It will be ours only as we have been to Pentecost as well as to Calvary.

"O that the baptism of the Holy Spirit might come upon you, that you might be imbued with the Spirit of God! Then day by day you will become more and more conformed to the image of Christ, and in every action of your life the question would be, 'Will it glorify my Master?'" My Life Today, p. 49.

How can we glorify our Saviour more than by revealing His character in a revolted world? To reveal the character of Christ requires great grace. This great grace comes with the outpouring of the Holy Spirit in our lives. This may come in response to our earnest prayer for the Spirit's power in our behalf. Great grace alone can help us win our battles with the evil one.

When you bite your tongue and by God's grace keep back a flood of stinging words that would hurt a brother it is a tiny earnest of Pentecost. God has heard your prayers for the Holy Spirit's presence in your life.

When we are opposed, baffled, frustrated, and we are enabled to keep calm and sweet and Christlike it is an evidence of that "full and generous grace which has overflowed into our lives" Eph. 1:8 (Phillips). This must be true, for "His grace alone can enable us to resist and subdue the tendencies of our fallen nature." The Ministry of Healing, p. 428.

When Satan tempts you to go to some place you could not take your Saviour with you and you wavered a moment on the brink of spiritual failure, then the power outside yourself took over and you felt great grace flood your soul and turn your footsteps from the place of sin, that victory was a little taste of your Pentecost. Your prayer for the outpouring of the Holy Spirit was not in vain!

If some time the bright lights of the world fascinated and dazzled you and for a few moments the cross and the crown grew dim, when in response to a faltering prayer for help great grace moved in and the dying Lamb of God on Calvary's hill came back into focus you triumphed in His power. That victory won by God's great grace was a little taste of your Pentecost. Your prayer for the outpouring of the Holy Spirit that morning did not go unanswered.

When the evil spectre of dishonest advantage beckons you to personal gain, or a shady business deal would enhance your bank account but wreck your soul, the grace of God interposes in your behalf and saves you from a seared conscience and spiritual shipwreck—that victory is a little taste of your Pentecost. Your prayer for the Holy Spirit's help reached the courts of God and He provided the great grace you so much needed!

For most of us this great grace may perhaps be the greatest, if not the only, evidence of the Spirit's power in our lives. It may be our only proof that we have been to Pentecost as well as to Calvary. Ours may be the powerful witness of a Christlike life rather than Spirit-filled preaching from a Pentecostal pulpit. But it is still the power of the Holy Spirit—the outworking of Pentecost in our lives. Let us thank God for it. We need never fear when great grace possesses us, for if God so wills the great power will be ours too at His appointed time and place.

So pray on, my brother, my sister. There is no greater need in your life and mine than the outpouring of the Holy Spirit. We need great grace and great power to finish the work in Trans-Africa!

ye received the Holy Ghost since ye believed?" Can we know? My answer is "yes." How then can we know?

In John 16:8 Jesus tells us that when the Holy Spirit comes His first work is to "reprove" or "convince" of sin. This conviction of sin is the "rebuke" and "chastening" which are the evidences that the Lord has set His love upon us. It is the "knocking" of the Saviour who comes to give "repentance" and "forgiveness" Acts 5:31. The eye of the Holy Spirit quickly detects all wrong motives and sin in the soul. A woman once dressed herself shabbily to consult a great specialist. She pleaded poverty. She swore that she had nothing with which to pay. The great man's heart was touched. Moved with compassion and pity he undertook her case as an act of charity. X-ray pictures were taken of her for the purpose of diagnosis. These revealed a false waist with a large number of golden coins stitched into the material. She stood unmasked, revealed for what she was. Even so, the Holy Spirit comes first as the great sin detector and then the giver of repentance in the soul.

The second work of the Holy Spirit is to convince of "righteousness." He who has truly received both "repentance" and "forgiveness" does not want to sin again. His "hunger" and "thirst" of soul are for righteousness. Daily dying to self and sin, he experiences the power of the Holy Spirit to daily live for Christ and righteousness.

The third work of the Holy Spirit is to convince of "judgment." We should be sobered by the fact that the hour of His investigative "judgment is come" and that the hour of His executive judgment is at the door. We are to live and witness as those who must give personal account to the Lord as well as for the souls of others. A great sense of urgency should be resting upon us now. It is almost sunset, and if we fail to gather in the sheaves now, they will be forever lost.

To ask for and to claim the promised gift of the Holy Spirit is to seek for the power of God. Such praying is the cry of the soul in its need for power to live and to witness for the Lord.

The Lord's work cannot be finished in the world until it is finished in the church. It cannot be finished in the church until it is finished in the hearts of the members. As the message goes forth advancing to every nation on earth, the church should be advancing in grace and power. This in turn should challenge each one of us to advance

spiritually with an advancing church. The church cannot be ready until its members are ready and that includes you and me.

In Isaiah 57:15 we read "Thus saith the High and Holy one . . . I dwell in the high and holy place, with him also that is of a contrite and humble spirit, to revive the spirit of the humble, and to revive the heart of the contrite ones."

"Christ promised the gift of the Holy Spirit to His church and the promise belongs as much to us as to the first disciples. . . .

"We cannot use the Holy Spirit; the Spirit is to use us. . . . But many will not submit to be led. They want to manage themselves. This is why they do not receive the heavenly gift. Only to those who wait humbly upon God, who watch for His guidance and grace, is the Spirit given. This promised blessing, claimed by faith, brings all other

blessings in its train. It is given according to the riches of the grace of Christ, and He is ready to supply every soul according to the capacity to receive.

The impartation of the Spirit is the impartation of the life of Christ. Those only who are thus taught of God, those only who possess the inward working of the Spirit, and in whose life the Christ-life is manifested, can stand as true representatives of the Saviour. . . .

"When one is fully emptied of self, when every false God is cast out of the soul, the vacuum is filled by the inflowing of the Spirit of Christ."—Gospel Workers, pages 284, 285, 287.

This is the only basis for spiritual revival and reformation. In fact, this is our only hope of a finished work within the soul, the church, and the world. Thus and thus only shall "a people be made ready prepared for the Lord."

A man from Pretoria sat in a Sabbathschool institute meeting in Johannesburg one day. Suddenly an experience which was being told made a deep impression on his mind. Then an idea struck him. During the succeeding hours of the day his thinking crystallized so that before retiring that night he had a plan worked out.

Certainty In Uncertainty









And moulded with my power and art a young child's soft and yielding heart.


I came again when years were gone: it was a man I looked upon. He still that early impress bore, and I could fashion it no more.

Young women also are eager to learn, as you can see by this keen group just emerging from a classroom block at Mombera Secondary School in Malawi.





Where there are Schools there must be Teachers' Homes. These will soon be occupied when staff members arrive to commence work at the New Training School near Bujumbura, Burundi.






The future is in the hands of the Homemakers, and these girls at Malamulo Training Institute are learning to be good ones.








Boys must learn to build. These students have been working on another wing of their Secondary School block at Mombera, in Malawi. They were about to put the roof on when this picture was taken.

AROUND OUR UNIONS

A Church for Every City

ONE of the greatest challenges in our work today is the cities of our great Division. Into these urban areas the progressive and money-earning population are flocking by their countless thousands. There, cut off from the natural restrictions of home life, many lose their sense of values and become completely absorbed in a life of pleasure and sin. Yet Jesus died to save these city-dwellers as verily as He did for the farmers in the country.

For many years we have accustomed ourselves to working in rural areas where an effort meant little more than inviting people to attend meetings under some prominent tree. Techniques were simple and the expenses small. At the conclusion of the effort a small temporary church building was erected and the people were left with a place, albeit humble, where they could worship. These methods have been followed with wonderful success for over half a century and undoubtedly the Lord has blesssed in a remarkable way.

There were good reasons for concentrating our work in rural areas. The population tended to be stable, land was easy to obtain, and expenses were low. However, with the growth of cities and the concentration of people in those cities our minds and energies must be directed more fully to them. Here, our methods, the techniques we use, and our plans must be geared to the tempo of city life. Here it is no longer possible or expedient to meet under a tree, and people must be persuaded to attend evangelistic meetings in competition with the attractions of the cinema, dance hall, and in many places, television. Thank God that the Gospel, preached in sincerity and humility, still has power to attract. Many of our faithful evangelists have succeeded in filling large halls for several weeks, and in winning many souls.

A serious problem confronts the evangelist at the conclusion of the meetings. People have been converted and wish to join the church. Maybe the meetings have been held in a cinema or

hall, and the question is asked, "Where shall we worship when the meetings are over?" Too often there is no place! Bear in mind that many have worshipped in beautiful cathedrals where everything is constructed to please the eye. They have been taught that God meets with them in such places. Now they have seen new truth in the Bible which they have accepted, often against bitter opposition, only to be told that we have no proper meeting place. The devil is quick to use this as a means to discourage new believers in cities. Their old friends and ministers say, "How can Adventists have the truth when they worship in a dance hall, cinema or some layman's house?" The messenger of the Lord saw this as long ago as 1900 for she wrote in that year, "As persons be-come interested in the truth, they are told by the ministers of other churchesand these words are echoed by the church members—'These people have no church, and you have no place to worship. You are a small company, poor and unlearned. In a short time the ministers will go away, and then the interest will die down. Then you will give up all these new ideas which you have received.' Can we suppose that this will not bring strong temptations to those who see the reasons for our faith and are convicted by the Spirit of God in regard to present truth?"—Evangelism, page 376.

The answer is a simple one to state but a difficult one to implement—every time we hold a city effort we should include in our planning the erection of a church. Sister White's counsel is clear, "Wherever a company of believers is raised up, a house of worship should be built. Let not the workers leave the place without accomplishing this." — Evangelism, page 376 (italics ours.) She goes on to state that it is right and proper to organize the new converts so that they can help in the building work. The point is, however, that our city evangelism must include a plan for a church.

This will require some changes in our approach to our work. We will have to recognize that city work costs money. Further, it will be necessary for our people in the areas where the work has been established for decades to accept more and more of the financial obligations. How can we, who have had the gospel so long, sit by complacently and accept

large sums of money from our friends overseas, for the conducting of our work in well-established areas, while our brothers and sisters in the cities are left ignorant of the truth of a soon-coming Saviour? The time has come when the work in our firmly established fields should become self-supporting, thus releasing funds for new work. May God give us all a vision of the dying multitudes in the cities of the Trans-Africa Division! Our motto should be—"A Church for Every City of the Trans-Africa Division."

Colporteur Institutes in the East and North Congo

PLANS were laid some time ago for us to visit the East and North Congo fields, but due to unsettled conditions we were not able to undertake this trip when we wished. Finally the way opened and preparations were made.

Pastor G. M. Ellstrom, the Congo Union's Home Missionary secretary, and the writer, left by car for these fields. It was not possible for us to travel through the Congo, so we had to take a circuitous route through Northern Rhodesia, Tanganyika and Uganda and re-enter the Congo at Kisoro. The 2,500 miles took us four days under trying and dusty conditions.

Once back in the Congo we made our way to Masisi, the headquarters of the East Congo Field (this is the new name for the Central Kivu Field). At this place an institute was conducted for 30 of our regular and student colporteurs. For four days, seven hours a day, we studied ways and means of taking the message through the printed page into the homes of the people. A new goal of Fr. 20,633 sales per month was set by the regular colporteurs. This was a good step forward, for during the first six months of this year this standard had not quite been achieved.

Our next visit was to Rwese, headquarters of the North Congo Field. Here we found 20 colporteurs and students waiting to be instructed in the art of selling gospel literature. We spent three days of intensive study with them, and at the end of the institute I made a call for their new monthly goal. The 14 regular colporteurs assembled set as their goal the reaching of Fr.15,250 in sales. This is more than they are doing at present so again another step forward was achieved.

From Rwese we went to Talla Station farther north. Here we found four men waiting to be instructed, and for three days we too studied together. They set themselves a goal of Frs.5,000 sales a month.

This brought us to the end of our safari in the northern parts of the Congo Union. After a week of car travelling we arrived safely in Elisabethville.

Back in the office I had opportunity to study the figures of the Publishing Department report for the first six months of 1964. The total colporteur sales is nearly half a million francs. The combined sales of colporteurs, pastors and bookrooms amounted to more than one million francs. The West Congo Field has a goal of Frs.150,000 for 1964, but in May of this year they had already sold books to the value of Frs. 165,000. One woman colporteur in Leopoldville in 32 hours received Frs. 88,500 for books sold. The South Katanga Station workers went to Kolwezi for their first Big Week, and they reached a total of Frs.152,880.

Fellow-workers in the Trans-Africa Division, we are very glad to share with you these good reports from the Congo Union. May the Lord give peace and unity to this country in order that the Lord's work can be done and even greater results be reached. But more than this we desire a rich harvest of souls to be brought in, and for Jesus to come soon to claim His own from the Congo. Please remember the work in this great union in your prayers.

matter was settled and Adronikas prepared himself for the journey.

During the last day of work, however, temptation came his way. "How nice," he thought, "it would be if I could borrow my master's car for some business I have to do." The thought became action and soon he found himself sitting in the car behind the wheel. With the left hand he turned on the ignition, the car started, and he found himself driving down the road. It wasn't long, though, before the car owner missed both Adronikas and the car, and soon Adronikas found himself behind bars where he was to stay for two years.

In connection with the independence celebrations in Tanganyika a large number of prisoners were given amnesty and among them was Adronikas. Soon he found himself on the way to his home in Kenya. But peace of heart had gone. Bitter regret and self-reproach haunted him in his sleep and often he would look at the offending left hand that had started the car. What could he do to make everything right with God?

One day he was reading the Gospel of Mark; there he found a text that he felt was written especially for him. "If thy hand offend thee cut it off."

He looked at the hand and felt that by starting the car it had betrayed him; he picked up a sharp panga from the floor, placed his arm on the window ledge and with misdirected zeal cut off the hand with one stroke.

His relatives found him on the floor in a pool of blood. He was brought to the hospital where later examination proved him absolutely sane and after treatment he was sent home.

Some months later he was contacted by our church and through the companionship and interest of workers and laymen he found a new joy in the Lord. He is now baptized and, crippled as he is, he does what he can to tell neighbours of his new happiness in the Lord.

Spiritual Darkness Still Prevalent in Swaziland

In Swaziland, as in many other countries, the people are still in deep superstition and in great need of the gospel message to point them to Jesus. The following letter received from Sister Elizabeth S. Masinga, a member of our church in Swaziland, will give the readers of Outlook some idea of what these people still believe.

"Dear Elder Harcombe,

"The work is great here, pastor, and we need more workers to labour in Swaziland. People still believe in spirits. When someone takes ill, members of his family go to a witchdoctor who usually tells them that someone in the vicinity is trying to kill him. The patient will then receive cuts all over the body and some raw medicine will be inserted in the cuts. After this so-called 'injection,' members of the family take a spear and push it into the ground so that according to their superstition, the person who is believed to have bewitched the 'patient' should die or take ill.

"There was a young girl of one of the members of the royal family where we stay, who went to a festival which occurs once a year at the Royal Kraal. In this ceremony all the young girls from all over Swaziland who are virgins have to collect reeds and go to the Royal Kraal at Lobamba. There they dance almost naked for about three days. (Usually it is at this time that the King chooses his wife or wives). The festival is called 'Umhlanga' (a reed). The girls have to travel for two weeks because they come from all parts of Swaziland.

"This young girl went there with insufficient clothing and came back suffering from a cold. A week passed and no attention or medicine was given to her. We then received news that the girl was very ill. When we got home we discovered that she had double pneumonia and was coughing blood and could not even eat. My husband and I requested her parents to let us take the child and treat her. This was on the preparation day. We applied fomentations and gave her pills. She was delirious and called to imaginary people whom we could not see. We prayed for her on the Sabbath. Because I had no hot-water bottle, I used to put some stones in the fire so that I could keep

her warm at all times. On the same Sabbath she perspired a lot and for the first time had a good sleep. By the grace of God the child was healed and was present at the camp-meeting.

"Time is short, and I cannot relate all the stories about the work in Swaziland but there are so few labourers. We need a hospital, a clinic or a dispensary. Please pray for us and send us more workers.

In Swaziland we have one secondary school at Mahamba and the Phongo-lwana primary school. Besides these two

schools, there are only two evangelists and one full-time literature-evangelist. Yes, there are many unentered areas in this country, and I am sure if we can establish some medical work, such as a clinic, this will help not only to bring relief to the many physically sick people, but also to bring healing to the soul. It will break down the barrier of prejudice and thus help us carry the third angel's message to them. We are praying, trusting and planning to bring in the much needed right arm of the message and we only hope that it will not be too long delayed.

The Trans-Africa Division Publishing Department is showing a gain of £13,900 in deliveries for the first eight months of this year over 1963. Over 18,000 prayers have been offered in the homes of customers and nearly 16,000 Bible studies have been given during this period.

A large evangelistic campaign is being conducted in the Cape Peninsula by F. C. Pelser, assisted by G. Beyers and others from the Good Hope Conference. Ten thousand requests for reserved tickets for the opening address were received, and six sessions had to be arranged to meet this demand. Early in the campaign 400 enrolments were received for the Bible Correspondence lessons. These came to hand before the course was offered. Meetings in Salt River, Elsies River and Athlone are being held concurrently with the main evangelistic meetings.

Among other campaigns being conducted at present is one by Brother Ron Thompson in Bulawayo and one by D. Chalale from Maluti Hospital in Maseru, capital of Basutoland. Many other efforts are in progress throughout the Division and as reports come to hand we shall pass the good word on to our readers.

Workers returning from furlough include missionary nurses Miss R. D. Ashton of Kanye Hospital, Bechuanaland, Miss Paula Lamnek of the Congo Union, and Miss Edith Gilham who will be located at Malamulo Hospital in Malawi.

Mrs. Pauline Long who arrived from the United States recently is at Solusi College serving as Food Matron. We are glad to have Mrs. Long back in Africa as part of our working force here. Formerly she spent some years at Helderberg College.

The Dr. S. P. Marsa family have returned to Africa for another two-year term of service. This time they will be located at Heri Hospital in Tanganyika. Dr. Marsa, in conjunction with Dr. W. W. Oliphant and Dr. E. A. Calkins, is a member of the Orion Group located in Michigan, U.S.A. These three medical missionaries adhere to the plan of two partners working their medical practice and, at the same time, supporting the third partner in the mission field. All three men have spent terms of service in Africa.

Word from M. E. Lind, president of the East African Union, tells us that the Nairobi church has passed its Harvest Ingathering goal of Sh. 51,000. This is an excellent achievement.

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

The Roneo Company sent three of their men to give instruction and demonstrations in the use of duplicators and it was amazing to see the excellent duplicating work that can be done on these machines.

The daily workshop periods proved of great interest and permanent value and benefit to the class, and already we are finding a decided improvement in bulletins coming in from the fields.
