

The Bekwai Gospel Crusade

The first full-scale effort held in the town of Bekwai since 1948 was conducted in the three-week period October 9th to 30th. Although not long enough to allow a full coverage of the message, the thirteen meetings carried the people through non-controversial, controversial and decision subjects as follows:

13. Climax of the Gospel - Second coming.

A large, clean, centrally located Cocoa store served as a meeting-place and was equipped with proper chairs and seats with backs. The platform was tastefully decorated nightly

This group of evangelists with the aid of the Holy Spirit, successfully held a Crusade for God. with flowers and several bright pressure lamps were hung above the people so that the atmosphere was both pleasant and reverent.

Advertising designed to cover the entire town was in the form of well-prepared handbills announcing the subjects in a way that appealed to the imagination of all. Also hung up across the street by the building was a large banner with the words, "BEKWAI GOSPEL CRUSADE" printed so that they could be easily read and a large arrow pointed down towards the doors of the meeting-place.

On the first night all chairs were occupied and a large gathering assembled outside and listened to as much as they were able. The attendance kept up and must have averaged about three or four hundred people each night. Because of the large number of adults, we were not able to admit children unless they were in the company of their parents or guardians. Across the street a special children's meeting was tried as a means of occupy-



ing them. No doubt the nightly coloured pictures did much to attract the people. All those who attended every meeting of the series were eligible to receive a one-year's free subscription to the Signs of the Times. Various other inducements were given and the public responded in a wonderful way.

As we had intended the meetings to appeal more to the educated type of people, it was encouraging to see many notable Government workers and civic leaders coming along regularly. Many indicated a sincere desire to step out and begin keeping the Sabbath but were held back by fear of loosing their jobs. The evangelists are still working and praying with these men and it is hoped that many will eventually see the true value of earthly wealth as compared to that in heaven.

Music was presented by many groups from the College and surrounding Churches. A specially prepared song sheet enabled the congregation to enter into the singing heartily, thus opening their hearts to the words of truth that followed the song service.

A bookstand carrying a supply of "Crisis" books on the subjects as they were presented became a gathering place for interested persons and much message-filled literature was sold at reasonable prices. A question box also proved a good idea and many fine questions were answered night by night.

Because of the shortness of the campaign it was realized that nothing could be gained by just closing the meetings and returning to our homes. The seven Advanced Evangelistsin-training together with the six Secondary-Evangelists started early on personal work and any success that has come to the effort must be attributed to their faithfulness in this important part of the campaign. When the meetings ended on the 30th they were conducting regular Bible studies with almost one hundred sincere souls. On the basis of the usual system of estimating results it could be said that almost fifty definite souls were brought to the Lord as a result of the campaign. Of course many of these will not remain true but on the other hand many will become strong members of the church. The evangelists are still studying with the interested ones and more and more are responding to the call. Some are definitely ready for baptism already and we hope that the local pastor will be able to help in the final reaping of the harvest that has been ripened. Only eternity will reveal the full extent of that which was accomplished by the preaching of the word in Bekwai during the Bekwai Gospel Crusade.

Corporation head Robert R. Coles gives lunar investors a deed to an acre of good bottom land in the crater, with fishing and winter sports rights, and a map explaining how to see the land through a powerful telescope."

Whether this will ever be realized remains to be seen. However, we have a more sure hope on which our faith is based. "For I go to prepare a place for you. Abeokuta, an enthusiastic man who had received an indwelling truth, which had left some perplexing questions in his mind. These he longed to discuss with a representative of the Seventh-day Adventists. Seeing that he was on duty, I fixed another visit for his home, and he consented.

The day of my visit happened to fall on Sabbath the 22nd October, 1955, when Mr. M. Olayemi, the District Leader, Lagos and district, accompanied me to his home. We met our friend Mr. Shodiyan, and he gave us a hearty welcome. His wife was somewhere in the backyard while we discussed his questions. The man believed the Sabbath, no question about that, but the most interesting question was, "What ought I to eat and what ought I not to eat?" As we treated this question to his satisfaction, "I CONCUR" was his reply.

Before we left, his wife came and greeted us. After that, he decided to follow the truth and added that he would arrange for his family to be regular attendants at our Church.

To you, as workers throughout the world, especially in West Africa, our success in this town depends on your earnest prayers. 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Suggestions for Evangelistic Workers

1. At the beginning of the year, list different places where your efforts will be held at least for the duration of one month each, and submit it for the approval of your District Leader.

2. Prepare your sermons thoroughly: Don't be content with your old notes. Put in fresh ideas. This will require a good Bible study. Set apart each day a time for Bible study and sermon preparation.

3. Have some time for follow-up work.

4. Plan visiting time and regulate it, both at and around your station.

5. Have a definite goal for new souls and check up on your results.

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6. Try to double your church financial and membership goals.

7. List the names of all the members that have been in the church for a long time and who are not willing to be baptized. Go to them and encourage them for baptism.

8 Teach your baptismal class lessons regularly using the register. Prepare them thoroughly before you present them for baptism.

9. Plan to make your Sabbath School spiritual and lively. Let the entire membership take interest and an active part in it. Devise some ways and means of supplying picture rolls and picture cards to interest your children in their classes.

10. Promote the increase of the tithe. More tithe means more blessing in the field and more workers.

11. Arrange for the building or repairing of your church. An attractive church attracts people and is an honour unto God. Remember that the Israelites built their own worship place for God.

12. Set the laymen at work through the Home Missionary Organization. A working ehurch is a growing, living, and strong church.

Keep your money if you do not like to add to it." What I gave to him—sixpence —on top of his charge of 2/6d, he thought too small and refused to accept it.

Coppers are the commonest pieces of money that are thrown to beggars. The

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insignificant money gifts are often-times ignored even by beggars.

One day I was travelling from Tarkwa to Kumasi on a train. A beggar came to our coach when we reached Dunkwa and asked for a tip. A woman sitting near me took her purse and as she was about to take some money from it for this beggar, he said, "Please do not give me a penny, for I cannot do anything with it here." Just listen, I cannot do anything here with a penny. Are we content to give a penny to the Lord if even a beggar ignores it? The prophet Malachi in denouncing the insignificant offering of those who did not recognise the authority of God in their giving to Him said, "Offer it now unto thy governor; will he be pleased with thee, or accept thy person?" Mal. 1:8.

How important it is for the people of God to come to the realisation of giving according as the Lord has blessed them. The contentment of giving week by week, month by month and year by year the same beggar's money (penny) is an indication of ingratitude to the manifold blessings of the Lord.

It is an indisputable fact that the very living of mankind would be at stake, had the Omnipotent limited the supply of our necessities to our needs ten or twenty-five years ago. Through his liberality He keeps us and supplies our wants to march with the rising and advancement of the main cost of living. "Offer it now unto thy Governor," He says, "if he will be pleased with thee." Dare you give a penny, three pence or that insignificant offering to your headman, chief or ruler and hope to receive his approbation? A penny cannot even now buy a kenkey, neither is a three-penny piece worth of kenkey anything. The age long habit of dropping pennies in the offering plate should not continue now. It is true that there is no set amount mentioned in the Holy Scripture as to the giving of the offering but a set rule is provided whereby one can determine how much he is to give to the Lord and it is put in this simple language, "As God hath prospered him." 2 Cor. 16:2. Nobody can dispute the fact that God blesses him ten times more a week than a penny.

The widow denied herself of selfish joys and pleasures and gave unto the Lord her ONLY possession on earth, the "two mites". "God loveth a cheerful giver" who gives liberally; for through inspiration we have the admonition, "He which soweth sparingly shall reap also sparingly; and he which soweth bountifully shall reap also bountifully." 2 Cor. 9:6. The scathing rebuke to the Pharisees was due to the fact that they did not give according to the blessing they received from the Lord.

"And he said, Of truth I say unto you " that this poor widow hath cast in more than they all:

For all these have of their abundance cast in unto the offerings of God; but she of her penury hath cast in *all* the living that she had." Luke 21:3, 4.

It is a noticeable fact that dishonesty in giving of the offering is termed as robbery while liberal giving opens the windows of heaven and pours blessings upon the giver "that there shall not be room enough to receive it." Mal. 3:8, 10.

What will you give to your God from henceforth, tips or real offerings? May we day by day sit down to count the many blessings of God and give according as God hath prospered us.

There is always great danger in introducing certain changes and unfolded systems in the cause of God to suit the condition of modern civilization. To increase the membership of unconverted church-men and women, churches of today have set aside the fundamental principles of God, replacing them with customs and traditions of men. It is surprising, that such a degenerating spirit of service is rapidly stealing into the remnant church of God.

This Advent Movement has some important doctrinal peculiarities which differentiate it from other christian religions. These are our badges of distinction, and should not be concealed. I advise, therefore, that all teachers take an active part in all missionary , activities, and discharge their honest obligation with indefatigable efforts, for yet a little while and we shall be at rest with Prince Emmanuel.

WHAT CHRIST SAID ABOUT PLANNING

"For which of you, intending to build a tower, sitteth not down first and counteth the cost? "Or what King, going to make war against another King sitteth not down first, and consulteth whether he be able to meet him that cometh against him. . . ?" Luke 14: 28, 31. The sermon that moves, the districts and churches that grow rapidly, the goals that are doubled, are the result of good plans and organisation; such work meets the approval of the Spirit of God who delights in decency and in order.

God's Plans

"But when the fulness of the time was come, God sent forth His Son" Gal. 4:4. This also indicates that God does His work according to well-laid plans. 

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
