# **Parents' Exchange two Extremes**

The way your child will develop is entirely up to you. His abilities, his outlook on life, his failures are a large part determined by his discipline or lack of it.

If you discipline too severely, his mind may become warped. He loses the desire to choose for himself what is right and wrong. He awaits your decision on what to do next. He matures into an adult that is easily swayed to and fro. He is influenced by good or evil, whichever one comes along first.

Let us now take the case of the child who is allowed to develop his own strong mind. The parents never tell him, "No." He goes from one thing to another as he pleases. By the time he reaches the age of five, he is no longer under the control of the parents. True, he may appear to mind at times, but

mainly it is only to reach his own objectives. He knows about how much he can get away with and pushes it to the limit.

For example, Johnny has his new shoes on. His mother doesn't want him to wear them outside in his play. "Johnny, don't you dare go outside with your new shoes on!" she exclaims.

Johnny turns slowly round and looks intently at his mother. He thinks to himself, "She means it now: I'd better postpone my trip for a bit." So two-and-a-half-year-old Johnny slowly walks back into the house. He circles the room twice slowly, watching his mother very closely. She's talking to someone else now; she's forgotten him, he thinks. He slowly heads for the door. He has learned by now that he is doing something wrong, but he has also learned that his mother is very strict one minute and absentmindedly liberal the next. Slowly the door closes behind him, and he is off to play. There is triumph in his mind. Quickly he settles down to playing in his sand box. Later when he comes in for his afternoon nap, mother notices that he went out and played with his new shoes on.

"Johnny, didn't Mommy tell you not to go outside with your good shoes on? What will I ever do with you?" But nothing happens-Johnny goes to bed triumphant; he has won the contest.

Over the years many more incidents occur like this, until Johnny is a teen-ager.

"Hev. Mom, Ed and I are going out tonight."

"Where are you going son?" No answer-"You'd better stay home tonight, son." No answer.

"Good-bye, Mom, See you later." The front door slams as Johnny leaves. "What will I ever do with him when he just won't mind me?" she exclaims tearfully.

Mother, you missed the beat many years ago when Johnny was two and a half years old. For surely if a small child takes pleasure in obeying, he will naturally continue on this way with your help and love. His will-power will not have been damaged in any way but merely guided in the right path.

The first of these commissioning services modern "120" in the West African Union, were held in connection with some of the Camp Meetings in the East Nigerian Mission during the Camp Meetings November to December 1957.

A total of the 116 had fulfilled all the requirements of the General Conference Home Missionary Department. They had taken the course "Training Light Bearers" early in 1956 and had gone to work in a soul-winning endeavour and were successful in bringing in 412, who, at the time of the commissioning service, were prepared for baptism.

The first of these commissioning services was in Aba. The writer presented a message portraying the zeal of the early "120" (Acts 1:15.) They were the ones to whom the gospel commission was given by Jesus just before His ascension. Under the influence of the Holy Spirit in its out-pouring in the "Early Rain" the greatest soul-winning programme the world has known was carried on. The gospel was quickly preached to all the world. (Col. 1:23.) Today God is looking for a modern "120"who, when endued with the power of the "Latter Rain", who will go forth with similar zeal to finish the work of God.

Pastor A. Nzotta, the Home Missionary Secretary for the East Nigerian Mission introduced the candidates for commissioning and certified that the 32 who were standing to their feet had fulfilled all the requirements for commissioning as members of the modern "120". When asked if there were those present who had been brought into the truth by these 32, imagine the

thrill of seeing 112 stand to their feet. To each of the "120" was presented a certificate of commissioning and the writer gave the charge.

Then an impressive candle lighting service followed, which graphically brought to the attention of the large audience the way in which the light of the gospel spreads from one to the other. All those who had taken or were taking the course "Training Light Bearers" in the audience were asked to stand. Then after the reading of some appropriate passages on light bearing,' the Union Home Missionary Department Secretary lighted his candle and from his lighted candle, lighted the candle of the Home Missionary Department Secretary of the East Nigerian Mission. In turn he lighted the candles of each of the Home Missionary Leaders from the local churches who in turn lighted the candles of those who had just been commissioned as members of the modern "120". In Umubiakwa there was an even larger group ready for commissioning. A group of 40 had fulfilled all the requirements and had been the means of winning 100 to the truth.

Not far distance there was another group of 32 in Umuocha who were prepared. They had brought in 120.

It remained, however, for the little group in Umuokpara to shatter all records for soul-winning achievement. Twelve were prepared for commissioning as members of the modern "120", but they had been the means of bringing 80 into the truth, an average of over 6 souls won for each of the laymen who were commissioned.

It is most wonderful indeed to see the missionary zeal of our brethren and sisters in East Nigeria. A new day in soul-winning has dawned in the West African Union Mission. The East Nigerian Mission is leading the way to greater endeavour for God. I am sure that their enthusiasm will spread and similar commissioning services will be held in each of the other Missions of our Union.

## **Evangelistic Work in Lagos**

In September of 1956, we started the evangelistic campaign in Lisabi Hall, Ebute Metta, Lagos.

The first eighteen meetings were very good; many people attended, and they listened carefully to what the lecturer was teaching them.

After we presented the Sabbath with full explanation, we started house to house visitation. As we were going from house to house, we gave Bible studies. Some of the converts paid better attention to what we were teaching them than others did.

After we conducted 30 or 40 meetings in Lisabi Hall, the effort was interrupted because of vacations. After the expiration of the vacations we started a very big campaign at Glover Memorial Hall, Lagos. Many people attended nearly all of the meetings. Pastor C. D. Henri presented the Sabbath to them in a wonderful methodical way. As a result of this, many people decided to keep the Sabbath. After they signed the decision card, we started a very strong house to house visitation. Pastor Henri, the team leader taught us a new way of approaching the new converts. We accepted the method to help many to better understanding of the love of God.

We started keeping the Sabbath with the new converts in the Forester's Hall.

In September of 1957, nine people joined the church by baptism and also in the early part of December another 12 people joined.



Today, God is doing His work in Lagos in a miraculous way under the leadership

of Pastor C. D. Henri.

We have a separate church now on Lagos Island, and over 35 people are now worshipping the Lord every Sabbath in Forester's Hall. Through Pastor Henri's ministry during the evangelistic campaign, God increased the membership of the church in Yaba, and by house to house visitation many backsliders were reclaimed.

When Pastor Henri and a few of his associates were going to Abeokuta, the first civilized and educated city in Nigeria, we received a call from Ikeja that the same message is needed there. The team leader Pastor C. D. Henri said, "Mr. Adewoye, go to Ikeja, God will go with you". I went and with the help of Mr. Ephraim Oshundele and teacher Abjoye conducted eleven meetings there. Now we have 21 Sabbath keepers at Ikeja.

Another big effort began at Surulere, Lagos on 15th December 1957. Please pray for the team and the team leader and for the progress of God's work in Lagos and

its district.

## **Ghana Constituency Meeting**

The Fifth Biennial Constituency meeting of the Ghana Mission was held 26th-29th December, in the Assembly Hall of the S. D. A. Seminary Bekwai, Ashanti, where over two hundred delegates from all over Ghana transacted the business of the session.

At 7.30 p.m. on 26th December, the delegates were welcomed by Pastor C. B. Mensah, Associate President of the Ghana Mission. The official seating of delegates was carried out by Brother John Rigby, Secretary-Treasurer, after which Pastor W. J.

Newman gave the opening address.

Each morning of the session delegates met at 6.00 a.m. for Morning Watch. The devotional message on Friday, 27th December, on the topic "God is here" was given by Pastor H. J. Welch, President of the West African Union. The day was spent on the business of the session and committee meetings. The Friday evening devotional message was conducted by Pastor G. A. Lindsay, Treasurer of the Northern European Division, who gave delegates and others a few glimpses of our work behind the iron curtain in Russia.

The Sabbath School on 28th December. was under the direction of W. B. Ackah, Sabbath School Secretary for the Mission. The guest speaker for the Home Missionary was Pastor E. Keslake, Home service Missionary Secretary of the Union, who gave a report of the recent soul-winning activities of laymen in East Nigeria which climax. ed in the commissioning of the 120.

The speaker for the Divine Service was Pastor A. F. Tarr. President of the Northern European Division, who challenged the workers and lay leaders of the mission with a message based on the parable of the Marriage of the King's Son in Matthew 22. On Sabbath afternoon, stirring reports of the progress of the work in each area were given by the district leaders. Delegates were happy to hear of the goals reached, and sometimes surpassed in souls, baptisms, tithe, Ingathering and Sabbath School offerings.
