## THE ACHIEVEMENTS OF THE MINISTRY OF LITERATURE

"Our publishing work was established by the direction of God, and under His special supervision"—C.S. page 148.

This statement is one of the most striking passages that has ever flowed from the pen of inspiration, for it reveals to us how vitally important the literature ministry is in the eyes of our Heavenly Father.

The Roman Catholics in their faith have stated rightly that the strength of the Seventh-day Adventist Church is seen in their publishing programme. Pope Pius X has this to say: "To build churches, preach, hold cottage meetings, establish schools, do all the good work possible is all right. *But*, if you neglect to make use of the christian press, the greatest and most powerful weapon of our day, and if you fail to scatter abundantly religious literature, all your other efforts will be in vain."—*Arsenal of Pope Pius*.

Now, keeping in mind the foregoing statements, here below is a comparison picture of the literature progress of our West African Publishing Programme.

The wise man says: "A good report maketh the bones fat."—Proverbs 15:30. However, we give all the credit to our Heavenly Father for the gift of the Holy Spirit, and compliment our consecrated bookmen and their Publishing Secretaries, and Book and Bible House staff for their co-operation and guidance in making this possible.

Now, there is another interesting aspect to be considered. Over 50 percent of our Voice of Prophecy enrolments are through colporteur contacts in West Africa. In the world programme of the Voice of Prophecy, a very large portion of their baptized students can first trace their contact with our message through the efforts of the bookmen.

As we glimpse into the future, and reflect upon the prophetic picture of last day events which are taking shape, we are reminded of this statement by the servant of the Lord.

"God will soon do great things for us if we lie humble, and believing at His feet. . . . More than one thousand will soon be converted in one day, *most of whom*, will trace their first convictions to the reading of our publications.—*Review and Herald*, November

## Mampong District Revival Meetings

At the beginning of the year, plans were made to hold district Revival Meetings at Mprim, a village about five miles from Mampong Ashanti. On Friday April 4, the delegates from the nineteen churches and Companies arrived in numbers, and joined the local church, and we had a very good gathering of believers to enjoy the Word of God.

We were privileged to have Pastors C. B. Mensah and S. Appiah-Dankwah with us. We thank these brethren very sincerely for their good messages and inspiration brought to the people of God. On Sabbath and Sunday afternoons, we visited every home of the village, and conducted an open air service and I am happy to report that five souls were won to the faith by the grace of God.

### *Dorcas Society Meetings*

After the revival meetings, Pastor Mensah and the writer toured the Churches in Mampong District, and arranged for Women's Meetings separately, for two days. To our surprise one hundred women attended from the churches, for this special Meeting.

Instructions were given on, the noble mothers of the Bible, the husband and wife, their responsibilities in training their children and caring for the home, as well as organization and work of Dorcas societies in the churches.

Encouraging reports were rendered by the women, and as time was allowed for discussion in every period, many interesting questions were asked by the women concerning problems of married life, and most of them were solved. The women told us that they have benefited from the meetings and more similar ones should be arranged twice yearly.

### *Training Light Bearer Classes*

Immediately as we closed the women's meetings, sixty-seven strong lay men came to Mampong, and started the Training Light Bearer Classes. Pastor C. B. Mensah Ghana Mission's Home Missionary Secretary, Evangelist S. E. Manu, and the writer were the instructors for the four days training. We were surprised to see the keenness of our grown up students taking such an intensive course. At the end of the studies, Pastor Mensah examined all verbally, on all the technics of the course, and they all came out successfully.

"But of the times and the seasons, brethren, ye have no need that I write unto you. For yourselves know perfectly that the day of the Lord so cometh as a thief in the night . . . Ye are all the children of light, and the children of the day: we are not of the night, nor of darkness. Therefore let us not sleep, as do others; but let us watch and be sober" (1 Thessalonians 5:1-6).

The greatest tragedy in the life of anyone having such knowledge as Paul refers to would be to forget about it and fall into a sleep of indifference and unawareness. It is not how much one knows but how well he uses what he knows that will determine his readiness for Christ's coming. Christ gave in detail the events that would come to pass just before His Second Advent. The disciples were to bear witness to this good news and thus prepare others for the coming of this grand event.

Christ's answer to the disciples' question, "Tell us, when shall these things be? and what shall be the sign of thy coming, and of the end of the world?" was given in language that was simple, clear, and understandable. He warned of Satan's plan to deceive them. He spoke of the distorted concept of Christianity that would prevail, of the coming of false christs and their attendant false prophets, of national and international struggles and of the rise and fall of nations, of famines, of widespread earthquakes, of epidemic disorders, of religious persecution, of multiplied wickedness and social pressures.

Sky signs also were given as indicators of the nearness of His coming.

He told of an epidemic of fear that would invade the world before He comes, and then He stated that the preaching of the gospel in all the world would bring a climax to the work of sin and make possible His return. In His reply Christ gave everything except the date of His coming, and regarding this He said: "But of that day and hour knoweth no man, no, not the angels of heaven, but my Father only" (Matthew 24:36.) Then He added: "Therefore be ye also ready: for in such an hour as ye think not the Son of man cometh" (verse 44).

Today, every one of these signs has been fulfilled or is being fulfilled. Christ has done His part in warning the world of its coming night of eternal destruction. The warning signals have been hung high, and all who will may read and take shelter. The prophet Nahum said, "The Lord is good, a strong hold in the day of trouble; and he knoweth them that trust in him" (Nahum

1:7) And as we do our part, Christ promises, "Lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world." (Matthew 28:20.)

In this generation God has those who have heard His call and are willing to go and proclaim the gospel story to the whole world. The foundation has been laid, and we have reached the time in the history of the world when the stage is set and the proper climate has been provided in which to go and preach with power the coming of our Lord. We read, "But the end of all things is at hand: be ye therefore sober, and watch unto prayer" (1 Peter 4:7)

One hundred and thirteen years ago a movement destined to encircle the world with the everlasting gospel began in fulfilment of prophecy. Its message was the commandments of God and the faith of Jesus. The facilities for carrying forward the work were limited, and those who assumed the task were poor and few in number. But they were aggressive, devout, and Spirit filled.

It was the judgment-hour message, a Sabbath-reform message, a life-and-death message, a message of the everlasting gospel for this generation, and it is the message that we believe and to which we are committed to speed on to a triumphant finish.

When we read of the early beginnings of this movement and note the opposition and hard struggles the pioneers met in effecting the organization of this church, and then today see its international growth and development, we can but thank God for those who have gone on before. We are constrained to humbly offer our lives anew to God.

God is counting on His remnant church to finish the task of taking the gospel to the remotest parts of the world and to make ready a people for the second advent of Christ. Now is the only time left in which this soul-winning work can be done. "Let us not sleep, as do others."

Every true-hearted Seventh-day Adventist is committed to the task therefore throughout the entire church there should be total evangelism. Evangelism should stir the heart, beam from the eyes, and become the prayer on the lips of every converted soul in the church. We read: "The work of God in this earth can never be finished until

the men and women comprising our church membership rally to the work, and unite their efforts with those of ministers and church officers."—*Testimonies*, Vol. 9, page 117.

The church members must believe this with all their soul until the heart, the head, the hands, and the feet co-ordinate. God is calling every church member to the work of soul winning.

We are living in an age when man claims to have conquered earth gravity and now contemplates creating a mechanism to take him to the moon. Yet these scientific discoveries have only brought upon the world more confusion and greater perplexity.

We have come upon very strange times. The whole world is in a state of shock and is afflicted with the crippling disease of moral paralysis. National and racial hatreds have been so stirred that they are producing Frankensteins of violence almost beyond human control. The future of human existence is in doubt, and civilization itself seems to be in danger. The world has reached an epoch of global fatigue. These are the times when "men's hearts are failing them for fear, and for looking after those things which are coming on the earth." It is also the time when the Seventh-day Adventist Church must rise and shine, and her ministers, as flames of fire, must preach with greater boldness than ever before the three angels' messages of Revelation 14.

The messenger of the Lord has warned us: "We have no time to lose. The end is near. . . . We have warnings now which we may give, a work now which we may do; but soon it will be more difficult than we can imagine. God help us to keep in the channel of light, to work with our eyes fastened on Jesus, our Leader, and patiently, perseveringly press on to gain the victory."—*Ibid.*, Vol. 6, page 22.

The Seventh-day Adventist Church is a Pentecostal church. Holiness belongs in this church. The Holy Spirit has been given to guide the church. The cry of the world today is, "What shall we do?" Our answer is, "Repent and be baptized, and rise to walk in the new life of keeping the commandments of God and the faith of Jesus." Purity of living is fundamental with us, and the church

must now use all of its resources to climb to the summit of true godliness. The eyes of the world are upon us, and we must be counted standing up and not sitting down.

This world-wide task of preaching the gospel in all the world requires the service of representatives from every nation, every tongue, and every people. Jesus made it plain that the gospel is for every nationality, every language group and every type of personality. I thank God for the organized togetherness that is found in His remnant church and for the message that makes us one in Christ Jesus. There is no depth of sin into which one may have fallen that the blood of Christ cannot reach, and there is no human soul, however polluted, that His grace cannot save. Christ came to seek and to save the lost. He believed in the dignity of the human personality.

Evangelism is not to be assigned to a group of Seventh-day Adventist specialists only, but there must be an awareness on the part of the whole church that its very existence is dependent upon its soul-winning activities. Now is the time when the whole church must speak to the whole world for Christ.

When the apostle Paul wrote, "Let us not sleep, as do others," he was sending out a warning to the Christian church, and it is especially applicable to the church in the twentieth century.

In the hour of Christ's greatest need of the sympathy of His disciples, they became drowsy and fell asleep. Three of them had been eyewitnesses of His majesty in His transfigured glory. They were also with Him when the daughter of Jairus was raised from the dead. One had sworn eternal fealty to Him, and one had leaned upon His bosom. Yet they failed Him at a time when He needed them most. They could not wait with Him. They could not keep watch with Him for one hour.

Today the ratio of time has lessened. We are told that "we should have a continual sense of the shortness of time and of the fearful events which prophecy has declared must speedily take place."—*Ibid.*, Vol. 4, page 612.

Again Mrs. White wrote: "Only a moment of time, as it were, yet remains."—*Ibid.*, Vol. 6, page 14.

## The Unveiling And Dedication Ceremony; S. D. A. Church, Freetown

The booth at the Church-yard had been crowded with invitees from all sections of the city. Here and there were groups of ladies and gentlemen; some renewing old acquaintance and a good many dilating on the great change which had come over the building since its renovation and fencing. At the left corner of the building was a special group of youngmen who at one time or the other had been students at the Fourah Bay College but who had all enjoyed their primary school days at the Seventh-day Adventist School. Among this group was a young man standing in the centre who recently returned from England with a second class honour in Economics. They were all absorbed with the reminiscence of school days. The time scheduled for the dedication service was fast approaching and the inflow of invitees was becoming intense. Some had in mind 3 p.m. and others 3.30 p.m.; but the Mayor of the City who was to open the door had been timed for 3.30 p.m. It was just three minutes to time and the Mayor's car arrived with His Worship in his regalia. There was a hush, mingled with a happy satisfaction over the prompt arrival of His Worship.

He was met at the entrance by Mrs. S. Thompson-Smart who welcomed him and introduced to him the Mission Superintendent, the Secretary-Treasurer, and the West African Union representative.

During this introduction the little groups around the church-yard had dissolved, and, along with those crowded in the booth, had collected themselves at the main entrance for the opening ceremony.

Pastor J. B. Leigh, the pastor in charge, then handed the key to His Worship the Mayor who reverently stepped forward and opened the door. Among those who took part in the opening of the windows were: Mesdames F. G. Williams, M. M. Damanda, Virtue T. Davies, Henrietta Freeman, Annetta Williams, C. R. Sawyerr, and Messrs J. Johnson, Leo Davies, S. L. Bangura, J. K. Gbla and J. S. Myers.

Following the opening ceremony was the unveiling of a new organ by Mr. E. B. Auber who had deputized the Assistant Colonial Secretary, T. C. Luke Esq. The un-

veiling of a new reading desk by Mrs. C. R. Sawyerr who had deputized the wife of Police Magistrate S. B. Jones was the next item.

The service now assumed a more solemn aspect, and eight ministers of the denomination moved reverently in a procession from the main entrance, taking their respective seats at the rostrum. After a brief introduction of each of the African Pastors by Pastor J. B. Leigh, the congregation arose and sang the favourite Old Hundredth. Pastor J. B. Terry read for Scripture Lesson the 132nd Psalm. This was followed by a fervent prayer in which the Secretary Treasurer J. L. Muderspach besought God's blessing upon the meeting. A duet entitled "Is your all on the Altar?" was beautifully rendered by Mrs. E. Keslake and Miss V. W. Terry. Pastor M. T. Battle made a vivid and impressive introduction of Pastor Edgar Keslake, the West African Union Home Missionary Departmental Secretary, who was the preacher for the occasion.

For about twenty-five minutes Pastor Keslake held the audience spell-bound on the important subject, Salvation. He pointed out the facts which he confirmed by Scripture references that while education, politics, economics, social ethics and a host of other good pursuits were necessary in this life, yet Salvation is not gained merely by any or all of these put together. "Salvation belongeth unto God". "And", he continued, "it is only as we relate ourselves rightly in the sight of God by obeying His Word, and by keeping His Commandments and by trusting in Him that we can expect Salvation".

In the dedicatory prayer that followed Pastor M. T. Battle recommended the whole building to God for sacred use, and he further invited the continual presence of the Holy Spirit for the rededication of our lives and for the salvation of precious souls for God's everlasting Kingdom.

Following this prayer was a dedication song rendered by selected members from the Church at Waterloo.

After the offertory and the closing song "Great King Of Glory Come," Pastor J. B. Terry said the benediction. The congregation then sat and waited quietly while the Mayor, accompanied by Pastor M. T. Battle and the rest of the ministers reverently walked down the aisle and passed out. Thus ended the unveiling and dedication ceremony.

Last year, we visited St. Andrews Training College, Ashanti Mampong; Wesley College, Kumasi; and Kumasi College of Technology. In fact, the visit to these colleges helped us immensely in fulfilling one of our aims—promoting friendly relationships among its members and other students.

These visits offered us the opportunity of meeting other students to discuss with them matters of mutual interest. Wherever we went, we had the opportunity to approach the students individually to tell them more about our club and the purpose of our visit. All the colleges we visited showed a keen interest in our activities and our aims. We were always taken round the campus of every college we visited to places of interest.

Toward the latter part of the year, we visited Obuasi Mines, which are operated by the Ashanti Goldfields Corporation Limited, where we increased our stock of knowledge tremendously. Truly, it was a place where we witnessed much for our-

selves—seeing the process of turning raw gold dust into solid bars of gold.

We visited also Aburi Botanical Garden during the first term of this year. The garden, apart from its beauty and its fascinating sight was a wholesome place for resort. For even the plants surrounding us and conditions around us portray the love of God and bear witness to Him.

The club members have since the visit to the botanical garden become more active members in the church, and they have been doing tremendous work in the "Share Your Faith Campaign." Now it is the club's ardent desire to do all that it can do which will uplift and uphold the honour of our Adventist institution, both morally and logically, coupled with good behaviour. The last but not the least objective is to hoist the banner of Christ among people of West Africa; and to show them that it is fitting to follow Him, for He never falters nor fails those who whole-heartedly grasp Him tightly.

The club has also recently published a journal of 30 pages which covers a wide range of many aspects on teaching principles, our relationships with people and experiences of eminent people in many walks of life. How enjoyable it would be for you to have a copy of this attractive journal in your hands to peruse at leisure!

To end, I seize this privilege to extend my greeting to our dear fellow students in Nigeria, Liberia and Sierra Leone. "LONG LIVE TEACHERS OF TOMORROW CLUBS IN WEST AFRICA," for they remind us of the earnest work of American tutors in our cherished land.
