

THE 1958 GENERAL CONFERENCE SESSION

The city of Cleveland, Ohio, a large midwestern city of more than one million population, was host to the 48th Quadrennial Session of the General Conference of the Seventh-day Adventist Church, which opened with its departmental pre-sessions on Sunday, June 15.

Delegates of the home and missions unions of the Northern European Division were located in the large 14-storey Hilton-Statler Hotel, about a ten-minute walk from the - spacious Public Hall where all meetings of the convention were held.

Furloughing missionaries who represented West Africa as delegates were: H. J. Welch (delegate-at-large); T. W. Cantrell (Liberia); R. W. Coon, Dr. R. E. Davenport, G. M. Ellstrom, C. D. Henri, and Miss B. M. Turtill (Nigeria); E. Keslake (Ghana); and A. M. Moyer (Sierra Leone).

New missionary appointees en route to West Africa who were able to spend a few days before sailing and were thus made delegates included : M. E. Cross (Nigerian Training College), J. Fridley (Union Educational Secretary), W. L. Parker (Bekwai Seminary), and W. F. Riley (Nigerian Training College).

Our one national delegate was Pastor J. M. A. Adeoye, field evangelist of the West Nigerian Mission, Ibadan. Dressed in his colourful *agbadas*, Pastor Adeoye was probably one of the most photographed delegates from our entire Division.

Of particular interest to denominational • workers among all the delegations were the departmental meetings which began Sunday morning, and continued until the grand opening of the Session on Thursday evening. June 19. Leading out in these workshops and seminars were the departmental secretaries of the General Conference in Washington and their assistants.

The keynote of the convention was sounded by Pastor R. R. Figuhr in the opening meeting. As President of the General Conference he reviewed briefly our world work during the past four years since the last session was held in San Francisco, California, in 1954. Business transacted at this meeting included the official seating of the 916 regular delegates and delegates-at-large, and the accepting into our world organization of a number of union and local missions and conferences in various lands which were created since the last General Conference session convened.

After the main public meeting was concluded each of our eleven world Divisions of the General Conference met privately to choose their representatives for the Nominating Committee whose duty it was to recommend names for all officers and departmental workers of the General Conference and the various Divisions.

Early in the session greetings were read from many veteran workers of many years service who were unable to attend. In addition, a telegram of greeting and congratulations from Dwight D. Eisenhower, President of the United States, was received which read:

"Please give my greetings to all attending the 48th Quadrennial World Conference of Seventh-day Adventists.

"Representing many countries but united in one faith, your delegates will find strength and inspiration in their meeting together. Dedicated to the truth that sets men free, their ministry contributes much to the lives of many around the world.

"Best wishes for a splendid conference."

Personal appearances to welcome the delegates were made by the Hon. Ralph S. Locher, director of law for the city of Cleveland (representing the Mayor who was unable to attend), and by the Hon. C. William O'Neill, Governor of the State of Ohio.

Sabbath, June 21, was a special day and Adventist members from many nearby States gathered in Cleveland to worship with the delegates. More than 17,000 Seventh-day Adventists attended the Sabbath School and Divine Worship services held in Public Hall, and in a nearby Baptist Church where a separate programme was presented to the teen-age and college youth who came to the convention.

The special Million Dollar offering was taken at the 11 o' clock service, at which time each Division reported local collections taken earlier for this special fund for world evangelistic advance. The goal of One Million Dollars was not only reached, but the overflow was nearly an additional 25 percent! A total of \$1,217,500 (£434,821) was raised the largest offering ever taken in the history of the Advent Movement!

Sabbath afternoon witnessed a special World Pageant of Missions in which the national delegates and visiting missionaries dressed in the costumes of the people living in the areas they represented. Their march from the rear of the auditorium to the stage alone took nearly a half-hour. Only a fraction of those appearing were allowed to speak due to the limited time available. West Africa was ably represented by Pastors Welch, Adeoye, Ellstrom, and Henri who spoke briefly of the progress and needs in our Union.

Except for the second Sabbath, June 28, the remaining meetings of the session were devoted to reports of departments and institutions and to the election of officers for the next quadrennium (1958-1962). R. R. Figuhr, World President; W. R. Beach, World Secretary; and C. L. Torrey, World Treasurer were re-elected.

Changes, however, were made in a number of other General Conference and Division positions. These will be reported in detail in the daily *Review & Herald* bulletins which regular subscribers will receive without additional charge. All Northern European Division officers and departmental secretaries were re-elected with the exception of Pastor E. W. Pedersen, who was chosen to become an associate secretary in the General Conference Home Missionary Department and Alf Karlman was chosen treasurer to fill the place left vacant by the retirement of Pastor G. A. Lindsay. Pastor C. R. Bonney, Principal of the Voice of Prophecy Bible Correspondence School in London, was elected to the Radio Department of the Southern Asia Division.

The final programme was held Sabbath afternoon, June 28, and on Sunday, the following day, the delegates began leaving Cleveland for their various destinations around the world. Taken as a whole, the session was a most inspiring one, and will long live in the memories of those privileged to attend.

Dear Readers, here again is the second series of the above topic. In this second series I am going to talk about spiritualism and how it has got hold upon the minds of so called Christians.

Whenever such word "SPIRITUALISM" is mentioned people begin to wonder what the speaker or the writer is going to say about it. This same doctrine was common at the time of Paul and he even said, "Now the Spirit speaketh expressly, that in the latter times some shall depart from the faith, giving heed to seducing spirits, and doctrines of devils." I Timothy 4:1.

• As I go round from place to place and from house to house I used to hear from people asking questions about the dead and where the spirit goes when someone breathes the last breath. They ask this question simply because they believe that when one dies, one's spirit goes to stay somewhere and live again.

According to the writings of the Apostle Paul we read, "Now the works of the flesh are manifest, which are these adultery, fornication, uncleanness, lasciviousness, idolatory, witchcraft, hatred, variance, emulations, murders, drunkenness, revellings and such like." Galatians 5:19-21.

Many secret societies and lodges have been instituted to teach such things which being so wisely taught, people have lost sight of its evil deeds.

For all that do these things are an abomination unto the Lord: and because of these abominations the Lord thy God doth drive them out from before thee. Thou shalt be perfect with the Lord thy God."-Deuteronomy 18:9-13.

Character of Satan

Our hope is to be constantly strengthened by the knowledge that Christ is our righteousness. Let our faith rest upon this foundation, for it will stand fast forever. Instead of dwelling upon the darkness of Satan and fearing his power we should open our hearts to receive light from Christ and to let it shine forth to the world, declaring that His power is above the power of Satan, that His sustaining arm will support all who trust in Him. Lagos is a large city, as West African cities go, with a population of over 312,000. Three principal tribes live there, the Yoruba, Ibo, and the Hausa. The population is over fifty percent Moslem. There are some few Christians, and the rest are pagan.

On a back street is a little Seventh-day Adventist Church of about thirty members. The church was old and dilapidated; one hundred children were taught the elementary grades in it for five days a week, and we had services in it on the Sabbath.

A great deal of witchcraft and juju is used and practised; the dread killer and enslaver, Indian hemp, is brought into the city by sailors, and is growing in use; palm wine is sold and drunk almost everywhere.

Over a million pounds is spent yearly for the importation of every conceivable brand of beer and alcoholic liquor. Tobacco, already a scourge, is growing in popularity and use. Add to this a population greatly divided by political and nationalistic feelings and you have an up-to-date picture of modern Lagos which provides a challenge for the preaching of the Third Angel's Message.

Eighteen months of difficult and intensive evangelistic endeavour have passed. Five campaigns, held four nights weekly, and lasting from two to three months each, have been conducted; thousands of pieces of literature have been systematically distributed; many hundreds of visits have been made and Bible studies given; eight thousand names of interested people secured, and three hundred and thirty five Sabbath decision cards signed.

Our methods? Such as would be used in most any city in Europe or America with little difference. Since the two major languages are English and Yoruba, the messages were given in English and translated into Yoruba. The use of slides, film strip, and even black light were almost a necessity. Visual aids of some type are still of paramount importance in West African 'evangelism. After-meetings, Bible correspondence courses, and many other methods were used to encourage decisions for Christ.

The results? There is a new church group, with an average attendance of twenty-five to thirty, on Lagos Island; the average attendance of the Yaba church has trebled, hovering between eighty and one hundred; seventeen to twenty new converts meet in a new church group at Ikeja; and scores are in the valley of decision being aggressively followed up by our African evangelists. normal time for the baptism of new converts in West Africa is two years, so we had the joy of baptizing twenty-three.

Two field schools of evangelism were also conducted. For the first one, two evangelists from Sierra Leone, two from Ghana, two from East Nigeria, one from North Nigeria, and three from West Nigeria participated. Classes in Bible Doctrines, Spirit • of Prophecy, denominational history, and practical evangelism were conducted four mornings weekly. The afternoons were used for visitation and Bible classes.

The second school was conducted in conjunction with our last public campaign in Lagos, which was held out of doors. The entire eleven members of the Advanced Evangelistic Training Course of the Nigerian Training College, composed of evangelists from Ghana, East Nigeria, and West Nigeria participated, as well as five new evangelists from West Nigeria. The same type of programme was followed as in the first school as far as time and responsibilities permitted.

The work was not ours alone. We were grateful to the Liberian Mission for permitting Pastor and Mrs. D. H. Hughes and family to join us for the major campaign in Lagos. Pastor Hughes, as singing evangelist and instructor in the school of evangelism, and Mrs. Hughes as organist and music instructor, gave invaluable service. The District Leader, Pastor J. E. Adewoye and wife were avid students and faithful workers giving unstintingly of time and talent in leading the entire church membership in cooperation and service. Mr. Caleb Adeogun, though the Principal of our Lagos elementary school and studying for an external examination, sacrificed time needed for study and preparation to be our loyal interpreter and musician,

There was no officer or member of the Yaba Church who could not be called upon anytime for any service and who would not give that service without reservation.

We are also grateful to Pastor Ellstrom, President of the West Nigerian Misston; Pastor R. W. Coon, Principal of the Voice of Prophecy Bible Correspondence School; Dr. • Sherman Nagel, Medical Director of the Ile-Ife Hospital, who came when needed to show sound movies or render any other service.

The Light In The Window

Years ago, in the great north country, a trapper and his dog team got lost in the vast regions of snow and timber. It was bitter cold, and the trapper knew that he must continue moving or he would freeze in the subzero weather.

Nearby, but unknown to the trapper, was a cabin where a man and an Eskimo boy were seated at a table in the centre of the room. A fire burned in the stove a few steps away. The man in the cabin was impressed that he should move the table to the window. He did not know why and he resisted the impression for some time. Finnally he could not resist any longer and moved the table and the lamp to the window. The Eskimo boy did not understand why he did that, since it was cold near the window and far away from the stove. But God was working in His mysterious way.

At that very instant the lost trapper saw the light in the distance and headed his dog team for the cabin. Then in the snowfall he lost sight of it. Again he caught the gleam of light from the window, and mustering his remaining strength, he urged the dogs toward the cabin. He knocked weakly, then groaned out his plight and stumbled in as the man opened the door. While the Eskimo boy took care of the dogs, food was provided for the nearly frozen trapper. For three or four days the two trappers stayed in this cabin. Then the storm abated. During this time the men and the Eskimo boy studied the Bible together. After that the trapper went on his way, but he was not forgotten. The kind man who lived in the cabin mailed books to him at the nearest point on the trap line. After some months the trapper gave his heart to Jesus and began to observe the Seventh-day Sabbath. He also accepted the Bible teaching that Jesus is coming again soon, and that Christ died on the cross to save him from sin.

And do you know, he became a Seventhday Adventist and was baptized! Someone asked him one day how he was converted. He then told the exciting story of the time that he nearly froze to death in the snow.

Activities Of Women In S. D. A. Church Otun, West Nigeria By Mrs. C. W. Adeogun

"A vision appeared unto Paul, a man from Macedonia stood and said, "Come over to Macedonia and help us" Acts 16:9.

It was a fine morning when a teacher visited my husband who inquired from him about the progress of his church. The teacher answered that only six members were present the Sabbath before. The teacher expressed sorrowfully that there were no women. When I heard this, it pushed me out of bed, and looking at the face of the teacher, I found that he is in person of Mr. D. O. Ogunyemi from Gogo. I requested to know from him why there was no woman in the church, he answered that they always kept in on Saturdays, and will never come to church. Ah! This shocked me greatly because there were many women in the church in 1929 during the time that Pastor D. B. Alabi was in charge of the church. I expressed my willingness to come over and help him (the teacher), he readily agreed that I should come.

The following Sabbath, after teaching the Sabbath School Lesson in Otun church, I gave a challenge to all the women in the church. I expressed to them that our fellow women in the Lord are dying at Gogo, and that they are weary in attending church services, and that Satan wanted to win them to his side. All the women in Otun church answered in one accord, "We will go and preach to them. We will go and hold revival Sermons. We will go and serve the Lord at Gogo."

Upon arriving at Gogo, we met only four men in the church. They were gazing at us with a great amazement. We, from Otun had the patience until the end of the services for the day. It was after this that I stood up to tell them our objective or aim in coming to them. At the end of my speech, a young man who was weeping because of gladness in seeing us ready to go and preach to their backsliding wives and women stood up and volunteered to take us from house to house. A band of us who went from Otun that day divided ourselves into groups, and did a lot of house visiting that day. We returned the first Sabbath, and after that repeated our visits. I personally afterwards went there every Sabbath for complete three months.

The first woman we visited was afraid to see us, but we smiled to her and showed our interest in her. We told her the reason of our visit to her, and then she expressed that her husband was not steady in that when he turned away from S.D.A. Church and joined the Catholic Church, she was thinking of following him to the new church, he joined the C. M. S. again; and this was why she sat tight at home thinking that the husband might come to S.D.A. Church again. At the end of her story we knelt down and prayed and we sang "Pass me not, O Gentle Saviour."

Surely God answered our prayer because this woman and others from Gogo were baptized early this year at Otun. Mr. D. O. Ogunyemi always reports to me that the women are increasing in number every day. I am happy too to see that the women in Otun church are increasing before I left the place. How happy shall it be when we shall all meet at Jesus' feet!

M. V. Week of Prayer In Ghana

The reports of the M.V. Week of Prayer in Ghana have been satisfactory. So far, out of the 19 reports received, over 2440 pupils benefited from the reading materials, 1602 responded to appeals and 621 testimonies were given. It is believed that almost all our 73 Primary and Middle Schools participated but reports could not reach us in time.

The purpose of this Week of Prayer was threefold. To show that the faith of Jesus is the only true faith, that the greatness of God's purpose for us is revealed in the provision He has made for deliverance from sin and the immensity of our reward. But the motive behind the Share Your Faith programme was to reveal the love of God and to give advertisement to our schools.

Monday, 31st March was the Share Your Faith activities. And among other things done were the distribution of tracts and papers, cleaning of compounds, supplying of firewood, and prayers offered for the sick. The interest was great as some useful remarks were given by many Headteachers.

Here are just four of the outstanding remarks made by some of the Headteachers: Writes Mr. J. E. Gyimah of Asamang, "Very indelible impressions created. Practice must be yearly custom." "Our activities have really advertised our School," remarks Mr. E. I. Ansong of Nkwatia. Mr. J. O. Boateng of Forikrom says, "Great interest was aroused. Three more children added to the number." And Mr. S. E. Opam of Agona completes by saying, "The Week of Prayer was both profitable and successful. Monday activities were most interesting and were appreciated."
