CONFERENCE COMMITTEE.

MANITOBA.

The seventh annual camp-meeting in Manitoba was held at Morden, June 28 to July 8, in a beautiful grove. A small stream ran nearly around the grounds, across which was built a temporary bridge for the occasion, thus giving the grounds almost the appearance of an island.

One large tent was used by the English-speaking brethren, and a smaller one by the Germans, of which nationality there are a large number here. Bro. Dirkson has charge of the German work. Elds. Hoopes and Morrison and Prof. B. G. Wilkinson were present and assisted in the work. There were nearly two hundred and fifty in attendance, some driving one hundred and fifty miles, and all testified that it was the best meeting they had ever attended. The Sabbathschool donations for the two Sabbaths were nearly twenty dollars, while the tithe for last year was about two thousand dollars, almost double that of the year before.

We are still at Morden, assisting in following up the interest created; but will soon leave the work with a brother and several Bible workers, while we go to enter another field. Money was donated at the camp-meeting toward purchasing a new tent, thus providing for two tent companies. In this field we have three un-organized companies and eight churches. Seven persons were baptized during the meeting; thus a few are taking hold of the truth. For this we are thankful, as well as for good health. We are of good courage in the Lord, and ask your prayers, that he may through us glorify his name and save souls.

AMONG THE CHURCHES AND ISOLATED SABBATH-KEEPERS.

Since camp-meeting I have visited and held meetings at Oskaloosa, Grinnell, Beaman, Traer, Waverly, Alexander, Sumner, Winthrop, and Dubuque. At Waverly two persons, a man and his wife, were baptized, having already been admitted to church fellowship subject to baptism. The ordinances were celebrated at Alexander. I have held over forty meetings in all, speaking thirty times. These companies are all small, some of them much reduced in numbers by removals, deaths, etc., the responsibilities and burdens thus resting more

heavily upon those who remain. To keep the light burning in communities where there was once a much stronger force, takes double the courage and activity that is required where these conditions are reversed. It is about equal to gathering light from others' darkness, and warmth from others' coldness.

During this time I also visited at Monroe, Beacon, Keota, Wellman, Kalona, Montezuma, and Gilman, calling at seventy-six homes in all. I have taken two orders for the Review and four for the BULLETIN. Many of these personal visits and seasons of worship were with the aged and infirm who seldom have the privilege of attending meetings. The blessing of the Lord was especially manifest on these occasions, and realized to a greater degree than at many of the public services. I have truly been made to feel that, while watering others my own soul has been watered also. So I go on my way rejoicing. H. NICOLA.
