# ADMISSIONS FROM THOSE WHO KEEP SUNDAY, -- PART 4.

In "Arnold's Commentary," Part 4, July 7, 1895, commenting on Mark 16:1-8, we find this admission concerning Sabbath-keeping by the holy women after the burial of Christ: "When the Sabbath was past—Saturday evening after sunset. It would seem by Luke 23:56, that the women prepared spices and ointments on Friday evening after returning from the sepulcher, before the Sabbath, then rested on the Sabbath."

The reader will also note that our Free Methodist brethren well understand that the Sabbath referred to in Mark 16: 1-8 is Saturday. They often ask us "How do you know that Saturday is the seventh day?" But they have no difficulty in locating the days of the week. Mr. Arnold in his commentary proceeds: "Very early in the morning—they began their journey

to the sepulcher while it was only twilight and came to the sepulcher as the sun began to rise. What day was it?—The first day of the week. What is the day now called?—Sunday." The lesson on the ten commandments reads as follows: "Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy." The seventh day is the Sabbath of the Lord thy God,—not only instituted by him, but consecrated to him. It is designed for a memorial of the creation of the world, and therefore to be observed to the glory of the Creator."

The Evangelical brethren also agree with other denominations concerning the days of the week. The lesson on Mark 16:1-8, April 10, 1898, says: "Jesus was crucified on Friday, and was buried on that day about sunset. On Saturday, the Jewish Sabbath, all was gloom for the disciples. He rose from the dead on the first day of the week, which ever since has been observed as the Lord's Day or Christian Sabbath.' They give no Bible for the change of days. Mr. Willson, Evangelical, who has written a book akin to the Gamble theory, in July, 1898, came forward at the close of a meeting at which the writer had presented the change of the Sabbath, and claimed he had time and again demanded of Father Enright the one thousand dollars offered for a single text of scripture for Sunday observance. Under date of Aug. 3, 1898, Mr. Euright wrote me as follows: "I have never received Mr. Willson's letters, never seen his proofs. The offer still holds good: One thousand dollars to anyone who can prove from the Bible alone, that I am bound under pain of mortal sin to keep Sunday holy. It is absolutely certain that the Catholic church abolished the Sabbath and appointed Sunday to be kept in its stead. Protestants obey not the Bible but the holy Catholic church alone. I shall always be pleased to help you as long as you seek the truth. "Respectfully.

From a tract written against Sev-

enth day Adventists by Rev. Boman, and circulated by the Episcopalians, I quote: "To turn, then, to the Sabbath. It is not a question of whether the seventh day is the Sabbath or not. Unquestionably, it is. And here, let me add, many good men have made grievous mistakes by contending that the Sabbath has been changed to the first day of the week; and the Adventists boldly challenge them to show one text from the Scriptures to prove it, and they can not do it. Of course not. There is no such thing. Then others lecture on the 'Christian Sabbath,' and quote history and the Fathers to show that the first day of the week is the Sabbath, only to be again challenged and overthrown by the Adventists, to the surprise of their audiences, the defeat of themselves, and the success of Adventism. It is all a total blunder; the seventh day is the Sabbath and no other. God never changed it, and no one else can."

I trust that these admissions will prove really helpful to those who read them.

### A CONVERTED MAGNET NEEDLE.

Some months ago I found that the needle in a small compass in my possession was inverted, so that the arrow pointed to the south, writes the Rev. Dr. Gage, in the *Interior*. It was not only wrong, but radically wrong. If it had deviated only a little from the true north I should have supposed that there was a magnetic storm brewing, or that the mechanism of the compass-

box was at fault. But in whatever position I placed it, it would turn and point due south when left free to move as it would. It was a scientific case of total depravity, and I determined to convert it. In my cabinet is a mass of magnetic iron, known as lodestone. I easily discovered which was the positive and which the negative end of the lodestone, and then I placed the compass needle on the stone so as to make it point north with the arrow of the needle. I left it in the company of the magnetic iron for twenty-four hours. and when I took it off the needle was converted. Now it points of itself faithfully and continuously to the north star. Its nature was radically changed. Scientifically, it was regenerated.

This perfectly illustrates the condition of the sinner by nature and what he becomes by grace. The sinner does not merely deviate from the right, but turns absolutely against it. He not only points wrong, but diametrically wrong. The restraints of home and society and companions may keep him quite in line with God and Christ and heaven, but when left free to move as he will he turns his back upon them and becomes more and more lost. The only thing that will change him is a radical change of character. What he must have is regeneration. The Holy Spirit alone can change the natural man till he becomes the spiritual man. #### MISSIONARY GIVING.

EARNEST writers have gone over the grounds, Biblical and otherwise, for Christian giving, till it would seem that no stone could be unturned and no heart untouched; yet the line upon line is still needed. One has only to read the calls of our Mission Board. and the entreaties of our brethren who are already in unevangelized fields, to realize that tremendous obligations to give rest upon everyone who can not

"At this time when the whole heathen world is a vast mission field. God is calling upon the church as never before to consecrate and concentrate all her forces, that she may measure up to the sublime opportunities of the hour." And is the church responding to the call? A noble work is being done, but as we read the published record of our missionary offerings, we can not but think that we have hardly touched our resources as yet.

A few rare souls there are who have attained to Paul's standard set forth in 2 Cor. 8, "who treat giving as a privilege, not a duty; as a grace, not as a burden." But by the large majority "the missionary Christ with his great commission is treated like a beggar, to be discharged with an alms, and not as a yoke-fellow in the gospel to be supported by daily co-operation.'

A dear old brother whose offerings to missions were liberal and unfailing. was asked how he always happened to have so much missionary money. "I do not 'happen' to have it," he replied. "No poor man ever 'happens' to have money. I plan for my missionary money the same as I do for my rent and flour. These three things are my ne-Other things I get as I can, or go without them.'

This reply really covers the most essential points of acceptable and intelligent giving. (1) The deep love which made the needs of the Lord's work as real as the need of daily bread. (2) Careful planning for the money. The amount given was not what the impulse of the moment might prompt, or what few pennies might be on hand; but as much thought was given to it as to rent money. (3) Regularity of payment. In this case, the offerings were usually paid in on the same day each month that the rent was paid. How simple a plan to follow, yet it could hardly be called an easy one, for all the principle a Christian has is involved in it. - The Missionary Idea.
