ANNUAL CAMP MEETINGS

When God led ancient Israel out of Egypt to dwell in Canaan, knowing the great benefit his people would receive from an occasional assembling together to seek God and be taught of him, he appointed certain stated seasons each year for them to gather together before the Lord.

Those who united in these feasts seeking the Lord faithfully, were never drawn away into idolatry. These seasons were so important that if any of the people failed to be present, for any reason of a personal nature, they were in danger of losing their hold on God and on being cut off from his people.

The Lord in the new dispensation still recognizes this principle of his people gathering together at stated seasons to commune with him. "Let us consider one another," He says, "to provoke unto love and good works; not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together, as the manner of some is; and so much more as ye see the day approaching." Hebrews 10: 24,25.

It is true that our home duties demand our attention, and sometimes it seems quite impossible for us to leave them to attend these annual convocations. We are afraid to leave our affairs in the hands of others while we are away, fearing we may suffer financial loss.

Viewing things in this light, some of our people have allowed themselves to remain away from these annual feasts, till they have almost lost their spiritual courage, not having met their brethren for years for mutual association and instruction.

But the Lord has to do with the affairs of men. He knows our needs and will shield us when he sees us reaching out to Him for help. He lets us live for a time in this world, giving us health and earthly possessions, that we might have opportunity to prepare for the life to come; and it is in this preparation that He is most concerned.

"Go to now, ye that say, today or tomorrow we will go into such a city, and continue there a year, and buy and sell, and get gain; Whereas ye know not what shall be on the morrow. For what is your life? It is even vapor, that appeareth for a little time, and then vanisheth away. For that ye ought to say, if the Lord will, we shall live and do this or that." James 4: 13-15.

It is the Lord's will concerning us that we need to know about. Our cattle, and our wheat fields, and our chickens and other belongings are blessings given us of God, but he never intended that we should allow these to become a wall between us and the opportunities he opens for our help.

There may be, and doubtless are times, when it is necessary to be away from camp-meeting. We would not judge or criticise those who remain away from these meetings. This must be a matter between the individual and God. We only desire to call attention to the fact that it is Satan's studied plan to frighten as many people as possible, by making it appear to them that they cannot attend the meetings that are set apart for the help and encouragement of those who are looking for the coming of the Lord.

It is so easy to be kept away when the campmeeting may be the thing we need more than anything else in this world, and we are in danger of allowing circumstances to influence us to stay at home and to keep our children at home from these annual convocations, and thus be cheated out of these opportunities for help.

How rapidly time does fly. Our seconds and minutes and hours soon make days, then weeks and months, and before we scarcely realize it, a year has gone. Like the pendulum of a great clock, the years swing across the centre, one-two-three-four, and soon the hand points to the eleventh hour; a life is spent and behold the Judge standeth at the door.

If it were ever important that we attend campmeeting, it surely is important now. This year is destined to be one of the most remarkable of any year in the history of this denomination. We sincerely hope that our people all over this great field will make every effort possible to attend these meetings in their respective conferences. Good help will be present, and those who come will not be disappointed.

Brother Horseman had quite a nice company in the city of Vancouver who wanted instruction in the science of gospel salesmanship, so in February this meeting was called and we spent a very pleasant and profitable time in the study of methods and plans for successfully placing the precious pages of truth in the homes of the people in the city.

Good results have already come from this meeting and we trust British Columbia will make a good record in the book work this summer. Many souls must be sought out in those cities and we trust Brother Horseman and his band of workers will meet the mind of the Lord in that field this summer, and many souls be saved as a result of the seed

sown.

EXTRACTS FROM THE SPIRIT OF PRO-PHECY ON THE IMPORTANCE OF OUR CAMP MEETINGS.

"The camp-meeting is one of the most important agencies in our work."

"They are to promote spiritual life among our own people."

"We need to meet together and receive the divine touch that we may understand our work in the home. Parents need to understand how they may send forth from the sanctuary of the home their sons and daughters so trained and educated that they will be fitted to shine as lights in the world. We need to understand in regard to the division of labor, and how each part of the work is to be carried forward. Each one should understand the part he is to act, that there may be harmony of plan and of labor in the combined work of all."

"Our camp-meetings are a power, and where held in a place where the community can be stirred, they will have far greater power than when for the convenience of our own people they are located where, because of previous meetings and the rejection of truth, the public interest is deadened."

"Our camp-meetings should be so conducted as to accomplish the greatest possible amount of good. Let the truth be properly presented and represented by those who believe it. It is the light, the light of heaven, that the world needs, and whatever manifests the Lord Jesus Christ is light."

"Every camp-meeting should be an open lesson of neatness, order and good taste. We must give careful regard to economy, and must avoid display; but everything connected with the grounds should be neat and tidy. Taste and tact do much to attract. And in all our work we should present the discipline of organization and order."

"We should ever bear in mind that angels of God are walking through the encampment, beholding the order and arrangement in every tent. To the large numbers of people who come to the ground, all the arrangements are an illustration of the belief and principles of the people conducting the meeting. It should be the very best illustration possible. All the surroundings should be a lesson. Especially should the family tents, in their neatness and order, giving a glimpse of the home life, be a constant sermon as to the habits, customs, and practices of Seventh-day Adventists."

"Go to the camp-meeting, even though you have to make a sacrifice to do so. Go with a will to work. And make every effort to induce your friends to go, not in your place, but to go with you, to stand on the Lord's side, and obey his commandments. Help those who are interested to attend, if necessary providing them with food and lodging. Angels who are commissioned to minister to those who are heirs of salvation will accompany you. God will do great things for his people. He will bless every effort to honor His cause and advance His work."

"None of us should go to the camp-meeting depending upon the ministers or the Bible-workers to make the meeting a blessing to us. God does not want his people to hang their weight on the minister. He does not want them to be weakened by depending upon human beings for help. They are not to lean, like helpless children, upon some one else as a prop. As a steward of the grace of God, every church-member should feel personal responsibility to have life and root in himself. Each one should feel that in a measure the success of the meeting depends upon him. Do not say, 'I am not responsible. I shall have nothing to do with this meeting.' If you feel thus, you are giving Satan opportunity to work through you. He will crowd your mind with his thoughts, giving you something to do in his lines. Instead of gathering with Christ, you will scatter abroad."

"The success of the meeting depends on the presence of power of the Holy Spirit. For the outpouring of the Spirit every lover of the cause of truth should pray. And as far as lies in our power, we are to remove every hindrance to his working. The Spirit can never be poured out while variance and bitterness toward one another are cherished by members of the church. Envy, jealousy, evil-surmising, and evil-speaking are of Satan, and they effectually bar the way against the Holy Spirit's working. Nothing else in the world is so dear to God as his church. Nothing is guarded by Him with such jealous care. Nothing so offends God as an act that injures the influence of those who are doing his service. He will call to account all who aid Satan in his work of criticising and discouraging."

CAMP MEETING

Word has been received that the General Conference has arranged for Elder O. A. Olsen to attend the camp-meetings in the Western Canadian Union Conference. We are sure that the brethren throughout this field will welcome this faithful brother. Further than this, we are unable to say at present who will attend our camp-meeting from the General Conference, but we know that efficient help will be provided.

Plans are being laid for speakers in the English, German, Scandinavian and Russian languages. Special privileges from the different railroads have been applied for and there is no question but that the usual one-way rate can be secured. the instructions regarding rates which appear in this issue. It is expected that this will be the largest

camp-meeting yet held in this field.

In addition to the fifty tents now owned by the Conference, we are securing twenty from British Columbia. These will be rented to the campers at a reasonable rate. Thirty-five bed springs were recently purchased for camp-meeting purposes.

The services of Sister L. T. Heaton have been

procured to provide meals on the cafeteria plan. We hope to be able to serve meals as cheaply as in years past, which has been at the rate of about fifteen to twenty-five cents a meal. It will be necessary for everyone to provide himself with a straw tick, pillow, comforts and blankets, as the Conference is not in a position to furnish campers with bedding. Remember that the nights are cool and that it will be necessary to bring plenty of warm clothing.

Careful consideration has been given to looking after the young people and children. Brother A. Pond, leader of the Young People's work will have charge of these meetings. Sisters Gertrude Mc-Culloch and Phyllis Sargent have been asked to arrange for the children's meetings in the English language and Sisters Sarah Suelzle and Martha Lang will conduct the meetings for the children in the German. We hope the parents will arrange, if possible, for the children and young people to be present at this meeting as they are in need of spiritual help as well as the older ones. The enemy is laying his plans to capture the lambs of

the fold. Our brethren and sisters should do everything in their power to attend these annual meetings. Every year as we approach the end of time, these meetings become more important. There is no reason why this coming camp-meeting should not be the best yet held in our province, and I am sure it will be, if everyone comes with the one desire to obtain benefit. RATES TO CAMP-MEETING

We are pleased to announce that we have been successful in obtaining special rates over the three main railroads being operated in Alberta, in connection with the camp-meeting to be held at Red Deer, June 18-28. For this we have much cause for thankfulness.

In order that all who will travel by rail may avail themselves of this privilege, it will be necessary for each one to observe certain rules prescribed by the railway companies. The following instructions, if followed, will enable anyone to obtain the special

1. Be at the station twenty minutes before your train leaves, in order to give the Agent time to make out the necessary certificate.

2. Purchase a one-way ticke', for which you will pay

full single fare to Red Deer.

3. For EVERY ticket purchased ask the Agent to supply you with a STANDARD CERTIFICATE, which you must keep. It is important that you secure a certificate of the standard form, as no other kind will be honored.

4. Those who have to travel over two roads must purchase two one-way tickets. They must also obtain a STANDARD CERTIFICATE for every ticket purchased. A person who travels over two roads will obtain two STANDARD CERTIFICATES-one from each Agent from whom he purchases a ticket.

On arriving at the camp-grounds, hand all cer ificates to the Conference Secretary. This is important.

Tickets can be purchased three days before the meeting begins-June 17th.
