#### A VISIT TO WESTERN CANADA

It has been my privilege to spend the time between June 29 and August 4 in Western Canada, attending the camp meetings at Saskatoon, Sask., and Lacombe, Alberta, and visiting the churches at Calgary and at Armstrong, B.C. From Armstrong I went to Prussia, Sask., where a local camp meeting was held from July 27 to August 2.

At all these meetings the Lord was present by his Spirit and souls were converted and accepted the truth. But as the two first camp meetings have been reported in the *Tidings*, I will only write a few lines about the other meetings and about the outlook of the work in this field.

I never realized the growth of the work in this field as I did on this trip. It made a deep impression on my mind when I arrived on the camp ground at Saskatoon and saw the many new tents filled with our people. My mind went back to the first camp meeting, where there was only a very few tents pitched, and that was only a few years ago. Now it looked just like a camp meeting in one of the larger conferences. Everything seemed to be in perfect order. I saw that the work has increased wonderfully. This was evidenced by the large attendance in both the English and German meetings.

The same can be said of the Alberta Conference. It seemed as if the Lord came a little nearer in this place. Quite a number were converted in all of the meetings. The Lord was certainly present with his converting power.

On my way I stopped in Calgary and held a few meetings with our people. They feel very anxious that their neighbors may accept the truth. There are hundreds of Russian Germans in Calgary, but it seemed that something else was going on each night so that only a few came to the meetings.

At Armstrong, B.C., I only stayed from Thursday until Monday, and held seven meetings with the church. In these meetings, the Lord came very near. The brethren seemed to enjoy the word of God very much. They do not very often have the privilege of listening to a German minister, and appreciate such opportunities. It was just three years ago that I visited them last. They are all of good courage and promised to support the cause faithfully.

From here I went to Prussia, Sask., where about 100 of our German brethren with their children, had gathered together from Fox Valley and Prussia. It was hard to get a place for the tents so the brethren decided to have the meeting in a hall and they rented rooms to live in.

The Lord came near from the first, but the interest increased as the meetings went on. Sometimes the hall was well filled. Quite an outside interest was shown.

Several families who were convinced of the truth before this meeting, decided to obey and were baptized. On the last day eleven were baptized, mostly all adults, and five or six who were also converted during the meeting decided to wait until after arriving home to be baptized, so that relatives could be present.

This meeting was a great success. The people all took a firm stand for the message. They all promised to pay a faithful tithe. As the prospect for a crop is very good—never was better—in that country, there will certainly flow into the treasury a large amount of money, if the Lord will preserve the crop from damage.

The prospect of the work in gathering souls was never better. I look forward for a great harvest of souls in this part of the great harvest field.

#### A COLPORTEUR'S EXPERIENCE

That there is joy and satisfaction attached to the colporteur work, one cannot but realize as they converse with the Lord's spirit-filled messengers who make it their business to scatter the printed page. In a recent conversation with Brother J. H. Lawson, who for the past six weeks has been out with "Bible Readings," I was told that in Ashcroft he found four families who, unknown to each other, were keeping the Sabbath, and living up to what light they had. He made them all acquainted and the prospects are that a Sabbath-school will be formed.

Brother Thomas Lambert, who resides nine miles from the city, has scattered tracts and papers judiciously, and to this may be attributed this good work. Truly in the Lord's vineyard one soweth, another watereth, but it is God who giveth the increase.

"I met a Presbyterian minister recently," said Brother Lawson, "who had some of our books and to whom I loaned others. During our talk he confessed to me that he believed the gospel message as lived and preached by the Seventh-day Adventists. 'When I want a good strong sermon—one that will wake up my congregation, I go to the Adventist books for it, said the minister. All this man needs is a little definite study, and he will be preaching the message."

"There is work needed at Ashcroft, and the soone: some of our Bible workers get in there, the better, said Brother Lawson. "On my bicycle I have travelled over the rough rocky roads a distance of more than 900 miles, and no community appeals to me as a field for labor as does Ashcroft." C. A. COLE.

#### FROM THE PRESIDENT

As I shall be unable to visit you for some time I esteem it a privilege to write you at this time.

I am enjoying the work here at Rivers very much. It is a treat to be preaching this precious message in a tent once more. What a privilege God gives us to be life saving stations, as it were, between the living and the dead.

We as a people knew that this war, now raging in Europe, was coming, and preached it years ago from pulpit and press. Now, it has been going on for a year. To think of the millions of lives lost and billions of property destroyed, and the sorrow it has spread over the entire world, ought to be enough to stir us. But this is only the beginning of trouble. We know not how soon it will come to our door and into our very homes, perhaps.

Only those who have their souls anchored in God will be able to stand. It seems to me there was quite a stir among our people at the beginning of the war. but now we are getting used to the terrible news so that we are hardly able to comprehend its meaning Some seem to be sort of settling down. I fear we are not doing as much as we might to get the truth before the public. What we fail to do under favorable circumstances will have to be done in very trying times, we have been told.

My heart is burdened for our people and the work in our province. In order to work effectually we must keep ourselves posted. We cannot supply the living minister to every place where he is needed, so the next best and only thing is to make use of our church paper.

Recommendations were passed at camp meeting for each family to take the *Review* or a corresponding paper in their own language wherever possible, also that we supply ourselves with one or more copies of the *Signs* in missionary work.

I hope and trust you are seeking to keep the avenue between yourself and heaven clear by prayer and daily study of the Bible. This is our spiritual breath and food and is as necessary to spiritual growth as air and food are to our natural life and growth.

The crops in general over the province are looking very promising. A bountiful harvest will open another avenue for helping, as we know one-tenth belongs to God and is holy unto him. At this time when our Conference is struggling to make ends meet we certainly appreciate these blessings and hope that none will be found robbing God at this time when he is calling us to united effort in the finishing of the message.

One of the resident ministers was taking his vacation, but the others got busy immediately, as we afterward learned, and our audience became very small. We found that the people are as completely under bondage to their leaders as Catholics are; however, a few have dared to come and as a result three have taken their stand in favor of God's sabbath. We are praying that this may make such a stir that it will be the means of others coming and know for themselves what we believe rather than take what is reported.

During our stay here, more literature, devoted to the most important truths of our message, has been put in the hands of the people than at any other like services that I have ever been connected with, and I might add that I never saw the "stay away habit" indulged in to such an extent as here.

We are praying that the promise, "My word shall not return unto me void, but it shall accomplish that which I please, and it shall prosper in the thing whereto I sent it," shall be fulfilled in this north country. As we have seen and become acquainted with so many nice people, but powerless to reach them with this truth, we have earnestly sought for divine power to reveal the love of God to those who are seeking for light and truth. Our hearts have been burdened as we see "sheep without a shepherd" and our daily cry is "for wisdom to know how to meet the demands of the hour." V. W. ROBB.

Surely, when we consider the conditions now existing in the financial world, this report should encourage us. But instead of feeling satisfied we should feel inspired to greater activity. We cannot expect our boat to take us "up stream" if we rest on our oars. This would do very well if we were *drifting* down stream. But our goal and destination lie "up stream" and the seriousness of the situation demands united and determined effort.

Something like five months is left us for completing the record of 1915. So if any school is not making the most of their privileges, no time is like the *present* for reformation.

We hope our schools and Home Department members will ever remember to do their part toward

carrying out the Sabbath-school resolutions voted on by the delegation at the Conference. We will give in part the resolutions that you may refresh your memories.

"We Recommend, That our people continue to cooperate with the Sabbath-school Department of the General Conference in reaching the three-fold goal, namely, the Daily Study of the Sabbath-school lessons; Personal Work for Every Pupil; and One Million Dollars to Missions as Soon as Possible. We Recommend, That the Sabbath-school teachers in our conference, whether in the organized or Home Department schools, avail themselves of the instruction provided in the Training Course, which is being outlined in the Sabbath School Worker.
