OUR BRANCH OFFICE IN THE WEST

Canadian Watchman Press In the fall of 1906 Brother H. H. Hall made a trip to Canada in the interests of the book work. He found that the sales for the entire year, for all of Western Canada was only \$706.31. There was no branch office, each tract society carrying a small stock, and securing supplies from the States, or Europe. In many cases this meant delay and inconvenincee. Brother Hall found one young man who had taken orders for a large number of Daniel and Revelation. and the books were undelivered in the late fall because he could not secure them in Canada and they had been long delayed in coming from abroad.

Conditions existing made those in charge of the work see the

necessity of opening up a branch house in the West which would carry a stock of books, and in turn supply the tract societies. Brother Hall finally made arrangements with Brother and Sister Conway of Regina and a small stock of books was stored in their kitchen. This was the first branch house in Western Canada. The work was carried on here for one year, when a building was rented and a little depository built on the rear.

The growing work demanded larger quarters and a well-equipped branch house was opened in Calgary, and the supplies for the union were handled through this office until one year ago when the stock was moved from Calgary to Winnipeg, the present location. We are glad to say that we are very conveniently and comfortably located in the heart of the wholesale section of the city, in a modern office building. At one time this summer we shipped in an entire carload of books; probably the first carload of printed books ever coming into the Dominion, for other publishers don't ship books in carload lots.

And we are also glad to know that we now have a publishing house of our own, which will enable us to print our own literature on our own presses in Canada. Surely the Lord's hand has been guiding in this work.

We are bending every energy to give the best possible service to the field, and we are at your

service. If any of our people from the West are passing through Winnipeg at any time, we shall be glad to have you call and see us. Our address is, 303 Nokomis Building, Corner Cumberland and Hargrave Streets.

COLPORTEUR WORK-DOES IT PAY?

(George A. Campbell, Union Field Secretary) To think of the millions, yes, hundreds of millions of homes of every nation, kindred, tongue and people where this message musr yet be proclaimed staggers one. Surely this gigantic task cannot be accomplished orally from the platform. It must and will be finished largely through our literature work. the self-supporting colporteur goes from farm home to farm home, from village to village, and the congested homes of our cities he leaves a trail of literature behind him that will speak to millions of hearts that would otherwise never hear the message of the coming King.

There can be no question as to the results accomplished in souls saved by this line of missionary endeavor. This line of Christian work cannot be over-estimated. Chapter upon chapter has been written by the servant of the Lord as to its importance. The question, however, that comes to many who would like to engage in it, is, "Does it pay financially?"

"Can I make a living at it?"

This question can be answered yes, or no. Yes, if you enter it with a burden for souls, obtain the necessary preparation and training, then work, work, work. No, if you have not made a success of your former occupation and heavily involved in debt. No, if you do not make a througho preparation and receive the necessary training. No, if you do not work industriously, putting in faithful time.

True, the colporteur must meet certain require-ents. The Field Secretary must thoroughly train and place the colporteur where he can work to the best advantage. When requirements are fully met on both sides, success is a mathematical certainty.

Yes, some have failed financially in the colporteur work, but please do not take this for evidence that it cannot be done. Many college graduates make a failure in life, but we do not conclude from this that a college course does not pay. A large number of men fail in business every year but that is no criterion that business is a failure.

The colporteur work can be made a success as scores of regular year-round colporteurs are proving. Just a word from the Testimonies: "The Colporteur work is elevating and will prove a success if he is honest, earnest, and patient, steadily pursuing the work he has undertaken. His heart must be in the work, he must rise early and work industriously, putting to proper use the faculties God has given him."

May God give us all a greater vision of what can be accomplished through the distribution of our literature, and may His Holy Spirit impress the hearts of capable men and women in the Western Canadian Union to enlist in this self-supporting

LITERATURE WORK IN MANITOBA

(G. F. Ojala, Field Secretary, Manitoba)

1920 is in the past and as we look back to what God has wrought for us, it makes our hearts glad and our faith in God is made stronger.

"God calls upon His people to act like living men, and not be indolent, sluggish, and indifferent. We must carry the publications to the people, and urge them to accept, showing them that they will receive much more than their money's worth. Exalt the value of the books you offer. You can not regard them too highly."—Canvassers Manual, p. 55.

The Lord promises to be the chief worker by the side of the Colporteur, and this has actually been realized by those in the firing line. While we have not made our goal for the past year, it is very encouraging that the sales by our Colporteurs in the Manitoba Conference territory has enjoyed a healthy

growth.

In 1919 our sales, as reported by the 26 Colporteurs, some of whom worked a week or two, while others spent the best part of the season in the field, amounted to \$12,584.15. This is not including the total sales of Tract Society which would bring the total sales up to \$21,691.60.

Colporteur sales for 1920 by the same number of workers increased \$2,417.00, amounting to \$15,000.00. Figures of Tract Society sales at the time of this writing not at hand. But we are inclined to believe the total figures will nearly reach the \$25,000.00

mark for the past year.

At the present time two or three are selling our larger books, two are working more or less with the smaller books, and a number are very enthusiastic about our new Canadian Watchman, and other

magazines.

Our courage is good and we are looking forward and planning for a vigorous effort along all lines of literature work for 1921. Shall we thank God for what He has enabled us to accomplish? And, let us pray that the Lord of the harvest will send forth laborers into His harvest. The fields indeed are ripe, but laborers are few. Let us reconsecrate ourselves anew to God, and ask Him what He would have us do. He has entrusted us with a message, and commanding us to give it to others. He promises to be the chief worker by our side. And assures us that the wages will be right.

FROM SASKATCHEWAN

Saskatchewan with its cosmopolitan peoples, speaking over forty languages, has many unentered districts. C.T.T. p. 515.

The new Magazine is on the go. Brother Ingham a new Sabbath keeper under the effort of Elder Johnston is taking up the work, with many others selling at odd times. Miss Schwartz, one of our girls here in the office sold 25 in a little less than an hour. Perhaps you can do this, have you tried? Brethren Jobs and Robinson are both working and others are inquiring about territory so we feel very much encouraged. My article is limited in words, but I will close by inviting you to join the "Bookman's Army."

"I MUST BE ABOUT MY FATHER'S BUSINESS"

Are you a business man? Does your business worry you? Or is it so firmly established that there is no need to worry. My Father is a business man and has many servants. Some are energetic and obedient and will move promptly when called upon,

are of little value. Some tell me, my Father's business will fail, because so many of the servants are not living up to their agreement, but I think that it is the unfaithful servants who will fail, as they will soon wither and die, for only the fruit-bearing branches will endure.

Jesus, our elder Brother, when He was but twelve years of age, understood His Father's business, for He said, "Wist ye not that I must be about my father's business." Oh, if we could only learn the lesson of this statement. It is said that Mary kept all these sayings in her heart. Would it not be well for us to remember these words and that God is our Father.

The promise of the Lord is, that He will send Elijah before the great and dreadful day of the Lord come. Are you, my brother, Elijah? Jesus said John the Baptist was Elijah because he did the works of the Prophet. Can He say the same of you? Probably you are passing through the experience of Elijah when he was discouraged and have run away from the work. If so, listen to the still, small Voice. "What doest thou here Elijah?" Are you about your Father's business. Probably it is in the colporteur or magazine work. It it is, and your place of business is in B.C., I would be pleased to hear from you, and to assist you in our Father's business.

is to make room for them that they may be trained to help supply the home and mission fields. Most of our books are sold by our students.

FOREIGN EXCHANGE

More than 150 church schools in the U.S.A. and Canada could not be started last year because of lack of teachers. The buildings and equipment were ready. The children were there. But no teachers could be found. There were not enough in the denomination to supply the calls.

"India is calling for 30 evangelists now," said Elder G. W. Pettit of Bombay, at our camp meetings last summer. But we have been able to find and send only about four or five instead of the thirty.

One of the great problems of the October Fall Council was the tremendous demand for trained workers. It caused our General Conference leaders to turn and point to our institutions here at home, and speak most earnestly regarding the vital work "The hour has come for us to step lively," said Elder A. G. Daniells, in speaking of this institutional enlargement and activity in training recruits.

"There never has been an hour when the educational work meant so much to this cause as today."
"There never was a time when the educational work could do so much to advance the cause as today."
These are significant, important words coming from our highest General Conference men at the Fall Council.

Laborers are made from young people. The work abroad depends upon the work at home. Depends on it for men and money. The money is nothing without the workers. Dollars cannot teach. When one goes south, he must exchange his Canadian into American money before it is of use. So before our money can be of full use to the mission fields, much of it must be exchanged into prepared young people.

We have more than 2,000 young people above six years of age in Western Canada. There are no finer youth in the world. They will make the best of missionaries once they are trained.

But they must be trained. These youth cannot become skilled workmen without training. It is not just workers that the cause needs, but skilled workers. God has not left his cause to be directed and advanced by untrained minds. It was not so with Moses, with Ezra, with Daniel, or Paul, or Luther. And today probably about ninety per cent. of our missionaries and conference workers come from our schools and sanitariums. From the world field calls are coming for hundreds more of our youth to be trained and sent on.

But listen. Less than 700 of our 2,000 are in our schools and sanitarium. If we fill every institution we have in Western Canada full—Lacombe, Battleford, the sanitarium, and every Church School—we could not accommodate more than 700. There is no room for the other 1300. They cannot get into our schools or sanitarium if they try—mot until we build larger for them. Two out of every three are outside with no provision for their training and but little for their salvation, for 85 out of every 100 of our youth who never go to our schools drift out of the truth.

This is the situation then. The cause needs more trained laborers. We have hundreds of splendid youth who can become such trained laborers. But we have no place to train them. Is not our duty plain? It is to provide the facilities over here that will send the workers over there.

Giving one dollar each month is the plan by which every believer is asked to help enlarge our Western Canadian institutions. What can I say that will help each church member to see this need and respond? If every member gives this dollar every month, \$40,000 will be raised in 1921. Think what a large sum this will bring for the spread of the Message if we are all faithful. But it is necessary to begin now in January, and keep it up to reach this goal. On behalf of the union and local conference officers, I appeal to each believer to give this Dollar-a-Month regularly and faithfully. May God open our eyes to see what kind of service He demands of us at this

time for our own neglected children and youth.

If China asks for a missionary, shall we send them a cheque? Can money preach? How shall they hear without a preacher? Western Canada has 2,000

they be trained? Exchange your money into trained minds and consecrated hearts. Still continue to support every branch of the cause as you have done. But give some of your dollars here to send workers over there.
