MANITOBA COLPORTEUR REPORT G. F. Ojala, Field Secretary

During the first four months of 1921 we had in this conference one man handling the large subscription books. Three were making cash sales of miscellaneous small books, and four making a business of selling *The Canadian Watchman* magazines part time. In the month of May we had two subscrip-

tion book men, and through the summer months until the month of August there were eight men and women in the field taking orders. Three magazines workers, and one book-man have stayed with the task more or less through to the end of the year.

As we look back over the past year of our work, scan over the record of colporteur reports, experiences in the field, what God has done for and through us, we must acknowledge that God is good.

Our literature sales as reported by our colporteurs and magazine workers, amount to \$10,635.33 for 1921. This, however, does not include the total sales of the Tract Society.

Brother David Wilson, one of our faithful colporteurs, writes:

"The colporteurs' work spells success, if he is willing to get right with God upon his knees, if he has stick-to-it-tive-ness, if he has enthusiasm, and if he puts in faithful time.

We have one all-the-year-round colporteur—Brother A. E. McGee who has been blazing the trail for the last eight years in the Manitoba Conference territory. Brother McGee is now working the sparsely settled region of Western Ontario. And, although the times are hard and the new settlers in many of these places are very poor, still there is a steady stream of literature pouring out to these people and the Lord has a care for His truth. "It shall not return unto Him void."

We are beginning a new year with all its blessings and opportunities before us. The year 1921 is in the past with its record indelibly fixed. We can not alter, nor change it. But if God has called us to sound the message for this time, and we know the solemn responsibility that is resting upon us—the record for 1922 may to a great degree be fashioned according to what we will have it. It is in the making. "I can do all things through Christ which strengtheneth me."

This is the very work the Lord would have His people do at this time. All who consecrate themselves to God to work as canvassers are assisting to give the last message of warning to the world. We cannot too highly estimate this work; for were it not for the efforts of the canvassers, many would never hear the warning." Vol. 6, p. 313, par. 2.

I have been much impressed with the problem which confronts us here in British Columbia. As I study the map of the province and check up the territory that has been worked, I find the larger portion yet unworked. Many small towns and villages as well as farming districts in the northern part are practically untouched.

If a line be drawn from east to west about 125 miles north of the International boundary line and running parallel to it until we reach the Alberta line, the district lying north of this line represents our untouched territory.

If a tour be made along the coast lines represented by Vancouver Island and the mainland, one would be surprised at the number of fishing stations, lumber camps, and mining towns, with all the way from 12 to 5000 inhabitants.

The statement: "Were it not for the efforts of the canvasser, many would never hear the warning" appeals to me. I gather from this that there will be men that will respond to the call and carry this truth to these souls living in out of way places. God will, through the consecrated colporteur, finish His work quickly in such districts.

Listen to this, dear brethren, "If there is one work more important than another, it is that of getting our publications before the public, thus leading them to search the Scriptures." Vol. 4, p. 390. par. 1.

Here is a large field for consecrated men to enter. Men who are not involved in debt, and who can devote their entire time, can gain a livelihood for themselves and their families.

Will there not be some one that will hear "the voice of the Lord, saying, Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" Surely the response will be, "Here am I; send me."

WITH THE COLPORTEURS IN B.C. Geo. Toombs, Field Secretary

As I review the work of the year 1921, it is with great pleasure that I think of the pleasant experiences with the colporteurs in the field and by correspondence.

Brother John Shaw of Vancouver was the first to launch out in the work, with the good old book "Daniel and Revelation" and was soon followed by Brother Clifford Fletcher, in the Kootenays with "Our Day". Then Brother John Bristol took the field of battle in the Southe-n Okanagon. These were all who entered the work before the close of school and only a few others till after the Camp Meetings. During the camp meeting session, a number of the colporteurs met daily to seek the Lord for power and strength for the task before them.

After the meetings I hastened to Salmon Arm, where Brother Lunney Astleford was pressing forward, facing some strong prejudice. We sought the Lord together for needed strength to meet the situation. The Devil is angry with the "Great Controversy" but the Lord and a faithful colporteur are more than a match for him. My next visit was at Kelowna where Sister Elizabeth Fox and Brethren Ralph and Sidney Harsh all started out with the new book "Our Day in Prophecy and Providences' on the same day. They were successful in their first day's work and of good courage in the Lord and with His blessing resting upon them. Sister Fox taking the towns from Kelowna to and including Penticton, while the Harsh brethren took the country north to Vernon and Lumby.

Then I returned to the Okanagan and as Brother Earl Harsh was ready for the field, we journeyed together to the Coast. He started out in the vicinity of Port Moody and his first day's work netted over \$30.00 worth of orders. Brother Harold Bass was at this time hard at work in the city of North Vancouver. The cities felt the stress of the financial situation keenly but it was inspiring to see our work moving forward in spite of these conditions.

Brother Mervin Warwick, anxious to get to work, started for his alotted territory near Victoria where I found him and went through the district with him. After a successful day's work together I started out to find Brother Chas. Bartlett who was having good success north of Victoria along the west coast. There is a big castle in this district and I must tell how Brother Bartlett succeeded in storming it for a full leather order. He tried to gain an entrance three different times but failed. Finally the phone was suggested and he made an appointment that way and when he called was warmly received and of course got the order. This shows the reward of perseverance. I found Brother Bartlett at Sooke, full of courage and happy in his work. I look back on these visits with the colporteurs with real pleasure. Brother Walter Hober was next to be visited. He was of good courage and God was crowning his efforts with success in the Cumberland district. Brother Geo. Brown went to the Northern Districts of B.C. and worked the towns of Lucerne, Prince George and Vanderhoof. At Prince George he found two families of Adventists who thought that each was alone in the city. Brother Brown brought them together and they now rejoice in being able to meet in the capacity of a Sabbath School. Thanks to the pioneer colporteur. I left the Okanagan August 20th and had the pleasure of delivering the books for Brother Brown. I was pleased to note the good influence made in the district by the colporteur. While I was away on the northern trip, Brother F. P. Wright, one of Britich Columbia's faithful pioneer colporteurs took the field again, going to the Fernie district where he is busy at the present writing.

OUR BOOKS DO BRING PEOPLE INTO THE TRUTH

In 1906 a copy of "Daniel and Revelation" was given to us and not caring to read it, we layed it away for over two years. Then we decided we would read the book and see what was in it. So one of us read the book while the other looked up in the Bible the texts referred to, for we wanted to be sure that we were not following "cunningly devised fables."


When we came to the seventh chapter and read the explanation of Dan. 7:25, we were fully convinced of the Sabbath truth and we dicided to keep the next Sabbath.

Looking over the past year we can say, "Hither hath the Lord blessed us" for it has been a year of victory through many trying circumstances.

With a cosmopolitan population speaking 49 languages the scattering of the printed page is a task which can only be accomplished by consecrated colporteurs, we are glad that we have these in Saskatchewan.

During the year we have had 36 colporteurs in the field, several working specially among the Russian,-Hungarian, Ruthenian, Roumanian, French and German peoples, twenty-two were student colporteurs and most of these have returned to school with a Caleb-Joshua report.

Our colporteur sales for 1921 are \$605.50 over the 1920 record and in the magazine work our hearts have been made to rejoice by the faithfulness of our magazine workers selling in all 12,760 copies: Watchman, 10,360, Life and Health, 2,400, also 215 annual subscriptions.

From July to December Sister Strong sold 2,400 copies, also taking 115 annual subscriptions, netting her a profit of \$415.00. We think this is good for the magazine work, and that the blessing of the Lord has been present.

We are glad to present to the *Tidings* family the testimonies of some of those who have been out in the colporteur field, and also of those who have been blessed by the work of the colporteur evangelist. (Reported elsewhere in this issue.)

The year 1922 is a year of opportunity. Our prayer, our hope, and determined effort is for a hundred per cent. increase in sales during the present year.

CANVASSING-A SOUL-SAVING WORK

Under our present financial depression, where it has become necessary for conferences to reduce their laboring force, the question often arises, "How is the message going to be finished?" In the soul-saving work "there is no crisis." Every soul will have the privilege to hear the message. How are they to hear it? By the consecreted colporteur.

"My brethren and sisters, remember that one day you will stand before the Lord of all the earth to give an account of the deeds done in the body. Then your work will appear as it really is. The vinyard is large, and the Lord is calling for laborers. Do not allow anything to keep you from the work of soulsaving. The canvassing work is a most successful way of saving souls. Will you not try it?

"There is no higher work than evangelistic canvassing." How many of the men and women of Alberta want to join this band of gospel workers this year? Alberta offers great opportuuities for this kind of evangelistic work. We are also told that "The canvassing work is God's means of reaching many that would not otherwise be impressed with the Truth." Test. No. 32-161.

As we near the end many will leave their places of business and workshops to take up this self-supporting missionary work. The colporteur will continue in his work until the close of probation. "As long as probation continues, there will be opportunity for the canvasser to work."

May the Lord impress the right ones to enter this soul-saving work is my prayer.

BRIEF REPORT FOR ALBERTA G.F. Ruf.

We have had 26 colporteurs in the field part of the time and a smaller number all the time. At present there are four men out in the field, and another will begin in a few days.

As far as I have been able to ascertain, we have sold about \$12,000 worth of books during 1921. There were about 1985 orders taken. 5,615 hours of canvassing were reported.

Our workers, were pretty well scattered over the inhabited parts of Alberta. One man worked with fair success in the Peace River country, another among the Russians and Ruthenians northeast of Edmonton; some were in the drought stricken south, and had pretty good success. Miss Astleford made her big records in the south country.

We have therefore placed nearly 2,000 books into the homes in Alberta during 1921. They were placed there by our God fearing colporteurs. These will bear fruit for God's kingdom. The influence of the personal visits, and the words they spoke while describing, and telling the people of our Present Truth, will never be fully known till the "mists have cleared away."

Our colporteurs have had trying experiences because of the financial crisis. Some became discouraged and left the field; others held on and worked hard, and succeeded. Our lady canvassers have stood by the work well, and developed to be some of our best workers.

SEVEN, THROUGH ONE BOOK

I thank the Lord for having prompted my neighbor, who purchased a Daniel and Revelation from a colporteur, to hand me four books to read, three Russelite and the Daniel and Revelation.

Strange to say we read the D. & R. but none of the others. Was our guardian angel at work? I think so.

While reading D. & R. one night about midnight I called to my wife for her Bible to prove the statements therein, she said it was in the bottom of her trunk. I finally got it and am glad to say that Bible and others are worn out since by us searching for the truth.

Result—most of us (seven from immediate family) now keeping the Sabbath and others believing. We are all of good courage and determined to serve the Lord to the end, and hope to wear out more Bibles serving Him for the welfare of others.

May God bless the colporteur work and may we each take a part in it to hasten THAT GLAD DAY.

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CANVASSING AMONG THE FOREIGNERS

I would like to say a few words about our work among the foreign people who live in our midst as I have never before been so deeply impressed with the importance of this work as I have since canvassing in the Crow's Nest Pass district.

We certainly have a large foreign field right at our door and surely this fact imposes the great responsibility upon us, who know this Truth and enjoy its benefits, to go forth to give it to others who sit in darkness hardly less dense than is found among the heathen in the heart of China or Africa. I imagine I hear some one say, "How can I work among these people or do anything for them? I cannot speak their language or make them understand me." It is not necessary to know their language in order to sell them our small books. You simply let them examine the book and in most cases they will buy one.

The books that I have been selling to the Chinese and most of the foreigners I have never read in English, but they are so well illustrated that in most cases all that is necessary is to show them all the pictures and read what is printed under them. I have sold books in Polish, German, Italian, Bohemian, Slovakian, Russian, Romanian, Hungarian, Ruthenian, Chinese and English. So you see we have quite an extensive foreign field right at our doors. If we do not sow the good seed now, the enemy will do his untmost to fill this fertile field with tares. Already you can see the results of the circulation of Bolshevist and Infidelic literature. Satan is busy but let us not be asleep so he can take undisputed advantage of this wonderful opportunity.—F. The Magazine Work in Saskatchewan.

I started canvassing the last week in June in Saskatoon, and then went to Biggar at the close of camp-meeting and spent three and a half days there. placing 125 magazines in the homes of that small town and taking 5 yearly subscriptions. I then went to Prince Albert and sold 600 there and took 25 yearly subscriptions. From there I went to Rosthern where I had my first difficulty in being allowed to canvass the town without a license but God in His great mercy removed those difficulties and inside of twenty minutes after receiving permission I took 3 yearly subscriptions. Then I came back to Saskatoon and did 5 days work selling 200 magazines and 8 subscriptions. I next went to Regina and in four and a half days sold 215 and 7 subscriptions. I am still in the work and hope to continue all winter.

"Commit thy way unto the Lord, trust also in Him, and He shall bring it to pass." I have seen this promise actually fulfilled. I have found several people won to the Truth just through the magazine work.
