

The Weekly Pledging Plan

THE plan of making pledges to God is not a new plan. It is as old as is God's movement. The tithing plan is a pledging plan in which we pledge to God one tenth of our income. Sabbath-keeping involves a pledge on our part to God to keep the Sabbath.

The advantages that come from adopting a pledging plan, are many and important. When we make a pledge to give a certain amount of money to missions during the year, we are simply saving to God that with His blessings we will devote a definite amount of money to the interests of His cause. There may be seasons of the year when money is much more scarce with us than at other seasons. By adopting the General Conference weekly pledge plan, each individual is given the opportunity of keeping track of just what progress he is making in turning over to God the sum of money he has promised to give during the year. It is possible that a brother who promises to give \$100 to missions during the year is not able to give \$2 a week right through the year. It may be that during the spring and summer months all he can give is 25c a week, but he keeps a faithful record of it on his weekly pledge plan card, and he knows at all times just how much he must make up to turn over the promised amount before the year closes. Then in the fall of the year when he enjoys a larger income than he does earlier in the year, he makes his donations through the regular channels large enough to make up what he is behind in his annual pledge to God.

We need not go outside of Western Canada in search of evidence that God blesses His people when they adopt this weekly pledge plan. We have a striking illustration of the results produced both by pledging and by failing to pledge right here in Western Canada. If we just drift along with a passive attitude towards the matter of giving to missions, the chances are there will be so many demands made on us for giving money to this, that, and the other thing, that the interests of God's cause will be almost crowded out. When we enter on the plan of making a weekly pledge to God, we place before ourselves a goal; and after all, the only things accomplished in this world worth while, are things that a goal was settled upon, and then a continuous effort made to reach that goal.

The plan of having a fixed goal in mind to work to is God's plan. All the way through the Scriptures the principle of adopting goals and doing one's utmost to reach the goal, is clearly set forth. Even in the matter of soul-winning God has a fixed goal. When the goal has been reached, the final fiat goes forth — not before the goal is reached, but just as soon as the goal is reached.

Some of the conferences in Western Canada have followed the weekly pledge plan for years, and know by experience that a real blessing comes to the individual who will enter into a covenant with God by sacrifice. Let us not give in a hit and miss fashion, for that results more often in missing than in hitting, but let us have a definite plan in mind; fix upon a definite goal, and decide by the grace of God that we will keep on sacrificing until somehow we have paid the vow that we have made before God.

As we enter the year 1930, let us as early in the year as possible get hold of the weekly pledge card, and then upon our knees alone before God ask Him what we should adopt as our personal mission goal for 1930, and let us faithfully keep check on ourselves to be sure that we actually turn over to God's cause the amount that we promised to give Him. Being systematic in giving will bring a double blessing from heaven to the giver.

Does not that include the foreigners in this country? If you have no foreigners living in your neighborhood we will be glad to supply you with names. We hope that the officers of the church will take special notice of this date, January 18 to 25.

Let us make this the biggest periodical week in our history.

How may we best reach these thousands of strangers within the territory of the Western Canadian Union, has long been the outstanding problem of our leaders in the work. What are we doing to solve this problem? It

is a problem that each believer in the soon coming of the Lord must help solve. A good suggestion and wholesome plans come to us from the Bureau of Home Missions which if we put in operation will help us in a large measure to solve the problem. Here is the simple plan: January 18 to 25 has been set aside as Foreign Periodical Week. During this week a special effort should be put forth to enlist the interest of every member of the church in his foreign neighbor. Where there are many foreigners in the neighborhood of your church a Home Foreign Band should be organized and put into operation. Where there are few or no foreigner in your neighborhood the General Conference Bureau of Home Missions will furnish names for any language in which we print literature at Brookfield, Illinois. Address, Pacific Press Publishing Association, Brookfield, Illinois.

No one church should order less than a club of five subscriptions.

Your church should take up a collection for foreign periodicals Sabbath, January 25, with which to order literature.

Prices of foreign literature for our field are: Foreign Present Truth, in Bohemian, Danish-Norwegian, German, French, Greek, Hungarian, Italian, Polish, Russian, Slovakian, and Swedish; Single subscription, 45c. Five or more to one address, thirty cents each. Five or more to separate addresses, 40c each. In bulk, \$10 per thousand. Christlicher Hausfreund, in clubs of five or more to one address, each per year, \$1.40. Clubs of five or more to separate addresses, each per year, \$1.70.



Keeping On, Keeping On P. D. GERRARD

ARE there not more young men and women in Western Canada who are willing to let God have all there is of them? Fear makes tailure, self-doubt is sure to cripple you. Never allow yourself to get sorry for yourself.

What others have done, you can do, so for that reason I am passing on to you the extract from a letter from one of our regular colporteurs, written under date of December 14, 1929, British Columbia. Note that this colporteur, as well as many others, states that he would not exchange the experience gained in this work for worlds.

"Another week has passed, and it has been even more eventful than the previous one, if that is possible. On Monday I had an interesting and happy day. On Tuesday I tried to get to my territory for three hours. I failed and had to return home. I fixed up the old chains I had in the back of the car and then found that the battery of my car was run down.

Mr. — has been unable to get his truck out all week and he put his battery in my car. By running the car I was able to get my battery charged up.

"On Wednesday I started out again but I had to return after three hours of persistent effort. I could not make the hills; it seemed that the gas would not come through into the carburetor. I looked to see if the small vent hole in the gasoline tank cap was plugged. Then I drained the gasoline tank in case of dirt or water in the gasoline. Then I cleaned the pipe from the tank to carburetor. I took out the carburetor and cleaned every part of it. I took off the commutator and cleaned it. Then I adjusted the carburetor. After all this I was ready to start on Thursday morning. My radiator had frozen up on Monday while I was in a house, so I had taken precautions against that happening again.

"I set out for Mr. —— 's place ; he was out hunting, but the man in the house higher up took the book for himThe next place they did not have the money, but they phoned the postmaster to give it to me and they would pay him later.

"Toward dark I decided to take a four-mile run to Mt. Lehman to post a letter to Miss Watson to say I would help her with her delivery. In Aldergrove the mail would not go out until the following day. I blazed a trail, following your advice, and looking far into the darkness. It was snowing heavily and I wondered how I could reach my destination. Like a flash an idea struck me. Back in February a young woman in service in ---- ordered a 'Patriarchs and Prophets.' She had been sick since and could not take the book. I remembered that her parents ders the mother was out. I posted the letter and called on the young woman's mother. I told her all about the book, congratulated her on having a daughter who was interested in ordering such a book. We got into friendly conversation and she paid me for the book. I certainly thanked God for this experience.

"On Friday my poor chains broke in fresh places and were useless. I tried three times to make a hill and failed. I decided that I must give up this false economy and bought new chains. I reached home just before sunset. The week had not yet ended for this evening (Saturday) I again set out as you see by my report, and pushed my way through the hard deep snow. The water in the radiator boiled with the terrible exertion and bubbled away furjously. I had to walk a mile or so in the deep snow with not a footprint in sight, but plodding always wins the race, and I reached home safe and sound.

"I have written all this just to let you know what your colporteurs have to go through. I expect you were thinking of us and may be you anticipated harder experiences for us than we even realized. Anyway, I thank God for my work; not for worlds would I exchange it. Through all its hardships there is a joy which comes from nothing else.

"I have been sending literature to some who ordered 'Patriarchs and Prophets' from me. The other night I had three valuable scraps of paper on which they had signed their names requesting more literature. These are precious to me, but I pray that the signing of them may prove exceedingly precious to those who signed and that they may begin to study and an experience which will lead them to the Kingdom of God.

It seems to me that we have reached the summum bonum of our experience when we can humbly let God use us in winning souls. I feel very far away from this ideal, but it is my prayer that God will help me to grow daily in capability and usefulness—pressing on to the place where I shall uplift every soul I meet."



THERE is a tendency on the part of most of us to settle down when the Harvest Ingathering campaign is over. We admit that the campaign is a strenuous one, but in these days of rapid movements, when on every hand we can see the signs of the soon approach of our Saviour, can we afford to relax our efforts? Many of our churches come and go like a door on its hinges, but the time has come for a decided change. New life must come into our midst, or we will neglect to do the great work that should be done at this time. "At this time—a time of overwhelming iniquity—a new life, coming from the source of all life, is to take possession of those who have the love of God in their hearts, and they are to go forth to proclaim with power the message of a crucified and risen Saviour."—Vol. IX, p. 44.

As the new year is approaching, every church will want to lay definite plans to evangelize the territory around its door. It is our great privilege to carry this message to every home. This involves much work and great expense. But the objective of every Seventh-day Adventist church in the land, whether large or small, should be to place this last message in the hands of every living soul in its mission territory. This will involve also organization, hence the necessity of every church being thoroughly organized for service. "For Christ's sake, my brethren and sisters, make the most of the hours of the new year to place the light of truth before the people."—"Colporteur Evangelist," pp. 41, 42.

"The very simplest modes of work should be devised and set in operation among the churches. If members will co-operate with such a plan, and perseveringly carry it out, they will reap a rich reward, for their experience will grow brighter, their ability will increase through exercise, and souls will be saved through their efforts."—"Appeal to our Church," pp. 11, 12.

- 7. Organize a Dorcas Society
- 8. Form a Home Nurses' Class
- 9. Organize tract work
