Personal Message For You A

Y FIRST message to the workers and believers of God's remnant church in the British West Indies Union is a call to deeper consecration and to a closer walk with God.

"Ye shall seek me, and find me, when ye shall search for me with all your heart." (Jer. 29:13). Only as all reservations are laid aside, and we seek the Lord with all our hearts will we be prepared for the days just before us. We are living in a time of unprecedented turmoil and upheaval. Undoubtedly these are the evil days which Christ declared would immediately precede His return. If we are to stand through the tests and trials just ahead, we must seek the Lord with all our hearts-not in the listless half-hearted indifferent manner displayed by some

professing Christians that may be seen all around us. Not only is this a day of trouble but it is a day of great opportunity. For those of us privileged to labour in this

fertile field of the British West Indies unlimited possibilities for soul-winning lie before us. If we are to meet this great challenge successfully, we must seek the Lord with all of our heart for the essential preparation! Nothing will take the place of this needed search for

God! Machinery, goals, degrees, diplomas, campaigns, and other planks in our denominational scaffolding are good, and they are an important part of our programme. but never can we allow any of these to substitute for a deep, abiding experience in the things of God.

Speaking of the power that will equip men and women to rise up and to finish the work, the Servant of the Lord says: "The laborers will be qualified rather by the function of the Holy Spirit than by the training of literary institutions. Men of faith and prayer will be constrained to go forth with Holy zeal declaring the words which God gives them."-Great Controversy, page 602.

Men and women of power-those whose lives have been emptied of sin and filled with the Spirit of God-those are the kind of men and women God wants here in the

British West Indies in these stirring times. He wants men and women who in their inmost souls are true and honest-who are as true to duty as the needle is to the pole! If we have in our field workers and believers who know what it is to go out from the place of prayer filled with the Holy Spirit-how soon the message will be given in every corner of Jamaica, of the Bahamas, of British Honduras, of the Caymans, and of the unentered Turks and Caicos Islands.

Jonathan Edwards, one of the most powerful preachers of his day, made this daily consecration of himself to his Heavenly Father:

"I have been to God today and have given myself, all that I am and have, to God so that I am not in any respect my own; I can challenge

no right to this understanding, this will, these affections that are in me; neither have I any right to this body or any of its members; no right to this tongue, these eyes, these ears, this smell or taste. I have given myself clear away and have not retained anything as my own. I have been to God this morning and told Him that I gave myself wholly to Him, so that for the future I will challenge no right to myself in any respect."

If every worker and member of our union field could honestly and sincerely come to God each morning in such a whole-hearted consecration, what power would attend our daily witness for the coming Christ!

Today, with you, I wish to rededicate my life anew to a closer walk with my Saviour, and to the finishing of His work here in this part of the great Inter-American Division. Daily you will each one have a place in my prayers, as I also hope that I shall be remembered in yours that we may each one experience a real revival of true godliness in our lives, that the Lord may join our hands in our quest for a closer walk with God and greater power to finish His work.

News Notes

The Missions Committee has recently extended to Pastor Nembhard an invitation to locate in Grants Town after his furlough, and to serve as pastor of the Grants Town church in addition to his work as superintendent of the Andros Island District. We feel sure that Brother Nembhard's leadership in Grants Town will prove a great blessing to our church membership there.

On the evening of June 15 Miss Ualee Lawrence presented the Hawkins Hill School in a very interesting programme. The many songs, recitations, and other features presented showed that a great deal of time and thought had been put into the preparation of the programme, and the large audience present demonstrated its appreciation by hearty applause. Elder H. D. Colburn, our mission superintendent, acted as master of ceremonies. Proceeds from the programme are to be used in purchasing a piano for the school.

The Mission Committee at a recent session has appointed Mrs. H. D. Colburn the Sabbath school department secretary of the Bahamas Mission. The Sabbath school work is one of the most important branches of our work, and we trust that all of our members will labour earnestly not only to strengthen our present schools, but also to organize branch schools wherever possible.

Brother R. B. Campbell, who has been one of our colporteurs, has now been invited to take up ministerial work. Brother Campbell will have charge of the Inagua District which is composed of Inagua, Acklins, and Crooked Islands. We are always happy when we are able to call new workers to supplement our very small working staff in the Islands.

Elder R. M. Whitsett, Inter-American Division radio secretary, recently spent the week-end in Nassau in the interest of the Voice of Prophecy radio programme which we are hopeful will soon be broadcast from our local Nassau wireless station ZNS. Let all of our members pray that such arrangements may be made, and that this deeply spiritual radio programme may help hundreds here in our islands to find peace and joy in Christ and His saving message for these last days.

Elder R. H. Pierson, superintendent of the British West Indies Union, spent several days in Nassau recently on mission business. This was Elder Pierson's first trip to the Bahamas, but he plans to return later in the year for a longer stay which will include a visit to some of our out island churches.

Let us have some good reports from our lay preachers. We feel sure that the Lord has many earnest lay workers here in the Bahamas whom He could use to win scores of souls if they would but respond to His appeal for workers. How about you?

Has your church reached its full Harvest Ingathering goal? If not is it because you haven't done your part? We hope that not only every church but every church member will reach his full Ingathering goal this year. The more we do in this good work the more we will have to spend here in our field to build up the work of God. We need schools; we need churches; we need workers. Let us do our part to help meet these needs by doing all we can in the Ingathering work now.

News Notes

On Sunday, April 30, interested friends and members from Corozal, Calcutta, and Pembroke Hall churches stood on the banks of the Pembroke Hall branch of the New River to witness the baptism of seventeen candidates by Pastor F. R. Archbold. This baptism was the largest witnessed in the north for some time and is to a great extent the work of lay workers and our church school teacher.

On Sunday, May 7, Pastor F. R. Archbold opened a six-week series of lectures in the Belize Seventh-day Adventist church. In spite of handicaps caused by an extended drought, interest continued good throughout the meetings. Our faithful Belize lay workers stood loyally by Elder Archbold in this work, and as the result of God's blessing eight souls were recently buried with Chirst in baptism.

Work on the Douglas church building is proceeding at a good rate, and we hope that before long it will be ready for dedication. The church members in Douglas have worked most faithfully in securing the land and getting this building erected. We are hopeful of having a school in Douglas before too long.

The writer has recently conducted brief efforts in Boston and Cow Head Creek. The meetings in Boston were in the form of cottage meetings and were held in the home of Brother and Sister Harding. The service in Cow Head Creek were held each night in the little church in that place. The interest was good throughout the series and the largest attendance was on the closing night. Names of twentyfour interested people were received, and it is hoped that from this number several will be prepared for baptism before the year closes.

Since the lay workers' school of evangelism held in April, four branch Sunday schools have been started. These schools have been established by Brethren George Middleton, and Amos Wright, and by Sisters Amy Campbell and Victoria Gibson. We are sure that many others will soon be following their good example.

Sister C. Gill and Brother I. D. Sabido, our temporary Bible workers in the Corazal district, have reported a good interest. At the present time there are eighteen who are regularly receiving Bible studies in their homes.

A very lively cottage meeting is being conducted regularly by Brother C. L. Claypole, assisted by other lay workers of the Calcutta church at Xiabe every Sunday evening. There are several who are eagerly embracing the truths of the Bible and are turning away from Catholicism.

The writer has recently completed an itinerary through the south and the northern districts. In the south our brethren and sisters joined in revival services in which great emphasis was placed on the work of the lay man. The trip through the north was mainly in the interest of the Ingathering work. Three of our churches have been organized and are just awaiting orders to go forth in the work of the campaign. Individual goals have been set and with such courage and interest we feel sure that they will reach and pass their goals.

A number of our faithful lay preachers will soon be leaving the colony for work in the United States. ×
