A Misunderstood Word

Paul knew the real meaning of sacrifice. He tells us, in II Corinthians 11, some of the privations, hardships and sufferings that he glad-

ly endured for the Cross of Christ. Perhaps when we feel that we have sacrificed for God it would be well for us to read Paul's record. He was many times beaten, stoned and robbed, shipwrecked, hungry, thirsty and cold. Yet he found happiness in all these things. It is as follows: "Human beings have no right to think that there is a limit to the efforts that they are to make in the work of soulsaving. - Testimonics, vol. 9, p. 32.

No limit! Think of it. Is it possible that we do limit our efforts? Sometimes we become so busy with every-day affairs that we overlook opportunities for soulsaving. How careful we must be, and how quickly we should take advantage of the opportunities that God presents to us to lead souls to the Eternal Kingdom. Big Week Plans

At a recent British West Indies Union committee the following plans were laid for the promotion of the 1946 Big Week campaign. We feel sure that every worker and church member throughout the field will be intensely interested in these carefully worked out details. It was voted:

1. That the Home Missionary, the Educational and the Publishing Departments collaborate closely in promoting the Big Week Campagin.

2. That each local Mission Committee set goals for each church and assure that promotion material and supplies reach the churches in ample time to launch the campaign on time.

3. That itineraries be worked out for all of the Union Office workers during October 26-November 2 that will assure an equitable distribution of Union help between the East and the West Jamaica Missions in promoting the Big Week among the greatest number of churches possible in both fields.

4. That each local Mission Committee be urged to work out careful itineraries for their office and field workers to visit the maximum number of churches between October 26-November 2 to launch the campaign in a good strong manner.

5. That the Mission workers devote their full time October 26-November 2 in promotion of the campaign among the churches, postponing their actual literature sales until the following week.

6. That we ask our Union Home Missionary Secretary and all of our Publishing Department Secretaries in the Union to spend the week immediately following the Big Week in actual literature sales turning in the profits for the Big Week Fund.

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Time is Short

"Every clock on earth is measuring the moments of opportunity that remain," wrote one contributor recently in his article appearing in a popular religious journal. As our attention is being called to the grim fact that time is exceedingly short in which to find solutions to the world's great problems, we are reminded of the words penned many years ago by God's messenger to the "little flock": "Strange, eventful history is being recorded in the books of heaven. Everything in our world is in agitation. Events are changing to bring about the day of God which hasteth greatly. Only a moment of time, as it were yet remains." Testimonies, Vol. 6, p. 14.

In view of the solemn fact that "The great Day of the Lord is near, it is near, and hasteth greatly," the coming Big Week Campaign scheduled November 2-9, takes on added significance. It must not be looked upon as just another Big Week offering! It comes when there can be but few moments left in which to give ourselves in willing service to God before He shall send His Son Jesus back to this world for His people, at which time every man shall be rewarded "according as his work shall be"! It comes when there are the greatest opportunities for the triumphs of the Cross in the history of the world!

Dear fellow-believers, it is God's plan that you take an active part in the Big Week project. In Testimonies, Vol. 5, we are told that "Every soul that has made a profession of Christ has pledged himself to be all that it is possible for him to be as a spiritual worker, to be active, zealous, and efficient in his Master's service Christ expects every man to do his duty." That statement means that every worker. departmental secretary, colporteur, every layman, every church member should take an active part in this project. In Vol. 6, page 417, we are told that "Anything less than active, earnest service for the Master gives the lie to our profession of faith." We would not dare to do that, would we? That would bring reproach upon our Saviour.

If we fulfill the three-fold purpose of Big Week our churches will be strengthened spiritually, and eventually in numbers. If we are to make a success of the Big Week project, it will be necessary for every church t_0 be thoroughly organized into working bands. The pastor or the church leader with his church board, should plan carefully so that every church member has a part in the project. The church members should be organized into bands. A leader should be chosen for each band. Each band should be assigned a certain territory and each member of the band given his or her part of that territory.

We have just one week for this project, but it will be easy to accomplish that if we plan carefully. Let us put forth our best efforts to do that which God has committed t_0 us and there will be great rejoicing in our own ranks, and among the hosts of heaven.

Gibson is leading out in a strong manner. A good baptismal class is being instructed and work is moving forward on a new church building. The former Cooper's Hill church has now taken up its new residency in Burnside Valley.

The following day we spent with Brother Aston Davis in the upper St. Andrew district. Here we visited the fine Woodford church and after a good consecration sevice helped them stake out the site for their new church building. During the day we also had good services and business meetings with Mt. James, In each of these places we found the brethren of good courage and where building projects were under way they joined in laying strong plans for this important work. As the result of Brother Crarey's effort in Rock Stone Pond, several were baptized some weeks ago by the Mission President and a number more are awaiting the sacred ordinance.

It is expected that Elder and Mrs. J. N. Williams will be arriving in Belize October 15. Elder Williams has been appointed by the British West Indies Union Mission committee as President of the British Honduras Mission. This need will be fully met when the Bahamas Junior Academy becomes a reality. The building to be first erected will provide ample space for a much larger number of students and pupils. It will not then be necessary for two and three to occupy a single desk as is now the case.

Another need that will be met will be that of play-ground space. Now we have none. Our new property which was purchased several months ago has nearly six acres of level ground, and all that will be needed for this purpose will be set aside.

Many have worked hard raising large amounts toward this new institution. To all such, we wish to say a sincere "Thank You!" As much as £100 has been turned into the Mission treasury in a single offering. Several have turned in £50 each. Others have contributed according to their ability.

We urge every member of the Bahamas Mission to do his best during the next few months, and to turn in every pound possible towards this fund. If all do this, we will be able to begin the construction of the first building according to our plan which calls for actual building to commence December 1st of this year.

Many of our young people are counting on us! We cannot disappoint them! They are continually writing in to the Mission Office, making inquiries about the new school. They are anxious to be enrolled in it, in order that they can further their education and thus prepare themselves for service here in the Bahamas or wherever God should call them. We cannot disappoint them! We will not disappoint them if each one who has an interest in the youth of this mission does what he can, and NOW!

A most encouraging response has come from all over the Mission, to the appeal for a good offering for "Famine Relief". It has brought real cheer and courage to us to see how our people have responded to this most urgent need on the part of those who are in even more dire circumstances than they.

the Battlefield of West Jamaica.

Pastor S. G. Lindo reports the following: "Yesterday morning we went down to Spring Plain and baptized 23 souls, the largest single baptism in the history of the Grove Town church. In our service on Sunday night, after the baptism when the call was made, nine took their stand for the truth and many others were struggling to stand, many of whom expressed their desire to attend service the following Sabbath. I see very bright prospects of a recurring number in our next baptism. It is our hope and plan, under God, that at least 95% of the people of Grove Town will be Seventh-day Adventists before we (On account of the drought, leave." Pastor Lindo was not able to have a baptism before, but the new converts became so anxious that they were willing to pay the cost of a truck to take them to a river in the adjoining parish for the baptism.)

Pastor E. C. H. Reid reports a full house each night at his meetings in Brown's Town, Already eight have taken their stand, although the testing truths have not yet been presented. Pastor Reid is carrying on a strong building programme over in his district. In fulfilment of a long-crying need for a place of worship, he began building the Brown's Town church in February, and now it is sufficiently advanced for him to conduct his effort in it while putting on the finishing touches, and planning for its dedication on the 10th of November.

Brother C. S. Greene's effort at Marchtown is still yielding fruit. He has now had his fourth baptism, bringing the number up to 57 thus far.

On August 18th a very large gathering assembled at Chamber's Penn to attend their stone laying service. We were privileged to have Elder W. L. Barclay, our new British West Indies Union Departmental Secretary, give the address, and Elder Crofoot, the President of the Cayman Islands Mission, also helped in the service. We hope the time will not be far in the future when we shall be called upon to celebrate the dedication of the Chamber's Penn church.

Brother Rugless has been conducting an effort at Belvue in St. Elizabeth during his vacation, and he tells us that ten have definitely taken their stand for God and the Truth.

Pastor Fletcher started an effort at Somerton, but because of illness he had to stay away for a while. In the meantime Brother Holness, leader of the Montego Bay church, and Brother P. Clayton have been carrying on the effort and they report twelve now keeping the Sabbath and many others are interested. We are glad that Pastor Fletcher is up again, and hope that within a short while he will be able to bind off this effort.

In order to assist pastor Fletcher for some time, Brother Earle Parchment has kindly consented to take the oversight of the churches in Westmoreland.

Pastor L. Gouldbourne has been spending most of his time finishing the church building at May Pen. We are happy to see that church building nearing completion. It is a credit to the cause.

We are sure the readers of the VISITOR will be happy to learn of the progress of our baptisms thus far for the year. At the end of the first quarter our baptisms stood at 98; the second quarter it went to 264, and at the eighth month we have 356 reported.
