The example of Christ is for us to follow. Prayer is a necessity in our labour for the salvation of souls. God alone can give the increase of the seed we sow."—VOL. 4:528-529.

We are to pray for those who feel no need of prayer, weep for those who feel no need of tears -you have such individuals in your homes, in your neighbourhoods, in your districts - they need your prayers, your tears! Christ is our example! "Prayer is a necessity in our labour for the salvation of souls."

This regular intercessory prayer will get the minds of our church members on soul-winning and off petty problems among brethren. Says the Servant of the Lord: "Solicit prayer for the souls for whom you labour; present them before the church as subjects for their supplication. It will be just what the members of the church need, to have their minds called from their petty difficulties, to feel a great burden. a personal interest, for a soul that is ready to perish. morning, how can I join the prayer circle?"

Inspiration answers this question for you. "While engaged in our daily work, we should lift the soul to heaven in prayer. These silent petitions rise like incense before the throne of grace." G. W. p. 254.

And again: "We may commune with God in our hearts; we may walk in companionship with Christ. When engaged in our daily lahour, we may breathe out our heart's desire, inaudible to any human ear; but that word cannot die away into silence, nor can it be lost. Nothing can drown the soul's desire, It rises above the din of the street, above the noise of machinery. It is God to whom we are speaking, and our prayer is heard." G. W. p. 258.

Whom shall we pray for? Pray first for yourself that your life may be patterned after Jesus, and that you will be an active soul-winner for Him. Pray for the unconverted juniors and young people of Adventist homes in your church. Pray for unconverted husbands and wives, sons and daughters of your church members. Pray for those in your baptismal class. Pray for the thousands throughout the island who are taking the Bible Correspondence Course, and mention by name those in your district whom you know are studying the Message in this manner. Pray for any unbelievers attending any of your church services. Pray for your District Pastor, especially when he is holding an avangelistic effort. Pray for the lay preachers who are holding efforts. Pray that a spirit of service may possess your whole church and imbue it with power for soul-winning!


The Mightiest Weapon of the Church

stone or stones at the stone-laying service. You can open a door or a window at the dedication service. You can make a gift of a pulpit or some benches or other needed furniture. You can help with materials — sand, rock, trees or other needed materials. You can help with free labour.

There are many ways you can have a part. If you will but sit down and carefully and prayerfully plan with your church members, the Lord will open up many avenues of service to you in helping your neighbour.

This plan is not man's plan; this is God's plan! Not only in Isaiah 41:6 are we admonished to help each other, but notice this statement from the pen of Inspiration: "There are some cases,...in which a young church may not be able at once to bear the whole burden of erecting a house of worship. In these cases let the brethren in other churches help them."—G. W., p. 432.

Cayman Islands Mission

During "Empire Health Week" Pastor and Mrs. Crofoot had the privilege and opportunity of speaking to practically all of the school children on Grand Cayman, and also to large and attentive audiences in three of the largest churches on the island. One night at a mass meeting in West Bay, Pastor Crofoot gave a thirty minute talk on nutrition, emphasizing the need of sufficient quantity of the "protective" foods containing the essential minerals and vitamins. An excellent interest was manifested, and at the close of the talk the acting commissioner arose and spoke at some length emphasizing the need of growing more of the "protective" foods mentioned by Pastor Crofoot in his talk. Unusually fine attention was manifested by the large audience at the Presbyterian church in Georgetown where Pastor Crofoot again gave his talk on diet and nutrition. Sister Crofoot in her talks to the school children of the island used very interesting "Flannelgraphs" to illustrate her message of healthful living. The sanitary inspector of the island was very appreciative of the help Pastor and Sister Crofoot gave during this week. The arrival of our doctor in the Cayman Islands will surely be a wonderful blessing to our cause here.

The newly organized "Correspondence" band in the Georgetown church is wrapping and sending out hundreds of copies of "Signs of the Times," "Youth's Instructor," and other Truth-filled magazines every month. With these copies of message-filled literature go the prayers of God's remnant people.

The young people of the Georgetown church have shown a real interest in the "Progressive class work". For many weeks meetings were held twice a week. On Monday nights a general meeting was held at which time all who had finished any of their requirements in their particular class would report. The Thursday night meetings were especially held for those working on some particular vocational honour.

Pastor Crofoot was in Jamaica during most of the month of December attending a Union conference session besides several other committees and boards. Just before he left however, he visited the East End church, and the company at Bodden Town. En route via the "Black Bear" he went ashore several hours on Cayman Brac where he met several of the

believers there and visited our church at the "Creek."

The mission house behind the Georgetown church has been remodeled in preparation for the conducting of a mission school during 1947. New benches are being made by the Wood working shop of the West Indian Training school in Mandeville. Sister Crofoot, who has had several years experience teaching both public and church schools in the United States will be in charge of the school. She will be assisted by sister Gleeda Forbes. It is hoped that many will take advantage of this opportunity to have a Christian education, and will attend our own mission school this year. Tuition rates have been set very low so every one will have opportunity to attend.

Pastor Pierson and Elder Barclay are planning on arriving in Georgetown February 22, and will be with us two weeks. Elder Pierson is planning a series of evangelistic meetings in the Georgetown church, and Elder Barclay will lead out in a Sabbath School convention and a Home Missionary rally during his stay. Let us all pray for the success of these meetings that Pastor Pierson and Elder Barclay will hold in our midst.

East Jamaica Mission Session

January 6-12 the first East Jamaica Mission Session convened in the North Street Temple church, Kingston. The meetings throughout were characterized by a splendid spirit of co-operation on the part of the large number of delegates present and by the high level of spirituality that was maintained throughout the meetings.

Each day an early morning devotional service, a Bible Study and an evening preaching service contributed rich spiritual food for delegates, workers and visiting friends. Business meetings were held twice daily and each afternoon time was given over for the promotion of the various departmental activities.

Attending the meetings and contributing their share to the success of the session were Elder W. H. Anderson, from the General Conference, veteran missionary to Africa, the Union Officers and Departmental Secretaries, all of the East Jamaica Mission Workers, Elder B. G. Butherus, President of the West Indian Training College and Elder W. S. Nation, President of the West Jamaica Mission.

All of the Departmental Secretaries were re-elected for another two years and the new mission committee elected to guide the affairs of the field for the new 1947-8 term as follows: D. V. Pond, chairman; E. W. Parchment, Secretary; M. G. Nembhard, Glenn Millard, W. A. Holgate, A. C. Stockhausen and D. E. Walker.

Comprehensive plans were laid for a mighty soul-winning advance during 1947. Brother Harold Fletcher was called to hold a series of evangelistic efforts throughout the country parts of our field during the year, and Brother B. A. G. Woodburn, a graduate of the West Indian Training College, has been called to help in the follow-up work of the Bible Correspondence School interest in the East Mission.
