 Our Literature Wins Souls!

Walking down a street in the residential district of Long Beach, California, one day I saw a group of children playing. As I approached them a little girl of about five years detached herself from the group and stood in front of me. Of course, I stopped. She reached into her pocket and took out a piece of paper which she handed to me. "What is that?" I asked...

"It's a tract," she replied.

"And what is a tract?" I next asked.

"It tells you about Jesus," She told me.
"Where did you get it?" was my next
question.

"From my daddy," she stated.

"And who is your daddy?" I ques-

She replied with emphasis and pride, "He is the deacon of the Seventh-day Adventist church."

The incident made a profound impression on me since I was at that time not a church member and was interested in the teachings of Seventh-day Adventists, not because I desired to join their church, but because I wanted to prove to my own satisfaction they were wrong in their teachings. I took the tract, thinking that by reading it I would know better how to disprove some of the teachings of Seventhday Adventists. The reading of that tract had the opposite effect and only helped me to realize more fully that the Seventhday Adventist church was teaching the truth. That little five-year-old, who was interested in taking a little time out from her play to give a tract to a passerby, may never know the part she played in winning a soul to God.

Certainly, we can find many practical ways to use literature effectively in spreading the gospel of Jesus, and the wonderful thing about it is that age is no barrier to literature distribution.

We are told in the Manual for Canvassers, page 8, that "Papers and books are the means of keeping the message for this time continually before the people. In enlightening and confirming souls in the truth, the people will do a far greater work than can be accomplished by ministry of the word alone."

There are many effective ways whereby we can keep a systematic supply of literature before the public. In every public place, where it is at all possible, we should place a reading rack and someone in the church should be assigned the responsibility of keeping these reading racks filled with clean copies of our magazines and tracts. Eternity alone will reveal the number of souls that have become interested in the truth through magazines they have taken from reading racks.

One case that came to my attention concerned a group of people who were on jury duty. They were locked up in the jury room to decide a very important case, but could not reach an agreement. They discussed the case until they had exhausted every argument pro and con. Finally they just sat and waited for someone to make the next statement. One of the members of the jury, tired of what seemed to him a waste of time, got up and wandered around the jury room. He noticed some magazines in a rack and took one out and decided he would read the magazine while he waited for the jury to reach an agreement. When he read the magazine, he placed it before the jury members and told them that it might help them to read it and he took the remaining magazines and distributed them among the jurors. When the jury finally left the room to return to the court, practically all of them took one or more magazines with them, and an interest was created in the message. Later this mun asked that someone be sent to his community to hold meetings. The magazines were the Signs of the Times and the Watchman.

Another effective way in the practical use of literature is to carry with you a package of tracts wherever you go on the train, in buses or by plane. We can place our tracts in the hands of travelers, who will be interested in whiling away their travelling hours by reading. Another good practice is to leave literature in the hotel rooms and in homes where we spend the night. Those who use the public libraries could conveniently slip a tract in the books they return to the library. That tract may

Our Tithe Record

The total tithe contribution within the British West Indies Union for the year 1946 totalled £24100-17-3 (\$98813.62). This sum exceeded the 1945 returns by £1174-5-3 (\$4684.13) or 5%. Tithe returns for the year 1944 totalled £18536-8-0 (\$76236.93), thus showing over a period of two years an increase of 24% or £5564, 9, 3 (\$22576.69).

The Tithe per Capita of the Union, whose membership is 12,973. is £1-17-1 (\$7.61) which would indicate that the average income of our members for the whole year of 1946 was £18-10-10 (\$76.10). This amount would seem very small although all our members are not wage earners.

The following report will show each Mission's Tithe per Capita for 1946:—

Let us say for a moment that the membership of the British West Indies Union were half what it is at the present time and that the average income of the members were £4. 0. 0. per month, and all the members paid a faithful tithe. The tithe income for the year would then exceed the present income by £7034-6-0. Or, let us say, to equal the tithe income as it is at present with only half the membership the average income of the members would have to be only £3-1-11 per month, or a tithe payment of 6/2 per month.

These statistics show that the individual tithe payer could, if taught to pay a faithful tithe, bring up the Tithe per Capita standard of the British West Indies Union and incidentally the tithe income.

Dedication of Georgetown Church, Grand Cayman

Sunday, March 2, was a high-day for the believers in Georgetown. The beautiful little church bulding they have worked so hard to erect was dedicated in a lovely service attended by many prominent men of the island, including Mr. I. O. Smith, Commissioner of the Cayman Islands.

Promptly at 3:30 p.m. the Commissioner cut the ribbon across the front door of the church, and a large audience filed into the building to witness the ceremony. Following the opening of the windows by various individuals, the congregation rose and united their voices in singing that beautiful hymn of dedicatio . No. 487, in the Church Hymnal. A' er a brief prayer and a few words of greeting by Pastor Crofoot, Brother George A. Merren, local elder of the Georgetown church, gave a history of the church building. From this we learned that the building was started while Pastor Lee Gouldbourne was in Georgetown in 1941. Work had to be stopped two or three times because of various shortages. In January, 1944, work had to cease because no lumber could be obtained to finish the ceiling. It was not until December, 1946, that this important item of material was obtainable. As soon as the last of the materials was available. Brother Robert Bush was placed in charge of finishing the work. The ceiling was completed, the building was painted inside and out, the beautiful mahogany pews were varnished and polished, a very


appropriate picture of Jesus was framed and hung behind the platform, and then we were ready for dedication.

Everyone was happy to have Pastor R. H. Pierson, President of the British West Indies Union, present for the dedication. He delivered the dedicatory sermon and Pastor Crofoot led out in the ceremony of the act of dedication.

The building was started with what donations the members could give, and a small contribution from the Jamaica Conference. Shortly after this was done, however, the Cayman Islands were transferred to the administrative guidance of the West Cuba Conference. The brethren of that Conference appreciated the great need of the brethren and sisters in Georgetown and gave them the fine contribution of £198. 0. 0. The individuals who opened the windows at 'the time of the dedication contributed over £25. 0. 0. The total cost of the building is £646. 0. 0., approximately, besides other materials and labour that were not recorded.

This little building is very beautiful. Its attractive natural finish mahogany pews and pulpit give a richness of atmosphere to the interior. The church is very light and airy. No member need be ashamed to invite friends or neighbours to this attractive place of worship. We are sure that this monument to God's commandments and the faith of Jesus will draw many more to come and hear the Third Angel's Message as it is preached, and thus be led to prepare for the soon coming of Jesus.

Ingathering in the Bahamas

Jesus had a perfect knowledge of the Scriptures. He was a constant student of the Bible. He understood current developments and happenings in the light of Bible prophecy. When preaching in the synagogue at Nazareth one Sabbath day, He stated in His sermon His conviction that the prophecy to which He referred, was meeting its fulfilment in His ministry. He said: "Today hath this Scripture been fulfilled in your ears." Luke 4:21. ARV.

I am thinking of another prophecy which is meeting its fulfilment in our day. It is recorded in Isaiah 60:5. The revised version reads: "Then thou shalt see and be radiant and thy heart shall thrill and be enlarged; because the abundance of the sea shall be turned unto thee, the wealth of the nations shall come unto thee."

Truly we have been properly interpreting and applying the prophecy in our annual Ingathering Campaigns. The millions of dollars which have flowed into the treasury of this organization and which have helped so much in doing the great world-wide mission work is something of a modern miracle! And in the gream of wealth that is still coming from our friends who appreciate the work of Seventh-day Adventists, we can see as clearly as ever the fulfilment of the prophecy.

The date for the Ingathering Campaign in the Bahamas Mission was set by the Union Committee and adopted by the local Mission Committee for the month of February. During the first two weeks of this period, the goal of £400 was in the hands of the Church and Mission treasurers. It proved to be the most successful Ingathering Campaign ever conducted in the history of the Mission. It was the most successful because more of our members took part, more contacts were made and more funds were gathered in. The goal was a very substantial increase over the amount solicited last year which was in turn approximately 30% larger than the amount received the year before.

Elder W. L. Barclay, Home Missionary Secretary of the British West Indies Union, was present for the first part of the campaign and rendered invaluable help in many ways. The strong promotion he gave before the campaign began encouraged more to take part than ever before. His personal contacts in the field resulted in many additional pounds to the total.

Elder W. E. Keuster, Pastor of the Nassau churches, organized his members into bands. Meetings were held each night during the first week of the Campaign in the Shirley Street Church, and each night during the second week in the Grants Town church. On the second Sabbath when the total receipts were counted, it was found that each church had exceeded its goal. Both congregations subsequently sang with fervor the victory song: "Praise God From Whom All Blessings Flow!"


WITH OUR LAYMEN

SALT CAYS MISSION

Report from the Salt Cays Mission

About one hundred miles north of Haiti and Cuba are a group of islands that are dependencies of Jamaica. These are the Turks and Caicos Islands, It is the newest organized mission in the Inter-American Division, known as the Salt Cays Mission. The only reason for their economic existence is the natural geographic location for making salt. The country is fairly flat and dry, and at one time this little group of islands supplied the world with salt. During the war most of this trade was lost, leaving the poor people with practically no means of making a living.

In September of 1945 there was a severe hurricane that all but destroyed these islands. Down in the lower Caicos group, especially, the people have not been able to recover. The government has done a great deal, but many people are still without suitable houses. So many people lost their lives at sea that there is a noticeable number of widows and orphans who are living in poverty. To add to their troubles, there has been a crop failure the past three years due to the drought.

Pastor E. E. Parchment and I made a tour of these islands and held meetings. In visiting these people we found many that are interested in the message and are waiting to know more before taking

their stand for their Master. While holding meetings on the island of Blue Hills, there was a great interest and the people wanted us to stay longer. Under the faithful service of Brother and Sister Nebblett, there were ten souls baptized and a church organized. Although there are other churches there, their members still cling to pagan superstitions that make them only a little better than Devilworshippers. We praise God that these souls can be brought from great opposition and spiritual darkness. There are many more who will soon be ready for baptism and have expressed their desire to become a part of this great S. D. A. Movement.

The field has been well covered with our literature and the people are only waiting further instructions. Brother and Sister Nebblett are carrying, along with their other tasks, the Twentieth Century Bible School, which is laying the ground work, and with some good Evangelistic efforts this year we hope to have a good harvest of souls. Wherever we went the Commissioners and the people expressed their desire that we come to their community and start our work. The work is truly ripe in Grand Turk, the capital. Many are definitely interested in the Sabbath: others have given up smoking and drinking. There was a minister in one place that asked that we come there and start a church so he could join with his members.

We ask the interest of your prayers as we return to this field that a rich harvest of souls may be reaped.

New Hope College has, until recently, been using rented quarters. This has naturally not been a satisfactory arrangement. Now it has been possible to secure a property on Osbourne Road in a suburb of Kingston and the school plant has been transferred to the new location. The bulding that has been purchased is not new. In fact, it is rather ancient. However, it is sound and substantial and with the proper repairs and remodelling will no doubt serve well for some time.

At the time when this property was purchased a sentiment was voiced by several persons to change the name of New Hope College. These individuals felt that we should now look ahead to a bright future rather than back to a day when our educational facilities were practically nonexistent. The board finally voted to change the name of the school at the time that the transfer from rented quarters to our own property was made. The name chosen is "Kingsway High School". We believe that this institution will nobly continue to point out the King's Way to the large number of students who enter its portals.

With the blessing of God on this fine school we look forward to new attainments and greater achievements at Kingsway High School as Headmaster Crawford and his staff continue the good work of moulding young lives for the Master's service.

reach someone at a time when he needs its message.

Not only are we to distribute our literature to travelling companions, but an organized effort should be made in every church to see that every home within reach will become acquainted with our literature. During recent years we have found the systematic mailing of literature to be very effective in gaining enrolments in the Bible Correspondence Course. Many, many souls have already been won to Christ as a result of this means of distributing literature.

Volume IX, page 127, we read that "Among the members of our churches there should be more house to house labour in giving Bible readings and distributing literature." Certainly, this is a clear indication that our church members should be organized for systematic literature distribution in their neighbourhood. By choosing the right type of literature, an interest in the message can be created that can lead to Bible studies. Certainly the instruction given to us from the Servant of God was given for a definite purpose and we should heed the instruction and put it into practice. Many more souls would find their way to the kingdom if only we would follow the blueprint outlined in the Spirit of Prophecy relative to the use of literature to open the doors to Bible study.

In my own experience, I have found that systematic literature distribution has not only opened the way for Bible studies in the homes of people, but it has paved the way for evangelistic efforts. After the evangelistic effort has been started and the names of interested people have been obtained, it has always been profitable to visit these people in their homes and leave a piece of literature dealing with the previous night's sermon: by this means the interested person not only has heard the message audibly, but has an opportunity of knowing the message again by reading and he has in his hands a perfect record of the Truth he has learned. Without the use of literature the work of God would be greatly handicapped and the spiritual growth of this movement would be very slow, indeed.

Recently, I was traveling with a group of m nisters of other denominations and one of them expressed a desire to know the difference between Seventh-day Adventists and his denomination. Before I had

an opportunity to answer him, one of the other ministers spoke up and said, "I can tell you all about Seventh-day Adventists and the difference between their church and ours." He then gave a very clear-cut picture of the doctrines and works of the Seventh-day Adventists their organization and missionary endeavours, and he said, "If our church was as active as the Seventh-day Adventist church, we would grow as rapidly. Wherever you find a Seventh-day Adventist church you find they all believe exactly the same thing. You find that one church helps another and you find that every church member has been given some missionary work to do, and all of them are encouraged to give out literature. The Seventh-day Adventists know the value of literature in leading people to the knowledge of God's work. We ought to learn a lesson from them and use more literature ourselves."

I was amazed to recognize how much knowledge this man had of Seventh-day Adventists and upon questioning him I learned that he had been a Religious Liberty secretary of the Protestant churches in Bulgaria and had often been associated with Seventh-day Adventists in the cause of Religious Liberty in that country. He had watched them very closely and was impressed.

A number of years ago a protestant missionary to Korea referred to our work as follows. "Wisely and well have the Seventh-day Adventists seen beyond the more limited horizon that binds most of us, and put their emphasis on books, thus reaching a world where no missionary goes, a world that never comes to church, a world that is old, proud, distressed, and needs the light just as much as any. I propose that we take our hats off to the Seventh-day Adventists and make a deep bow. They have had more sense and vision in regards to missionary work than the rest of us. All other things pass away. The printed page alone remains,"

Other denominations have recognized that the rapid growth of the Seventh-day Adventist church has been the result of the wide distribution of literature and they themselves are following the example set by this church. We should continue to be out in the forefront, using literature in every way possible to keep before the public the message that God has entrusted to us.
