Taking Men Alive

WOULDN'T you like to learn one Greek word? Let me teach you a very important one for every Seventh-day Adventist to know. It is *zogreo* and it means "to take alive."

The Bible teaches us that every judgment bound man or woman born into this world of sin is going to be "taken alive" by someone. Notice by whom.

"Zogreo" appears only twice in the whole of the New Testament. Let us read both of these references. They should make a deep impression upon your heart and life.

First, turn to *1 Tim. 2:26*. Here Paul says, "And that they may recover themselves out of the snare of the devil, who are taken captive by him at his will." Here the word *zogreo* is translated "taken captive". It means literally "taken alive". Here is depicted the great portion of the human race who will be "taken alive" or "taken captive" by our adversary the devil—trapped in his clutches, lost—eternally lost!

In *1 Peter 5:8*, Satan is described as a "roaring lion" out seeking whom he may take alive and devour. Now we are told by those who have traveled in Africa where there are many lions that these great beasts will not pass fires built around camps at night. They will pace back and forth, their eyes blazing like balls of fire in the night, but they will not venture to cross the fire line that protects the travelers.

The Prophet Zechariah describes our God as "a wall of fire round about" safety against the attacks of Satan, that roaring lion seeking to take us alive,

is in keeping the fire of God burning brightly about us. He cannot pass that wall of protection with which the Lord surrounds His people.

From these texts it is proof plain that many will be "taken alive" (*zogreo*) by Satan.

On the other hand, let us turn to the one other place in Scripture where the word *zogreo* is used, and note its connection there.

"And Jesus said unto Simon, Fear not; from henceforth thou shalt catch men." *Luke 5:10*.

Here again men are taken alive, but in what a different manner and for what a different purpose! This time it is the King of Glory who declares that you and I have been selected to take men alive for eternal life! What a glorious privilege!

"God could have proclaimed His truth through sinless angels, but this is not His plan. He chooses human beings, men compassed with infirmity, as instruments in the working out of His designs. The priceless treasure is placed in earthen vessels. Through men His blessings are to be conveyed to the world. Through them His glory is to shine forth into the darkness of sin. In loving ministry they are to meet the sinful and the needy, and lead them to the cross." *A. A.*, p. 330.

What an honour heaven has bestowed upon each one of us—hunters for souls—workers together with God to take men and women alive for Him!

Solemn thought—every person born into this world will be taken alive by one of the great fishers of men—either Christ or Satan! All will be taken alive unto death or taken alive unto

Soul Winning News from The Bahamas

Sabbath morning, November 21, I left Nassau on board the M. V. "Gary Roberts" for a two weeks' itinerary among the churches and companies on the island of Andros. After two days of average sailing weather in waters smooth and rough, I arrived at Kemps Bay where a goodly number of our people were waiting to greet me. Soon each one, so far as the pieces of baggage and equipment would go around, was carrying my things into the settlement from the beach and a little later I found myself settled in a house which had been made ready.

The next eight days I spent holding meetings in our church building and in visiting with our people. I also spent quite some time in visiting the Mission School. At all of our meetings, the attendance was good and the Lord blessed with good gatherings which proved profitable for all.

It was a source of real inspiration to hear the children of the school sing and recite their drills and lessons. Brother U. B. Toote, our teacher, is to be commended for the good work he is carrying on!

The following Tuesday, four of our brethren from Black Point came in two small boats for my things over there. The weather had been so rough that it wasn't until their third attempt that they were able to get through. Another house had been made ready and here I again set up house-keeping.

It was also a joy to meet with our believers here and our nightly attendance to the meetings conducted in the Black Point Church was even larger than at Kemps Bay. Each night the building was well filled with earnest and attentive listeners. Seldom have I been privileged to hear more enthusiastic singing than at this meeting.

On Thursday, December 9, in company with Brother Romulus Rahming, Brother U. B. Toote, and Brother Thomas Miller, I made the trip by sail boat to Pleasant Bay where I had the privilege to witness what God has been doing through Brother and Sister Toote for the upbuilding of His work in that section of the island. I was happy to see a fine church building up to the belt course, as well as a room for the children's Sabbath school division. There were six ready to be taken into the church who had been prepared for baptism by this couple and the rite was subsequently administered. We are hopeful that soon we shall be able to organize another church as well as to dedicate a new building in this place.

Returning to Black Point by foot, we were privileged to visit with a number of our isolated believers along the way. Sabbath, December 13, was a day which will be remembered for a long time by all the believers in that entire area who gathered at the Black Point church for an all day meeting. At the close of the Sabbath, ten more candidates were baptized. These, including one taken in on profession of faith, were the fruits of the labours of three of our lay brethren, namely, Brother Romulus Rahming, Brother Thomas Miller, and Brother Walter Rahming of Black Point, Kemps Bay and Deep Creek respectively. One other was received into the Black Point church on Profession of Faith, making a total of fifteen new members for that area. We are grateful for the faithfulness on the part of these laymen, which resulted in these additions.

Just after this service, Brother Garfield Newman, the pastor of the district, and I went out to San Adres, where a quiet wedding took place between David Brown and Sarah Phillips.

New Year's morning was one of joy and gladness for the churches of Corozal and Calcutta. They met part of the way between the two churches to have a joint baptism by the seaside. Seven precious souls were buried with their Lord in baptism to rise and walk in newness of life. On the afternoon of the same day, we went by motor car thirteen miles to Santa Clara to unite a couple in holy wedlock. This brother had been keeping the Sabbath for sometime, but he was not married and could not be united with the church; the woman being opposed to Seventh-day Adventists, wanted to be married by the Roman Catholic church. The brother on the other hand was determined not to have anything to do with the priest. Thousands of people reading that question would probably answer 'Yes.' Possibly you are among that number. What a wonderful thing it would be if there were no more unemployment. Then we would be happy, because our employment would enable us to buy the food we need to build healthy, strong bodies and minds. We would be able to buy the necessary clothing for our families, and we would rejoice in the knowledge that they also would be happy.

How I wish it were possible for me to provide employment for every idle Adventist in the British West Indies Union. If I just had a large plantation I would say to every Adventist: "Go work in my field today," and I am sure that all who were idle would be glad for the opportunity to go to work.

But wait, I do have a large field, and I do need workers in that field. And I am offering the best pay that it is possible for man ever to receive. That field is the territory that comprises the British West Indies Union. Within the boundaries of that territory there live approximately a million and a half people. Only about fifteen thousand of them are preparing for the coming of the Lord. The rest are drifting along, indifferent to the fact that soon Christ will come, and the Lord wants us to go into the highways and the byways and bring them into His fold. The time to finish the work is very short, and every moment of delay may cost some soul the eternal kingdom. "The perils of the last days are upon us," the pen of inspiration records. Now is the time to rise to the challenge of the greatest hour in history.

This is no time for any Adventist to be idle in the Lord's service. The servant of the Lord admonishes us that "It is not the Lord's purpose that ministers should be left to do the greatest part of the work of sowing the seed of truth. Men who are not called to the ministry are to . . . labour for the Master according to their several ability. Hundreds of men and women now idle could do

acceptable service. By carrying the truth into the homes of their friends and neighbours, they could do a great work for the Master." *Testimonies*, Vol. 7, p. 21.

Are you unemployed? The Lord is waiting for you to go to work, and the need for active laymen is greater today than it ever was in the history of this movement. Thousands in the West Indies have been students in the Bible Correspondence School, and they are anxious for a more personal acquaintance with the children of God. Spearhead Evangelism

At the Autumn Council in Michigan a few months ago a new type of Evangelistic effort was born. It has been called the Spearhead effort.

This new plan encourages our regular Mission Workers to hold short campaigns for the purpose of securing names for personal follow-up work to be done by our lay workers.

Under this plan the church or the company where the effort is to be held will prepare the field well first by a thorough, systematic literature distribution programme. Week after week members will visit friends and neighbours and others each time taking them a tract on the message. These tracts are so selected that they will create and progressively develop an interest in the truth.

Prayer bands will be organized in the church or company and earnest intercessory prayer will ascend on behalf of unbaptized juniors and young people of Adventist homes, unconverted husbands and wives, sons and daughters of members and interested persons. These prayer bands should meet regularly and pray definitely for certain individuals by name who are on their prayer list.

Then the worker will come to commence the effort. He will spend a week or ten days getting the meetings well under way and assisting lay workers in their plans to keep the interest burning brightly. He will conduct a class on "How to Give Bible Studies" with prospective lay Bible workers. He will help the Lay Preacher or Preachers who will continue the effort to plan their subjects and carry the meetings on through in a good strong way. He will preach most of the sermons this first week of the effort.

The prayer band will continue. As the minister visits in the homes of interested persons he will take the lay workers with him thus enabling them to learn helpful lessons in visiting, praying, and studying the message with such persons.

When the minister leaves, the lay workers will continue the meetings as many nights a week as agreed upon. The lay preachers will preach and lead out and the other lay workers will help in the visiting, the Bible Studies and other phases of the meetings.

When it is time to present the last eight or ten subjects of the effort the minister will return and help the lay workers bring interested persons to a

When Should a Child be Baptized?

This is a question that has not been fully settled in the minds of many of our believers. There are those who reason that one should not be baptized until he is in his middle or late teens; but according to the inspired word this belief is unfounded.

In *Mark 16:15, 16* we have the plain instruction of the Master, "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved." Peter says in *Acts 2:38* "Repent and be baptized." In *Volume 6 of the Testimonies*, pp. 93 and 94, we read: "Religious instruction should be given to children from their earliest years. When the happiest period of their lives has come, and they in their hearts love Jesus and wish to be baptized, then deal faithfully with them. Before they receive the ordinance, ask them if it is to be their first purpose in life to work for God. Then tell them how to begin. . . After faithful labour, if you are satisfied that your children understand the meaning of conversion and baptism, and are truly converted, let them be baptized."

Now the question arises, at what age is a child responsible for his wrong doings? Do parents wait until their children are in their teens before they hold them responsible for wrong acts? Surely they do not.

The laws of the land do not provide that persons must be grown men and women before punishment is inflicted for violation of such laws. Why then should they wait for carrying out of the instruction of their Lord, when they fully comprehend what is right?

Let us ponder the words of the wise man—"Train up a child in the way he should go; and when he is old, he will not depart from it." If the child has been

Is Tithe Paying Related to Soul Winning

Thirty-five years ago the world membership of the Seventh-day Adventist denomination stood at 98,044 members. At the close of 1946, the latest date at which figures are available, the world membership totaled 598,683. Thus, in such a comparatively short period of time, the net increase in the ranks of God's remnant people has been more than 510%!

To what factors may we credit this phenomenal growth? Is it the result of superior talent or ability on the part of our ministry and laity? Is it because the pioneers were men of great wealth? Is it due to an abundance of equipment and facilities? We believe that the growth of the Seventh-day Adventist church is due to none of these factors. Instead it has resulted from faithful adherence to the "blue-print" that God has given to the remnant. This "blue-print" includes such major points as true Sabbath observance, tithe-paying and the proclamation everywhere of the judgment hour message to a dying world.

Indeed, these are the things that set us apart from the rest of the world. Men marvel that we are able to keep the Sab-

bath, refraining from gainful employment on the day that Satan has caused to be the real "bread and butter" day of the whole week. They are amazed to find a people who, in the midst of the greed and covetousness of a world, almost wholly given over to self-serving, are faithfully returning to God's treasury the tenth of all their income. Here is the testimony of one author, not of our faith, on this subject:

"So far as known to the writer, there is but but one evangelical denomination in the world which accepts the tithe as a church tenet and belief, and regards the law of the tithe as of the same binding force as the law of the Sabbath. I refer to the Seventh-day Adventists."

Then this writer ascribes to this faithfulness in tithe-paying and Sabbath-keeping the tremendous growth of our evangelical work.

Dear brother or sister, do you see the connection between faithfulness in these two great commands of God and the tremendous work of evangelism that has been done by Seventh-day Adventists?

Have you caught a vision of the greater work that might be done if every member were faithful in keeping the Sabbath and paying his tithes? If your answer to these questions is negative, we plead with you to get down on your knees and pray for a "heavenly vision" before the door of probation closes. God promises faithfully to open the windows of heaven and pour out a marvelous blessing when you and I do our part. This blessing will not only be seen in our personal lives and experiences, but in the prosperity and growth of the church. Let us, brethren, first examine ourselves and then each encourage his neighbour to greater faithfulness to the end that, under the blessing of God, many of the honest-in-heart may yet be garnered in.

taught the way of God, to know the right from the wrong, so that when he commits a wrong, he is sorry and repents, why then should the third step be withheld? Baptism, as we know, is the gateway to eternal life. To repent and believe is no more important than to be baptized, to the one who knows, God requires of us to go the whole way in all His commissions.

Again there are those who think that a child should know and understand all there is of the Advent Message, before baptism. This certainly is an unreasonable position to take. Many of us who are advanced in years are still lacking in knowledge of some of the technical truths concerning our Message. When one accepts the Message under a Pastor or Evangelist, that one is not asked to wait until he fully understands every technical phase of the truths we teach before baptism is administered, then why should we make such requirements of children. They should have sufficient knowledge of the Third Angel's Message at the age of ten to be able to make decisions for right. Statistics reveal the following facts:—

There were actually more children baptized at the age of seven, than the age of twenty-three.

There were three times as many baptized at the age of eight, as at the age of twenty-two.

There were five times as many baptized at the age of nine, as at the age of twenty-one.

There were six times as many baptized at the age of nine, as at the age of twenty.

There were nine and one half times as many baptized at the age of eleven as at the age of nineteen.

There were seven times as many bap-

tized at the age of twelve, as at the age of eighteen.

There were four times as many baptized at the age of thirteen, as the age of seventeen.

There were two times as many baptized at the age of fifteen, as at the age of sixteen.

Many of us can testify to the truthfulness of this report, probably in our own experience. In this age of the world's history, when Satan is bidding for the souls of our youth, let us grasp every opportunity that comes in saving the youth and children of the church. Let every Adventist parent encourage the children to go forward in baptism at an early age. Let the leaders of our churches take the same stand. Let us all as workers in the Advent Cause encourage the youth to make his vows to God by following the footsteps of Jesus in this solemn rite. Is not this one heaven-sent means of saving our youth from drifting into the world?
