Christ's Prayer for His Church in the British West Indies Union

PAUSE with me for a few moments by the side of the Master as He prays one of His last prayers before the crucifixion. We find in the 17th Chapter of John's Gospel the words of this earnest intercessory prayer recorded. Even with the agony of the cross just before Him the Saviour's solicitude was not for Himself but rather for those whom He should leave to carry forward His work in the earth. He knew that most severe trials lay ahead of them; He was well aware of the persecu-

tion and the opposition that they would meet from without. but Jesus saw that their greatest danger would be from a spirit of division within. So the burden of this intercessory prayer was for a spirit of unity and brotherly love to exist among His followers. 7John 17:9:11).

"That union and love might exist among His disciples, was the burden of our Saviour's last prayer for them prior to His crucifixion." Vol. V. p. 236. Not only for the disciples of

His day did the Master pray on this occasion, but as well He prayed that a spirit of oneness and brotherly love might prevail in His church throughout all generations.

"Neither pray I for these alone, but for them also which shall believe on me through the

truth." (John 17:20). That prayer, Brother, Sister, was for you and for me and all members of God's Remnant Church living even today. This prayer was answered in the early church. As the disciples

gathered together in preparation for Pentecost the first and second chapters of Acts tells us that a spirit of unity and brotherly love existed among them. "These all continued with one accord in prayer and supplication." (Acts 1:14).

"And when the day of Pentecost was fully come, they were all of one accord in one place." (Acts 2:1). Because of the unity and love which existed among them the Holy Spirit descended in mighty power upon them.


As a result the Lord could use them mightily for the preach-


ing of His Gospel.

"Only as they were united with Christ, could the disciples hope to have the accompanying power of the Holy Spirit, and the cooperation of angels of heaven. So long as they (the disciples) remained united . . . the church would advance from victory to victory, gloriously fulfilling her divine mission of proclaiming the gospel to the world." D. A., p. 91.

The task of preaching the message of salvation to every kindred, tongue and people is as much for the church today as it was in the days of the disciples. Before Jesus comes His last warning message must go to earth's remotest bounds. This will be accomplished only if the members of God's Remnant Church put away all differences and draw closer together in a spirit of unity and love.

The British West Indies Union Committee has formulated a plan whereby every church in the Union, regardless of when it was built or dedicated, be it old or new, can have a good-sized, neat notice board painted with the name of the church on it and space for special announcements to be written in. The Union has offered to join every mission and every church in sharing the expense of such a board. The total cost of the board to the church under this plan will be only a very few shillings—probably not more than 5/-, Isn't that reasonable?

Here and There Over the Union

For health reasons and because of circumstances in the Cayman Islands at this time Doctor and Mrs. Cafferky have responded to this call and will be connecting with the hospital on a part-time basis and also for private practice in the City of Kingston.

Miss Ualee Lawrence, our efficient teacher in the Bahamas Junior Academy, has spent the summer in Oakwood College taking further school work. She reports a very pleasant time and is now back in Nassau on the job once more. We greatly appreciate the very fine work that Miss Lawrence has been doing in the Nassau Academy.

Word has been received that Elder O. Schneider and family have accepted the call of the British West Indies Union to the directorship of the Cayman Islands Mission, and it is expected that the Schneiders will be arriving in the field at an early date. Brother and Sister Schneider have been conected with a number of our educational institutions in America and they have also had considerable experience in pastoral work. We welcome them to our staff of workers in the B. W. I. Union.

Elder Nation, Elder Butherus, and Brother Morrison made a trip around the West Jamaica Mission recently in the interest of the educational work, visiting the various churches where there are church schools and where there are prospective students for the West Indian Training College. The Brethren report a good interest in Christian education throughout the West Jamaica Mission.

Toward the end of July we were happy to welcome Elder E. F. Hackman and Brother L. F. Bohner, two of our Division officers, in Kingston for a few hours. The brethren stopped over on their way back to Miami after spending some months down in Central America and other parts of the field.

Elder K. S. Crofoot and family arrived on the S. S. Merco from Georgetown Tuesday, August 3. Elder Crofoot, after accepting a call to the Presidency of the East Jamaica Mission, had returned to Georgetown to pack his things and bring his family to finally settle in Kingston, the headquarters of the East Jamaica Mission. We welcome the Crofoots to their new work and to their new home here in Jamaica.

Looking forward to a good strong programme in 1949, the Union Committee has requested General Conference and Division help for a number of important appointments early in the new year. The request has been passed on for Elder W. P. Elliot. Secretary of the Publishing Department of the General Conference to attend the East and West Jamaica Colporteur Institutes which will be held early in 1949. Another request was passed along for Elder L. T. Reynolds, Editor of the Message Magazine. to pay a visit to Jamaica sometime during the year to assist in the promotion of the Message Magazine work in our field. The request was also passed on to the Division for Elder T. L. Oswald or Elder Henry Brown, Secretaries of the Home Missionary Department, to be present at Lay Preachers' Institutes to be held in the East and West Jamaica Missions at the turn of the year. We are also anticipating help from the Division Home Missionary Department.

The last week of July the Union President paid a visit to the Cayman Islands field in the interest of the medical and educational work. The members there greatly regret the loss of Elder Crofoot and his good wife and Dr. and Mrs. Cafferky, all of whom are leaving the field at one time. We are glad to report, however, that replacements are being provided at an early date.

We have been made happy to note an increase of £135. 0. 0 in our Sabbath School offerings for the second quarter over the first quarter. This is as it should be, for as the work widens it needs greater sacrifice on our part to keep it moving, and only as we share our blessings liberally with others will we retain them ourselves.

An Open Letter to Our Missionary Volunteers

Dear Fellow Missionary Volunteers:

Sometimes non-Adventists give us food for real thought. Sometimes they say things that challenge us. Sometimes they say things that embarrass us. Recently Elder Nation and I met a man who did all three.

We were soliciting a certain business man for Ingathering, and after telling him of the work Adventists were doing all over the world through hospitals, schools, welfare activities and evangelism, he said, "Yes, that is a good work, but you are losing out in the more important plac : -you are doing nothing for young people." This man went on to recite the things the Catholic church was doing to win and hold the young people. By a strange coincidence a worker told me, just a few days later, that he had a similar experience in another part of the island!

Of course, it is embarrassing to us to have people think we are not doing anything for young people, and it is useless for us to talk about our progressive class work or Youth Congresses or any other programme like that, because these people were talking about what we were NOT doing for young people not of our faith.

While it is embarrassing to us, nevertheless, these men have given us real food for thought, and as we study this matter seriously we must recognize the challenge that is laid down to us. Our records show that the number of young people baptized in this Union field during the first quarter of 1948 amounted to ninety-nine. The possibilities are that most of these were youth from Adventist homes who would have joined the church in the natural course of events. Our records show further that twenty-eight of those baptized were won by our young people. Our Young People's report for the first quarter indicates that there are 8,352 voung people in the Union. Rightly directed in evangelism these thousands of Advent Youth should be able to win at least hundreds of other youth.

Missionary Volunteers, what can we do to meet this challenge? I know we have a busy programme working for and with our own youth. It takes time and effort to plan Youth Congresses, rallies, progressive classes, and social life for youth, and these are necessary. But the challenge of unconverted youth lies before is. We cannot shut our eyes to it. Now

is the time to do something. The Message means much to each of our youth, but it will mean much more if they take that Message to other youth.

In our Youth Congresses, soon to convene, much emphasis will be placed on the "Share Your Faith" movement. We should not wait until then to launch a programme of soul-winning for non-Adventist young people. We cannot hold dances or other types of questionable entertainment to entice youth to our churches, but we can use legitimate methods that will get results.

First of all, we should emulate our Saviour. We should go out of our way to be friendly with those not of our faith. Jesus made a special effort in behalf of the woman of Samaria. When she recognized His friendliness she responded and was won to Christ - and she in turn brought others to Him.

We would like to suggest that every Missionary Volunteer Society plan periodical entertainments of a high standard and INVITE the neighbourhood youth to attend. Make these youth feel that they are wanted and they will respond. Plan hikes or trips to a nearby beach for a picnic and invite them to go.

After these entertainments or hikes or picnics, plan a "Share Your Faith" rally in the church and invite these young people to attend. A carefully planned question hour could raise questions in their minds that would create an interest that may lead to conversion.

We are living in the last days and the time has come for our Youth to march forward to do battle for God. Let us answer the challenge of the hour and bear the "Fiery Cross" of Christ into every hamlet, village, town, and city in this great field that God has committed to us. Let it no longer be said that we are doing nothing for the youth of the world. They are our responsibility. Let us SHARE OUR FAITH.

The power, the wisdom, the strength, the physical and mental capabilities, are blessings from God. May we always remember this. Instead of withholding what we possess from God, we should use what we own to His glory. To do this is for our good. Prov. 3:9, 10. In failing to dothis we fail to our own detriment. Prov. 11:24, 25. Many of those who fail, and who experience hard times, fail because they forget and rob God. And thus failing, very many will lose their place in the Kingdom of heaven.

"Will a man rob God? Yet ve have robbed me. But ye say wherein have we robbed thee? In tithes and offerings. Ye are cursed with a curse: for ye have robbed me, even this whole nation." Mal. 3:8, 9. Do you have members in your church who are not returning to God His own, who are coming behind in tithes and offerings? Such persons are robbing the Lord. The officers of the church should pray for, and work with them, and help them to see that they are in danger. God's curse is resting on them, and they will never have true success, until they repent of their sin and return to God that which belongs to Him.

Dedication of the Petersfield Church

About two years ago it was my privilege, in company with Pastors Shirleigh Greene and Earl Parchment, to visit the Petersfield church in the Parish of Westmoreland, Jamaica. We enjoyed a pleasant and profitable weekend, holding a departmental convention.

When I was asked recently to attend the dedication of the Petersfield church, my mind went back to the previous visit and I pictured in my mind's eye the condition of the church edifice as it was at that time. As I remembered the walls they were of boards, unpainted and not too carefully applied. There was no roof over the entrance way. The whole appearance was a bit discouraging. Now, as I thought of the dedication, I wondered what changes had been wrought in the building. However, my imagination was not able to fully picture the complete transformation that has taken place at Petersfield. The wooden siding has all been pulled down and masonry walls substituted. An inviting entrance to the building has been constructed. Paint and color-wash have transformed both the inside and outside of the building. The grounds are clean and pleasingly landscaped: a small flower garden is carefully tended in one corner of the church plot. A new sign announces to all who pass that this is the Petersfield Seventh-day Adventist church.

Though the day of the dedication, Sunday, August 1, was rainy, the church could not hold all who came to the dedicatory service. Several mission workers were present and took part in the service, including a former pastor, Elder E. C. H. Reid, and the pastor of the adjoining distict, Elder Lee Gouldbourne. Pastor W. S. Nation, Pastor E. E. Parchment and the writer represented the West Jamaica Mission and the British West Indies Union.

The dedicatory service was carefully planned by the Pastor of the district,

Pastor Shirleigh Greene. In addition to the features usual to such a service, we were pleased to listen to a short address by the Hon. C. C. Campbell, M.H.R. for Western Westmoreland. Music by the choir, under the direction of Brother Felix Clayton added much to the service.

It is already evident that the fine new building will soon be too small to house the Petersfield congregation. May God bless them as they continue to let their light shine brightly in that part of the field.



"Pastor Lindo has started the programme with an effort at Race Course in Clarendon. A few years ago an organized church was flourishing in this place, but through apostacy and removals it has been reduced to practically nothing. Now with a tent effort in progress we look forward to a revival of the Race Course church. For years our colporteurs have been sowing the seeds of truth through the printed page throughout this area. Because of the establishment of its large sugar factories Vere has been attracting many workers from other parts of the island. Ouite a large number of students have taken the Bible Correspondence Course, so let us pray earnestly that this effort will be the means of reaping a rich harvest of souls.

"Pastor Gouldbourne's effort at Pondside has been yielding very satisfactory results so that in the next few weeks he expects to organize a church there. The little Sabbath School at Rejoin which was started a few months ago as a result of Brother Arthur Heron's lay effort is also progressing and gives promise of developing into an organized church shortly."

and our love to our fellowmen. When there is harmonious action among the individual members of the church, when there is love and confidence manifested by brother to brother there will be proportionate force and power in our work for the salvation of men." T.M., p. 188.

With a gigantic task before us and with the inspired assurance of a time of trouble such as never has fallen upon this world ahead, there will be plenty of obstacles and opposition from without. This being true we must be certain that unity reigns within the church. Only as we meet the tests and trials ahead with a spirit of solidarity prompted by a mutual feeling of brotherly love will we be able to survive the fierce assaults of the Evil

Paul, writing under inspiration, calls for a full and complete consecration of every member of God's church. "I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service," (Rom. 12:1).

He further tells us that we are all one body in Christ Jesus. We can well imagine the difficulty that would result if members of the physical body did not co-ordinate. Just so it is when there is destructive criticism and unchristian railing, causing divisions within the church of God.

The Lord desires we should all be one in Him. In Galatians 3:28 the Apostle says that there is no room for Jew or Greek, slave or freeman, male or female, that we all become one in Christ Jesus. Just as sometimes America is called "the melting pot of nations" where men and women from all parts of the world have united under one government owing allegiance to one flag and using one language, so the Cross is to be the great Standardizer of high and low estate alike when we become Christians. All of the old pride and prejudice and differences are left behind and we become one in Christ Jesus.

"All of you should be of one mind, quick to sympathize, kind minded, not requiting evil with evil." (I Peter 3:8, Weymouth).

"God is the embodiment of benevolence, mercy and love. Those who are truly connected with him, cannot be at variance with one another. His spirit ruling in the heart will create harmony, love and unity." Vol. V, p. 28. The Apostle Paul further joins IV's Saviour in an earnest appeal for unity 1 the church. "Now I entreat you, brethren in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ to cultivate a spirit of harmony all of you and that there be no divisions among you, but rather a perfect union through your having one mind and one judgment." (I Cor. 1:10, Weymouth).

The Moffatt translation makes the appeal even more vividly specific. "Brothers, for the sake of our Lord Jesus Christ I beg of you all to drop these party cries. There must be no cliques among you." In these words the Apostle Paul appeals to all for a spirit of unity and singleness of spirit. Party cries that foment trouble and cliques that breed suspicion and distrust have no place in the church of God.

"Divisions in the church dishonour the religion of Christ before the world, and give occasion to the enemies of truth to justify their course" Vol. V, p. 239.

The Spirit of Prophecy further warns us that "It is not the opposition of the world that endangers us the most, it is the evil cherished in the hearts of professed believers that works our most grievous disaster, and most retards the progress of God's cause. There is no surer way of weakening our spirituality than by being envious, suspicious of one another, full of fault finding and evil surmising." Vol. VIII, p. 242.

May the Lord help us in these last days when we have such a tremendous task before us and when Satan is assailing God's people so fiercely that we may "press together, press together, press together."

"We are of the same faith, members of one family, all children of the same Heavenly Father with the same blessed hope of immortality. How close and tender should be the tie that binds us together." Vol. VIII, p. 242.

Deeper Experience Demanded

As our numbers are increasing, broader plans must be laid to meet the increasing demands of the times; but we see no special increase of fervent piety, of Christian simplicity, and earnest devotion. The church seems content to take only the first steps in conversion. They are more ready for active labour than for humble devotion — more ready to engage in outward religious service than in the inner work of the heart. Meditation and prayer are neglected for bustle and show. Religion must begin with emptying and purifying the heart, and must be nurtured by daily prayer.
