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"I Come Quickly"

AS THE delegates took their seats in their assigned section of the arena in the large auditorium in San Francisco, all eyes fell on a large clock which had been painted and hung at the back of the platform facing the audience. The hands pointed to five minutes to twelve, and across the middle of the face were the words of Christ which are recorded in Rev. 22:7, "I Come Quickly".

This solemn message from the Lord was the keynote throughout the whole Session. The songs, the prayers, the sermons, the reports and the resolutions were vibrant with the proclamation of the Saviour, "I Come Quickly."

The newly elected President of the General Conference, Elder W. H. Branson, in his acceptance speech said:

"My chief burden shall be the winning of souls. This, I believe, should be our greatest of all goals. Our chief business as a church is to make ready a people prepared for the Lord. We must lose no time in accomplishing this solemn business for God. Everything else in the world is ready for the end. Heaven will be made up of people. The only possessions we can take with us to heaven are those whom we can save from the waves of sin, and this gathering of the people can be done only under the power and blessing of the Holy Spirit. We must now receive this pentecostal power, and lay plans throughout the whole world to get the people ready. The hour is growing late. The night is falling. There is not an hour or a day to lose."

Elder N. C. Wilson, President of the Australasian Inter-Union Conference in his morning devotional study said:

"We need a mighty revival of the preaching of the soon return of our Lord." "Nothing makes such a change in people's

lives as LOOKING for and WAITING for the Saviour's return."

From the pen of inspiration Elder Wilson gave the following quotations:

"The return of Christ to our world will not be long delayed. Let this be the keynote of every message." Vol. VI, p. 406.

"Time is very short, and all that is to be done must be done quickly. The angels are holding the four winds, and Satan is taking advantage of everyone who is not fully established in the truth. Every soul is to be tested." Vol. V, p. 573.

"Slowly but surely the wheel of Providence is turning. We know not how soon our Lord will say, 'It is done!' His coming

is drawing nigh. Soon our opportunities for work will be forever past. Only a little while longer shall we be permitted to labour." Vol. VII, p. 235.

Dr. T. R. Flaiz in his morning devotional study also stressed this cardinal truth. We quote two paragraphs:

"Peter, in his epistles, gave great emphasis to the day of the Lord. Not only did he strongly emphasize the certainty of the event, but he described something of the nature of that fateful day. After fascinating us with his dramatic description of the world's dying agonies, he directs our attention to what to him seems of greater significance than the mere fact of the end of the world. 'Seeing then that all these things shall be dissolved, what manner of persons ought ye to be in all holy conversation and godliness?'"

"What a pertinent question! How very directly related to our situation in these times of crisis! Yes, what manner of persons ought we to be? What is the significance of Peter's question in this connection? Will our attitude toward the coming of the Lord have any bearing on the type of persons we will be? Will our conduct be in any way affected by our thinking on this matter? Will our life purposes, our pursuits, our talents and potentials be in any way related to our thinking on this question?"

The call of the hour is for Spirit-filled men, women, and youth who will put on the full armour of God and go forth into the highways and hedges and compel them to come in for "all things are now ready." Thousands are waiting only for the invitation. It was stated by the President of the General Conference that if we were permitted to come together again four years from now, our membership ought to be twice what it is at present.

Facts of Interest from the General Conference Session

Southern Asia Division:

Pastor R. H. Pierson, former President of the British West Indies Union, was elected President of the Southern Asia Division.

Pastor W. L. Barclay was asked to serve as Home Missionary and Sabbath School Secretary of the Southern Asia Division.

South American Division:

Pastor W. E. Murray, who has served as Secretary of the Inter-American Division, was elected President of the South American Division.

Inter-American Division:

Pastor A. H. Roth, former Educational and Y. P. M. V. Secretary of the Division, was asked to serve as Secretary of the Inter-American Division.

Pastor V. E. Berry of the Central American Union Mission will take Pastor Roth's place as Educational and Y. P. M. V. Secretary of the Division.

Pastor W. A. Wild of the Antillian Union Mission will take Elder Wesley Amundsen's place as Home Missionary, Sabbath School and Temperance Secretary.

Pastor W. Amundsen was chosen as one of the Associate Secretaries of the Home Missionary Department of the General Conference.

Russia:

"In my village at least 75% of the population are Adventists, and in many villages up to 50%. Many are being baptized. They are loosely organized. It is practically impossible to effect any kind of organization."

Rumania:

"The Rumanian church has doubled its membership since the close of the war. This has been possible because our members, though harassed with perplexities, have worked unceasingly to win souls. In recent years 2,378 people were brought to baptism through laymen's efforts. A Rumanian Government official, who recognized the good the Advent Movement is doing in his country, said: 'The achievements of the Seventh-day Adventist Church recall most singularly the sixteenth-century Reformation.'"

Italy:

The Italian churches adopted as their motto, "I Seek My Brethren." "Our Italian believers are seeking their brethren still outside the fold. As a result, the church membership of Italy has trebled in the span of a few short years."

Spain:

"In Spain a young man belonging to the Catholic Action was sent by this organization to observe the youth activities of the Adventists. He sat in on the youth meeting, once, twice, three times. 'I was thrilled,' he told us, 'by the programme of these young people, and after attending the meetings a fourth time I decided to join them. I reported back to the Catholic Action, 'I am joining the Seventh-day Adventists. They have the truth.' Today

this young man is one more Missionary Volunteer, and one of more than five hundred faithful members added to the church in Old Spain since the end of the civil war.'" (Last three quotations from W. R. Beach.)

China:

"Every union and local mission and every institution of which we still have control throughout all China is functioning as before, but entirely under Chinese leadership."—W. H. Branson.

Sabbath Afternoon:

"One of the most thrilling programmes ever presented to a Seventh-day Adventist congregation was conducted Sabbath afternoon in a pageant of missions entitled 'From Every Land.' The great Civic Auditorium was crowded to the doors when the long parade of missionaries and nationals began. At the sound of the trumpet and the organ, in they came, with banners bearing the names of the country each group represented. As they marched up one aisle and down another to the platform, two large spotlights played upon the colourful national costumes which they wore. It was a most inspiring picture of what God had wrought among many kindred, tongues and people in fulfilment of His prophetic Word."—Frederick Lee.

This great march of the "United Nations" was led by Pastor H. S. Walters of the British West Indies. B. W. I. Union must always lead.

Christian Education:

"The elementary schools during the past four years have recorded 7,550 baptisms among their boys and girls. So effectively are spiritual values emphasized on this level that, of the entire number of children between the ages of seven and twentyone from Adventist homes, 75.3 per cent are baptized before reaching academy age. The academies have recorded 1,453 baptisms, thus helping to raise the baptized to 95.5 per cent of the seven to twenty-one age group."

"A survey made in 1949 of the children from Adventist homes shows that in the United States 58.7 per cent of the children attending elementary schools are in church school. The corresponding figure for the secondary level is 61 per cent in the academy; and for the college-age group, ages nineteen to twenty-two, of those attending school, 79 per cent are in our colleges."—E. E. Cossentius.

Membership:

The Seventh-day Adventist membership in 1863 at the time of organization was 3,500. At the end of 1949 our world membership was 716,538. The population then in 1863 was one billion but now it is two and a quarter billion.

Sabbath School:

During the last four years the Sabbath School membership has had a gain of 201,392. A new Sabbath School of 138 members was organized each and every day of the 1,461 days of the quadrennial period.

Home Missionary:

Each week for the past four years the church has distributed a million copies of literature. *A MILLION A WEEK.*

A large number of new faces are seen every Sabbath at the church services.

Brother David McCalla of the Upper St. Andrew District has had unusually fine results from his meetings at Devon Pen. This is a very isolated community between Castleton and Broadgate and Brother McCalla found a number of people awaiting the preaching of the Third Angel's Message. It is very obvious that a new church will have to be organized here this year.

Pastor Walton held an effort in the Clermont church with unusually fine results. Again the members contributed very materially to the success of the meetings by their faithful visiting and diligent efforts to bring visitors to the meetings.

Other efforts have been and are being held around the conference. It is very evident that the third quarter will also have a very fine record of baptisms. Pray for these evangelistic efforts in the East Jamaica Conference.

Tidings from the Battlefield

It was my privilege after careful reconnaissance of the enemy's stronghold to marshal my forces, and in the name of Prince Emmanuel, the Great General, launch an attack against the enemy in that part of the battlefield called Porus. I was able to take the offensive from the very first week, and despite increasing attacks and counter-attacks by the forces of the arch rebel, we were able to maintain the offensive and consolidate our position. As we bombarded the enemy's positions, night after night our camp was filled to the overflowing with interested visitors and those who were leaving the ranks of the enemy. Our camp became too small to accommodate them. The campaign continued for nine weeks. Now at its close we have over thirty new recruits who have fully joined the army of Prince Emmanuel and many others who contemplate doing so. All honour and praise to the Great Captain of our salvation through whom this victory was made possible!

The mopping-up process is still going on and many are leaving the rebel army and coming over on our side. We are also glad to state that some, who years ago deserted the army of Prince Emmanuel, are returning to fight side by side with His soldiers.

This is just a little report in military language of the effort that was held in Porus some weeks ago. For years the work went very slowly there, and there was little or no evidence of growth. The church was reduced to just a few members. Thank God the hard fallow ground is now broken.

Pastor Nation, our President, personally supervised the removal of the little church building from the spot it had occupied for years at one end of the town and brought it closer to the populated area to a spot generously given by Brother Luther Daley. It was enlarged and converted into a small tabernacle so that more people could be accommodated.

The meetings were well attended from the outset and continued unabated until the close of the series. I was not well when I started the meetings but God strengthened me and I was able to continue without missing one single night. In addition to the evangelistic sermons a Bible Class was conducted every night for half an hour from the third week, with an average attendance of over one hundred. We were also able to enroll over sixty in the 20th Century Bible Correspondence School. Over one hundred persons signed the Covenant to keep the Sabbath. There are at present over thirty in the baptismal class and others hope to follow soon.

I desire to express my sincere appreciation for the help given by our Union President who despite his busy programme

found time to speak for us on several occasions; also to Pastor G. A. E. Smith who willingly contributed his quota. I cannot close without mentioning the students of the West Indian Training College who on different occasions contributed items in songs etc. and the members of the ministerial class of the college who particularly during the binding-off stage willingly assisted whenever their busy programme made it possible. Brother Irving Smith has been engaged for the past several weeks in Bible work there and is doing splendidly. Continue to pray for the work in Porus and in the District of Manchester.
