# A Bookman's Gratilude And Retrespect

"PUBLISH glad tidings", so commands the Sacred Page. There is a rejoicing which tingles the blood and flushes the cheeks, when accompanied with blare of trumpets, the booming of cannons, and the diapason of drums. But there is a greater rejoicing when lives are saved for eternity; then, prayer and psalms savoured with the salt of humanity give to the souls of noble men satisfaction with peace-precious resultants of a whiff of the breath of God. The latter is the only true rejoicing. The former, may only be emotion and the disciplined antics practised for form and demanded by custom.

"Let the church roll on", the California Harmon'ans sing. Yes, Saints "publish glad tidings" with the hope that such telling will inspire the Church—especially the youth to attempt the impossible for God.

Who said it couldn't be done? Knaves and dreamers. In 1940, ALL Jamaica sold £4,500. 0. 0 worth of our literature and that WAS a miracle! (Jamaica is only 150 by 48 miles, and at that time, she only boasted an almost entirely rustic population of a million souls!) But year by year her sales have mounted. Glory to God, and honour to one of the finest groups of colporteurs and auxiliaries to be found anywhere in the world. Illiteracy and economic strangulation do not deter them. Most of their prospects were not wage earners. They saved pennies and sh'llings from the few produce of the field, yet they bought books costing as high as £3 each, or in United States currency of those days \$12.00! How did they do it? I don't know but the poor bookman often had to collect as often as twenty times from many of his patrons.

knows it. £4,500 -0 0 in 1940! Lince 1944, ALL Jamaica, has been averaging annual deliveries of £15,000 -0 0! In 1950, her slugging colporteurs sold £18,000 -0 0!

East Jamaica Shines Again in 1951.

East Jamaica has been one of the inspiration-centres of our Advent World, Almost all of her noble warriors are youth. Under the heroic, as well as planned strategies of Field Marshall Elder William Urepides Campbell, a number of spots on the earth have been more thoroughly canvassed than aynwhere else in the world! I refer to the parishes in East Jamaica, and especially to the city of Kingston—our capital and only city. For years, we, older Publishing men, wrote off Kinstston as too difficult a territory. The colporteurs of those days must have read our fears, for few would work there. Among the few who stayed on in Kingston was dear old Sister Florence Rose-God bless the heroine. She is still there like good old Brother Maurer, colporteur of Canada. She always pleaded, "I cannot manage Kingston, send me more colporteurs". Today her dreams are realised. I venture to state that one out of every three books sold in East Jamaica is sold in Kingston and the Corporate area. Rich and poor, high and low are being persuaded to see the canvasser. What story eternity will tell!

East Jamaica has been averaging delivery of £8,000 — 0 — 0 a year sinc1947. For the first sven months of this year, she delivered £7,000 — 0 — 0! She is reaching out toward a ten or twelve thousand pound delivery in 1951. I wonder if even the ravages of the recent hurricane can prevent her? I doubt it. Sail on mighty Conference!

West Jamaica Conference Astounds the Advent World. Two young men as leaders are doing BIG things for God in West Jamaica, I respectfully refer to Generalissimo Herma Sebastian Walters, President of West Jamaica Conference, and to Field Marshall Pastor Balfour Emmanuel Hurst Publishing Department Sedretary. Verdun and Nomandy-not even Hell's gate corner can stop them. Because of their mutual interest in the Feet of the Message, old records have been smashed to smithereens. West Jamaica, without the help of a city in their territory has been averaging £6,000 - 0 - 0 deliveries a year since 1947. Her goal for 1951 is £6,000, by June of this year £6,000 - 0 - 0 was reached and passed! Today she sweeps on with majestic tread, as with bated breath we await the consummation. What will it be by December 1951? I have just read the strategy of President Walters, a few minutes ago, and from what I saw, West Jamaica is out to inspire to larger efforts in 1951, the conferences of Inter-America. To the breech, West Jamaica!

Jamaica's Colporteurs Save Souls. For years our colporteurs continue to grow more efficient in soul winning. One Colporteur Auxiliary sold a number of small books in a home in West Jamaica. today there is another church in St. James. A lady worker stepped into a home in East Jamaica and saved a lady from a suicide's grave. Colporteur Dillon of West Jamaica helped to win some of his twenty colporteurrecruits to the Message, then trained them. Today most of them are doing exploits in East and West Jamaica, and also in the Bahamas. No wonder God blessed veteran Colporteur Dillon with £1,000 - 0 - 0 delivery in seven months of this year-an astounding record both for West Jamaica and for Inter-America. Sister Bogle of East Jamaica has a growing company in Duaney Pen. Student-colporteur George Wilson of Kingsway High School raised up a company in Johnson, St. Thomas, and from that company, two sisters are now colporteurs. Colporteurs Kenneth Destoe and H. Moore of East Jamaica are regular soul winners. Brother Moore has won over forty souls since 1945. Recently, in one day, nearly a thousand souls were baptized in all Jamaica. We wonder how many of them did not 'study some piece of our literature before baptism. Praise Him. eternity will tell!

Bahamas Colporteurs Silence our Fears. Who thought that the Bahamas Mission could sell £3,500 — 0 — 0 of our literature in one year? For the last two or three years, the Bahamas Mission is the first to REACH and to SMASH goals. Over there, the books are doing a mighty work, and a number of fine folk are coming into the Truth. Others even in government circles are giving very serious study to the revelations they are finding

in our Advent literature. Colporteurs J. S. King, C. H. Hepburn, W. G. Adderley and S. Vasciannie, under the paternal leadership of Pastor Owen Jones, ably assisted by the Secretary Treasurer. Mrs. O. P. Jones and the President, Pastor R. E. Gibson are conducting a house-to-house, store-to-store and office-to-office campaign. Many colporteurs would do well to pattern. Recently, in one month, Brethren King and Hepburn took £600 worth of orders in a lumber camp with good deposits. The Lumber Jacks and their bosses come from parts of the Bahamas, the Turks and Caicos Islands, and America. What may the books accomplish in the homes to which they are sent, or will eventually go to? Some of the answers will be cleared up when our noble bookmen lay their prospectuses down and bow to receive the crowns and palms.

No Colporteur, How Sad. There are no colporteurs in British Honduras. Salt Cays, or the Cayman Islands. Our hearts are pained for this. We are glad to report, however that this blet upon the face of our fair Union is soon to be erased "Hasten glad day".

With Our Student Colporteurs. Yesterday I accompanied Publishing Department Secretary, Ivan Benson on a delivery with two of his stalwart youth. Herman Douse and Emmanuel Mitchell. As I observed them, I found myself musing; and this is what I was convinced of: Destroy or close down our colporteur work, and sooner than we think our work will become as poor and as nominal as contemporaneous Christian organizations, but as long as our envisioned youth will accept the higher education given in the colporteur school-"out there" -- the work shall not lack leadership of superior ability and deeper consecration. May God bless and preserve our colporteur-schools the world around.

Since 1947 no less than three hundred students from the West Indian Training College and Kingsway High School have sallied forth. With their alert minds and dauntless courage they have faced giants and pigmies, alike. Hundreds of scholarships have been earned but best of all, hundreds of our precious boys and girls, catching a clearer vision of the needs of dying men have resolved to stay by, and serve where the need is greatest —"Till the day dawn and the shadows flee away."

We thank our Bible and Publishing Houses. Nothing of the above could have been told today, were it not for our Bible Houses and for their personnel. Our Union has been blessed with fine men and women in our Bible Houses. In the New Earth the names of Clyde O. Franz and Arthur Edeburn. Union supervisors, S. Beaumont, Qurtis Parchment, B. R. Hamilton. L. A. Morrison, Ivy Usher, Mrs. O. P. Jones, Mrs. H. D, Colburn. Cassel Cooper, and Zeta Boyd will never be forgotten.

There is power in the printed page, whether it be our truth filled magazines, books, or papers. Someone handed a Signs Of The Times magazine to a young man serving a short sentence in the Nassau Prison, whom we will call Fred. Fred had not been living a Christian life for some time, but the message contained in that paper touched his heart, and in-stilled within him a deep desire to live for Christ. A fellow inmate was enrolled in the Voice of Prophecy Course and when he asked Fred to enroll in this systematic Bible study he gladly accepted. He found the course just the answer to the heartlonging, but the truths revealed were quite new and different from his former beliefs. However, the Word of God was so plain that he could not see how he had never seen its truths before.

After completing his course he enrolled in the 20th Century Course, and by the time he finished this he was asking for baptism as soon as he was released. The Warden spoke to us about Fred. He said he didn't know what kind of lessons we were teaching, but he knew the boys taking these lessons were changed in their ways and Fred was one of the most trust-worthy he had under his care. We continued to study with Fred and about mid year he was released on good behaviour after having served only three quarters of his time.

Fred came into our office with his face beaming and let us know that he wished to get into something where he could give the Message to others. He was told of the Colporteur Work and, because the printed message had been so instrumental in his own conversion, he felt a real burden for the work. After his baptism, he took his prospectus and he is now actively engaged in the circulation of our truth filled books.

He joins the ranks of our veteran workers, Brothers King, Hepburn and Vasciannie, who have done such valiant work here in the Bahamas. We Appreciate the seed sowing of these faithful men that have left their homeland to bring the good news of salvation to many homes in our territory.

Brother Adderley has been our lone Bahamian colporteur and he has truly proven that his own fellows could do exploits for God if they would only join in the literature ministry. We only wish we could recruit more consecrated young men and women also into the phase of our work and now, with Fred, get right out in the firing line beside Comrade Adderley. We look for the Publishing Department to break all records in 1951.

We wish to also pay tribute to the faithful work and inspiring leadership of Pastor O. P. Jones who has just recently left the field for that ever lush and green field, the United States. He has done a grand job with his seasoned workers and I know we shall all miss his leadership. We wish the Joneses every success in their field of endeavour wherever it may be.

May God inspire others to join the ranks now and help finish the great task that lies before us.

As I talked with them I learned they had their problems. "We are having a great deal of difficulty to get books since the devaluation of the pound and the increase in the price of books", they said. "People in Jamaica do not have the earning power and the income to afford expensive books."

In spite of these difficulties every colporteur without exception said they would go back to their territory with renewed determination to do better work than ever before.

I appreciated this fine spirit. The colporteurs of Jamaica have done a marvelous work both in selling books and in saving souls.

Just a few weeks ago I again visited Jamaica. This time the problem was a different one. Brother Parchment told me they had so many books now they didn't have room for them. Many boxes of books were stilf down at the docks because they had no space for them. I am sure this was encouraging news for the colporteurs, to know that the books were at the Book and Bible House waiting to be sold. We have done our best to supply these books to you at a reduced price so that they can be sold at a price near which they were sold before devaluation.

Surely this is the day of opportunity for the Gospel Colporteur. Men's hearts are failing them for fear. Men and women are thinking more seriously than ever before. Recently disaster has struck your Island and to some colporteurs it might seem their work will suffer as a result. This is just another sign of the end and a sign we should get out and work harder than ever.

We do appreciate the fine work that is being done in Jamaica in the literature ministry. As I haw almost 500 souls baptized at Montego Bay a short time ago I wondered just how many of them were the result of a visit some colporteur made to a home and sold a book. We will never know the results of our work on this earth. But we are told the Lord will look after the seed we how and it will some day spring up and bear fruit.

May the Lord richly bless you as you carry on in this most important work for Him.



than compromise by selling themselves and working on the Sabbath.

3. It trains members in the arts of courage and faith in order to meet people and therefore they shine more efficiently in all other lines or departments of missionary endeavour such as Ingathering, Big Week, and the giving of Bible Study.

4. As youth and their parents engage in Brigade work they discover that which they thought they did not have—the talent to persuade MEN to BUY the TRUTH and sell it not. Many in the group soon became full-time colporteurs or youth earning scholarships to our colleges, often assisted by their canvassing parents.

Sister Ferguson of East Jamaica earned scholarships for her son while doing full-time canvassing and saw him pass his Senior Cambridge at Kingsway. Mrs. Douse of West Jamaica, while doing full-time work with her delicate frame, has helped to earn scholarships for her two sons and daughter.

As a direct result of the Colporteur Auxiliary Work in Jamaica, we hardly need to do much recruiting. We have had more applicants for years than we can handle. Many of our most successful young colporteurs today are recruits who graduated from our Auxiliary groups.

Brigade versus recent hurricane. Now is your chance to rebuild or repair your church and school buildings and furnish them. God helps those who help themselves. Buy your books and magazines and mottoes and organize campaigns in every church. Scatter the truth and gather the money; then report to the conference president what you have accomplished and see how quickly God will provide the rest.
