More Than Before In '54

If you were to visit the office of the president of the British West Indies Union, you would notice a motto hanging up over his desk, "MORE THAN BEFORE IN '54." This has been the motto accepted by the British West Indies Union as our goal for 1954. As we have accepted this in the Union office, I would like to appeal to each one of our members to adopt this motto also for the new year.

What does this motto of "MORE THAN BEFORE" mean? To you as individuals it should mean:

MORE LOVE. The Lord Jesus has long been waiting to see His prayer fulfilled, "That they all may be one . . . that the world may believe that Thou hast sent me." The world today is earnestly looking to us for the evidence that God has indeed sent His Son into the world. Shall we not during 1954 do all in our power to come into close union and fellowship with Christ, so that our love for each other will widen and strengthen with exercise?

MORE PRAYER AND STUDY OF GOD'S WORD. As never before I feel sure that each one recognizes that we are living in very serious and important times. We are told in *Great Controversy*, page 593, that "None but those who have fortified their minds with the study of the Bible will stand through the last great conflict." Will you not at the beginning of this year resolve that you will spend more time in your personal devotions in the the study of the Sabbath School lesson and Morning Watch each day?

MORE MISSIONARY WORK IN '54. As we spend more time than before in the study of the Bible and the Spirit of Prophecy, we will be led to recognize that there is a call for every member of the church to do active missionary work for God. If everyone of the more than twenty-thousand Seventh-day Adventists in the British West Indies Union would consecrate himself to God and pledge to spend one hour per week more than before in missionary work, I believe that many

stars would be in our crowns as the result of this extra hour per week of missionary

MORE FAITHFUL ATTENDANCE AT THE SERVICES OF THE CHURCH. "If every member of the church were just like me, what kind of a church would our church be?" Dear fellow-believer, if every member of the church were just like you, would it be a good church? Would there be a good attendance at the prayer meeting week by week? Would the members be present and on time so that the services of the church could always start on time? Not only must we be "not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together . . . as we see the day approaching", but there slould also be a willingness to participate in the various activities of the church as we are requested to.

MORE CARE FOR THE SPIRITUALLY SICK ONES OF THE FLOCK.
From time to time I have called upon individuals who were not attending church and they have stated: "The church is not interested in me. I have not attended services for many months and no officer of the church has ever visited me." May 1954 be a year when "more than before" those who may be seemingly careless and indifferent will be worked for and with by the officers of the church that they may come back into the richer, fuller, deeper experience that they once enjoyed.

Colporteur Institutes in East and West Jamaica

Our colporteur institutes in East and West Jamaica have just come to an end. In these meetings we saw the Mighty hand of God leading in the preparation for the future.

On the morning of December 8, approximately 50 colporteurs assembled in the tabernacle on the grounds of the West Jamaica Conference office, where we spent the day in fasting and prayer. This spirit of devotion was carried througout the entire session which came to its end on the 15th.

Our joy was mixed with sadness when we learned that Brother Sylburn Reid would be leaving the publishing department at the end of 1953. However, we were cheered to know that Brother S. A. Grant, former associate publishing secretary of the Conference, would be in charge of this department, and that Brother R. B. Wallace, a faithful colporteur for twenty years, would be his associate worker. These leaders are in dead earnest to help finish the work by scattering the printed page. We are doing all

we can to make an early start in 1954, and solicit your earnest prayers.

The meetings in the East began in a similar manner on the 15th of December with more than 100 colporteurs present. Glorious indeed was the fellowship as we sang hymns of praise and pleaded with God for victory in our own lives.

As Elder Delafield spoke on the need of the Holy Spirit among us as colporteurs, nearly every one wept while we prayed for the presence of God to lead out in the

work during 1954.

Present at both of these institutes were our loyal Elder Culpepper, the Inter-American Division Publishing Department Secretary, and Elder C. L. Paddock, Sr., Manager of the Book Department of the Pacific Press Publishing Association. Their years of hard work and experience made their services extremely valuable to the colporteurs here in Jamaica. It was felt by all that the Holy Spirit of God was using these men in a definite way. We could hear expressions on every side,—"This is the best institute I have ever attended."

The last meeting of the institute was the meeting together for the "breaking of bread." Our sincere wish is that this spirit of fellowship and communion will be carried into every act of the colporteurs in the entire Union during 1954, while we endeavour to make this our banner year.

Items of Interest from Year-End Reports

Bahamas

For the first ten months of 1953 sixty souls were baptized, bringing the total up to 306 added to the remnant church for the past five years.

Over 16,000 garments distributed to the needy during 1953.

£4,410. 9. 0 worth of books sold in ten months of 1953 by colporteurs, as compared with £1,632. 8. 0 in the year 1949.

East Jamaica

Number of Sabbath schools increased from 96 in 1948 to 114 in September, 1953, while its membership grew from 7,128 to 10,573 during the same period.

Whereas church membership has increased about 34% during the past five years, the tithes have been increased by 59% and Ingathering by 79%.

Colporteurs have delivered £10,064 worth of books up to September of 1953, as compared with £9,772 for the year 1949.

West Jamaica

Up to the middle of November, 1953, 1,120 souls were baptized, while there were 831 for the year 1950.

Church membership has been increased from 7,051 at the end of 1950 to 10,018 at the close of the third quarter of 1953. At the same time Sabbath school membership has moved up from 8,550 to 10,680. Ingathering has shown an increase of 74% since 1950, and colporteur deliveries have climbed from £6,642. 4. 11 during that year to £7,292. 5. 7 up to September 1953.

Home Visitation days were soul-thrilling and soul-stirring days as the membership of the East Jamaica Conference visited the homes of neighbours and friends November 7 and 8, speaking to them of the soon coming of Jesus, praying and singing for them and leaving in each home a piece of literature. The following are two of the many reports that have come in to us:

"Our church was organized into three different bands in preparation for the 7th and 8th visiting days. We then moved out in the power of the Almighty. Doors were thrown open as we entered homes. Prayers were made for the sick and Bible studies were given and tracts distributed. Many requested us to return. We can hardly comprehend the way in which God is improving our church. Almost every week we have new visitors among us who have made up their minds to follow Jesus. At present we have 15 in the baptismal class. . . We can see many who are very interested and have requested prayers." —Orange Field Company.

"The young people of the Ewarton church went on a Home Visitation campaign in the Ivy district nearby. We visited many homes and after song and prayer left 150 pieces of literature. We held an open air meeting at the public square at Mt. Rosser, and it was attended by over 100 persons. A follow-up was made in the work and open air meetings began weekly. Since then a branch Sabbath school is being held in the home of one of the most respectable families in the district. Let us pray that God will richly bless the work here in this part of the vineyard."
