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

"How can there be peace," Jehu replied, "as long as the harlotries of Jezebel, your mother, and her witchcrafts are so many?" 2 Kings 9:22, Smith. NE SUMMER when Karen was two and a half years old, a big, black, rather unkempt dog used to come to visit us. His master lived only

a few houses away, but it seemed that "Boots," as the dog was called, preferred to come and sleep away his afternoons in our back yard.

Little Karen soon learned that Boots was just a perfect playmate. The dog apparently understood that the occasional, rather rough treatment she gave him was not intentionally cruel. Even though

she would pull his tail and fur, Boots still was very kind to her and never once tried to bite or hurt her. Because of Boot's apparent under-

standing, Karen loved him. Often I would see her chubby little arms around his neck in a tender embrace while she pressed her face against his not-too-clean face and fur.

Karen's mother, too, noticed the affectionate treatment Karen lavished on Boots. She did not think that the unhygienic Boots should be handled in this loving manner. More than once I heard her tell Karen not to embrace Boots any more, inasmuch as he was too filthy and dirty. Karen would dutifully listen to her mother's admonition, and then she would happily run out into the back yard and play again. But all her mother's exhortations were quickly forgotten by the child when Boots would suddenly reappear in the back yard; Karen would gleefully welcome him with a big, hearty embrace. Love for her pal Boots made her unmindful of his filthy and unworthy condition; she simply loved him in spite of his unclean state.

This is love's way. Love does not calculatingly stoop to ask if the object of its affections is worthy or not. Love just wells out from within irrespective of the recipient's worthiness. God said that because He loved Zion, she was honorable. (Isaiah 43:4.) Love

knows no questionings, no demandings; it only gives, joyously and spontaneously.

I am happy this is the nature of love. If this were not love's way, God, who is the essence and primeval source of love, would never

Grace or Disgrace?

Exposing One of the Devil's Greatest Deceptions That Will Send Millions to Hell

HE GREATEST exponent of righteousness and truth is the Lord Jesus Christ. Everything He did when on earth was in perfect harmony with the eternal plan of God. While here among men, He declared: "Think not that I am come to destroy the law, or the prophets: I am not come to destroy, but to fulfill." Matthew 5:17.

Some of the strongest opponents of Bible truth brazenly declare that Christians today are under no scriptural obligation to keep the law of Ten Commandments. This pre-cross obligation was forever banished, they say, after Christ's substitutionary death

on Calvary.

Now we believe in Jesus and all His teachings of truth. Let us see what He, the most reliable authority on truth in the world, says in His Book: "For verily I say unto you, Till heaven and earth pass, one jot or one tittle shall in no wise pass from the law, till all be fulfilled." Matthew 5:18. In another place Jesus said, "I have kept My Father's commandments." John 15: 10. And in John 14:14 we read: "If ye love Me, keep My commandments."

We note another stirring verse of the outstanding Sermon on the Mount: "Whosoever therefore shall break one of these least commandments, and shall teach men so, he shall be called the least in the kingdom of heaven: but whosoever shall do and teach them, the same shall be called great in the kingdom

of heaven." Matthew 5:19.

Law is eternal. Long before the advent of our earth, which was made in the beginning, God the Father, Jesus Christ, the Holy Spirit, and the angels were in heaven. It was there that Lucifer made his bid for supremacy. He, the leader of the heavenly choir, coveted the position of Christ and of God. These words are recorded concerning Lucifer: "Thou wast perfect in thy ways from the day that thou wast created, till iniquity was found in thee." Ezekiel 28:15.

Iniquity or sin originated with Lucifer in heaven. This rebellion precipitated "war in heaven" and resulted in Lucifer's banishment with one third of the heavenly angels. And from that day to this Satan has carried on his nefarious program of subtle conniving and scheming to destroy the souls of men. He has deceived men and constantly tempted them to sin. He is the instigator of the scheme to ban the law, and he tries to conceal its necessity in all physical and spiritual plans.

Many uninformed, sincere folk are forwarding the plans of the evil one by promoting his doctrine of "no law." If law were stricken from the universe, the heavenly bodies would soon leave their courses; and the result would be the destruction of our earth as well

as the planets.

Take away law from the realm of physical existence, and we would experience calamity immediately. Do away with law in our country, county, or community and watch the awful results of lawlessness. Occasionally we observe the tragedy of mob violence that defies law.

Now consider the definite necessity of law in the spiritual realm. Then seek to answer the question why intelligent Christians who read the Bible and study its doctrines should desire to destroy God's law in spiritual living. Too often we are told that we are living "under grace and not under the law." Such statements in this enlightened age sound rather strange when men should be fully informed on the clear, simple truths of Scripture.

We have already noticed how Christ the greatest Teacher taught the full and complete binding moral obligations of the law. Turning to the word of the wise man, we read: "Let us hear the conclusion of the whole matter: Fear God, and keep His commandments: for this is the whole duty of man." Ecclesiastes

12.13

Looking at the eminent testimony of David, we observe that two of his choice verses state: "All His commandments are sure. They stand fast forever and ever, and are done in truth and uprightness." Psalm 111:7, 8.

It has been suggested that only folk of certain dispensations were under the binding claims of the law, and that in other eras Christians are not under law but under grace. However grace and law go hand in hand. Paul, the New Testament theologian, forever dispelled the sham of such deceptive teaching. He boldly proclaimed: "The grace of God that bringeth salvation hath appeared to all men." Titus 2:11. Every child of God since the time of Adam has been a recipient of His free grace so generously proffered to all. John recorded the Master's words: "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life." John 3:16.

Are you willing to accept this gift, His life, for you? His love is mighty; it is vast, deeper than the ocean and higher than the towering mountain peak. And His unchanging law and free grace are based upon His love. They are tied together like the fingers of a

man's hand. They are inseparable!

Does not your heart cry out in responsive joy for His unfailing goodness to poor, lost mortals? There is nothing good about us, but His grace covers all. He glass: for he beholdeth himself, and goeth his way, and straightway forgetteth what manner of man he was. But whoso looketh into the perfect law of liberty, and continueth therein, he being not a forgetful hearer, but a doer of the work, this man shall be blessed in his deed." James 1:23-25.

As man sees his horrible sin through the "perfect law of liberty," he recognizes his failure, and futility of existence. But as He turns and looks into the lovely face of Jesus, he accepts anew His redeeming grace; and through Christ's covering of grace he is bathed in the sunshine of God's love and walks forward in faith.

This "law of liberty" the apostle refers to will be the standard which God will use to judge all peoples of all ages. It is most important that you and I thoroughly know and understand God's great program of salvation.

It will be a holy law that we shall be judged by. Wrote Paul, "The law is holy, and the commandment holy, and just, and good." Romans 7:12. Can we believe that this holy "commandment" which God gave

audibly, which He spoke to our first parents, and also wrote upon two tables of stone with His finger, is out of date and has no place today in the Christian economy?


Paul's answer will fully satisfy our heart's question: "Do we then make void the law through faith? God forbid: yea, we establish the law." Romans 3:31.

The acceptance of grace is based upon our willingness by Christ's help to keep His commandments. Grace is free; it is given as a reward. And why is the reward given? Because we have in simple faith told our Saviour that by heavenly power we desire, yea, we determine, to keep His commandments.

There is not one of us who can keep His commandments in our own strength. But if we are willing to try by His help to keep His law, legions of angels will be sent if necessary to stand by our

sides and sustain us in hours of great need and trial.

Will you accept His free grace? Are you willing to keep His commandments in His strength? The way may be long, weary, rough, and treacherous; but through His never-ending grace we have the assurance that we can keep His commandments and be faithful to the end. The reward will be a crown of life placed upon our heads by the lovely hands of Jesus Himself. Is it not worth the struggle? Will you surrender yourself fully to His care and keeping?

How May We Find the True Church Among So Many Conflicting Creeds?

T IS A GOOD thing to belong to a church. But when a person looks for one to join, he finds there are many denominations. And they all claim to be God's true church. Yet they have many different beliefs.


One says just have faith, just believe; that is all that is necessary. Another says you must do certain works; that is how to gain heaven. One says obey His law. Another says you do not need to be concerned about the law; we're saved by grace. One predicts a millennium of peace just ahead in which everybody will have a second chance to get right with God; another prophesies the end of the world and the judgment. The beliefs that are diametrically opposed to one another are many, Yet each church "backs" its doctrines, whatever they may be, with Scripture.

One finds many denominations today. All claim to be God's true church. The problem is to find the one that has "the faith of Jesus."

How then is a person to know which is the right one to join? We ask which is the right one, because, according to "the word of faith" (Romans 10:8), there is but "one faith" (Ephesians 4:5). So the problem is how to find a church that has "the faith of Jesus," the faith of which He is the Author and Finisher.

One cannot depend on sincerity, zeal, and high motives alone as indicating God's church. Paul mani fested all those qualities in his persecution of the Christians, yet he was doing so in direct opposition to Christ. (Acts 22; 26.)

One should not take miracle working alone as indicating God's church, for deceivers will be able to show great signs and power and lying wonders so much so that if it were possible they would deceive even the elect. (Matthew 24:24; 2 Thessalonians 2:9, 10.)



Even what you hear in the pulpit and read in religious publications as being the Gospel truth must not be taken for granted. Yes, men may, like Satan, quote Scripture and still not teach God's will. (Matthew 4:1-10.) They, not wanting to obey Him, corrupt, resist, and wrest His Word, making it a snare and a stumbling block to themselves and those that would follow them, (2 Corinthians 2:17; 2 Peter 3:16; 1 Peter 2:8; (Continued on page 17)

BOMBERS CANCELLED OUT.—British strategists, up against the gun in Europe, are convinced that the big bomber no longer is the key weapon in any future war. Their view is that, when Russia has the bomb, plus rocket bases in Europe, all of the pressure of European nations will be against action by U.S. that would give Russia the signal for destroying European cities. Idea is that bombers will cancel out and armies come back into their own, as they always have.—U.S. News & World Report, Oct. 14, 1949.

THE BEWILDERED MAYOR.—The Prairie Overcomer reports, "Casting off all restraint in reckless abandon, nearly 1,000 teen-agers, members of sorority and fraternity groups, descended during the summer months upon the New Jersey ocean resort community of Lavalette (normal population, 700) to drink deep the draught of debauchery. Renting cottages, they carried on their wickedness and immoralities unrestrained and unconcealed. In trying to cope with the situation, William Chandler, the bewildered mayor, ordered more than seventy of the boys and girls out of town because his police officers had 'caught them in flagrantly compromising situations.' Said one authority, 'Little Lavalette has just caught the backwash of a thousand indulgent homes." - Christian Victory, Nov., 1949.

MISCALCULATIONS.—U.S. military planners are taking a fresh look at Soviet industrial capacity. Having miscalculated on Russia's ability to make the atom bomb, they are wondering if they haven't made other miscalculations, too.—U.S. News & World Report, Nov. 4, 1949.

MORAL LAXITY IN GREAT BRITAIN.—"Premarital and extra-marital sex adventures are so prevalent in Britain that among women under 20, at least 64 per cent of children are conceived out of wedlock." Reported by the London office of the United Press; based on interviews with 2,051 persons of all economic and social classes.—Christian Victory, Nov., 1949.

"MEN'S HEARTS FAILING THEM FOR FEAR." (Luke 21:26.)—"The dominant emotion everywhere in the world is *fear*. This applies to every part of hu-

man activities—finance, industry, farmers, workers, thinkers, and government officials."—Former President Herbert Hoover.—Christian Victory, Nov., 1949.

NEW JERSEY CATHOLICS WANT LEGAL-IZED GAMBLING.-A straight issue of public morality confronts the voters in the New Jersey gubernatorial election. The Newark Roman Catholic archdiocese wants bingo legalized so that revenues from this form of gambling may swell the revenues of Catholic schools. Auxiliary Bishop James A. McNulty and other Catholic officials stated the case bluntly to 400 nuns and priests meeting in the hall of St. Patrick's Cathedral, Newark. The bishop said that parochial schools need money, that it can be got from the legalization of bingo, and that Elmer H. Wene, the candidate for governor of the discredited Hague machine, favors a legalizing plebiscite. In putting the entire apparatus of Catholic schools and organization to work to elect the gambling ticket, the bishop said: "The interests of the church would be better served by Wene and other Democratic candidates." Republican Governor Alfred E. Driscoll opposes either legalization or a plebiscite, declaring: "As to bingo . . . I say it is gambling!"-The Christian Century, Nov. 2, 1949. N THE FIRST epistle of Peter, the second chapter and the twenty-first verse, Inspiration reminds us that Christ has left us an example that we should "follow His steps." We shall never be wrong if, with His help, we follow in His steps. In fact the Saviour Himself reminds us that there is no other pathway into the kingdom.

Many religious leaders today promote a philosophy teaching that there are many ways into the kingdom. That it was Jesus Christ who instituted the seventh-day Sabbath on the last day of creation week has already been made clear in a previous article. "By Him were all things created . . . visible and invisible, . . . all things were created by Him and for Him." Colossians 1:16. It was Christ, God's Son, who created this world of ours and all that it contains, everything visible and invisible. The seventh-day Sabbath of the fourth commandment was one of the things Christ made during creation week. He blessed it. He sanctified it. He rested. (Genesis 2:1-3.) It then became the Christian Sabbath. From the very beginning Christ set subsequent generations an example in Sabbath-keeping.

The Saviour's attitude during His earthly ministry toward the Sabbath of creation is foretold by the prophet Isaiah: "The Lord is well pleased for His righteousness' sake; He will magnify the law, and

\HE FIFTH of the seven epistles of Christ to the churches of Asia was sent to Sardis, and is found in Revelation 3:1-6: "And unto the angel of the church in Sardis write; These things saith He that hath the seven Spirits of God, and the seven stars: I know thy works, that thou hast a name that thou livest, and art dead. Be watchful, and strengthen the things that remain, that are ready to die: for I have not found thy works perfect before God. Remember therefore how thou hast received and heard, and hold fast, and repent. If therefore thou shalt not watch, I will come on thee as a thief, and thou shalt not know what hour I will come upon thee.

"Thou hast a few names even in Sardis which have not defiled their garments; and they shall walk with Me in white: for they are worthy. He that overcometh, the same shall be clothed in white raiment; and I will not blot out his name out of the book of life, but I will confess his name before My Father, and before His angels. He that hath an ear, let him hear what the

Spirit saith unto the churches."

Sardis was founded in the twelfth century B.C. and was located about thirty-five miles southeast of Thyatira. It was long the capital of the kingdom of Lydia,

which was one of the richest kingdoms of the ancient world. The Lydians were the inventors of coined money. King Croesus was famed for his wealth. Solon, one of the seven wise men of Greece, spent some years in Sardis during the reign of Croesus. The city was built on a plateau rising fifteen hundred feet above the plain, and its perpendicular walls made it an impregnable fortress. The one means of reaching the city was steep and narrow and easily guarded. From Sardis Cyrus marched against Artaxerxes, and at Sardis Xerxes gathered his mighty army in preparation for his ill-fated expedition against Greece. A near-by village still goes by the name of Sart.

The natural defenses of

Sardis made the citizens overconfident. The guards grew reckless-with fatal results. Because of their failure to watch, Cyrus captured the city by stratagem in 549 B.C., and 330 years later it was again taken by the same means by Antiochus the Great. Solon warned the overconfident Croesus that his feelings of safety and self-sufficiency would eventually lead to ruin. This happened one dark night when a Persian soldier scaled the precipice where no guards were stationed, and by means of rope ladders a large number reached the top before they were discovered-too late to save the city.

The historic background gives great force to the language of Christ in His message to Sardis. He warned the church that failure to watch because of overconfidence would end in tragedy. He would come to them in judgment "as a thief" at the most un-

expected moment. Sardis means "those escaping," or "that which remains." The name, the message, and the subsequent history of the city and church indicate a good start but a bad finish, a change for the worse

as in the Ephesian period. Sardis has been called "the city of death," and its history is just the opposite of that of Smyrna, the "city of life," which "was dead and is alive." At the time of the writing of this epistle the city and local church had "a name that thou livest, and art dead." They were living chiefly on past glory and reputation.

The city of Sardis has long been a heap of ruins with no sign of life; and, of course, the local church disappeared with the city. It was once a flourishing church in a large Christian community. The evidences of death were present when the epistle was written, and soon after there was nothing left except the

memory of a glorious past. The city never fully recovered from the earthquake of A.D. 17, and was only partially rebuilt. But its citizens were still boastful of the history and reputation of the past. The name remained, but in reality the city was dead or dying. There is nothing more pathetic and desolate than a dead or dying city, the few remaining citizens of which boast of its past glory and vainly hope for a restoration of that which has departed forever.

The Sardian period of the church universal covers the rise and decline of the Reformation during the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries. In a sense it embraces the entire history of Protestantism. "Then came the Sardian period-the age of separation and return to the rule of Christ; the age of comparative freedom from Balaam and his doctrines, from the Nicolaitans and their tenets, from Jezebel and her fornications; an age of many worthy names, but marked with deadness withal, and having much of which to repent; an age covering the spiritual lethargy of the Protestant centuries before the great evangelical movements of the last hundred years, which brought us to the Philadelphian era."-Joseph A. Seiss, The Apocalypse, Vol. 1, p. 143. Another writer declares that the Sardis message pictures "the inauguration, development, corruption, and judgment of Protestantism."-McCarrell.

The One in possession of "the seven Spirits of God, and the seven stars," who is the Author of life and the strength of His ministers, rebukes the church of Sardis for being Christians in name only. "Men say you are living, though you are dead," and "you are supposed to be alive, but in reality you are dead," are other translations. The very profession of Christianity is a profession of life. A Christian claims to live in the name of Christ; and if he is dead spiritually, his profession is vain and false. It is akin to a corpse making a pretense of life. A church may have the most modern ecclesiastical machinery that vibrates with activity, and at the same time be dead spiritually.

There is nothing wrong with church form and organization, providing it is vitalized by the presence and power of Christ. In fact the machinery is necessary for effective service. But to God life is more important than all else combined. The Reformers began well, but their work was never brought to a successful conclusion. The Reformation is still incomplete, because it was brought to a standstill by apostasy and spiritual deadness within itself. Matthew Arnold appropriately describes this sorrowful period of lifeless formalism:

SAVING OUR CHILDREN

EFORE settling down, some of the boys and girls of past generations climbed fool's hill, sowed wild oats, and had their fling; but it is too late now in our old world's history for juniors to follow in the pathway of their older brothers and sisters. They do not have time to taste the world's pleasures and excesses. If they are ever going to be saved, they will have to be saved as children.

A world that has forgotten God, has also forgotten its children. Children have been abused, abandoned, and deserted. So many children are unwanted, unkempt, and unloved. They are outcasts-just wretched, forlorn little outcasts—human derelicts, coming up but not being brought up. Luther Burbank once said, "If we paid no more attention to our plants than we

have to our children, we would now be living in a jungle of weeds." And another has remarked, "In many respects, your cattle have received better treatment than vour children."-Mrs. E. G. White, Testimonies for the Church, Vol. 2, p. 94.

Without tender feelings of sympathy for the home, without any true loyalties to society, without any endearing attachment to the church, these little outcasts will soon rise up to punish, and to punish terribly, the generation which has denied them the privileges of normal home life. Community cen-

ters, good as far as they go, are poor substitutes for true home life. The social gospel that lacks moral betterment is a mirage. The world is willing to spend hundreds of thousands of dollars for the child's physical and social well-being and then pinches and

skimps and saves when it comes to providing him the inner values of life. Our children are paupers spiritually. They do not have the basic incentives to live as good moral citizens.

Says Hosea 4:6: "My people are destroyed for lack of knowledge: because thou hast rejected knowledge, I will also reject thee, . . . seeing thou hast forgotten the law of thy God, I will also forget thy children."

Parents who have ignored the Ten Commandments, who have acted in complete disregard of God's moral law, will live to rue the day. Lawlessness begets lawlessness. A part of the second commandment reads: "For I the Lord thy God am a jealous God, visiting the iniquity of the fathers upon the children unto the third and fourth generation of them that hate

Me." Exodus 20:5.

There is a reason for the present low state of morality. Says Proverbs 26:2: "The curse causeless shall not come." In all generations there has been a revolt on the part of youngsters against the oldsters, but the present low level of ethics is more than a revolt. It is a moral collapse. Civilization itself is cracking up. Disintegration and decay have set in. The guilt of parents and children is immeasurably great.

The violence of Noah's day sickened the senses of the Almighty and provoked the Flood. The evils

of Noah's day have been multiplied a thousand times. Parenthood today stands indicted. The atrocities they have committed against their children will not be expiated in a thousand years. It all adds up to one

thing: Jesus is coming again. He is coming soon!



wanting." Daniel 5:26, 27.

Babylon the Great, thanks to the skill and foresight of the mighty Nebuchadnezzar, was an impregnable city. Her walls were too lofty to be scaled, too strong to be breached by any weapons known to the ancient world. However there was one fatal defect in the plans of Nebuchadnezzar. He might have built for his degenerate descendants walls that would have pierced the clouds, and the results would have been the same; for what defenses could have saved a people so besotted with wine that they left open the gates of the city? Of the powerful Assyrian nation, the Lord said:

"O Assyria, rod of My anger,
And staff of My fury!
Against a godless nation I send him,
And against the people of My wrath I charge him,
To despoil them, and to prey on them,
And to trample them down like mire of the streets.
But not so does he think,
And not so does he plan;
For destruction is in his mind,
And to cut off nations not a few."

Isaiah 10:5-7, Smith.

God calls Assyria "rod of My anger"—an instrument in His hands to destroy a nation utterly corrupt and a menace to surrounding nations. But the instrument got out of hand. "Shall the axe boast itself against Him that heweth therewith?" Verse 15. The war-mad nation, filled with blood-lust, thrust out in every direction and destroyed the innocent as well as the guilty. Yes, Assyria attacked decadent nations and reduced them to the scrap heap only to go on the scrap heap herself. "He that killeth with the sword must be killed with the sword." Revelation 13:10.

"Woe to the bloody city," cries the prophet Nahum, speaking of Nineveh, the capital. "It is all full of lies and robbery." Nahum 3:1. In conclusion the prophet justifies the fate of the city and nation thus: "There is no healing of thy bruise; . . . for upon whom hath not thy wickedness passed continually?" Verse 19. The city was not only corrupt, but corrupting.

God does not break the bruised reed nor quench the smoking flax. He instructed Abraham that his descendants were to go up and conquer and possess the land of Canaan; but He was careful to say not till the fourth generation (from their entrance into Egypt); "for the iniquity of the Amorites is not yet full." Genesis 15:16. But moral conditions became such that the Lord declared: "The land is defiled: therefore I do visit the iniquity thereof upon it, and the land itself vomiteth out her inhabitants." Leviticus 18:25. The utter depravity of the people coincided with the coming of the conquering invader.

Military might is powerless when a nation is bankrupt morally. Listen to the words of the prophet Obadiah: "Thus saith the Lord God concerning Edom, . . . Though thou exalt thyself as the eagle, and though thou set thy nest among the stars, thence will I bring thee down, saith the Lord." Obadiah 1, 4. But there is a security exceeding that afforded by military might. Of Jehoshaphat, one of the best of Judah's monarchs, we read: "And the Lord was with Jehoshaphat because . . . he sought to the Lord God of his father, . . . therefore the Lord established the kingdom in his hand." 2 Chronicles 17:3-5. "And the fear of the Lord fell upon all the kingdoms of the lands that were round about Judah, so that they made no war against Jehoshaphat. Also some of the Philistines brought Jehoshaphat presents, and tribute silver; and the Arabians brought him flocks." Verses 10, 11.

The seventeenth chapter of Second Chronicles contains the much-coveted recipe for maintaining peace. But what are the prospects for peace in this modern war-weary world? The prophet Jeremiah has light for us on this point. He says: "For thus saith the Lord God of Israel unto me: Take the wine cup of this fury at My hand, and cause all the nations, to whom I send thee, to drink it." Jeremiah 25:15. The cup that the prophet was to pass to all the nations was a symbol. But what did it symbolize? "And they shall drink, and be moved, and be mad, because of the sword that I will send among them." Verse 16. The wine symbolized the sword, or war. The nations were to be drunken with militarism.

The cup that Jeremiah said was to be passed to all the nations was to be accompanied with the words: "Drink ye, and be drunken, and spue, and fall, and rise no more, because of the sword which I will send among you." Jeremiah 25:27. Not a nation was to be spared; all must drink. "And it shall be, if they refuse to take the cup at thine hand to drink, then shalt thou say unto them, Thus saith the Lord of hosts, Ye shall certainly drink." Verse 28.

True, not all were eager to drink the war-exciting potion. There were some—we would call them pacifists today-who hesitated. But they were swept along by the rising flood of militarism. Is this all the recital of an incident that ended in the dim centuries of the past? No, it belongs to the age that has witnessed World War I, World War II, and is storing weapons for a more terrible World War III. Now let us read of the aftermath of the symbolic wine drinking as Jeremiah relates it in verses 31-33: "A noise shall come even to the ends of the earth; for the Lord hath a controversy with the nations, He will plead with all flesh; He will give them that are wicked to the sword, saith the Lord. Thus saith the Lord of hosts, Behold, evil shall go forth from nation to nation, and a great whirlwind shall be raised up from the coasts of the earth. And the slain of the Lord shall be at that day from

one end of the earth even unto the other end of the earth: they shall not be lamented, neither gathered, nor buried; they shall be dung upon the ground."

Not lamented? Nobody to lament. Not gathered? Nobody to gather them. Not buried? Nobody left to bury the dead. Surely this is the end. A dreadful picture but not a hopeless one; for Jesus, the Prince of Peace, will return to take away His people and to destroy the remnant of those who are destroying the earth. (See Revelation 11:18; 19:15, 16.) His coming is the only cure for the militarism that is to grow more and more destructive. Of Him it is written: "He maketh wars to cease unto the ends of the earth." Yes, He finds at His coming the angry nations still fighting.

But His promise to a distressed world is: "Behold, I create new heavens and a new earth." Isaiah 65:17. There even the beasts shall be at peace, and the lion and the lamb shall lie down together.

Isaiah 28:13.) They add to His Word and take from it and favor certain texts to the exclusion of others. This is how "wind of doctrine" is "supported" by Scripture; this is how contradictions or opposing doctrines are "founded" on the Scriptures.

Nor is it well to take for granted what one hears or reads "against" a church. The condemnation may be sound, or it may be an intended distortion of the teachings of that church. The only way to know is to check the sources from which the opposing writers have quoted and see for oneself. In some instances one is amazed to find how sentences and paragraphs (apparently quoted without consideration as to context) are "explained" so as to make the quoted material purport teachings that are even opposite to those intended by the original sources.

Tradition, too, may be a treacherous leader. It certainly is if the tradition you follow is the tradition of men and not that given by the apostles. (2 Thessalonians 2:13-15; 3:6.) For by men's commandments and traditions God is worshiped in vain, and by them His Word is made of none effect. Not a few reject the commandments of God that they may keep their own tradition. (Mark 7:7, 9, 13.) One thereby heeds false philosophies and reverences symbols, and worship days, and practices that are of pagan rather than Christian origin. "That ye be not partakers of her plagues," do not drink of the "wine of Babylon." (Revelation 18.)

Christ and His disciples time and time again spoke of the coming of religionists that appear as ministers of light but who craftily speak commandments, traditions, doctrines of men, feigned words, fair speeches, lies in hypocrisy, fables, and perverse things. Christ and His disciples repeatedly warned us against the "many deceivers"—false apostles, deceitful workers,

false brethren, false Christs, false prophets, ungodly men, grievous wolves, antichrists, and liars. None of these bring salvation; but, instead, their end is "swift destruction" and "the blackness of darkness forever." (2 Peter 2:1, 17; Jude 13.)

Summing up the conditions that would exist in "the last days," Paul says, "From such turn away." (2 Timothy 3:1-5.) In 1 Timothy 6:3, 5, which depicts those who "consent not to . . . the words of our Lord Jesus Christ, and to the doctrine which is according to godliness," he says, "From such withdraw thyself." Christ Himself says, "Go ye not therefore after them." Luke 21:8.

And it is not God's plan that you should take things for granted, and chance being deceived. Nor is it His intention that you should seek Him blindly, and chance losing the Way. The price Jesus paid that we might be redeemed is too great. So He has given us the Scriptures, and He commands us to search them. (John 5:39; 2 Timothy 3:16.) Indeed the Bereans are called "more noble," because, although "they received the word with all readiness of mind," they searched the Scriptures daily to find out whether the things even Paul said were so. (Acts 17:11.)

The best thing to do then is to prove by the Scripture any organization that beckons or appeals to you. The Word reveals whether those whom you would follow have in them His light, His law, and His testimony. (Isaiah 8:20.)

There have always been some who contended earnestly for the original, the unadulterated faith that was once delivered unto the saints. We therefore can expect to find such a "remnant" in existence today. (Jude 3; Romans 11:4, 5; Revelation 12:13-17.)

According to Scripture, precept, and example the remnant will have ministers like David: preachers who do not conceal His truth from "the great congregation." (Psalm 40:10.) It will have evangelists like Paul: evangelists who do not shun "to declare unto you all the counsel of God." (Acts 20:27.) It will have lay members like Aquila and Priscilla: helpers who can expound to sincere persons "the way of God more perfectly." (Acts 18:26.) Its publications will show that its "hands wash in innocency" that they may publish with the voice of thanksgiving and tell of His wondrous works. (Psalm 26.) Its beliefs will be founded on all the Scriptures-not merely a favored few (2 Timothy 3:16, 17; Matthew 4:4); and it will be unafraid to have its hearers search them whether its teachings are so.

It will not say works only, or *only* believe, or grace alone, or law alone; but it will uphold *all* these as necessary components of Christian living. As in the Scripture-recorded lives of Christ and His early followers, there will be in it both grace and the keeping of the whole law, both faith and works, both hearing and doing the Word.



* Criminal Cheating in the U. S.

THE RECENT exposure of criminal cheating by people on relief rolls and those receiving unemployment insurance has led us to wonder what has happened to the American spirit of independence and integrity that characterized so many of the early

pioneers of this great nation.

In our study of history we find that our forefathers came to this new land seeking opportunity and independence. They wanted to live in a country where they would not be oppressed by tyrannical rulers and where the natural rights of man could be fully realized, among which are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. Many of them were willing to brave the hardships and deprivations of frontier life. They cut their way through the woods and back into the interior, facing the terror of the stealthy attacks of the redskins. All of this was done that they might carve for themselves a life of independence. They were not afraid to work for what they wanted.

But it seems today that the picture has changed. We ought to hang our heads in shame after reading the shocking revelations in the December, 1949, Reader's Digest, under the title "Chiselers Endanger Our Unemployment Insurance Program." Of similar nature is the article in The Saturday Evening Post of December 10, 1949, under the title "Detroit Cracks Down on Relief Chiselers." We have learned from these exposures that there are literally thousands of people receiving unemployment insurance who could have jobs if they wanted them; that there are many who deliberately do everything that they can to keep out of work. They simply prefer to loaf and be supported by the state.

Then there are thousands of others who have jobs but who collect unemployment insurance while they are actually working regularly. A committee of the California legislature reported that fully thirty million dollars' worth of benefits in California last year were paid to fraudulent recipients. California is not the only state where this condition exists. Other states give

similar reports.

We are led to believe that dishonesty is being encouraged. An official from Washington told Herschel Atkinson, former administrator for Ohio: "This money is for velocity spending. We want to get spending power into the hands of the people. If a man walks in and signs a slip, pay him. What do you care? We will never audit you. Get the money out."

It is a deplorable thing that dishonesty is encouraged for reasons of so-called security.

A Massachusetts fraud-investigating committee became suspicious when many workers periodically stood in line to collect insurance checks a few minutes after the end of the first shift at a near-by textile mill. They checked the cards of 150 beneficiaries against the mill's payrolls, and more than a third of them were found to be currently employed; yet they were receiving unemployment insurance. Of 5,208 beneficiaries subsequently interviewed 4,249 had obtained insurance fraudulently. The booty: \$88,476.

To show how the encouragement by officialdom of such dishonesty causes a travesty of justice, we cite the following: "One day the Detroit Free Press carried two significant items on the same page. One told of a man being sentenced to jail for ninety days for stealing forty cents from a newsstand; the other told of four

* "The Earth Was Filled With Violence"

THE SHOCKING upsurge of sex crimes in recent months has brought an outcry of public indignation demanding measures to combat this menace. It is believed that many of these crimes can be prevented by giving proper treatment to those apprehended by the law that show signs of moral perversion.

We seriously question that such preventative measures are enough to solve the problem. Undoubtedly it will help the situation, but it is not going far enough. If we were to institute a program of clinical aid for these perverts and entirely disregard some of the underlying causes of their condition, we would be making a grave error.

We are inclined to believe that there are some very powerful influences that are being countenanced by the American public at large that have much to do with the condition that prevails at this time. Some of the most outstanding of these influences are the crime movies, the obscene literature that floods the newsstands, and the radio and television programs of violence.

It is interesting to note that there are some Hollywood producers and television officials who recognize that crime and brutality, as shown on the movie and television screens, are having detrimental effects upon the youth.

Louis B. Mayer, who is the head of the MGM studio, issued a statement some time ago attacking producers who make pictures bordering on the obscene under the guise of telling real-life stories or delivering so-called messages. Mr. Mayer also spoke of crime pictures as "nothing more than a great criminal college for our youth." He stated that he found it disturbing "to see some industry sources bidding for those stage plays and best sellers which, to [his] way of thinking, are obscene and unfit for consumption by the typical American." (See *The New York Times*, July 17, 1949.)

A popular American news magazine recently reported that "an ominous new trend in television last week was causing comment among U.S. psychiatrists, shocking civic leaders, and startling most telefans above a mental age of eleven.

"It was video's growing preoccupation with violence and brutality. What radio could suggest but never actually accomplish, TV mystery and crime dramas were doing with almost sadistic relish."—Pathfinder, Nov. 30, 1949.

The following report was given regarding a few television programs: On one program a hefty 175-pound man struck a woman a hard blow, then mauled her around the set in front of the camera. He accompanied this mayhem with a snarl: "Now, I'm going to see if you can take it." The locale was a girls' private school.

Another program was enlivened by the hanging of a woman. The suspense program, it was revealed, rarely misses a lapse into slugging of some sort. On the "Lights Out" broadcast a stone was recently used to beat a character unconscious.

There has been a feeble voice of protest raised by some people against such acts of violence, for there are some parents who do not wish their children to see such things. But the television producers are answering the attack by putting the blame on Hollywood and claiming that they are not showing anything worse than what people see in the movies. One television producer has said that "if we commit 'mayhem' on TV, it is because the public wants it. We aim to please the majority, not the individual."

Where Does Caster Come From?

Is It Christian or Pagan?



INCE the days of ancient Bablyon Easter has been celebrated among the pagans as the festival of the queen of heaven, "the goddess with ten

thousand names.'

"Easter" is defined in the New Standard Dictionary as derived from "Eostre," "a goddess." This name is related to Ishtar and Astarte. The same dictionary defines Ishtar as being from Babylonian and Assyrian mythology, and as "the 'Great Mother,' goddess of all fertility. . . . As goddess of sexual love Venus was her planet, and she was worshiped as the queen and mistress of heaven. She slew her spouse Tammuz and restored him to life after a period of mourning, her action typifying the earth in its destruction and restoration of vegetation with the seasons. She was worshiped in western Asia under many names.

That all pagan goddesses melt into one individual-the Babylonian queen of heaven-is well recognized by the schol-

ars of ancient history. The book The Mythology of All Races states: "The entire mythology of Astarte goes back to the Sumerian Ininni-Ashdar-Ishtar; goddess of Venus and mother, wife, and lover of the Sumerian dying god Tammuz."-Vol. 5, p. 14. The same author speaks of Ishtar as "the goddess of Love and Harlotry."-Id., p. 34.

The Babylonian goddess Ishtar and the Old Testament Ashtoreth are the same individual. William Smith says of Ishtar: "There is no reason to doubt that this Assyrian goddess is Ashtoreth of the Old Testament."-Dictionary of the Bible, p. 75. (S. S. Scranton

& Company, Hartford, Conn., 1897.)

Ashtoreth is called queen of heaven in Jeremiah 7:18. "There is . . . reason to believe that she is meant by the 'queen of heaven,' in Jeremiah 7:18; 44:17, whose worship is there said to have been solemnized by burning incense, pouring libations, and offering cakes."-The Popular and Critical

Bible Encyclopedia, Vol. 1, p. 168.

Evangelist H. A. St. John in his book Our Banquet, page 377, quotes Charles A. S. Temple, to show the variety of names of the Babylonian goddess: "The ancient Pagans, with entire unanimity, worshipped one and the same great 'goddess of sensual love.' The Babylonians and Phoenicians called her 'Astarte'; the Egyptians, 'Isis'; the Greeks, 'Aphrodite'; the Romans, 'Venus, Flora, Ceres,' etc. Our Pagan-English ancestors called her 'Eostre,' and the Saxons by the similar name, 'Easter.' She also had many other names, among which were the 'Ashtoreth' of the Jews and Zidonians, and 'Diana' of the Ephesians."-Pagan Counterfeits in the Christian Church, pp. 42, 43.

We get our name Easter from the pagan Babylonian goddess. What a pity that the name of "the goddess of Love and Harlotry' should be given to a supposed

Christian festival!

Bible. It is a mistranslation, and the translators erred in the translation of the word Easter. Any commentary will explain that error. The Bible scholar, Adam Clarke, says: "Perhaps there never was a more unhappy, not to say absurd, translation than that in our text. . . . The goddess Easter, whose festival was celebrated by our pagan forefathers on the month of April; hence that month, in the Saxon calendar, is called Easter month. Every view we can take of this subject shows the gross impropriety of retaining a name every way exceptionable, and palpably absurd." -Adam Clarke's notes on Acts 12:4.

The name Easter and the time of its celebration is Babylonian and not Christian. It is baptized paganism.

Let history testify as to the truth:

"To conciliate the Pagans to nominal Christianity, Rome, pursuing its usual policy, took measures to get the Christian and Pagan festivals amalgamated, and, by a complicated but skillful adjustment of the calendar, it was found no difficult matter, in general,



to get Paganism and Christianity-now far sunk in idolatry-in this as in so many other things, to shake hands."-Alexander Hislop, The Two Babylons, p.

History is clear that Easter was not known in the

apostolic church:

"The festival, of which we read in Church history, under the name of Easter, in the third or fourth centuries, was quite a different festival from that now observed in the Romish Church, and at that time was not known by any such name as Easter. It was called Pasch, or the Passover, and though not of Apostolic institution, was very early observed by many professing Christians, in commemoration of the death and res-



urrection of Christ. That festival agreed originally with the time of the Jewish Passover, when Christ was crucified, a period which, in the days of Tertullian, at the end of the second century, was believed to have been the 23rd of March. That festival was not idolatrous, and it was preceded by no Lent. 'It ought to be known,' said Cassianus, the monk of Marseilles, writing in the fifth century, and contrasting the primitive Church with the Church in his day, 'that the observance of the forty days had no existence, so long as the perfection of that primitive Church remained inviolate."-Id., p. 104.

"The earliest Christians continued to observe the Jewish Passover on the fourteenth of the month Nisan. As the pagan element increased in the Church, and the anti-Jewish feeling accordingly, after a sharp struggle, the time was changed from the fourteenth of the month to the Sunday nearest the Vernal equinox. This brought it in conjunction with the festival of the Goddess of Spring, an ancient pagan feast, which probably dates back to the time of Astarte-worship, in Babylonia."-A. H. Lewis, D.D., Paganism Surviving in Christianity, p. 279. (G. P.

Putnam's Sons, New York, 1892.)

Not only is the name "Easter" and the time of celebration pagan, but the way in which we celebrate Easter is Babylonian. The pagans had their Easter egg, hot cross buns, the fish, and sitting bird; all had their place in the worship of the Babylonian queen of heaven. They had their Lent, yes, forty days of

"Whence, then, came this observance? The forty days' abstinence of Lent was directly borrowed from the worshipers of the Babylonian goddess. Such a Lent of forty days, 'in the spring of the year,' is still observed by the Yezidis or Pagan Devil-worshipers of Koordistan, who have inherited it from their early masters, the Babylonians. Such a Lent of forty days was held in spring by the Pagan Mexicans, for thus we read in Humboldt, where he gives account of Mexican observances: 'Three days after the vernal equinox . . . began a solemn fast of forty days in honor of the sun.' Such a Lent of forty days was observed in Egypt, as may be seen on consulting Wilkinson's Egyptians. This Egyptian Lent of forty days, we are informed by Landseer, in his Sabean Researches, was held expressly in commemoration of Adonis or Osiris, the great mediatorial god."-The Two Babylons, pp. 104, 105.

The mystic egg of the Babylonians had the following origin according to the Egyptian Hyginus who was keeper of the Palestine Library at Rome: "'An egg of wondrous size is said to have fallen from heaven into the river Euphrates. The fishes rolled it to the bank, where the doves having settled upon it, and hatched it, out came Venus, who afterward was called the Syrian Goddess'-that is, Astarte. Hence the egg became one of the symbols of Astarte or Easter."-Id.,

p. 109.

Had you ever wondered how chocolate eggs, chickens, and fishes came to be associated with Easter? The above quotation answers that question. How about rabbits as we see them everywhere at Easter time? That also is Babylonian.

"The rabbit is a pagan symbol and has always been an emblem of fertility."—The Catholic Encyclopedia, Vol. 5, p. 227, art., "Easter."

"The hot cross buns of Good Friday, and the dved eggs of Pasch or Easter Sunday, figured in the Chaldean rites just as they do now. The 'buns,' known too by that identical name, were used in the worship of the queen of heaven, the goddess Easter, as early as the days of Cecrops, the founder of Athens-that is, 1,500 years before the Christian era. 'One species of sacred bread,' says Bryant, 'which used to be offered to the gods, was of great antiquity, and called Boun." -The Two Babylons, pp. 107, 108.

When Israel went into the idolatry of sun worship we find the Israelite women making cakes to the pagan goddess: "The children gather wood, and fathers kindle the fire, and the women knead their dough, to make cakes to the queen of heaven, and to pour out drink offerings unto other gods, that they may

provoke Me to anger." Jeremiah 7:18.

How and Why Will Christ Return?

This verse of Scripture points out three characteristics of His return. First, it will be a literal, bodily return, for He "shall so come in like manner as ye have seen Him go." The disciples had but shortly before been conversing with a real being, One who after His resurrection had said, "Behold My hands and My feet, that it is I Myself: handle Me, and see; for a spirit hath not flesh and bones, as ye see Me have." Luke 24:39. His second coming, then, cannot be described as coming into the heart, which is an experience we know as conversion.

The second feature of His return is that it will be personal. "This same Jesus." As Job declared: "Whom . . . mine eyes shall behold, and not another." (Job

19:27.)

The third characteristic is that His return will be visible and not secret. Going back to verse nine of Acts 1, we read: "And when He had spoken these things, while they beheld, He was taken up; and a cloud received Him out of their sight." They "beheld." The angels stated that He would return as they had "seen" Him taken away.

In the Revelation of Jesus Christ given to John, that apostle recorded: "Behold, He cometh with clouds; and every eye shall see Him." Revelation 1:7. And little wonder that this spectacle of the ages draws the attention of all mankind, for "as lightning cometh out of the east, and shineth even unto the west; so shall also the coming of the Son of man be." Matthew 24:27.

Accompanying the Son of God will be the myriads of unfallen angels, adding glory and brilliance to this awe-inspiring scene. "When the Son of man shall come in His glory, and all the holy angels with Him, then shall He sit upon the throne of His glory." Matthew 25:31. Viewing this event in vision, John described it: "And the kings of the earth, and the great men, and the rich men, and the chief captains, and the mighty men, and every bondman, and every free man, hid themselves in the dens and in the rocks of the mountains; and said to the mountains and rocks, Fall on us, and hide us from the face of Him that sitteth on the throne, and from the wrath of the Lamb: for the great day of His wrath is come; and who shall be able to stand?" Revelation 6:15-17.

This is almost an echo of Christ's words recorded in Matthew 24:30: "And then shall appear the sign of the Son of man in heaven: and then shall all the tribes of the earth mourn, and they shall see the Son of man coming in the clouds of heaven with power and

great glory.

A consideration of these verses leaves no doubt but that His second coming will be visible-to the wicked as well as to the righteous. Perhaps foreseeing that some might mistake the glorious coming witnessed by the wicked as an event occurring after the righteous have been gathered, Jesus continued: "And He shall send His angels with a great sound of a trumpet, and they shall gather together His elect from the four winds, from one end of heaven to the other." Matthew 24:31.

Thus we have the words from the very lips of the Son of God that His glorious return, beheld by all on the earth, has as its major purpose the gathering of the righteous. Not before or not after, but at His second coming will the angels "gather together the

elect."

Our present existence is often marred by sorrow and death. All have seen it; some have experienced it close at hand in the family; and to these, especially, should the knowledge of the return of Jesus bring consolation. "For the Lord Himself shall descend from heaven with a shout, with the voice of the archangel, and with the trump of God: and the dead in

Christ shall rise first: then we which are alive and remain shall be caught up together with them in the clouds to meet the Lord in the air: and so shall we ever be with the Lord. Wherefore comfort one another with these words." 1 Thessalonians 4:16-18.

The thought of the second advent brought joy to Paul, for he was "looking for that blessed hope, and the glorious appearing of the great God and our Saviour Jesus Christ." Titus 2:13.

If we really love Him, we will look for His return with expectation; and when the heavens depart as a scroll, revealing the once lowly Jesus of Nazareth as KING OF KINGS AND LORD OF LORDS, we shall confess, "Lo, this is our God." Isaiah 25:9.

We read and hear much about the matter of cholesterol as a food factor in connection with arteriosclerosis and high blood pressure. What is its importance, and should we avoid certain foods on this account?—B.L.

Since in many cases of arteriosclerosis we find deposits of cholesterol in the vessel walls, and since a similar condition can be induced experimentally in small animals by feeding large amounts of this material, we believe it is well to avoid this food constituent as far as possible in persons who may have a tendency toward vascular disease or whose parents may have suffered from such a condition. The three foodstuffs that contain cholesterol are egg yolks, animal fats, and meat. Egg yolks contain the greatest amount, about 1.5 per cent; whole milk, about 0.02 per cent; and meat, a lesser amount.

Although all the factors that cause some persons to suffer vascular changes more than others are not known, it is much safer to avoid these food factors as far as possible. Whole milk need not be avoided, but butter and cream should be used moderately. It may be well to use margarine made from vegetable oils which contain no cholesterol. Although meat is the lowest in cholesterol content of the three foodstuffs mentioned, there are many other reasons why meat is less desirable than most other foods. Eggs serve a useful purpose in the diet especially if one is anemic, as the yolk is a good blood builder, but I would suggest that most persons limit their eating of eggs to less than one a day or three or four a week. Cooking can best be done with vegetable oils for shortening.

What causes creeping paralysis? Is there any cure? Does a patient always lose his mind?—C.

So-called creeping paralysis is a disease of rather obscure origin and probably is due to more than a single cause. Landry's paralysis is the name given to one form of paralysis. Probably in most cases the disease has an infectious or a toxic cause or both, and if it is possible to ascertain the nature of the infection

and its source, it might be possible to arrest the disease. In many cases this is not easily done. No, the patient does not always lose his mind. Specific treatment is often difficult, although the newer antibiotic medicines such as penicillin or streptomycin may be useful. Hydrotherapy and massage may aid in assisting the patient's health, and a careful dietary and good hygienic program may slow the progress of the disease and add to the patient's comfort.

What do you suggest as a practical first-aid treatment for ordinary burns such as happen in home work?—B.R.

Since one of the first demands in a medium burn is the alleviation of pain, probably butesin-picrate ointment is one of the very useful things to keep in the house, as it does relieve the pain quite rapidly. At the same time I find it favors the healing process very well, which is the second important factor to be considered. One should cover the burn with a thin wax paper; then put on a thin layer of cotton, and bandage it. This routine may be repeated once daily.

What is the predominant indication of hardening of the arteries?—F.N.H.

Hardening of the arteries seldom takes place over the body in the same degree. On an X-ray film one leg may show calcified vessels like pipes, and the other leg may not show this change. The heart may be the organ affected, as in coronary heart diesase and angina pectoris; in cases of senility or senile dementia the brain is chiefly affected. Blood pressure may be higher than normal with very little vascular change, although if of long standing secondary blood vascular changes may result from high blood pressure, 80 per cent of which is caused by nervous tension. This disease or symptom is known as essential hypertension. Perhaps I have not answered your question as yet, but remember that high blood pressure may not indicate hardening of the arteries. Sometimes the hardened arteries feel like the radial arteries or the cords where we take the pulse.

Isaiah 40:22. "Behold, the nations are as a drop of a bucket, and are counted as the small dust of the balance: behold, He taketh up the isles as a very little thing. . . . All nations before Him are as nothing; and they are counted to Him less than nothing, and vanity." Verses 15, 17. "Blessed be the name of God forever and ever: for wisdom and might are His: and He changeth the times and the seasons: He removeth kings, and setteth up kings: He giveth wisdom unto the wise, and knowledge to them that know understanding: He revealeth the deep and secret things: He knoweth what is in the darkness, and the light dwelleth with Him." Daniel 2:20-22. The Most High ruleth in the kingdom of men, and giveth it to whomsoever He will." Daniel 4:17.

While God is thus enthroned, what does He behold?

"The Lord looketh from heaven; He beholdeth all the sons of men. From the place of His habitation He looketh upon all the inhabitants of the earth. He fashioneth all their hearts alike; He considereth all their works." Psalm 33:13-15. "O Lord, Thou hast searched me, and known me. Thou knowest my downsitting and mine uprising, Thou understandest my thought afar off. Thou compassest my path and my lying down, and art acquainted with all my ways. For there is not a word in my tongue, but, lo, O Lord, Thou knowest it altogether." Psalm 139:1-4. "The Lord searcheth all hearts, and understandeth all the imaginations of the thoughts." 1 Chronicles 28:9.

Can we escape from this divine scrutiny?

"Whither shall I go from Thy Spirit? Or whither OUR TIMES, MARCH, 1950 shall I flee from Thy presence? If I ascend up into heaven, Thou art there: if I make my bed in hell, behold, Thou art there. If I take the wings of the morning, and dwell in the uttermost parts of the sea; even there shall Thy hand lead me, and Thy right hand shall hold me. If I say, Surely the darkness shall cover me; even the night shall be light about me. Yea, the darkness hideth not from Thee; but the night shineth as the day: the darkness and the light are both alike to Thee." Psalm 139:7-12.

"Why sayest thou, O Jacob, and speakest, O Israel, My way is hid from the Lord, and my judgment is passed over from my God?" Isaiah 40:27, 28.

What is the purpose of this divine comprehension

of every human being?

"I the Lord search the heart, I try the reins, even to give every man according to his ways, and according to the fruit of his doings." Jeremiah 17:10. "For God shall bring every work into judgment, with every secret thing, whether it be good, or whether it be evil." Ecclesiastes 12:14. "Thou hast set our iniquities before Thee, our secret sins in the light of Thy countenance." Psalm 90:8.

When is this judgment to take place?

"The hour of His judgment is come." Rev. 14:7. What proclamation is being made throughout the

world right now-February, March, 1950?

"And I saw another angel fly in the midst of heaven, having the everlasting gospel to preach unto them that dwell on the earth, and to every nation, and kindred, and tongue, and people, saying with a loud voice, Fear God, and give glory to Him, for the hour of His judgment is come." Revelation 14:6, 7.

What is the standard by which all men will be tested in the judgment now going on in heaven?

"So speak ye, and so do, as they that shall be judged by the law of liberty." James 2:12. Verses 8-11 show this law to be the Ten Commandments.

In view of God's omniscience, His omnipotence, and the judgment now going on, what should be our attitude?

"Search me, O God, and know my heart: try me, and know my thoughts: and see if there be any wicked way in me, and lead me in the way everlasting." Psalm 139:23, 24. "Order my steps in Thy word: and let not any iniquity have dominion over me." Psalm 119:133.

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that turneth away his ear from hearing the law, even his prayer shall be abomination." Proverbs 28:9.

Let us look at some of the Bible examples. Jereboam was cursed with a withered arm and healed by the intercession of the prophet of Judah; yet his heart "returned not from his evil way." (1 Kings 13:1-10, 33, 34.) He stands out in the Old Testament records as a perpetual byword for apostasy and evil. God did a miracle for him, yet he was never converted.

The Pharaoh of the exodus, who withstood Moses and Aaron, saw unmistakable evidence—wonders and supernatural judgments—until he finally cried out, "Go serve the Lord, . . , and bless me also." (Exodus 12:31, 32.) And everyone knows that the Pharaoh died in the pursuit of Israel at the Red Sea. He was never converted, even with all that mighty demonstration of God's power before his eyes and senses.

Balaam, once a true prophet of God, witnessed and heard the miracle of his ass speaking to him in the voice of an angel, when on the way to curse Israel against God's command. Balaam knew and understood this event as a providence of God, yet covetousness robbed the onetime saint and prophet of eternal salvation. This miracle did not break his heart nor reconvert him. (Numbers 22; 2 Peter 2:15.)

In Luke 17:11-19 we read that Jesus healed ten lepers. Only one of the ten returned to glorify God. This one, a Samaritan and a stranger, returned to Jesus glorifying Him. Jesus said, "Thy faith hath made thee whole." This one stranger was regenerated, born again; nine were only physically healed and, at that, ungrateful for such a special, divine, temporal blessing.

Peter and Judas, two of the twelve apostles, were given the same power on their missionary tours. Yet Judas was never converted; and Peter was definitely singled-out as being among the unconverted on the night of the betrayal of Jesus, when He said, "When thou art converted, strengthen thy brethren." Luke 22:32. Peter, after being with Jesus for more than three years, was finally converted; yet he did miracles before his conversion. Judas also witnessed for Christ during the same time; in fact he was their treasurer. However he finally sold his Lord for thirty pieces of silver—the price of a slave. (Mark 6:7-13; Matthew 27:3-5.)

The crowning witness of God's power in old Jerusalem was the resurrection of a multitude of saints together with Jesus on a Sunday morning. (Matthew 27:52, 53.) "We be risen with Christ," they proclaimed, in startling and fearful testimony. For forty days, they with Christ walked the streets of old Jerusalem, witnessing to the mighty power of Jesus as their Messiah; and then they ascended with Jesus to heaven. (Ephesians 4:8.) But everyone, even to this day, knows that old Jerusalem was destroyed in A.D. 70 and

the Jews cursed forever for their crime of killing Christ and for their rejection of Him. (Luke 21:24.)

"Verily, verily, I say unto thee, except a man be born again [from above, margin] he cannot see the kingdom of God." John 3:3-7. We must be born from above. Paul says: "For we are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus unto good works" (Ephesians 2:10), "a new creature" (Galatians 6:15), "by the washing of regeneration, and the renewing of the Holy Ghost" (Titus 3:5). (See 1 John 3:9; 5:1-4, 18.)

Being born again is the only gateway to heaven. Miracles and the gift of tongues will never convert the world to Jesus. It has been shown that miracles, wonders, special talents, and gifts are not true signs

of regeneration or being born again.

The preaching of the law and the prophets—the good news of salvation from sin through faith in the blood of the Lamb and in His life-giving power—is the only way to conversion. "Faith cometh by hearing, and hearing by the Word of God." Romans 10:17. It is the miracle of the Word itself that creates a new being. (1 Peter 1:23-25.) For those words are life; they are spirit. (John 6:63.) The law points out sin, but in the Word is found power to keep from breaking those holy precepts. (Jude 24; Romans 5:10.)

I have never met a born-again Christian who was not in love with the admonitions of the Holy Bible. (Every Christian knows that the breaking in the least degree of the Ten Commandments violates his conscience.) Truly the greatest miracle of all is that a sinful, hating heart in direct opposition to the law and the Bible may be supernaturally changed and created anew. The "new creature" loves, obeys, and believes God's commands and gives his all-even his very life-for their teaching, publication, and propagation. Job said: "Though He slay me, yet will I trust in Him." Job 13:15. John says: "And they overcame him [the devil] by the blood of the Lamb, and by the word of their testimony; and they loved not their lives unto the death." Revelation 12:11. See Romans 8: 35-39.

As I said, after conversion, miracles by the Holy Spirit only serve to *confirm* one's faith. Those who walk in the meekness and lowliness of Christ, who walk in humility of mind and who love and fear God possess a power more valuable, more precious, more desirable, and more exalted than learning, eloquence, or any other of the special gifts or talents of God. In short the supreme "heavenly gift" of adoption into the family of God the Father by a miraculous new birth is the one way to the kingdom of God. And what a privilege! John cries out: "Behold, what manner of love the Father hath bestowed upon us, that we should be called the sons of God." 1 John 3:1. "And [Christ] hath made us kings and priests unto God and His Father." Revelation 1:6.

Why miracles? Jesus can outdo the devil's wonderworking power a thousand times over; all power is in His hands and control. And in spite of the fact that Satan is a fallen angel, what is gained by a display of either of their powers if we miss the way of Christ and are not delivered out of the power of the prince of this world? If we are not converted in heart and mind and the whole being which is our reasonable sacrifice,

neither wonder-working power will save us.

The Christian that is converted needs no further evidence to prove Jesus to him. There is no doubt in his mind about the Holy Bible, the Ten Commandments, or the Holy Spirit witnessing to the law, or Word, or for Jesus. He knows in his own heart the power that overcomes death. Miracles are given to sustain the believer already in Christ; for no miracle, other than the new birth, ever brought one to Christ. Miracles are for the edifying of the church, to ratify and perfect the first work of the Spirit—the new birth—and to bring one fully back to Jesus. (1 Corinthians 1:7, 8; Ephesians 4:12.) Miracles are given to witness to the life-giving power over death, sin, and torment; they are not given to show off supernatural power.

"Even so it is not the will of your Father which is in heaven, that one of these little ones should perish" (Matthew 18:14). Says Psalm 127:3, "Lo, children are an heritage of the Lord." Some day, and soon, our returning King will ask, "Where is the flock that was given thee, thy beautiful flock?" Jeremiah 13:20. May you be able to answer in the language of Hebrews 2:13, "Behold I and the children which God

hath given me."

I believe in child evangelism. Jesus said, "Suffer little children to come unto Me, and forbid them not." Luke 18:16. Jesus loves children. Jesus is a child's Saviour, and a child's pattern. As a child He said, "I must be about My Father's business." Luke 2:49. Jesus as a child obeyed His heavenly Father. He died to save children. Jesus now is ready to help any boy or girl that wants to be saved. He calls today just as He did 1900 years ago. We read of an experience that illustrates this in Matthew 18:2: "And Jesus called a little child unto Him, and sat him in the midst of them."

Yes, Jesus calls, "Let the little ones come." Will you sing it, please?

"I think when I read that sweet story of old, When Jesus was here among men,

How He called little children as lambs to His fold, I should like to have been with them then.

I wish that His hands had been placed on my head, That His arm had been thrown around me,

And that I might have seen His kind look when He said,

'Let the little ones come unto Me.'"

Does child evangelism pay? It does. We believe that we should now stress child evangelism more than ever. When an adult is won to Christ, a unit of strength has been added to the cause of righteousness and truth; but when a child is brought to Christ, a multiplication table has been added.

Warden Lawes, formerly of the Sing Sing Penitentiary, has declared: "When we get to the place where we pay more attention to the high chair, we will have less need for the electric chair." Said Francis Xavier, the great Jesuit missionary, "Give me the children until they are seven and anyone may have them afterward." And Ella Frances Lynch writes: "If you train your children carefully until they are seven years old, they are already three quarters educated."

A child is susceptible to, and capable of, religious feelings long before he can grasp religious thought. He has heart responses long before he understands the reason of things. Every child should have a religious experience in accordance with his years. Says Clarence H. Benson in his book *Introduction to Child Study*: "Before the fourth year the child acquires his knowledge of right and wrong solely by imitation. His religion is a reflection of the religion he finds about him." By beholding, the child is changed. This is a spiritual truth as well as a psychological dictum. Here is how it is expressed in 2 Corinthians 3:18: "But we all, with open face beholding as in a glass the glory of the Lord, are changed into the same image from glory to glory, even as by the Spirit of the Lord."

But someone objects that children are sometimes coaxed and urged to take their stand for Christ prematurely, and that when they get older they will break away from their baptismal vows. It is true that some parents, and even ministers, have unwisely urged children to take their stand before they were prepared in heart and mind to do so; but those who raise this question, more often than not, sound a false alarm. Let every boy and girl have an experience

in Christ in proportion to his years.

Says Spurgeon: "I have more confidence in the spiritual life of the children that I have received into this church than I have in the spiritual condition of the adults thus received." And to quote him further: "Eighty-seven per cent of adult converts fall away within five years, but not more than 40 per cent of child converts are lost in the same length of time."

And Dr. George W. Baley observes: "Less time and effort are necessary for the winning of twenty children to Christ than one adult, and a Christian child is worth more in the extension of the kingdom than

many adults."

Jesus calls the children today. He calls each boy and girl. He calls them to be preachers, missionaries, church leaders, and workers. He calls them just as truly as He calls the disciples of old. His word to them now is "Follow Me." Yes, Jesus says, "Follow Me, and I will make you fishers of men." Matthew 4:19.

The Protestant Reformation

"Its form still stood without a breach, When life and warmth were fled, And still it spake its wanted speech, When every word was dead."

Protestantism got its name from the vigorous protests of the reformers against the doctrines and corruptions of Romanism. It developed a big name vibrating with life and heroic exploits. But the name of Protestantism has largely lost its significance. Protestants have ceased to protest and, in fact, are getting on very friendly terms with their former enemy. They have also largely lost the glorious truth of justification and salvation by faith and have replaced it with the non-Christian doctrine of humanism. There is still much activity and boasting of the glorious past and planning for a greater future through church federation; but knowledge of the Bible is lacking, spiritual life waning, and worldly conformity seems to be the order of the day.

The meaning of Sardis indicates a "remnant" or "an escaped few," and therefore represents Protestantism especially in its decadent backslidden state when only a remnant of faithful souls would continue the work of reform. There would be "a few names" or "a few souls" (Moffatt) in Sardis who "have not defiled their garments." Some would maintain and increase their spirituality and loyalty to principle even in a church having more profession than vital godliness. The success of the earlier days brought feelings of pride, boasting, and overconfidence; and men hid behind their creeds and refused to walk in advancing light. The appeal of the divine Lord is for an advance in scriptural knowledge and for the finishing of the work

so nobly begun.

The work of the reformers was "not perfect before God." In other words it was not up to the mark, because it was incomplete. It was not "fully performed" according to one translation. The work was good as far as it was carried on, but it came to a standstill before being completed. It reached the state of stagnation. Dr. Philip Schaff truthfully declared that "the Reformation of the sixteenth century is not a finale; but a movement still in progress." Robert Peel, while prime minister of England in 1840, said: "The day is not far distant, and it may be very near, when we shall have to fight the battle of the Reformation over again." The Reformation cannot be complete until the people of God are brought all the way back to the faith delivered to the saints by Christ and the apostles. There are some hopeful signs that the battle lines are now being formed for the final contest between truth and

The accusation that the church was "ready to die" indicated a little life that should be fanned into a

flame before it became extinguished. "Strengthen then those thy remaining few graces, which, in thy spiritual deadly slumber, are not yet quite extinct." —Dean Alford. Christ does not say, "Arise from the dead," because there was some life remaining; but He does urge the church to awake and be watchful. The situation is serious, but not hopeless. The call is for repentance and the continuance of the arrested Reformation. The divine Watcher says, "Wake up, rally what is still left to you, though it is on the very point of death." Moffatt. The scriptural injunction applies with special force, "Awake thou that sleepest, and arise from the dead, and Christ shall give thee light." Ephesians 5:14.

A remembrance of the glorious history and experiences of the past would be an incentive to repentance and renewed Reformation efforts. There was much to "remember" that was of great value, especially in creating a desire for a repetition of the miracle-working power and celestial glory of the former days. In this period of decadent Protestantism would come the beginning of the judgment. Christ warned, that during the period of the judgment "you will certainly not know the hour at which I shall come to judge you." Weymouth. The secret coming of judgment would be "in such an hour as ye think not," and like the visit of "a thief in the night." Just as the overconfident and self-satisfied citizens of Sardis were suddenly surprised and overtaken with disaster, so an overwhelming surprise awaits the modern religious world in its lukewarm and complacent attitude.

The overcomer will be arrayed in white raiment, the symbol of purity and victory; and his name will be retained in the Lamb's book of life. The early Christian candidates for baptism marched to the place of immersion wearing white robes as the outward evidence of their profession. In Rome the white toga was worn by successful candidates for office and by victorious generals when given a triumph by their grateful government. Often in the Scriptures the finally victorious saints of God are represented as being clothed in white raiment, symbolic of their complete

and final triumph over their great enemy.

In Greek and Roman cities, as in our own, the names of the citizens were registered. Citizenship brings special privileges not available to others. It has always been a disgrace and tragedy to have one's name expunged from the book of record because of unworthy conduct. The names of all spiritually dead Christians must be removed from the book of life, which is only for the names of victors. Either the name is blotted from the book of life or the sins from the books of record. The promise indicates the danger and possibility of falling from grace, which is the great sin of the modern religious world. It is high time for a great spiritual revival and reformation by the forsaking of sins and a full return to primitive godliness in the daily life of the people of the world.



WATCH SMOG WEATHER.—A strict watch of the weather is the chief of ten U. S. Public Health Service recommendations for preventing future smog catastrophes such as hit the small industrial town of Donora, Pa., a year ago this month (Oct. 27, 1948).

If forecasts show a possibility of weather inversion, industrial plants should either be shut down or cut down their operations enough to reduce "sharply" the amount of contamination going out into the air.— Science News Letter, Oct. 29, 1949.

POLIO CASES EXPECTED TO BE HIGH IN 1950.—1950 will be another big infantile paralysis year. There may be more big years to follow. "The end is not in sight" to the upward trend in this disease, Surgeon General Leonard A. Scheele of the U. S. Public Health Service declared at a conference of health officers in Atlanta, Ga.—Science News Letter, Oct. 29, 1949.

DRAMAMINE RELIEVES MIGRAINE AND NAUSEA.—Dramamine, the new drug that both prevents and relieves seasickness, may help patients with migraine headaches and mental patients with nausea after electric shock treatments.

This possibility appears in satisfactory results with the drug for both conditions reported by Dr. Edward F. Kerman of Baltimore to the *Journal of The American Medical Association* (Oct. 15), in Chicago, Ill.—Science News Letter, Oct. 29, 1949.

ELECTRIC LUNCH BOX.—Plugged into a factory or office electric outlet, it provides both a steaming hot lunch and cold dessert. Besides two containers for food, it has a bottle for hot beverages. It is available also with voltage units for use in automobiles, trucks, boats, and trains.—Science News Letter, Oct. 29, 1949.

SPOTTING SOVIET A-BOMB.—Clinching proof of Russia's atomic bomb activities could have come from cosmic ray studies by American scientists who have been keeping a careful watch this summer on all radioactivity in the upper atmosphere.

Their studies would show, as no spy could, whether the Soviets were trying to start a false "scare" rumor.

The existence of bomb fission fragments in the atmosphere could not be faked. Such fission fragments would be viciously "hot" strange atoms, radiating furiously, and of a kind never found in nature outside of a bomb or atomic pile. And these fragments could have been detected by cosmic ray scientists.—Science News Letter, Oct. 1, 1949.

about the fighting, the cursing, the swearing, and the morals? Yes, and are they lovely, are they of good report? Surely if we put all the comics to the test of these words-true, honest, just, pure, lovely, good report—we will need to ban them from our reading, for we are Christians trying to be pure in heart to meet our Lord and Saviour. Not only does Paul give us this excellent counsel, but the book Messages to Young People, by Ellen White, gives to us some earnest thoughts for our consideration: "'Keep thy heart with all diligence' is the counsel of the wise man, 'for out of it are the issues of life.' . . . We have a work to do to resist temptation. Those who would not fall a prey to Satan's devices must guard well the avenues of the soul; they must avoid reading, seeing or hearing that which will suggest impure thoughts. The mind should not be left to wander at random upon every subject that the adversary of souls may suggest." "'Gird up the loins of your mind,' says the apostle Peter. 'Be sober, not fashioning yourselves according to the former lusts in your ignorance, but as He which hath called you is holy, so be ye holy in all manner of living." Then, after quoting Philippians 4:8, the writer goes on to say, "This will require earnest prayer and unceasing watchfulness. We must be aided by the abiding influence of the Holy Spirit which will attract the mind upward and habituate it to dwell on pure and holy things. And we must give diligent study to the Word of God." "Wherewithal shall a young man cleanse his way? By taking heed thereto according to Thy Word." "Thy Word." says the Psalmist, "have I hid in mine heart, that I might not sin against Thee."

Not only do the Bible and other spiritual books show us that comics should definitely be shunned by us as Christians, but notice what an editorial in the *Chicago Daily News* of May 8, 1940, has to say concerning comics: "Badly drawn, badly written, and badly printed, a strain on young eyes and nervous systems. The effect of these pulp paper nightmares is that of a violent stimulant. Their crude blacks and reds spoil the child's natural sense of color. Their hypodermic injection of sex and murder makes a child impatient with better, though quieter stories."

May God help you Teen-agers to resolve in your hearts to live true lives for Him. One writer has said, "When we submit ourselves to Christ, the heart is united with His heart, the will is merged in His will, the mind becomes one with His mind, the thoughts are brought into captivity to Him; we live His life." I want to live that life, don't you? By God's grace let us be "pure and kind and true."

make it honorable." Isaiah 42:21. Looking down through centuries to come, God foresaw the rise of those who would seek to set aside His commandments and His holy Sabbath day. The words of Isaiah stand as a beacon light of warning to such. The gospel prophet declared that the Messiah would "magnify the law, and make it honorable." To magnify means to enlarge a thing making it more distinct. As we read Christ's Sermon on the Mount, especially Matthew 5: 21-37, we discover how the Saviour did just this.

Early in His earthly ministry the Saviour was aware that some were teaching that He had come to abolish the sacred claims of the law. From the very beginning He made His position clear: "Think not that I am come to destroy the law, or the prophets: I am not come to destroy, but to fulfil. For verily I say unto you, Till heaven and earth pass, one jot or one tittle shall in no wise pass from the law, till all be fulfilled." Matthew 5:17, 18. Jesus did not come to set aside the Sabbath which He had instituted at Eden; but rather He came to "cram full" (for that is the literal meaning of the Greek word from which the word "fulfil" is translated) all the principles of His law, for they are "holy, and just, and good." (Romans 7:12.)

In His own words recorded in John 15:10, He declared: "I have kept My Father's commandments, and abide in His love." "I have kept My Father's commandments" is the testimony of Jesus, our great Example.

We should not be surprised at such a statement from Him for in Malachi 3:6, we read: "I am the Lord, I change not." He could not dissociate Himself from the Sabbath which He had instituted at Eden; neither could He disclaim words He Himself had given at Sinai and had later declared would stand as long as heaven and earth abide.

During His earthly ministry Christ observed the

seventh-day Sabbath.

Inspiration records in Luke 4:16: "And He came to Nazareth, where He had been brought up: and, as His custom was, He went into the synagogue on the Sabbath day, and stood up for to read." It was our Saviour's custom to keep the seventh-day Sabbath during His life here upon earth and to attend divine worship on that day. According to Winston's Dictionary a "custom" is an habitual or usual course of action; a frequent repetition of an act." Consequently Jesus did not just occasionally observe the seventh-day Sabbath in order to reach the Jews who observed that day. It was His "usual course of action." Week by week the Saviour of mankind was found in the place of divine worship on the seventh-day Sabbath, which He had made in the beginning. This custom was quite in harmony with His teachings to His people in Old Testament times: "The seventh day is the sabbath of rest, an holy convocation." Leviticus 23:3.

Congregational Sabbath worship is recommended by the psalmist in what is known as the Sabbath Psalm: "It is a good thing to give thanks unto the Lord, and to sing praises unto Thy name, O Most High: to show forth Thy loving-kindness in the morning, and Thy faithfulness every night, upon an instrument of ten strings, and upon the psaltery; upon the harp with a solemn sound. For Thou, Lord, hast made me glad through Thy work: I will triumph in the works of Thy hands. O Lord, how great are Thy works!" Psalm 92:1-5.

Christ was in church on the Sabbath day. To those who should come after, He says, "If any man serve Me, let him follow Me; and where I am, there shall also My servant be." John 12:26.

Jesus Christ was a reformer. His day demanded a man of action to startle the people from their tradition-steeped ways. By His time the seventh-day Sabbath had long since ceased to be a "delight, the holy of the Lord, honorable" to the Jewish people. They had so encumbered God's day of rest with a multitude of restrictions, purely figments of their own tradition, that the Sabbath was indeed a burden.

Mark you well, Christ came as a reformer and not an abolitionist. As already noted the gospel prophet had made this point clear over 700 years before. "He shall magnify the law and make it *honorable*." To make it honorable, to rescue it from the debris of tradition—such was the work of Jesus.

The great Teacher made it plain to His contempo-

rary critics and to all future generations that "it is lawful to do well on the Sabbath days." Matthew 12:12. Said He: "What man shall there be among you, that shall have one sheep, and if it fall into a pit on the Sabbath day, will he not lay hold on it, and lift it out? How much then is a man better than a sheep?" Verses 11, 12.

Acts of mercy and healing are quite compatible with Christian Sabbath observance. This Jesus made clear by precept and example during His earthly

ministry.

Looking beyond His own day and foreseeing the rise of those who would seek to change His holy Sabbath rest, Christ made clear to His disciples that at least thirty-five years the other side of His resurrection the Sabbath should still be kept. This is easily seen from Matthew 24:20: "Pray ye that your flight be not in the winter, neither on the Sabbath day." The Son of God, with His ability to foresee the future, knew that the fall of Jerusalem would be more than thirty-five years after His resurrection. Knowing this, He told His disciples to pray that their flight on that occasion be not on the Sabbath day. Had He intended to change the day, He would never have given such instruction to His followers.

Then, too, even in His death Jesus rested on the

Sabbath day. (Luke 23:54-24:1.)

If Christ were here on earth today, He still would be keeping the seventh-day Sabbath of Eden. When the sacred hours of the Sabbath come week by week, Jesus would be worshiping with His people as He did during His earthly ministry. Does not Paul say by inspiration: "Jesus Christ the same yesterday, and today, and forever"? Hebrews 13:8.




So we live at the bottom of an ocean. It is transparent to a greater degree than the sea; yet the air may become so filled with vapors or chemicals in

it not so, life would cease through concentration of poisons—the air would become a dead sea. "All the rivers run into the sea," wrote an ancient scientist, "yet the sea is not full." Why? Because of a circuit of motion: "Unto the place whence the rivers come, thither they return again." Ecclesiastes 1:7. In that circuit the water becomes purified; in the distillation by the sun's heat the liquid drops its load of impurities and becomes pure vapor, to condense into the purest form of water, the rain.

So the air performs its circuits. "The wind goeth toward the south, and turneth about unto the north; it whirleth about continually, and the wind returneth again according to his circuits." Ecclesiastes 1:6. Into the ocean of air run all the rivers of air from two billion human lungs, from countless myriads of lungs of lower creatures, from the leaves of every plant on earth, from the very pores of the globe itself in the aeration of the soil. Yet the sea of air is not full, because "it whirleth about continually."



As the messengers of the Creator, they go on merciful errands. Even though, since man sold out his kingdom to the usurper Satan, winds often serve the prince of the power of the air, yet they still obey the higher Sovereign; and to the child of God it is the Majesty of heaven who rides upon the wings of the wind.

In New York Dr. Frederic Wertham, psychiatrist and author of the best-selling book entitled *The Show of Violence*, disagreed with this television producer. He says: "The producers of these exhibitions tempt the public with violence and brutality. In all of us are tendencies in that direction. If they are exploited, we yield and some of us ask for more. Then the producers say, 'The public wants violence.' Actually, it is a case of the industry forcing it down the public's throat."

Coming back to this matter of giving clinical help to the moral degenerates, we wish to say that the American public must face the facts. Clinical aid will not solve the problem. We must go further. We must get to the roots of the matter. We think it is quite

clear that the influences mentioned herein are definitely contributing to the condition that now prevails. Educating immature minds to acts of violence is bound to result in violence.

Perhaps it would be well for us to consider the fact that in the days of Noah "the earth was also corrupt before God, and the earth was filled with violence." Genesis 6:11. Jesus said, "As the days of Noah were, so shall also the coming of the Son of man be." Matthew 24:37.

So our Lord prophesied that the world in the day of His coming would be as it was in the days of Noah—that the earth would be filled with violence. How strikingly this prophecy is being fulfilled before our very eyes today!

persons only being put on probation for stealing \$868 from the Michigan insurance funds by claiming benefits while they were working. The same judge presided at both trials."

The Detroit investigation of relief chiselers is a startling revelation of the dishonesty that prevails in our cities among a number of those who are on relief. It was found in Detroit that many persons on relief

were buying all sorts of luxury items.

In investigating one reliefer over the phone, it was found that the person on relief was in town and the one that was contacted on the phone was the hired maid. Another case was of a woman who received \$65 a month for room and board from her son, rented another room for \$25 a month, and worked three to four days a week as a domestic at \$6.00 a day. She had a monthly income averaging about \$175 from these sources. On top of that, the woman was receiving \$74.65 a month in direct relief.

Hundreds of other cases of this nature were uncovered in the investigation. In fact it was found that at least 30 per cent of the people drawing relief in Detroit were doing so dishonestly. Numerous women were drawing relief checks, claiming that their husbands had deserted them; but when investigated, it was found that the husbands were living with the

wives and had good-paying jobs.

We were amazed to learn that there were a number of people who make a career out of relief. These people do not want to work for a living. The variety of fraudulent reasons given for claiming relief aid would make

an honest man blush.

Although we deeply regret the loss of pride and integrity among so many citizens of our fair land, we cannot help but recognize in this an outstanding fulfillment of a prophecy pertaining to our times. Here it is: "This know also that in the last days perilous times shall come. . . . Evil men and seducers shall wax worse and worse, deceiving and being deceived." 2 Timothy 3:1, 13.
