Working under the supervision of a General Conference appointed committee on Adventist Ministry to College and University Students (AMiCUS) and in coordination with the world divisions, these three departments promote and support initiatives designed to meet the spiritual, intellectual, and social needs of Adventist students on public campuses worldwide. In cooperation with leaders at various church levels, the committee aims to achieve these objectives by strengthening the faith commitment of these students to Seventh-day Adventist beliefs and mission, providing opportunities for Christian fellowship, preparing students to deal with the intellectual challenges that arise in a secular environment, developing their leadership abilities, and training them for outreach, service, and witnessing on the campus, in the community, and in the world at large.

AMiCUS

 The AMiCUS Committee cooperates with the Adventist Volunteer Center and Global Mission by encouraging the involvement of these Seventh-day Adventist students as missionaries or volunteers. It also engages the support of the Public Affairs and Religious Liberty Department in order to obtain, at the regional or national level, Sabbath exemptions for class assignments and examinations for Seventh-day Adventist students.

AMICUS Responsibilities (GCWP FE 95 10

- The AMiCUS Committee provides overall supervision and coordination of this global ministry and, in consultation with leaders in the world divisions, promotes initiatives designed to:
- 1. Organize associations of Seventh-day Adventist students in public campuses and hold special meetings for them,
- 2. Publish and distribute *College and University Dialogue*, a *Handbook*, and other materials that support this ministry, and
- 3. Train campus chaplains, lay leaders, and pastors in university centers.
- The committee also develops an annual budget to carry out its international ministry.
- The Department of Education focuses on producing *Dialogue* in parallel language editions (English, French, Portuguese, and Spanish) and distributing this journal on the basis of orders received through the world divisions. The Department of Education also promotes the value of Seventh-day Adventist education, encouraging these students to continue their studies at a Seventh-day Adventist college or university, where possible, and to make their professional services available to church institutions once they complete their studies.




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



While science has been associated with "reason" and thus is expected to be reasonable, creationism has been associated by many with "faith," and thus seems to be incompatible with anything "reasonable."¹

But biblical faith, in this case faith in creation, is "reasonable" in the sense that it is not mythical and/or irrational: on the contrary, it presents.

found naturally on the grape peel. Up to 12 percent of alcohol, by volume, may be generated in the process. Any excess sugar remains untransformed, and yields "sweet" wine. Less sugary must yield "dry" wine, which was avoided in antiquity. Who would ever have thought that a volcano on the remote coast of an isolated island might impact people around the whole world? When Eyjafjallajökull volcano in Iceland began ejecting its particle plume 30,000 feet high, it was blasting right into the path of the jet stream that then dispersed ash and silica across the upper atmosphere. Air travel to and from Europe was abruptly shut down, causing the greatest interruption of airtraffic since World War II. The "lockdown" of airspace grounded thousands of flights and millions of people as far away as Australia. Stranded groups of students returning from Easter break, tourists who had by then run out of money, retirees with



health problems, ordinary people who needed to be at work, and high-paid business consultants were all trapped in limbo together as airports turned into campgrounds. Some slowly made their way home by car, train, or boat. British comedian John Cleese paid £3.300 pounds (nearly U.S. \$5.000) for a cab ride from Oslo to Brussels.

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
