DISTRIBUTION OF AGENDA R. A. Wilcox led the devotional service, drawing a challenge for the annual meeting from the life of Job. Job is described as God's servant, he said (Job 2:3), pointing out what a privilege we have today of being known in heaven as servants of God. Although written in Old Testament language, the book of Job is for New Testament readers, since it has a message applicable to these times. The life of Enoch illustrated the life that leads to translation; the life of Moses to resurrection. But the life of Job shows us how to live in the time of trouble. Job was a great man, one of immense influence in the East. He was known for his loyalty to God, a loyalty that was tested by adversity. He encountered the wrath of Satan, saw his family divided, and lost all his material possessions. But he did not sin with his lips. He continued steadfast in his trust. God has placed us today in places of influence. We can also expect to be the object of Satan's attacks. But by the grace of Christ, we also will maintain our spiritual integrity.

BAGHDAD MEDICAL WORK 65/271

The meeting was opened by a hymn and with prayer by Miss Ruby Williams and George Khoury. R. R. Figuhr drew devotional lessons from the healing experience at the pool of Bethesda, John 5:1-9. Jesus picked the most difficult case and demonstrated God's ability to restore. He led the man to put his request into words, and then asked him to do what time and experience proved impossible. Experience is a good teacher, but then we need to take the advanced course, Faith. When commanded to walk, he went to the temple. Something had been done for him inwardly and it showed outwardly. What God does for SDA's shows in many ways: digestion, heart, lungs. and teeth, as well as spiritual. Sometimes affliction prepares a persons for what the Lord wants to do for Him. It was so with this man. The handiwork of God has been marred by sin. Man came from the Creator wonderful. We are called to the work of reform. We should be reformers, however, not bigots. A bigot never questions his own opinions, only the opinions of others. The law of God is the foundation of all true reform. We follow the Lord down the middle of the road. The service was concluded with prayer by V. A. Fenn.

The committee continued in recess from 8:15 a.m. to 10:30 while some members paid a call on the President of the Lebanese Republic at his home in Aley. After recovnening, the committee was led in prayer by H. E. Robinson.

Dr. H. C. Lamp reported the work of the Medical Department during 1965.

WHEREAS, The Seventh-day Adventist Church in Iraq has the possibilities of securing the services of a growing number of Iraqis who are interested in various phases of medical work and who have or are securing training to fill key roles, and

WHEREAS, Funds from the former hospital have been kept in trust with a view toward reopening medical work, it was therefore

A fifteen-minute recess was taken at 3:30, after which Cleo Johnson offered prayer.

<u>VOTED</u>, To accept the plan for promotion of the 1966 Book of the Year (<u>Messages to Young People</u>, see 65/142, 143 p. 1249) as recommended by the promotion committee with the addition of six points as recommended by the MV Department

From the promotion committee: Recommended, That

1. February 5, 1966, be designated in the Church Calendar as the Book of the Year Promotion Day.

2. The volume be introduced and promoted during the church service on February 5th. The MV Department will provide suggestive sermon material for this service. The Middle East Press will provide promotional brochures and posters.

6. Pastors and evangelists use the volume as premium gifts in their meetings.

12. The volume be included in the set of books to be presented by the Sections to the libraries in non-Advantist secondary schools, colleges, and universities.

1967 BOOK OF THE YEAR 65/282

THE BIBLE IN THE LIFE OF THE CHURCH 65/283 <u>VOTED</u>, To designate <u>The Ministry of Healing</u> as the Arabic Spirit of Prophecy and Missionary Book of the Year for 1967 to sell to the church member at LL 3.00, the balance of the cost to be charged as follows: 75 per cent to the Middle East Division and 25 per cent to the local Section concerned.

WHEREAS, The turbulence, violence, and wickedness of these times indicate clearly that the crowning deceptions of the last days are upon us, and

WHEREAS, Our spiritual experience, as well as all our corporate and public witness for the truth through preaching and all other available media, can be effective in soul winning only in the measure that we are surrendered wholly to Christ and devoted to His Word, and

WHEREAS, The Lord's servant has said: "Only those who have been diligent students of the Scriptures and who have received the love of the truth will be shielded from the powerful delusion that takes the world captive. By the Bible testimony these will detect the deceiver in his dis guise. To all the testing time will come. By the sifting of temptation the genuine Christian will be revealed. Are the people of God so firmly established upon His word that they would not yield to the evidence of their senses? Would they, in such a crisis, cling to the Bible and the Bible only?" -- <u>The Great Controversy</u>, p. 625, it was

VOTED, 1. That from this 1965 annual meeting an earnest call go forth to our people throughout the Division to devote more time to daily reading and study of God's Holy Word and to seek humbly before God, not only to gain a better understanding of His truth therein revealed, but to build our lives upon its blessed precepts.

2. That whether in writing, preaching, or personal soulwinning endeavor, we make the Holy Scriptures central in all our presentations revealing to all men our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ, as Redeemer, Mediator, and coming King, and

3. That our ministers and local elders in all our churches be urged to cover regularly our major Bible doctrines in their sermons so that the church may become established in

the holy faith, and thereby be enabled to stand for God and His truth now and in the evil day.

4. That throughout our ranks we identify ourselves, both old and young, as a Bible-loving people by bringing our Bibles to church and public services.

THE SPIRIT OF PROPHECY IN THE LIFE OF THE CHURCH 65/284 WHEREAS, The messenger of the Lord, near the close of her life, penned these words of admonition to the Advent people: "I am instructed to say to our churches, 'Study the Testimonies. They are written for our admonition and encouragement upon whom the ends of the world are come. If God's people will not study these messages that are sent to them from time to time, they are guilty of rejecting light. Line upon line, precept upon precept, here a little and there a little, God is sending instruction to His people. Heed the instruction; follow the light. The Lord has a controversy with His people because in the past they have not heeded His instruction and followed His guidance.'"--Ellen G. White Letter 292, 1907

And also declared: "Many are going directly contrary to the light which God has given to His people, because they do not read the books which contain the light and knowledge in cautions, reproofs, and warning." -- <u>Testimonies for the</u> Church, Vol. 4, p. 391, it was

VOTED, 1. That there go from this annual meeting to our people throughout the Division a call to renewed and most earnest study of the messages of warning, counsel, encouragement, and especially the prophetic fulfillments pertinent to the "last acts of the Drama" in <u>The Great</u> Controversy, and instruction that the Lord has given to His people in the Spirit of Prophecy writings, and

2. At this mid-point in the 1965-1966 period of Spirit of Prophecy Emphasis, we deem it appropriate to urge those who have not yet done so to avail themselves of the opportunity to secure the E. G. White books at the present generous discounts.

3. That we encourage Section committees to give further study to means by which all their church members may have the Spirit of Prophecy writings in their homes.

ADJOURNMENT

The committee adjourned for the day at 5:45 p.m. after prayer by Elder Figuhr.

DEVOTIONAL

After the hymn, "O for That Flame of Living Fire," and a season of prayer led by C. V. Brauer, Maurice Katrib, and E. W. Waring, Elder Beach presented thoughts on "Positive Living." The Christian life, he said, is not the absence of transgression but the presence of righteousness. This lesson is taught in the parable of Matthew 12:43. Positive qualities illustrate this: that virtue is not the absence of blemish but the presence of quality and distinction, and peace is not the absence of war but the atmosphere of cooperation. The empty life will not remain empty but sin will come in. Thus the way of perfection for the Christian is not the elimination of one sin after another, a way which is based on a concept of righteousness by works. but a copying of the Pattern by which one adds qualities to his life. We may not equal the Pattern (see Testimonies, Vol. 2, p. 549) but we must each one according to the ability God has given us copy the Pattern. Light dispels darkness; heat melts ice. These principles apply also to the work. We cannot succeed trying to stay out of trouble. We cannot be successful evangelists if we are absorbed in fighting error. Our only successful approach is to walk in the Spirit. Dr. D. C. Ludington led the closing prayer.

A short recess was taken after the devotional meeting to allow smaller committees to meet. The committee as a whole reconvened at 9:30 a.m. and Elder Jones led in prayer.

<u>VOTED</u>, To appoint Elders A. A. Haddad and Maurice Katrib representatives of the Seventh-day Adventist Church on the Supreme Council of the Protestant Churches in Lebanon and Syria, and to designate Elder Haddad as our representative on its executive committee.

<u>VOTED</u>, To authorize the Division Sabbath School Department to prepare 100 copies of Series C, Kindergarten Teacher's Guide and 100 copies of Series C, Junior Teacher's Guide in Arabic, mimeographed and bound in time for use in the 1967 Vacation Bible School program, to be distributed at the expense of the department, it being understood that the stock, by our saving the books and reusing each series every third year, will be adequate for a number of years. The department is further authorized to provide English copies of these books to English-speaking teachers in Sections where Arabic is not used.

HEALTH EVANGELISM COUNCIL 65/290 <u>VOTED</u>, To request 2,000 CARE units for the Turkey Section from the General Conference Welfare Service.

WHEREAS, Health evangelism has been adopted as a basic part of the approach to the peoples of the Hiddle East, being developed through the use of health correspondence courses, a health magazine, the Five-Day Plan to stop smoking, temperance films, lectures and literature, public and church health education programs, and special youth camps,

WHEREAS, Study is required in order to 1) integrate these activities with the total objectives of the denomination at the same time maintaining their separation from religious evangelism, 2) devise proper follow-up programs, 3) analyze content and materials for pertinence to the interests and needs of the people, 4)provide adequate materials, 5) arrange for workers and their training in necessary skills, and 6) discover methods of broadening and strengthening the methods of work, and

WHEREAS, The success of the programs so far undertaken encourages such a study, it was

<u>VOTED</u>, To plan a council on health evangelism in connection with the quadrennial meetings of the Hiddle East Division, late in 1966, when a large and representative group of workers will be gathered for counsel.

This was not a blatant optimism, but a calculated opinion. The scriptures emphasize God's ability to bring strength out of weakness (Heb. 11:34,35) and that "All things are possible." (Mark 9:23). General McClellan, of Civil War fame, because of his obsession with the delusion that the enemy forces always outnumbered him, has given his name to a defeatist attitude known as the McClellan Complex. He withdrew his forces in the face of certain victory had he taken the initiative. Elder Beach illustrated optimism with the story of a man who had been sentenced to die by the Prince. He begged a stay of sentence for a year while he taught the Prince's horse to fly, to which the Prince agreed. His fellow prisoners rebuked him for attempting such an impossible thing. "You will have a miserable year and a worse death," they assured him. He explained that during the year the Prince might die, the horse might die, he himself might die, and the horse might learn to fly. On the other hand, foolish fear was illustrated by a rabbit who ran when the donkey was threatened. We should not be spectators on the balcony, but fighters in the arena; not fearful, but courageously getting the work done. We do not have to do God's work --Let God be God. We can go up and possess the land. Dr. Vine offered the closing prayer.
