## STATEMENT OF THE AUDITOR

June 28, 1914.

To I H Evans, President and W T Knox, Treasurer North American Division Conference:

Dear Brethren: - -

This is to certify that I have made a careful examination of the books of account, with the vouchers on file, for the North American Division Conference of Seventh-day Adventists for the period from June 1, 1913 to January 20, 1914. The attached Revenue Statement and Balance Sheet presents a correct report of the condition of the business as at the close of the period, January 20, 1914, as disclosed by said books of account.

It is proper to note in this report that no charge or provision for light, heat, or rent expenses for the period covered appears, as the adjustment is still pending. The expenses of the Departments in Washington are up to January 17, 1914, while the expense of the field workers and the Departments away from Washington close with December 31, 1913.

The work of the accounting department is both neat and accurate.

### FURTHER REPORT:

The Treasurer rendered a further report for the current year, covering the time from January 20 to October 20, 1914. The report wa not being audited, and submitted simply as a matter of information, is not made a matter of permanent record.

### **APPROPRIATIONS:**

The question of appropriations to the various conferences for the coming year being a matter which requires carefulstudy, it .was

VOTED? That the appropriation budget be referred to a committee of seven persons of which the Chair shall be one. The following persons were appointed as this Committee: W T Knox, E E Andross, B G Wilkinson, C W Flaiz, S E Wight, I H Evans, Charles Thompson.

### COMMITTEE ON DISTRIBUTION OF LABOR:

A number of requests having been received by the Secretary involving the transfer of laborers, it was

VOTED, That the Chair appoint a committee on the distribution of labor to whom all requests for the transfer of laborers can be referred for study. The Chair announced as this Committee the Secretary of the Division Conference and the Presidents of the Union Conferences present.

### AUDITING COMMITTEE:

The following persons to act with the Division Conference officers and Union Conference Presidents were chosen as an auditing committee:- C H Jones, W H Edwards, S J Lashier, R L Pierce, W H Williams, R T Dow sett, S N Curtiss, O A Olsen.

COMMITTEE ON PLANS:

It being necessary to formulate and bring before the Council in proper form various plans, it was

VOTED, That a Committee of seven be appointed by the Chair as a committee on plans. Subsequently this committee was announced as follows:-- W A Spicer, E E Andross, O Montgomery, O A Olsen, L H Christian, W W Prescott, W T Knox.

#### MISSIONARY VOLUNTEER DEPARTMENT:

<u>Goals</u> Some careful study was given to the work of the Missionary Volunteer Department. Professor C L Benson called attention to the various goals proposed by the Department for the coming year. Consideration was given to the question of the advisability of dropping the financial goal from the work of the Department. The opinion prevailed that this would not be wise, and would prove detrimental to the work of the Department. Other goals proposed by the officers of the Department were considered, and the following were approved:-

1. That a financial goal be retained for the coming

year.

The conversion of 2000 young people.
 1000 Standard of Attainment members.
 3000 Reading Course Certificates.

5. 3000 Bible readers.

VOTED, That the amount of the financial goal that we shall endeavor to attain be referred to a committee consisting of C L Benson, M E Kern, Meade MacGuire, W T Knox, and B B Thompson.

## Secretaries

Brother Meade MacGuire and others called attention to the need of efficient field leadership in the work of the Department, and of maintaining, as far as possible, a more permanent and efficient class of secretaries in the field. The concensus of opinion prevailed that this was desirable in order to carry forward aggressive work for our young people.

Brother E E Andross felt that the frequent changes in secretaries was caused by lack of qualification by many who are asked to take up this work. He favored the appointing of secretaries rather than electing them.

Brother W C White expressed the opinion that theelection of secretaries, all things considered, would not be the wisest plan.

Elder R A Underwood expressed it as his judgment that many of the changes in local conference secretaries were made because of the dearth of suitably qualified workers. He preferred efficient young men if obtainable.

Elder Watson believed in permanency as far as possible. He favored the plan of electing the secretaries in the local conferences.

Elder Flaiz expressed encouragement concerning the work in the North Pacific Union, and stated that they were endeavoring to educate and develop capable secretaries. He felt that in this way they would be able to avoid such frequent changes in the future.

Elder O Montgomery favored the election of secretaries. This plan was also favored by Brother Meade MacGuire, who thought that young married men were more preferable for this work, everything considered.

## YOUNG PEOPLE - THE WEEK OF PRAYER:

Professor Benson called attention to the fact that we have some thing like 10,000 young people and children among us who are unconverted. He desired to see a special effort put forth during the Week of Prayer. He suggested that Friday of the Week of Prayer be devoted to a special effort in their behalf.

## UNIFORMITY IN THE WORK:

Professor M E Kern spoke of the need of all Missionary Volunteer secretaries using the lessons, outlines, and programs sent out by the General Department. He thought uniformity in this matter would tend to greatly strengthen the work. Other members of the Council concurred in this matter.

#### FALL MISSIONARY CAMPAIGN:

 $( \cap$ 

Professor Benson thought all our young people should be encouraged to enter heartily into the Fall Missionary Campaign which is being carried forward. Elder R D Quinn suggested that one day each month be set apart in our schools as a means howard encouraging all the young people to take part in this work.

Professor Kern stated that some classes in the Washington College went out each week in active missionary work. He favored the plan.

W C White expressed the opinion that the best education for our young people was obtained in this line of work.

Professor F Griggs thought that the young people who are not in our schools should also be encouraged to enter this work, hold Bible readings, visiting, etc.

Following the discussion of these topics, it was

VOTED, That a committee of five be appointed by the Chair to bring in definite recommendations on the topics under consideration. This committee was announced as follows:- M E Kern, S E Wight, B G Wilkinson, R D Quinn, W A Spicer.
