HOME MISSIONARY MANUAL:

The General Conference Committee, at a recent meeting, took the following action regarding a Home Missionary Manual:

"VOTED, That the manuscript be published according to the following plan:

- *1. That the name be !Home Missionary Manual. !
- "2. That the Review and Herald be asked to publish 1000 copies of this manual, in form and style of binding similar to the Canvassers' Manual.
- "3. That each publishing house be asked to furnish this manual free to all union and local tract society and home mission—ary officers in their respective territories.
- "4. That the Review and Herald be asked to furnish the manual at cost of manufacture to other publishing houses for free distribution."

VOTED, That we concur in this action and request the Publishing Department to make such use of it throughout the Division as seems best.

SOUTHERN PUBLISHING ASSOCIATION - HARVEST INGATHERING:

A request from the Board of the Southern Publishing Association, asking that the Association have the privilege of issuing the Harvest Ingathering numbers for the years 191? and 1918 was considered. As much is involved in this request it was

VOTED, That action be deferred until the time of the next Fall Council, this being the time when this matter is usually decided.

HELP-INDEPENDENT SCHOOLS:

The action at the Fall Council, bringing the independent school work in the South under a more close supervision of the Division Conference, makes it necessary that some provision be made to render some financial assistance to certain schools in the South which heretofore have received help by soliciting throughout the field. In order to provide this assistance at the last Council it was:

VOTED, That we look with favor on the request of the Southern Union Conference in reference to the Spring Branch School, and request the Treasurer to take some steps to open some sections of the field, from which some funds can be secured.

Inasmuch as the Treasury Department finds it impracticable to open some sections of the field for solicitation, it was

VOTED, That one of the Educational Sabbaths, arranged for at the Fall Council, be set apart this year for the presentation of the rural schools of the South, and that a collection be taken to render help to such schools as it may seem duty to help, said collection to be sent on to the Treasury Department and be dispersed by action of the North American Division Executive Committee.

Further-

VOTED, That Sabbath, June 10, be selected as the day on which this presentation and collection be made.

Adjourned.

MISSIONARY VOLUNTEER DEPARTMENT:

The Committee appointed to study the work of the Missionary Volunteer Department, and make recommendations regarding the strengthening of the work connected with the Department reported. After giving the matter consideration it was—

VOTED, That Elder Meade MacGuire be invited to move to Takoma Park, and that for a time he labor in the East.

VOTED, That C L Benson be Field Secretary for the Department, and that he be invited to labor in the West, when able to do so.

VOTED, That Mrs. I H Evans be office secretary for the Department, and that the question of her wage be referred to a committee consisting of W T Knox, M E Kern, F Griggs, and W A Spicer.

ROTH - HAITI:

VOTED, That in response to a request from the General Conference Committee we release Elder G G Roth to attend a general meeting in the island of Haiti to be held in March, and that he spend such time there as seems best, after counsel with the General Conference.

TAYLOR-MELROSE:

In response to a request received from Elder R D Quinn, President of the Melrose Sanitarium Board, asking that C L Taylor, from the Northern Union, be transferred to the Melrose Sanitarium as chaplain, it was

VOTED, That we concur in this request, providing satisfactory arrangements can be made with the Northern Union Conference, and that the transfer is agreeable to Elder Taylor.

ORNO FOLLETT:

Action was taken at the recent Fall Council recommending that work be opened among the Indians, and suggesting the name of Brother Orno Follett as one who might do successful work among these tribes. There being some question, however, as to his health, it was

VOTED, That we place Brother Orno Follett on a salary of \$12.00 per week from February 1 until the close of the season of the Southwestern Union Conference, and that we invite him to attend this meeting, at our expense, providing at that time he is assurred by a competent physician that his health is such that he can take up this work permanently.

OSTOICH - SALARY:

VOTED, That the salary of Brother Milan Ostoich be increased to C17.00 per week.

APPROPRIATION - ARKANSAS:

A request having been received from the President of the Arkansas Conference for an appropriation of \$1500 to do aggressive work in the cities of that Conference, it was

VOTED, That the request for this appropriation of \$1500 be referred to the Southwestern Union Conference for counsel, and in case it is approved by the Union that the appropriation be granted.

RELIGIOUS LIBERTY DEPARTMENT - LEGAL COUNSEL:

VOTED, That we authorize the Religious Liberty Department to employ Judge Simmons, of Tennessee, to assist in looking after the prosecution of our brethren for Sunday work in Oklahoma, and that in harmony with his offer we pay him \$10.00 per day, he paying his own traveling expenses and hotel bills.

-SHAW - WASHINGTON COLLEGE:

Considerable study was given to the condition in which the Washington College will find itself providing the action taken at the Fall Council for a change of work for Professor Shaw is carried into effect.

VOTED, That in view of the situation which will be caused by Professor J L Shaw severing his connection with the Washington Missionary College to act as Assistant Secretary of the General Conference, we ask the Chairman and Secretary to draw up a memorial

to the General Conference Committee, asking that they reconsider the former action looking toward the separation of Professor Shaw from the College and allow him to remain as President of the College for the present.

Adjourned.
