Good Reports From Our Delegates

San Francisco, May 10, 1922

Tomorrow the fortieth session of the General Conference opens, and anyone around the Civic Buildings fully realises that something important is about to happen. A large number of delegates has arrived, and in the reception room many old friends and workers are shaking hands, and seem delighted to meet again.

The readers of the Outlook probably would like to know something of the surroundings where the session of the conference is to be held. To the left as one enters the building is a very large hall which has been divided into sections, the largest being used as a reception room, and which seems to be a very popular place. In the centre of this hall, there is a large globe of the wor'd fitted with very small electric bulbs, showing very clearly where Seventh-day Adventist mission work has been established in the several continents. The Pacific Press has arranged a splendid book-stand, with a separate stall for magazines and periodicals. At one corner there is the post office, and at the further end a convenient writing room. The auditorium holds 12,000 people, and it is expected that at the Sabbath services this large room will be nearly full.

Every delegate and visitor is especially anxious for the session to commence. We believe that God will meet with His people at this time, and will guide in the plans under consideration for the extension of His work to the ends of the earth. There is abundant evidence in the world to show that we are living in the last days, but, just as we have been told by the spirit of prophecy, there is only one thing that delays the coming of the Master, and that is, the work is not yet finished. We all so seriously need to be emptied of self and have our own plans laid aside, that the good Spirit of the Lord may direct in quickly finishing the task of giving the last warning message to all the world. 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The Largest S. D. A. Conference Ever Held

[The following is quoted from a personal letter received from Elder W. H. Branson.—Ed.]

"The Conference is going to be by far the largest that our people have ever held. The delegates are coming in now from all parts of the world field, and I think most all of them are coming with the greatest reports of progress that have ever been made at any conference at any time in the history of our work. God has been going before our representatives in every field of the world in a most remarkable manner during the last four years. The brethren from Europe are simply running over with enthusiasm at the successful progress of the work in that field. Russia is also opening up in a marvellous way, and no doubt we shall soon see a great harvest of souls from that field which has suffered so much from war and famine. From

the South Sea Islands the brethren come telling us of marvellous progress in giving the message to the cannibal tribes. We are confident that this conference will record the greatest reports of progress that have ever been made by the church of God, since the fall of mankind, in any four year period of the world's history. There is a feeling on the part of the brethren generally that we are truly very near the end of the history of the world; that the conditions we face now in the political and religious world are unmistakable signs of the end of all things. There is settling down upon the delegates who are coming in to the conference and who are planning for the work that is to be undertaken, a spirit of deep consecration and earnest supplication to God that this people may know how, in such a time as this, to measure up to the greatness of the task before us.

"The African delegates have arranged to meet together at a given hour each day for special prayer in behalf of the work throughout the world, and in behalf of the work in the African Division. We are leaving no stone unturned to lay before the brethren the needs of the African field, and I am glad to report that we are getting a very sympathetic hearing. I feel sure that our brethren throughout the African field will be glad to join us and the brethren here at the conference in an earnest effort not only to lay plans for the finishing of this work, but to sacrifice more than ever before that?"

Daniells took charge of the morning service. He spoke with a strong, clear voice. The attention was keen. Solemnity marked the whole meeting. From the gallery I watched every movement. God's Spirit came into that huge assembly.

On several occasions the whole congregation was moved to tears. God's presence was very manifest. The meeting closed with the whole congregation rising to their feet. The working of God's Spirit has brought in a feeling of love. God is preparing His people for the latter rain.

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Clippings from San Francisco Newspapers

100 COUNTRIES REPRESENTED IN SAN FRANCISCO MEETING

"Delegates from more than a hundred nations began reporting early this morning at the registration booth of the quadrennial session of the World's Conference of Seventh-day Adventists, which will begin tonight in the Civic Auditorium. Delegates from Patagonia, Tibet, Nigeria, the Gold Coast, Burma, Chosen, New Zealand, Esthonia, the Pitcairn Island and a hundred other remote spots, mingled with those from the great cities in the more civilised countries. Straw suitcases, carpet bags, and the newer leather contrivances stood side by side as the newly arrived delegates registered. . . .

"More than 300 delegates and visitors were assembled in Larkin Hall this morning. As they chatted and discussed plans for the opening meeting tomorrow morning the air was filled with a mingling of many tongues. The delegates all speak the language of the

people they represent."

ADVENTISTS OPEN SAN FRANCISCO CONFERENCE

"The quadrennial session of the World's General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists got under way today at the Exposition Auditorium, where 600 delegates and 6,000 lay members from 110 countries are holding one of the largest religious conventions ever assembled.

"From a little band of men and women almost in poverty seventy-eight years ago, the church has grown until now it has hundreds of missionaries all over the world, teaching the gospel in 120 different languages.

"The progress of the church, particularly in its missionary endeavours, is outlined in the general report today of Elder A. G. Daniells, who has been president of the General Conference since 1901, having been the administrative head longer than any of his predecessors.

"Dr. George T. Harding, brother of President Harding, is in San Francisco today from Columbus, Ohio, attending the World Conference of Seventh-day Adventists. Dr. Harding, who is accompanied on the trip by his son, George T. Harding III, says he came here for the conference, and, as there is only one politician in the Harding family, knows nothing of a political nature to talk about.

"W. A. Spicer, general secretary, in his report, pointed out that 708 missionaries have been sent out since the last conference, and in the last four years 67,315 converts have been baptised, 37,786 of which

were outside of North America."

Native Evangelistic Effort

It was planned by the Zambesi Union some months ago that several meetings, of from two to four weeks' duration, should be conducted for the natives in different sections of our territory. Pastor H. M. Sparrow and I have just closed the first of these efforts in the South Rhodesia Field. This effort was held at Mkupavula, about twenty-five miles from Solusi Mission.

Yet when we compare our opportunities and the result of our labours with those of the disciples of Christ after Pentecost, our souls cry out for that greater power which brings conviction to the sinner. We believe that the time is not far distant when we may expect mighty things to happen all over the earth.

There were about fifteen young people who gave themselves to the Lord. These will be under the charge of the native teacher of this place, studying the different phases of the third angel's message, and will be baptised later.
