

## Abounding in Benevolence

This is an age of plenty, but also of selfishiness. It is easier to raise money for commercialized sport than for spiritual and charitable purposes. Gambling grows, charity wanes. Riches increase, yet people give away less. There is more for pleasure. sport, and self, but less for such things as voluntary hospitals and foreign missions. As selfishness grows the principle of voluntary sacrifice iails.

We must not allow the spirit of this age to enter our ranks. Not all of us appreciate that very much more might be done if our support of the cause could be voluntarily. planned and sustained. Moreover, we need to remember that sacrifice is not only a matter of will. Its bases are deeper rooted than the determination of man.
Paul has a remarkable passage in 2 Corinthians 8:1-9 on Christian benevolence. We use Weymouth's rendering for the sake of emphasizing our points.

## 1. the basis of benevolence

Although Paul upheld the Macedonians as an example of worthy benevolence, we must remember that "nearly all the Macedonian belicvers were poor in this world's goods."-"Acts of the Apostles," page 343. It is no more natural for the poor to be liberal than it is for the rich. It certainly is not easy for them to be liberal at all. Therefore Paul, states in verse 1: "We desire to let you know of the

grace of God which has been bestowed on the churches in Macedonia." True benevolence, then, is a work of grace, that is, of God, in our hearts.

Do you find it hard to be liberal? Do you look at a shilling twice, and handle it six times, before you drop it in the offering plate? Remember, then, to seek God for His grace in this respect, and victory will come.

## 2. the bealety of benevolence

These Macedonians lrave become classic illustrations of Christian benevolence, yet Paul says that while contributing generously to the cause of their poor brethren they were (1) "passing through great trouble," (2) "amid deep poverty," (3) in "boundless joy." The three things seem to be incongruous. Yet there they were in the hearts of these believers, as a work of divine grace-beautifully refreshing to think of in this sordidly selfish generation.

## 3. free will and sacrifictal giving

In many countries to-day there is much sacrifice, but it is mainly eniorced. What we are forced to give is not what God asks. But we must not neglect sacrifice on that account.
In Israel sacrifices involved cer-
tain legal requirements, but at the same time God expected the people to give willingly. Unblemished gifts from willing hearts was what the Lord required. "Ye shall offer ai your own will a male without bientish." Lev. 22:19.

Of the Macedonians Paul said, "I can testify that to the utmost of their power, and even beyond their power:, they have of their own frec will given help." 2 Cor. 8:3.

They went beyond this even, for the next verse states: "With earnest entreaty they begged from us the fazour of being allowed to share in the service now being rendered to God's people."
If only we could all get that spirit in our hearts to-day, what mighty things would be accomplished for God.

## 4. the gift and the giver

True Christian benevolence is different in many ways from charitable giving. The former is regular, the latter too often spasmodic. The former is born of love ior God, the latter of pity for man. in the former the donor's heart has gone before the gift, in the latter his interest may, or may not, iollow the gift. Thus we read of our Macedonian examples, "First of all in obedience to God's will they gave their own selves to the Lord and to us." Verse 5 .
There is a great secret here. Our hearts must be given first. Our treasures always follow our hearts.

## 5. the test of our love

It is easy to talk of free will, liberty, and love in this matter of sustaining God's cause. But hard ${ }^{*}$ facts often reveal little more than talk. Talk will prove to be some. people's barrier to the kingdom. Performance of loving duty is the royal guide to divine favour.
"See to it," says Paul, "that this grace of liberal giving also flourishes in you. I am not saying this by way of command, but to test by the standard of other men's earnestness the genuineness of your love also." Verses 7, 8. Liberal giving, then, is a grace, and it is a test of our genuineness.

## 6. Privilege v. Compulsión

In speaking of this now famous support of the needs of God's cause, Paul refers to the Macedonians' act as a "gift of love," and not "something which I have extorted from you." . Verse 5. He thereupon adds, "Let each contribute what he has decided upon in his own mind, and not to do it reluctantly or under compulsion." Verse 7.

So much was it a privilege to give that these Macedonians were ready with their offerings a whole year before Patl and the other leaders called for them. ( 1 Cor. $8: 10$.) Paul was not usually slow in getting things moving. Yet these believers were ahead of him in their readiness.

Is it too early to ask all our lay members, workers in institutions and conferences, and colporteurs to lay these thoughts well to heart as we think of the Week of Sacrifice this year? It comes July 1 st to 8 th. Could we not plan now to give a full week's salary in these times of challenging need? Arrangements could be made for this gift to be spread over a period of months where necessary.

Above all, we hope and pray that our entire membership may join in this expression of loyalty "because of God's surpassing grace which is resting upon you"
"Thanks be to God for His unspeakably precious gift!" 2 Cor. $9: 14,15$.

## M.V. Congress in Denmark

Owing to the illness of Brother F. W. Goodall and to Brother W. T. Bartlett's absence in Africa, it has not been possible to issue final details governing the M.V. Congress to be held in Denmatk in August. However, we are sending these preliminaty words to the field as general guidance, and further information will be supplied as soon as possible.

It should be understood that this is not a congress to which all and sundry will be invited. It is primarily intended as an attempt to develop the prospective future leaders in the young people's work. Only those who possess a Study
and Service League Certificate, or a Companion badge of the Progressive Course, will be eligible to attend.

There will probably be a minimum and a maximum age limit. Adult members not possessing the qualifications and beyond a certain age are not included in the list of persons to attend this gathering. It seems that those taking advantage of the cheap steam and rail fares offered will need to go and return in a party. Passports will, of course, be necessary, and all details on these matters will follow a little later.

## " Present Truth" in East Anglia

Here is another experience which may interest our readers.

One of the first on whom I called was a young married lady who suffered with sore eyes very badly, and could scarcely read. However, she bought a copy of Present Truth and has done so ever since. During the early part of the time I frequently spoke to her of God's healing power, and have always prayed for her. About two and a half years ago I persuaded her to come to the church, and she came one Sabbath, before service time. I had previously arranged for Brother Skinner and Brother Dowell, with Pastor J. M. Howard and myself, to meet with her. Pastor Howard anointed her with oil, and after we had all offered prayer, Pastor Howard prayed, for healing and cleansing.

At the July conference, 1938, I secured for her Providential Deliverances by W. A. Spicer, and she read it. This lady is perfectly healed and trusting in the Lord, and has also promised to come to the church and go through the waters of baptism as soon as she can arrange it.

She also told me that her husband and daughter and mother-in-law are praying morning and evening. Praise God, the days of miracles have not passed.

## Another "After Many Days" Story

Tife story of how the young man in Beterverwagting in British Guiana came to accept God's message for this time through finding some old copiés of Present Truth and other denominational literature in his father's home has led' Brother John Bodell of Banbridge, Ireland, to send us a copy of Present Truth dated October 23, 1890, and to relate his experience to us.

We publish extracts from two letters which will be of great interest to our readers, revealing again the blessed work which Present Truth has accomplished in the past and is still able to perform as it is faithfully circulated by our churchmembers.

Brother Bodell writes:
"I have just one other 1890 issue. . . . I have also quite a number of issues dated 1891, 1892, 1893 , and 1894.
"The first pioneer preached here in Ireland, I think, about 1889. My grandfather attended the meetings and was greatly interested but never took his stand for the Sab-
bath. Once the pioneer was in a real strait-a quarter's rent for hall due on Friday evening, no bread in the house, and no money in his pocket, but he and his wife were praying. At the last moment my grandfather headed a deputation and unwittingly relieved the pioneer's distress by handing him more than enough cash. My grándfather's interest led him to subscribe to Present Truth years before I was born-and he got a copy of Bible Readings, too-but how sad that he never took his stand.
"Then I went to live at my grandfather's. Two or three years after his death, my Presbyterian aunt one day began to tell me that Sunday was the Pope's day and that the Protestant religion was the Bible and the Bible only, and that it declared the seventh day to be the Sabbath. I had no interest in religion at all but I challenged my aunt's statement. My aunt's answer was to put Bible Readings in my hands.
"Then she went up to an old box
'in a corner of the houseto ${ }^{\prime}$ ' in a little disused room and brought me down a big pile of copies of Present Truth. How I did revel in those papers! Included in my 'find' were two copies of the Review and Herald, dated 1889, and one copy of our Australian Bible Echo, also dated 1889, the latter containing an article with subheadings, 'Canright in the Light' and 'Canright in the Darkness.'
" $I$ heard that one man in a neighbouring house had kept the Sabbath for one year about 1890 .

I went to his sister and asked if there were any Seventh-Day Adventist books there and she hunted up one for me, Testimony for the Church, No. 32, which was to exert an influence for good on me.
"That 'After Many Days' report in last issue of the Messenger has led me to reread my own old literature and it is stirring my soul as never before."

## Working with "Bible Certainties" in Sheffield

We have just had a most interesting time together taking: orders for Bible Certainties in Sheffield. The experiences reveal the guiding hand of God in a marked way.

First, no doubt in answer to Brother Binks's prayer, the weather became favourable after rain in the early morning and the forecast of a stormy day. Then it appeared that Brother and Sister Binks had worked with the magazines a few days previously in the stretch of territory we chose, but two roads had been left, for no apparent reason. So we decided to work these door to door with the bound book, Bible Certainties.

At the third call, the lady said her husband, a Sunday-school superintendent, had just gone to bed, as he was a night-worker. After she had slipped upstairs and informed him of the object of our visit, he insisted on getting dressed and coming down to see us. In a few moments he ordered a copy in the leather binding and handed out a ten shilling note as a deposit, after which we knelt and prayed together with them.

The next person did not order, but mentioned a lady by name who lived in the first house in the next road. We found this person to be a very earnest Christian and she told us an interesting story. Her daughter, along with five other young people who attended the chapel, had started studying the Bible for themselves and were accepting doctrines that were some-
what different from the orthodox. All the parents, we understood, were earnest Christians and had been brought up from early days in this little chapel, and the attitude of these young people, while it could be commended for its earnestness, was causing some disturbance in the life of the church, the leaders having gone so far as to ask two or three of them to cease their work as Sunday-school teachers. The whole situation was causing quite a stir.

However, the parents were much perplexed. On the one hand, they recognized the spiritual coldness among the members of the chapel; and felt there was need of a revival; yet, on the other hand, were getting quite concerned because their young people seemed to be departing from the orthodox faith into new teachings. They appreciated their zeal, but hardly knew what attitude to take toward their earnest Bible study, as it seemed to be causing quite a cleavage, and there was no knowing where it would end.
We suggested a word of earnest prayer to which the lady agreed, and after canvassing through the book, she gladly ordered a copy and paid a deposit. She told us the names of the other people concerned, and at each home we followed a similar procedure. We sympathized with the person and commended the zeal of the son or daughter as the case may be, and had prayer, which was followed by an order and a
deposit. Surely we were led to these homes at this opportune time with the message they so much need and which, if they are seeking with all honesty of purpose, they will accept as they study the books which are to be delivered next week.

The last call in the afternoon was upon a lady whose little boy had been very ill, but had been healed in answer to her prayer. This lady was just wanting further heip regarding the Bible. In fact; she was on the point of going into town to search the book-shops for a good book on the Scriptures, not knowing exactly what kind, but feeling that she ought to purchase some such help to lead her to become better acquainted with God's Word "And now," she said, "here you are in answer to my longings." She readily ordered a copy at 11 s .6 d . and paid for it on the spot. At this home also we had prayer before leaving. The whole experience in that little locality was most encouraging and we were conscious of the guiding hand of God through it. May all these dear people accept the message of Bible Certainties. B.
