# Sabbath Observance

There are great blessings in Sabbath observance. To observe the Sabbath, in spirit and in truth, is to keep the Sabbath holy.

In speaking of the tithe the Lord says it is holy, and we do not think of using it for any other purpose. But the Sabbath, which is holy time, is sometimes used for other purposes, at least some parts of it. The edges of the Sabbath are just as holy and consecrated as any time of the Sabbath, but how often trampled upon!

"If thou restrain thy foot for the sake of the Sabbath, not doing thy business on my holy day; and if thou call the Sabbath a delight, the holy day of the Lord, honorable, and honor it by not doing thy usual pursuits, by not following thy own business and speaking vain words; then shalt thou delight thyself in the Lord." (Hebrew Version.)

Please note every word of the above text.

How often the foot is not restrained for fifteen and sometimes thirty minutes after the Sabbath has commenced! And often the usual business of the week is begun ten or fifteen minutes before the Sabbath is passed.

This is not Sabbath-keeping. Simply to rest during the greater part of the day, thinking and talking about the business of the week, feeling anxious for the Sabbath to pass, and eagerly watching for the sun to go down, is not Sabbath-keeping, and there is no delight in such pretentions.

Sabbath observance embraces more than physical rest. There is a spiritual rest and blessing in Sabbath-keeping. If the day is not kept in spirit as well as in letter, it is not kept at all.

We are commanded to remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy, and where this is done the temporal will not be allowed to encroach upon the spiritual.

"Far more sacredness is attached to the Sabbath than is given it by many professed Sabbath-keepers. The Lord has been greatly dishonored by those who have not kept the Sabbath according to the commandment, either in the letter or in the spirit. He calls for a reform in the observance of the Sabbath." Testimonies, Vol. 6, page 353.

I wish to urge that all read, before next Sabbath, the chapter entitled "The Observance of the Sabbath," in Testimonies, Vol. 6.

There is joy and delight and blessing in Sabbath-keeping,— in keeping the Sabbath in spirit and in truth.

# Lornedale Academy

The second year of this school closed on Thursday, June 29. Although the results of the work during the year have not been all that could be desired, yet very material progress has been made in every way. With perhaps one or two exceptions, all who have attended the school the past year have done good work, and several of them will connect directly with the work of spreading the truth of the third angel's message. For this we are very grateful, and we shall enter upon the work of the new school year with the object in view of having every one who attends the school, so far as possible, do so for the purpose of devoting their lives to the work which we all love so much.

Financially the school has done much better than could have been expected under the circumstances. A payment of five hundred dollars has been made on the debt, and another five hundred will be paid the first of October, the money for which we have on hand.

The school has paid all its running expenses, except the salary of the principal which is paid by the Conference, and in addition to this, it has made extensive improvements on the farm and in the buildings. I will mention some of these improvements for the benefit of our friends who may wish to know about them.

THE HOUSE.—The interior has been entirely repainted and decorated. A new floor has been put in the basement throughout, and a much needed system of water works has been established. This consists of a large tank placed in the garret, into which the water is forced by an "Armstrong" power force pump, operated by the students during their spare moments. This pump is connected with a well near the house, and also with a new cistern which has recently been put in.

A very ingenious contrivance devised by Brother Sweeten, enables us to draw water eith r from the well or from the cistern as may be desired, with the same pump, by simply turning a faucet.

A thorough system of drainage has also been established, by means of which all the waste water from the house is conveyed away through the drain, instead of being carried in pails up the stairs out of the basement, where our kitchen is located, as we were formerly obliged to do.

A large hotel kitchen range has been purchased and installed; and connected with it is a large, one hundred gallon hot water tank, which supplies an abundance of hot water for the bath-room, the laundry, and the kitchen. All these improvements wou'd have been very expensive had it not been for the work done upon them by Brother Sweeten. In fact, it is very questionable if they could have been made at all without his timely help.

THE FARM.—On the farm the improvement is as marked as it is in the house. Many of the unsightly rail fences where the stones and rubbish of a generation had accumulated, have been removed. Long rows of potatoes now mark the place where only briers and weeds were before. A carload of cedar posts has been purchased, and about one hundred rods of new, patent wire fence has been put up. A large amount of ditching has been done, and still more will be done before the farm will be in proper condition.

The crops present a fine appearance at the present time, and there will be an abundance of fruit of every variety.

THE SCHOOL BUILDING .- A temporary school

building has been improvised from one of the farm buildings for which we had no use, and it serves the purpose of a school-room below and a boys' dormitory above. The expense of fitting up this building was about two hundred and fifty dollars. This building will serve admirably for a printing office after the new school building is erected, which we hope to see in the near future.

THE PRINTING OFFICE.—At an expense of about two hundred dollars, supplied from private funds, a small printing plant was installed about one year ago; and in addition to the educational benefit which it has been to those connected with the office, it has entirely paid for itself in that time, so that the plant now belongs to the school. The Messenger is printed on its press, and, though not given to boasting, we will say this much, that we are not ashamed of its appearance.

#### MONTREAL

I SPENT June 9-12 with the church in Montreal. Brother George H.
