More Colporteurs Needed

"Forward with increasing success" was the counsel that came to us in 1902. Again, "The character is revealed not by the occasional good deeds and occasional

misdeeds, but by the tendency of the habitual words and acts." So it is with the literature ministry. Its success is not determined by success here or apparent failure there, but by the general trend of the movement as a whole.

Literature sales have varied somewhat from time to time, yet since the counsel of 1902 the sales have climbed from about \$3,000,000 in ten years to more than \$5,000,000 in one year.

Elder Franklin wrote that the gain for March in North America was the first in thirty-two months. Our Central Union shows a gain of 46 per cent for the first quarter of 1933 over the same period of 1932. Naturally we feel that we did our part in bringing about a gain for North America. We also show a substantial gain in soul-winning; however, we are not content. We need a large army of recruits; therefore we hope the Lord will lay a burden upon our people for service.

In this union of nine local conferences

with a population of nearly 15,000,000 there is room for 500 full-time colporteurs. The aim of the colporteur recruiting Sabbath, May 20, is to enlist at least one from each of the 457 churches in the union. I hope all will heed the statement of the servant of the Lord when she said, "Many times I have been shown that there should be a more general interest in our canvassing work." And again, "The presidents of our conferences, and others in responsible positions, have a duty to do in this matter that the different branches of the work may receive equal attention."

Elder Watson said to the publishing department men, "You need to be men of much faith and undefeatable courage in the work that is given you to do. You deserve in attempting that work, the most brotherly cooperation we can give you. Conference presidents, ministers-upon all there is a responsibility of interest and leadership in the work of God, without which it cannot succeed in these times. Plans should be laid on which all can unite. From one end of the earth to the other we should make this literature what God wants it to be. It should be made an agency that will contribute far beyond any voice that can be raised. We want that the recognition of that fact will be with you and your men all the time."

A Tremendous Challenge

THE effectiveness of literature as a soul-saving agency has never been questioned. When the first Bible was finished. seventy-five million volumes in 237 languages, penetrating the darkest corners of the world, could hardly be visualized. How few realized that from the efforts of Peter Waldo, a typical colporteur in his day, who so courageously stamped through the Piedmontese valleys with his supply of literature, would spring the Waldensian churches which through the many terrible persecutions preserved the Word of God. Again it is hard to estimate the true value of the literature ministry in the darkest days of the Revo-

It is doubtful if our early pioneers really glimpsed the day when this denomination would publish truth-filled literature in almost 150 languages, reaching every corner of the globe. When people, not of our faith, are made acquainted with these facts, they wonder, and when told that the sales have amounted to practically \$100,000,000 during the last fifty years, they marvel.

The Central Union has a population of 14,600,000. Many of these people are seriously contemplating on what the future has in store. Never has there

been a greater opportunity to answer these questions than today. Should not this constitute a tremendous challenge to

every one of us to see that our wealth of literature is put to work in every way possible? Last year was the greatest soul-saving year in the history of the denomination. In 1933 this result could be doubled and even trebled if every church member would make his neighbor his responsibility. If you are already a part-time literature worker, why not celebrate the fiftieth golden anniversary of the colporteur work by putting in even more time this year? If you have never engaged in the literature ministry, why not do your share by devoting part of your time to this cause in 1933? If you are unable to take a personal part, will you not have a share in the finishing of the work with the literature by entertaining or helping our faithful colporteurs who may be working in your community?

There is a place in our literature work for every willing and consecrated worker, although definite results may not always be apparent. One man worked a whole week and sold only two little 25 cent books. He gave up and got a job. A year and one-half later, at the camp meeting a family asked for him. Four had come into the truth as a result of reading these two little books. As a Christian, it is your privilege as well as responsibility to find such people and bring them in through the reading of our message-filled literature. Let every one of our 457 churches in the Central Union join in this great soul-saving enterprise, and eternity will reveal the results of faithful service.

Work of the Highest Order



TRUE colporteur work is not merely a process of selling, but is missionary work of the highest order, as illustrated by the following experiences of some of the Minnesota colporteurs:

"I called at one

home; and while giving my canvass the husband said, 'All the signs of today prove that the end is near, and the Bible says that Saturday is the Sabbath. We do not want any literature unless it is S. D. A. literature.' They ordered the book in spite of the fact that they are in hard circumstances."

"I handed my prospectus to a Catholic relative who knows that I am a Seventh-day Adventist. She looked it over carefully and after asking the price, gave me an order. Of course I was happy to place an Adventist book in that home. A Presbyterian minister told me he approved very much of the fine work Adventists are doing. A Lutheran minister ordered by book, and is comparing it with the Bible. He says he will rocommend it to his people if he finds it compares favorably. Faithful time will bring us success regardless of unemployment or any other obstacle."

"I met a business man who was discouraged because he could find no minister who would tell him the truth about the Bible and the other side of death. I gave him a short study on this question, and he said, 'That's it, and God will finally set up a kingdom on this earth, but I can't find a church that teaches that.' I told him of our church, and he said he would attend; and he seemed very much pleased as he bought a Watchman."

God is calling men to participate in this work so that we may share in the happiness and joy it brings to one's soul in service for others. May you get in contact with that dynamic power from on high, and then get in contact with the writer for territory.

The Colporteur Ministry

Some things cannot be substituted! An attempt at substitution may be tried, but with no success. Thus it is with the colporteur ministry-it cannot be substituted. There are some individuals who can be reached no other way. By the colporteur the truth of God is carried throughout the land, even into the nooks and crevices where other means of spreading the gospel utterly fail. Like the seeds carried on the breeze and deposited everywhere, so the seeds of truth are scattered by them. The Northern European Promoter recently cited an instance where one book, "Our Day in the Light of Prophecy," had been sold to a shoemaker in a Polish village, and through its light an interest of more than two hundred has awakened. Many of these individuals ripened into true followers of God. An interesting experience is told by Elder J. B. Nelson, of Old Mexico. He states that an American colporteur sold a subscription of one of our Spanish papers to a shoe cobbler. This man bound the twelve numbers together, and for fifteen years studied from them and used them among his friends to win others to the message. The following paragraph sketches the happenings of these fifteen years:

"As I fingered over the soiled and worn pages of the old magazines, noting how some were literally dropping to pieces from much use, and as he told me how many of his brothers and sisters and neighbors had accepted the truth from his teachings, and how many nights he had preached from these old pages while his little shop was filled to its capacity and other eager listeners stood outside, my heart was full of praise to God for the mighty power He has given to our printed message, and the high honor we mortals are given to have a part in its circulation. How I wondered who that lonely colporteur, away from home in a foreign land, could have been who had visited this cobbler in this out-of-way village, and how I wished that he might have been present to hear and see the harvest from his faithful sowing!'

Indeed, there is no substitution for the colporteur ministry. It is efficient and successful. It is to be one of the last means of labor to cease. It will be with us to the end. May those who both can and will, join in this excellent branch of self-supporting, soul-saving work.

GOLDEN ANNIVERSAR

UP UNTIL the year 1882 not a single subscription book setting forth the doctrines of the Bible as held by Seventh-day Adventists had been sold outside the denomination. The colporteur organization as we now have it, and the work of selling our books through colporteurs from house to house, were unknown. Literature sales from the beginning of the movement to that date had totaled only about \$200,000. The publications were given away, not sold.

In 1879 instruction came through the servant of the Lord to establish a houseto-house selling work with our books. As at every such time when an advance step is to be taken God prepares a man willing to undertake the task, so it was then. Brother George A. King offered his service. He was not only willing, but he had such a conviction regarding the need of doing this work that he implored the leading brethren to prepare the books and let him take hold of the work of circulating them. He was sure of success. This was at a General Conference meeting held in December, 1881. In response to his earnest plea, the two small books, "Thoughts on Daniel," and "Thoughts on Revelation," were united in one volume. Brother King became personally responsible financially for the first edition of five hundred copies, finished and bound

First INSTRUCTION

Testimony, 1879

SOME things of grave importance have not been receiving due attention at our offices of publication. Men in responsible positions should have worked up plans whereby our books could be circulated, and not lie on shelves, falling dead from the press. Our people are behind the times, and are not following the opening providences of God. . . . The power of the press with all its advantages is in their hands. By judicious calculation they can extend the light in the sale of books and pamphlets. They can send them into thousands of families that now sit in the darkness of error."

Elders J. N. Loughborough and W. C. White were among the few who encouraged him in launching this colporteur movement that has since become such a mighty factor in the promulgation of the truth the world around.

Success attended the sale of this first subscription book. It was evident that God was in the program. Others soon joined Brother King, and the work made progress. This was the beginning. As suggested, during the thirty preceding years the sales of all publications were less than \$200,000. During the fifty-year period since, which we review in this Golden Anniversary year, the total sales have been more than \$96,000,000.

Looking Backward and Forward

May the celebration of this Golden Anniversary impress us with what God has wrought in the publishing of the truth during these fifty years of our colporteur work. Shall we not take courage as we review it? And shall we not make it a time when we shall look forward to the great unfinished task that calls for renewed consecration, and for renewed determination now to place books in the homes of the people? Shall we not pray for the vision and the spirit that took hold of Brother King in those early days, realizing that to-day the call is just as definite, and the promises just as clear as to what our truth-filled books will accomplish?

was given the privilege of demonstrating a dream. She called her mother-in-law, the book with her company present. He sold a copy each of 'The Great Controversy' and 'Daniel and the Revelation'; and the husband, who came in during the demonstration, insisted on receiving the Bible studies offered."

A New Sabbath School

Listen to this story of a new Sabbath school in St. Louis, Missouri, as told by R. G. Campbell, field secretary, in a letter written April 6:

"Last Sabbath one of our colporteurs, together with the Sabbath school secretary of our conference, organized a little Sabbath school in a solid Catholic section of St. Louis, with eighteen members. as the result of the work of just one colporteur since the beginning of the year. He stated in his letter that he expects between thirty and forty to attend this coming week. As soon as this Sabbath school is functioning properly, he plans to move on to another territory, to work where he will undoubtedly be able to raise up another company. The people are very anxious for the message these days, and are glad for any help they can get along this line."

Angels Are Preparing the Way (See Volume 9, pages 46, 47)

Experience after experience given indicates that the Lord is impressing people through dreams, and is appealing to them in very striking ways.

To illustrate, one colporteur recently had this experience:

"A lady canceled her order because she stated that her husband had lost his job. She said, however, that if she obtained the money she would write me to send the book. A few days after that I went by her house and she called me, requesting me to bring the book. She then told me that she had had a dream, and in her dream somebody told her that she should and must have that book. This is the reason that she took it. The Lord has a hand in His work."

In a Catholic Home (Northern California, March)

"I canvassed a woman in a Catholic home, who said that she had seen the same book and the very same pictures in

and told her to listen while I went on with the canvass. When I had finished, she said: 'You are the same man I saw in a dream, and have the same book.' I told her that to me this indicated that the Lord wanted her to have the book. She gave me her order."

All Studying the Bible

"Miss Q. is in this business to win souls, and claims the promise that the Lord will impress hearts. On calling to see a woman who is piecing a quilt for her in payment for 'Daniel and the Revelation,' she and Sister G. who accompanied her, were invited in, and, to their surprise, found five other women whom they had canvassed previously-Nazarene, Quaker, Methodist, and Jewish,-all studying the Bible together. Our sisters entered into the study, and proved very helpful in explaining some of the uncertain points. Miss Q. led in prayer. Later Mrs. G. met the leader of the little company again, and was told that our sisters' visit was not in vain, that the ladies were deeply impressed, and wished further help at their next meeting. Let us pray for these honest hearts.

we have not the men to send to them. We have ten homes where colporteurs can live with our believers and their room and board will be furnished them free. Surely this is an opportunity, and I hope many will hear the Macedonian call and come over and help us.

A Fitting Anniversary Celebration

THERE are two phases to the colporteur work: the financial and the soulsaving. I believe that above everything else the soul-saving phase of our work should be emphasized above every other feature of it. We are told that "the canvassing work, properly conducted, is missionary work of the highest order." -Vol. 6, p. 313. Eternity alone will reveal the large number who will be saved in the kingdom as the result of purchasing and reading our literature. Today our faithful colporteurs who are trudging from door to door day after day in all kinds of weather, are doubtless doing more to prepare this old world for the loud cry of the third angel than they have any idea of. So there is no question about the importance of the book work from the standpoint of soul-

From a financial standpoint there are very few who have ever made a large income of this work, although those who have worked faithfully and prayerfully have usually been able to get along quite comfortably from a financial standpoint. At the present time, I suppose the book work is going harder than It has for a number of years, and yet our reports in Missouri show that the value of sales per hour thus far this month have been right around seventy cents. By exercising care in the taking of orders so as to insure good deliveries, our colporteurs who are faithful in putting in good time have the possibility of earning as much as they probably

would at any other line of employment at the present time; and with so many out of employment, it appears as though the privilege of engaging in the sale of our soul-saving literature is really a godsend to our people who are willing to work and be faithful.

The year 1933 is the Golden Jubilee year for the colporteur work in this denomination. Fifty years ago our subscription book work had its beginning, and in recognition of this anniversary an effort is being made to place in the field as many colporteurs as there are churches in each of the conferences. In the Missouri Conference we have fortyone churches, and according to reports, we have about thirty-two colporteurs who are reporting quite regularly at the present time. It should not be a very difficult task for Missouri to reach this goal of one colporteur for each church in the conference, and we hope that there will be a number upon whom the Lord will lay a burden to take up this soul-saving work in the near future
