

CONFERENCE.

ARTICLE I-Name.

This organization shall be known as the Ohio Conference of Seventh Day Adventists.

ARTICLE II—Purpose.

The purpose of organization shall be to economize our time, energy and means for the speedy heralding of the Third Angel's Message to all within our borders, and to assist as far as possible in the giving of the same to the world.

ARTICLE III-Bounds.

This Conference shall include the counties constituting the state of Ohio, with any other territory that hereafter may be added.

ARTICLE IV—Representation.

All members of the Seventh Day Adventist church of the state of Ohio, in attendance at any regular delegates thereat.

ARTICLE V—Officers.

Section 1.—The officers of the Ohio Conference shal consist of a President, Vice President, Treasurer, Recording Secretary, Educational Secretary, Auditor, State Canvassing Agent, and an Executive Committee of seven, of which the President and Vice President shall be members.

Section 2.—The above named officers shall be elected at a regular session of this Conference for the term of one year or until the election of their successors.

ARTICLE VI-Trustees and Agents Section 1. The members of this Conference at each regular session, shall elect boards of management for such incorporated institutions and enterprises as are or may be connected with this organization, in accordance with the rules governing each of the same, and the laws of the state wherein the same are situated.
