To FIND words to express the benefit the school has been to me is impossible. It is impossible, first, because the known benefis are numberless; second, because there are many that I do not know of, and never shall in this, earth, in its present state. However, I will try to tell in a general way what Buena Vista has done for me.

Considering my school life in a general way, there are three ways in which I have been helped,—spiritually, mentally, and physically.

First in importance, as I, and every Christian would feel, is the spiritual side. The Bible lessons studied for each day, the prayer and social meetings on Friday evenings, the advantage of having instructors whose aim it is to mold our characters so that we may be prepared to pass the final examination for an entrance to the school beyond,—these are the vitals that have been a spiritual uplift to me. In preparing my daily course of studies I have learned to trust in God as an ever-present helper.

When I entered school, a few years ago, I started in the lowest grade provided—seventh. I am glad to say I have progressed continually. My views of life and a lifework convey a broader and deeper meaning to me now. As I entered, I saw, in peering into the future, a pleasant, care-free student life—truly characteristic of childhood and youth. Now, I have learned to say "Blessed be Drudgery;" for Drudgery is the grey angel of success. It is work that makes life worth while; and what is more worth while than worth-while-work? Sometimes requirements set by those above me have not been what I would do. But, "To obey is better than sacrifice;" and though I did not see the reason at the time, the result always proved that older and more experienced persons know better than the young.

Speaking of the domestic work which develops the physical powers, the training I received was broad, because, as each student becomes thoroughly acquainted with one phase of work, he is given other tasks which give him the experience needed for his life's work.

In conclusion, Buena Vista has planted my feet on higher ground. I would say to other young people, there is no better place to develop one's capabilities for service in this earth, and higher service in the earth made new.

#### Finances

The finances of an institution like Buena Vista Academy is no small factor in its management. The past year's success which has attended the school is due in large measure to the prompt payment of dues, and the students and patrons of the school are deserving of heartfelt expressions of gratitude.

Among the many other items of expense may be mentioned \$220.50 insurance premium and \$405.33 interest on outstanding indebtedness. On account of the war, flour, and nearly all other articles of diet are much in advance of former prices. This has made the past year exceptionally hard, but the prompt payment of bills has won for the school an enviable reputation among the business men of Oshawa and vicinity.

At the present time, there are about \$200 yet due on the operating expenses of the school, but if the outstanding accounts are as promptly paid as they have been in the past, we hope to liquidate these claims and have something over with which to accomplish the summer's work. C. D. TERWILLEGAR.
