Remember the Harvest Ingathering

Some of the members of the Maritime Conference are now at work in the Harvest Ingathering campaign, and others are ready to begin as soon as their special *Signs* arrive. We have ordered over five thousand copies from the Pacific Press, which is a little in excess of last year's total, and we plan a careful use of each copy. Our church at Sydney Mines, N. S., with a membership of sixteen, has ordered one thousand of these copies, which would make an average of sixty-two papers. They have had splendid success in this work in other years, and we are looking for an encouraging report from them soon. Other churches too have a good number on hand, and every church will be supplied by the time this is published.

We find the people just as ready and willing to give as in former years. A timid young girl here in St. John was given twelve copies. She went to work at once and in about an hour's time called at the office for more papers. She had disposed of them among her neighbors, receiving their donations, and enjoying the work, wished to continue. This was her first experience. Miss Manuella Verge, who received a twenty-five dollar cheque last year from a gentleman in Halifax, writes that she called upon him again this year, receiving the same amount. It is well not to forget the business men in our community.

If you have never engaged in this line of missionary work, do not let the 1916 campaign pass without your first experience, and you will be surprised what joy you will find in it. If the supply which your church elder has is insufficient, he may have more upon request at our office.

QUEBEC

Among the Believers

After leaving South Roxton my next stop was Actonvale, where I had a wait of six hours. As there are no Adventists in this place I decided that I would spend the time trying to sell some of our books. However, I soon found that there were only three English families in the town, but I managed to sell a book to each one of them besides giving away some literature. After having a pleasant visit with a retired English church clergyman, with whom I was invited to dine, I left for Richmond where I was met at the station, and then took a drive of about seven miles to the home of Sister Makenzie. The believers here are earnest missionary workers, and they are planning to do something extra this year in the Harvest Ingathering campaign. The following day I vis-

ited some of our people living about four miles from Sister Makenzie's home, and then I went to Sherbrooke and Lennoxville where I spent the Sabbath.

The next week I visited our people in the following places:—Compton, Mose River, Coaticook Dixville, Waterville, Capelton and North Hatley. Space will not permit of a detailed account of experiences at all these places, but it was interesting to travel the ground of the first heralds of the third angel's message in Canada. While many of the early believers who have since borne the burdens of the work in this field have fallen one by one others are now shouldering the responsibility, and we believe that the loud cry of the third angel's message will exceed in power that of former years as our people dedicate their lives anew to the blessed work of soul-saving.

Sabbath and Sunday, September 2 and 3, I visited the church at Fitch Bay, conducting three services. There were some of our people present from a distance of twelve miles. The Lord greatly blessed these services, and all renewed their consecration to him. We have young people here who should be in the Oshawa school. From here I went to South Bolton where I was met by Brother Darwin Dingman who took me to his home. After a pleasant visit with him and his family I left the following day for South Stukely. While on the train I was pleased to meet Brother Rodney McClary and his family from Knowlton, with whom I had a splendid visit. At South Stukely I met Professor Miller of Oshawa and Elder Young at the meeting that night, and from there I returned to Montreal, Wednesday, September 6. While among our people I have been impressed with their loyalty to the cause and with their desire to sacrifice for its advancement.

We were so successful with our Ingathering Signs on our "Rally Day" that we thought it would be helpful to pass it on to you.
