COMMENCEMENT EXERCISES OF THE SOUTHERN TRAINING SCHOOL

Commencement Week opened with the Sabbath service on June 4, 11:45 A. M. with the Baccalaureate Sermon, which was delivered by Judge Simmons of Knoxville, at the Adventists church in Graysville, Tenn. The subject of the address was announced as, "Why Are We Here?" The speaker handled his subject ably, and gave a very interesting discussion along the line of duty and needs of the cause of God, and the reasons why young people should be here. The church was crowded to its utmost capacity, and all expressed themselves as having enjoyed the treat.

The afternoon consecration service was conducted for the young people, by Professor Miller. A good spirit prevailed during the meeting.

At 7:30, after Sabbath was past, the Junior class rendered an interesting program at the school chapel. The chapel was taxed to its utmost capacity to accommodate the students and the friends from the village.

On Sunday, at 5:00 o'clock P. M. the Alumni Society elected its officers for the coming year. President Sam. Moyers; Vice president, L. B. Spear; Secretary-treasurer, Etta Reeder; Assistant Secretary-treasurer, Nellie Travis. Since there were so few reports received from absent Alumni, it was thought best not to hold an open meeting.

On Monday night the Senior class rendered their program to a large and appreciative audience, and while our Senior class this year numbered only six. yet the exercises were of the character, which showed careful preparation and honest purpose, and the impressions left upon the audience were most excellent.

On Tuesday night, June 7, the commencement address was delivered by Elder Chas. Thompson, President of the Southeastern Union. He gave as the title of his address, "The Divide." The subject was ably handled, and many examples illustrating the divide in life were given, showing us that the right side might be easily chosen, when one is divinely imbued with the Spirit of God. At the close of the address the class received diplomas at the hand of the principal.

As the school year closes, and the students separate to go to their respective homes, an excellent Christian spirit seems to go with them. Tuesday morning at chapel, the last morning of the year, the exercises were turned into a social meeting, and in one way or another, practically every student responded. Many hearts were warm and tender as the Spirit of God came in and as new consecrations were made, the Lord blessed by his presence.

A goodly number of our students go out this year into the field. A number of young ladies go out to sell papers to earn their way through school next year. One member of the graduating class goes with a tent, another of the class finishes the nurses course in the sanitarium this year; one goes to sell papers that she may earn money to take more advanced work in our school; another goes to accept a position as stenographer; the other two are planning to work some where as the way may open. There seems to be good prospects that the entire graduating class will be connected directly with our work in the near future. For this we are thankful.

Our Training School is in position to offer well defined and practical courses to students. It is the hope of the management and faculty that young people of the proper age will be inspired with a desire to obtain a proper education.

The new calendar will be ready for mailing about the first of July. Persons desiring calendars should write the principal who will see that they are properly mailed.
