We should add that the report of Sabbath-school contributions is not complete, as some associations had not reported up to the time when the recording secretary was obliged to send his report, in order to get it in this Exrra. The receipts for last quarter show an increase of $\$ 1,622.76$ over those for the corresponding quarter of last year. But how much - more rapidly souls in foreign fields are responding to the calls of the Lord's providence, and crying out to us for teachers to bring them the message, than we are preparing to send it to them. In no previous year have the demands for advancement come in so urgently, as God's calls to us to grow in this grace of giving also.

A recent letter from Sweden to the Board, states that the cause there is progressing, and all are of good courage. Their great perplexity is to know how to fill the openings which are presented. The fourth Sabbaths in October, November, and December, had been appointed by the Conference as days of fasting and special prayer for their work, and the making of donations. "Although the circumstances are sometimes quite perplexing," the letter says, "we do not mistrust God; for we know that he will not suffer his own work to stop. We know you do all you can to help the work everywhere, and we do not suppose that we are the only ones that are lacking means." Four churches have been organized in Sweden since July 1, and some most encouraging items are reported, showing how the Lord is working on the hearts of the people, and preparing the way for the message. We can depend upon it that the help we are able to give these foreign conferences will be appreciated, and used economically and in the fear of the Lord for the advancement of the truth. We might add in this connection, that the ministerial laborers in Sweden are paid from about $\$ 2.80$ to $\$ 5.33$ per week, and by rigid economy they are able to live. The perplexity of our brethren in Sweden is not to know how they can
increase the wages of the laborers, but rather to know how they can keep a sufficient force in the field to do the work that is to be done.

In the Reviex of December 8, Elder Conradi states that the Russian brethren, during his and Elder Holser's visit to Russia, have paid into the cause over $\$ 500$. This is more than the entire receipts from that field during any previous year. This visit of Brethren Conradi and Holser has been a source of great blessing to the cause in Russia, spiritually and financially. As the brethren there learn of the spirit of the message, and of the plans and methods of labor, they take hold with a practical zeal and consecration, joyful in the thought that they are working in harmony with their brethren in other lands, from whom they are so widely separated by the barrier of Russian conservatism and despotism.

We are glad to be able to make so encouraging a report, as appears in this ExTrA, of miscellaneous donations to foreign missions during the last quarter. Heretofore in our printed report we have not specified the special fields to which contributions were made. The record has been kept
on the books of the treasurer, however, and all funds donated for a specific object have been credited to that enterprise. Our friends who contribute to a special purpose may depend upon it that their contributions shall be applied as they desire. Hereafter, these reports will be itemized, as in this Extra. This will take more of our space, but it will, we are sure, add to the interest of the report.

To Librarians.-The promptness with which the annual offerings to foreign missions were forwarded to the treasury last year was very gratifying, and helped greatly in our work. We hope the same plan will be followed by all this year. Let the annual offerings made during the week of prayer be sent to the State secretary, with the other remittances for the fourth quarter, as early as possible in January. Do not hold the contributions to hear from all the absent members, but send what you have in hand, and make a second remittance later if necessary. This will enable the State secretaries to make to the Board an early remittance of these contributions, which are much needed now for the foreign work.

During the last quarter workers have been sent out to Australia, So. Africa, England, So. America, and the Bay Islands. Brother Chadwick has visited Mexico, and now goes on to the West Indies and So. America. All these movements have been made in response to earnest calls, and only show how the Lord is opening up the way. But as the work enlarges, so must our liberalities be increased.
