THE receipts were unusually small, owing to the fact that the Sabbath-school contributions for the quarter went to the Orphans' Home instead of the Foreign Missions, as usual. Will not our brethren and sisters, as they see the great need of the foreign fields, more than make up the deficiency in their first-day and miscellaneous offerings during the year?

THE miscellaneous offerings are higher this quarter than last; and while the first-day offerings fall over $\$ 1000$ belind the preceding quarter,- some of our stronger Conferences failed to report,- they are nevertheless considerably more than for the corresponding quarter last year. We can take courage as we note increase, but may rest assured that the openings in foreign fields and the calls of Providence for us to enter, are increasing in far greater ratio than our contributions.

We wish to thank the State secretaries for the evident pains taken in making out the reports to the treasurer this quarter. It has saved considerable work in preparing the reports for the printers, and thus expense has been saved to the foreign fund. We know that our secretaries are pressed with work and have many reports to malke out, and on this account appreciate their care the more.

## THE AVERAGE.

Please notice in the general report the average per member in the various Conferences. The total average is ten and a half cents for the quarter. This of course means that while thousands have given much more than that, other thousands have given nothing, thus bringing the average down. On this account, and for the sake of the cause above all other reasons, it behooves every member of our church who is regularly making the weekly offering to interest himself in getting others to do so. As a people, we can give more than ten cents a quarter per member for foreign missions.

## A FOREIGN REPORT.

THrs quarter we have our first report from Great Britain since our churches in that field began generally to report first-day offerings, The result is very encouraging indeed, as will be noticed by looking at the average per member for the quarter. Our brethren in Britain have not yet the burden of sustaining a Conference, and they have not very large numbers, but is there any reason why most of our American conferences could not double or quadruple their present average of ten to twenty cents? It is encouraging to see so general an interest to contribute to the foreign fund in foreign fields.

## A MESSAGE TO EVERY TONGUE.

THIs is what we profess to believe of the third angel's message - that it will go to every tongue and people. It will go, whether we believe it or not. The Lord has pledged his word that all the ends of the earth shall hear the invitation to look unto him and be saved. This work of inviting he has committed to his church. How many tongues have been consecrated by being the vehicle for the Scriptures, through which the Holy Spirit speaks to men ?-Over 300. In how many tongues have we printed matter setting forth the third angel's message ? -- Barely a dozen.
In the progress of the work in the home field we see evidences that the end is very near. Thrilling developments show that the events long expected are being fulfilled before our eyes. Yet the work will close up for all the world at the same time. Does not this say to us that it is time for the Lord to work for the many peoples and nations
yet untouched by the last message? If so, it says to us that it is time for us to put our means into the treasury, and to bear the burden of unwarned millions upon our hearts, and in prayer before God; for it is through his people that he will work.

The Lord miraculously gave the gift of tongues to the early church, and the gospel was speedily taken to every nation. Now the Lord in his providence has given us the leading languages of the world, reduced to writing, with the Bible already in the field in advance of us. How plainly the Lord says to us to go on and fulfill his command to preach the truth " before many peoples, and nations, and kings." 'It will take money to do it; but it is the Lord's money.
