## MY HOBBY By Mary Paul (Second Prize Sketch)



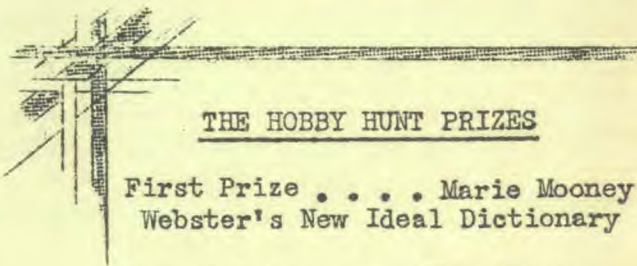
Self-reliant bachelor girl though I be, I do detest going places alone. Hence my hobby--playing chauffeur for friends and relatives.

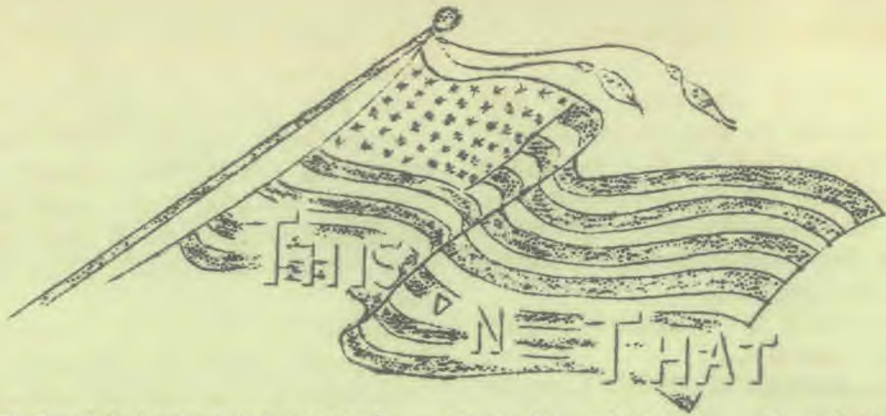
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Edna Helms' latest achievement is learning to drive a car. She passed the driver's test and received her license on June 2.
