THE \$1,000 REWARD STILL GOOD.

The National Sabbath Evangelist of the M. E. Church, Mr. S. W. Gamble, in his paper, "The Toiler's Friend; The True Sabbath," for May-June, 1902, Vol. 5, No. 2, published in Osage, Iowa, makes the following statements on pages 13 and 14:

"For several years I have been making it interesting for those who were circulating the "Enright Thousand Dollar Reward," for one text of Scripture to uphold Sunday keeping. I have stopped the mouths of the editors of the Adventist papers by filing sworn affidavits with them on Enright's refusal to produce his 'reward,' (?) and also filing a demand for the Advents to 'find the Enright reward, if there was any.' I have assured them also for years of my willingness to meet Enright, or any Saturdarian in the United States, on that Issue, if the reward can be produced, and it has never been found."

In answer to the foregoing statements the following letter was received:

ST. Louis, August 9, 1902.

DEAR SIR:-Your letter was forwarded to me here, where I at present reside.

- I have never received a line from anyone of the name of Gamble.
- 2. I have not "backed down" or withdrawn the reward. I still offer \$1,000 to anyone who can prove to me from the Bible alone, that I am bound, under pain of grevious sin, to keep Sunday holy.

We keep Sunday in obedience to the law of the Catholic church.

I then returned to Concordia to prepare for my summer's work. May 28 I went to Delphos where Brother Shafer was canvassing for Object Lessons. June 2 I came to Glasco and Brother Shafer joined me here. We began our work by canvassing the town for
