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### Church School Government

Perhaps there is no question which has caused so much perplexity in church school work, as that of discipline. These lines are penned with the view of setting forth the principles of true government as they appear to the writer.

In the first place the teacher stands in the relation of parent to the children, which makes her duty to teach obedience, the same as that of a parent; therefore let us study the parent's duty to the children in this respect. God's original plan for this world was that man might have dominion and in government, be his representative. He created man in his own image and likeness in order that as "King of the world" he might administer the government after the order of heaven, and thus demonstrate the character of God's government. Although man lost his dominion by becoming Satan's servant, God's purpose has never changed. God so loved the world that he sent Jesus to seek and save that which was lost. "And thou, O tower of the flock, the stronghold of the daughter of Zion, unto thee shall it come, even the first dominion." Micah 4:8. The "right to rule" is now being contested and the character of God's government is being judged. When the controversy is ended, the question will be settled for the entire universe. "What do ye imagine against the Lord? he will make an utter end; affliction shall not rise up the second time. "Nah. 1:9. "For I think that God hath set forth us the last apostles, as it were appointed to death: for we are made a theater unto the world, and to angels, and to men." 1 Cor. 4:9. (margin). We are called upon to be witnesses for God, Isa. 43: 10, ambassadors for the government of God, 2 Cor.5: 20. God desires that the government in every family be patterned after the government of heaven, with the parents at the head, united in their plans and methods of administration, as God and Christ are united in the government of the universe.

In every family where this relation is maintained, heaven can be enjoyed here upon the earth. See Deut. 11: 18—21. But God requires strict obedience to all his commands and so should the parent. If the child is taught.

reverence for the Word of God and faithfulness in obeying the parents' wishes, he will be the more ready to respond to the "still small voice" which is always ready to guide in the path of present duty. If the parents are not united in their object and methods of discipline, certain trouble is in store for the children. Parents should deal with their children as God deals with his. When they dowrong they should be corrected. The method employed should be governed by the character of the offence. In Rev. 3:19 we read, "As many as I love, I rebuke and chasten; be zealous therefore, and repent." Read also Heb. 12: 5-6. From these texts we learn a part of God's method of dealing with his children. The same instruction is given to parents in the following texts: Prov. 13:23; 19:18; 23:13. It may be necessary at times to use the rod in the correction of children. If so, it should be done in love, but well done. Once or twice will usually be as often as any child will have to be whipped, if the whipping is administered in the right spirit and at the right time. It is not love that will allow a child to disobey his parents rather than chastise him. But the use of the rod is not the only way of correcting disobedient children, and many times it might be avoided if other methods were properly followed.

Let us study Prov. 22:6. "Train up a child in the way he should go; and when he is old, he will not depart from it." This text says, "Train" the child. The child is not to be left to his own natural inclinations, but is to be trained. But this training is all to be in one direction, "The way he should go," "In the nurture and admonition of the Lord." It is one thing to train the child in the way he should go, and quite another to train him out of the way in which he should not go. This text says nothing about training the child out of the way in which he should not go. Take for illustration this thought:—

Harry is a bright active boy, full of mischief. His mother observes him playing in a tub of water, and calls out impatiently, "Harry stop playing in that water. Don't do that." Harry obeys, and his mother is satisfied to leave him to find something else to do. After a few minutes of searching, Harry finds an old hoe and begins digging where the ground is mellow of course. He is soon greeted by, "Harry, stop digging up my flowers. It is a pity you must always be into some mischief. You make your mother so much work."

Now the better way to have done when Harry was playing in the water, was to have called his attention to something which he could have done, and yet have been in the way in which he should have gone, instead of calling him out of the wrong way and leaving him to hunt his own way. This would have saved him from digging in the flowerbed This method, properly employed, will teach the child to know and love the right way.

Shall we show our belief by the fruit we bear? May the dear Lord help each one to faithfully perform his part.
