Dear Friends,

It was my thrilling experience to attend and participate in the Open House ceremonies of the Moberly Regional Medical Center on Sunday, May 3. By the time you read this, the hospital will be operating on a full schedule. This was, no doubt, a tremendous event for Moberly and the surrounding area. Moberly is a thriving little city of 35,000 located in northeast Missouri on U.S. Highways 63 and 24. I noticed radio and television crews as well as several press photographers and reporters covering the special event. It is no wonder that this \$14.3 million hospital is attracting so much attention.

United States Congressman, Harold L. Volkmer, flew down from Washington to give the keynote address to the three hundred who had gathered for the occasion. Randolph County Presiding Judge, Hartley Huntsman; Moberly Mayor, Donald R. Schaffer; Board Chairman, Thomas Flynn; MRMC Foundation President, Donald Orscheln; MRMC Administrator, James C. Culpepper; Raymond Pelton, General Conference Health Department and I were among the participants in the afternoon ceremony.

The Moberly Regional Medical Center brings the number of Adventist-operated hospitals in Mid-America to twelve. The medical work has historically brought strength and stability to the church. Already this is true in Moberly. The church has grown to such proportions that property has been secured on which to erect a new church building to house the rapidly expanding congregation.

The new 110-bed facility, one of the most modern in the state, joins a network of some 400 Seventh-day Adventist health care institutions around the world. Not only will this hospital provide help and support to the local church, but it will also provide untold avenues of help to the community. For instance, during the past year, while operating in the old facilities, the salaries of the 230 full time employees amounted to \$3,304,000 with another \$2 million being expended for equipment and operating costs. This is no small boost to the local economy.

But uppermost in importance in our medical work, of whatever nature, is the fact that through this avenue we are letting the community know that the Seventh-day Adventist Church cares for its neighbors.

I would like to thank the president of Adventist Health System/Eastern and Middle America, J. Russell Shawver and his various boards, foundation and committees, for the work done to make this facility a reality and for the work that is being done to continually add to the family of Seventh-day Adventist hospitals in Mid-America.

Temperance Given A Youthful Image

The Central States Temperance Program for the 80's has taken on a youthful image. New guidelines for organizing temperance activities were distributed by the Temperance Department at the beginning of 1981.

Each local church is to organize into Adventist Youth for Better Living groups. Membership is directed primarily at ages 14-35. The groups, once organized, are to use guidelines set up by the World Temperance Department for academy and college participation.

Points are accumulated for various activities such as Temperance Week, *Listen Magazine* field day campaign; speech, essay, poster, and jingle programs; films, temperance contests, Five-day Plans to Stop Smoking, home help, community projects, etc. At camp meeting each year, local churches will be recognized for their achievements in promoting temperance in their communities. The emphasis has already delivered substantial gains.

The conference has been divided into federations. With this division and local church participation, the Temperance Program for the conference has reached 41,316 points thus far. The Allon Chapel membership of Lincoln, Nebraska has accumulated 8,210

points, one fifth of the conference total. The federation areas have contributed with the following accumulated points: Central AY - 6600 points; Eastern AY - 5850 points; Great Plains AY - 8650 points; Mexi-Colo AY - 6850 points. A graduate of Oakwood College in business administration, Pastor Mouzon began his denominational work as a literature evangelist in the Southwest Region Conference in Dallas, Texas. He later became accountant for the conference for two and a half years.

The desire to serve the Lord in preaching the gospel of Christ became overwhelming. In answer to this desire, he was assigned to his first district in Louisiana, and pastored in the Southwest Region for seven years.

The effect of Hector Mouzon's ministry was greatly enhanced when he accepted a call to the First SDA Church in Huntsville, Alabama in 1971. His labors with the members there produced a beautiful edifice to the glory of God. Pastor Mouzon's influence was instrumental in erecting a church building in Decatur, Alabama, just 20 miles from Huntsville.

In 1975, Hector was called to the Central States Conference as Pastor of the Linwood Boulevard SDA Temple in Kansas City, Missouri. During his tenure there, the Beacon Light Church was established which now has a membership of 100 members.

Upon recovery from back surgery in 1980, Pastor Mouzon was assigned to the Atchison/Topeka district, where he served until his call to the Bermuda Mission.

Pastor Mouzon is married to the former Inola Wright, who is a convert of his pastoral ministry. They have twin boys age 13, Derek and Damyon.

Pastor Mouzon's ministry has been highlighted by his dedicated pastoral experience and the fact that he has

added souls to the church wherever he has served.

The writer explained the positive system the teacher uses for behavior. He said that Mr. Wood gives ice-cream sticks as good behavior awards. When the students have accumulated several they are allowed to go to a cabinet known as "the store" where they can purchase supplies with their sticks. Should three sticks be taken away for misbehavior, the student must go to the "corner." However, this rarely happens.

of children - automobile accidents. The hospital now rents infant car seats to parents taking home their new-

borns. The cost is only \$1 per month plus a returnable \$10 deposit.

The program was begun because approximately 2,300 children die and another 165,000 are injured in collisions in the United States each year. Many youngsters are left permanently disabled, disfigured, or psychologically impaired. A study also shows that children who ride in car seats behave better, are not as likely to cause an accident by distracting the driver, get carsick less, and sleep better in the car.

Kansas and Missouri are among 36 states currently considering legislation which would make car seats mandatory for children. For more information contact Jeanine Hummell, assistant director of nursing - obstetrical services. Phone, 676-2396.

Concerned Adventists Help Defeat Liquor License Near Union College

What one Lincoln, Nebraska, city councilman called "the best organized presentation we've ever seen" has ensured the defeat of a liquor license in the College View neighborhood near Union College.

ShowBiz Pizza, a national chain, had requested such a license to serve beer and wine at a proposed pizza parlor at the corner of 48th and Calvert streets. The site, which also would have electronic games, is adjacent to Helen Hyatt Elementary School and about one block from the college.

"Atmosphere is very important to a Christian college," Dean Hubbard, Union College president, told the Lincoln City Council at a hearing on the issue. "Our girls' dormitory would be closer to this establishment than to the College View Church."

Mrs. Hulda Roper, an Adventist who is retired from the Lincoln city police force, described the application as "the most serious moral threat to College View in the 55 years I've lived here." She helped to organize a petition drive that netted 3,000 signatures from Adventists and others who opposed the license.

When the city council met to consider the application in late April, about 400 College View residents jammed the chamber and spilled out into the hall, where closed circuit TV was set up to show the proceedings. One non-Adventist testified she had raised four children in College View because it was a conservative neighborhood; she didn't want to see it change.

The presentations by ShowBiz, including a video taped presentation and a Disney-like, life-size bear which would be part of the entertainment at the establishment, failed to sway the council. When the roll was called all seven members voted to deny the application—even the councilman who had introduced the measure.

"One of the criteria for granting licenses," noted one councilman, "is the attitude of the community. We've certainly seen that you are opposed to this on moral grounds." Another councilman stated that he would oppose the license "because Hulda Roper is against it and when a woman of her caliber says it's bad, that's all I need to know."

Television, radio and newspaper coverage of the council hearing were extensive. One radio commentator said the next morning, "College View hasn't had liquor in 90 years, and obviously they're not going to start now."

183 Seniors Graduate in Union's 90th Year

One hundred eighty-three senior class members received degrees at commencement exercises May 1 to 3 in Union College's 90th year. U.S. Representative Douglas Bereuter, Republican of Nebraska's first congressional district, delivered the commencement address.

Two of the graduates were awarded diplomas after a considerable absence. Dr. Ernest Larson, 85, a retired surgeon now living in Phoenix, Arizona, attended Union early in this century but didn't graduate. He went straight on to medical school and a successful practice. Another attendee who went on to later success without graduation is Cyril Miller, president of the Texas Conference.

Speakers for the weekend included Smuts van Rooyen, assistant professor of religion and theology at Andrews University (Consecration) and Floyd Breese, former UC professor and pas-

| 1 medium tomato (peeled, seeded and chopped) | 6-10 hard rolls (number depends on size of rolls) |

Heat oil in a skillet. Add celery and onion. Sauté at medium heat until vegetables are tender-crisp. Add chopped tomato continuing to sauté 2 minutes longer. Combine cooked vegetables and VEGETARIAN BURGER in a large bowl. Add parsley, 1/2 cup shredded cheese and 1/3 cup tomato sauce. (Reserve remaining tomato sauce to serve with Savory Burger Boats.)
