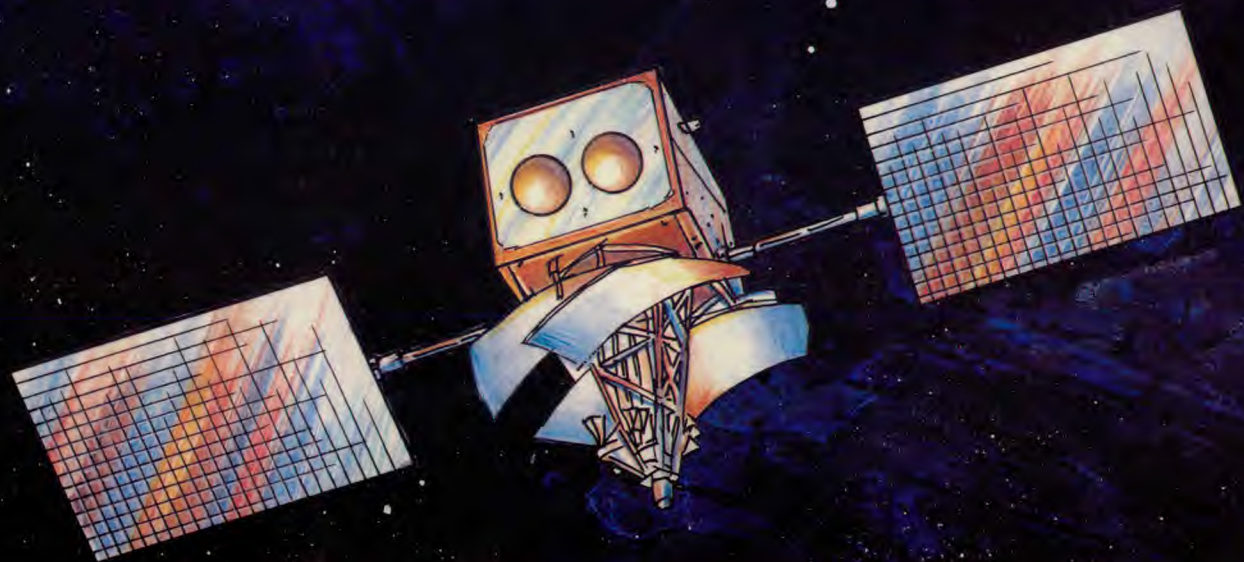

Dear Friends,

The Mid-America Union Executive Committee was given a report on the financial advantages of the merger of the Northern and Central Unions into the Mid-America Union Conference. This report is intended to bring to each of you information similar to what was presented to the committee.

It has taken about two years to arrive at the current level of staffing. The Mid-America office is operating with one less staff member than the former Central Union alone, thereby reducing the administrative costs by approximately \$275,000 per year. Also with the closing of an office comes an additional savings in office expenses, utilities, rent, etc., to make a total saving of more than \$300,000 per year.

It is the plan of your Union Executive Committee and the officers of the Union to insure that these savings are used to expand the Lord's work in our area. Already the appropriations going to your conference for evangelism have been increased to assist in the employing of additional evangelists. The "Pilot Church Program" is receiving almost \$50,000 per year to enable those churches participating to purchase equipment and supplies for these outreach programs. Each conference with a boarding academy is receiving \$50,000 during the two-year period 1982-83 to be used for capital improvement at their academy.

We believe that the merging of the two Unions into one has been financially successful and that the enlarged territory has demanded that we become more efficient with our time and schedules to allow us to meet the many appointments in the territory.

I must express my appreciation to each of you as you assist your local conference personnel with their great responsibilities. Each of your conference officers is dedicated to the task of operating an efficient and financially sound conference and in these days of higher costs and lower incomes this is a real challenge. Our conferences are all required to make some adjustments to meet the changes in the economy. This is being done and each conference is improving its financial position.

May the Lord bless each of you in your responsibilities within your local church, local conference, and the Mid-America Union, so that by working as one unit we will be able to reach the precious souls in our great territory.

Thank you for your continued prayer, work and support for God's cause.

SATELLITE PULPIT

V O P Beamed Across U. S.

"A giant step for the Adventist Church and its radio ministry!" That's how H. M. S. Richards, Jr., describes the new satellite broadcasting venture by the Voice of Prophecy.

Elder Richards' daily messages are beamed to the SatCom III satellite, then picked up by 110 radio stations across the United States. Millions more people now have the opportunity to hear Seventh-day Adventist programs.

"I call the SatCom III my satellite pulpit," says Elder Richards, Jr. "Never have we been able to touch so many lives every day with the gospel's message of hope. Dad prayed many years to see this day. Suddenly, God miraculously opened the door for the Adventist Church to be on the ground floor of this new radio technology. Someday, I believe all radio programs will utilize satellite. We want to move forward in faith as God leads His people toward the finishing of the gospel commission."

With the addition of satellite broadcasting, Voice of Prophecy daily programs now reach people listening to 247 stations. "What a witnessing potential we have today!" declares Elder Richards, Jr.

"And during this year and next," he continues, "we're taking listeners through the entire Bible, book by book, covering major themes as we go. We'll deal with all the main doctrines, some of them several times, and we'll try to help people see how the Bible offers them help for living right now, as well as hope for their eternal future."

Listeners across Mid-America are indeed finding help and hope. A woman in Kansas City wrote: "I thank God for your radio ministry. You are a blessing to my daily life. When I first came back to Jesus, the radio ministry was all I had. Your program is comforting. I pray that your ministry swells and continues herding the sheep back to the flock."

An auto mechanic in southern Colorado shared these thoughts: "Thank you for the great spiritual uplift your program gives me. I listen almost every

morning as I am driving 26 miles to work. Your program has so much meaning to me that I don't like to start the day without listening. I pray it will not cease until the rapture comes."

Everyone who asks for books or other items offered on the Voice of Prophecy broadcast is invited to enroll in the New Life series of Bible study guides. A teenager in Minnesota who began the course in this way says, "I enjoy the guides so much. I ask that you pray with me, asking God to help me remember all that I am learning. I know I can't remember all by myself."

Here's what a woman in Colorado wrote this spring at the conclusion of the course: "I had always asked questions concerning the Sabbath, but most ministers tossed me a couple of scriptures about the first day of the week and left it at that. Of course, I wasn't satisfied. Your interpretation of Scripture has set my mind at ease—someone out there believes what I do. My husband refuses to try a seventh-day church. I am patiently waiting for a change of attitude. I know and pray God will lead us where we should be."

A family in St. Louis is "now walking with Jesus. We are keeping all His commandments, because He loves us and we love Him. We are thankful for knowing the Light."

The annual VOP offering received in many Adventist churches on October 8, along with funds given throughout the year by those on the personal giving plan, will help the broadcast and Bible course ministry continue its work of sharing the third angel's message with others.

CENTRAL STATES

Dear Fellow Believers,

Let us look again at our goals for 1983 and see how we are doing. Are we following the plan?

Our theme for 1983 in connection with the 1,000 Days of Reaping is "Share the Miracle". "Share the Miracle" is a call to dynamic discipleship in Central States. This is more urgent in 1983 than before. If we will be the servants, lifting our empty hands to Jesus, He will fill them, and we can Share the Miracle through a Word-centered, worshipping, warm, self-giving, witnessing church.

"Share the Miracle" means putting a stop to backsliding by encouraging each member to make an attempt to look after the welfare of one another.

"Share the Miracle" calls for each church pastor to organize his elders, deacons and deaconesses into a lay shepherding plan in order to make sure that each member is accounted for and cared for.

"Share the Miracle" means Sabbath School renewal and reformation. Sabbath Schools are being encouraged to have one high Sabbath each month with an unusual program to which visitors can be invited with good results. Special emphasis is being given to program improvement in all divisions to make every division a soul-winning agency of the church. An outstanding goal device should be prepared so that each Sabbath School can chart its progress in four specific areas: attendance, offerings, lesson study, and visitors.

"Share the Miracle" is a call for every church and every member to receive an infilling of the Spirit of God. Each pastor will lead out in an eight-day revival for the outpouring of the Holy Spirit in latter-rain power to be concluded with a day of fasting and prayer. Group prayer meetings will be established in each church.

"Share the Miracle" means public evangelism. Every pastor is being encouraged to conduct two crusades for each church in his district. In some instances, these will be conducted by our Union evangelist. At least four tent efforts will be held in 1983. We expect at least two lay meetings.

"Share the Miracle" calls for bringing the principles of church growth as outlined in FAITH—ACTION—ADVANCE to each church. It is our goal to help each member find his particular aptitude in the area of soul winning and put his talent to use.

"Share the Miracle" calls for each church to establish a monthly baptismal objective, a date set aside by the pastor and the church, so that the members may be working and praying toward a harvest of souls.

"Share the Miracle" means an active community service program. Through five-day plans, cooking classes, and health screening classes, we are anxious to let those living in our neighborhoods know that we are here by God's grace to help.

"Share the Miracle" means that Central States Conference will win 500 souls in 1983 to keep pace with the 1,000 Days of Reaping.


"Share the Miracle" calls for at least three Pilot Churches.

"Share the Miracle" calls for at least \$250,000 in sales from the literature evangelists.

"Share the Miracle" calls for each member of Central States to distribute a minimum of five copies of *Cosmic Conflict (The Great Controversy retitled)* per year during the 1,000 Days of Reaping.

Let's "Share the Miracle" in 1983 by walking with God, working with God, and waiting on God. Let's begin today, for tonight may be too late.

Director of Development Appointed

The Minnesota Conference Executive Committee has invited Elder Vic Hilbert to serve the conference as its Director of Development for Maplewood Academy. Elder Hilbert comes to this position with a broad background in development, beginning in the Potomac Conference while at Shenandoah Valley Academy in the late 1960's. During the past nineteen years he has served in the educational field as principal of three large schools as well as Associate Superintendent of Education for the Michigan Conference. He holds a Master's degree from Andrews University and the Educational Specialist degree from The College of St. Thomas. Most recently, while serving as principal of Maplewood Academy he devoted much of his time and energies to industrial development and the securing of worthy student scholarship funds.

"...The Rest of the Story"

July 2, 1983 Roslyn Wheeler was baptized and became a member of the remnant church at Stillwater. Pastor Robert Hallock performed the rite. Roslyn had been attending church, had attended a 24-lesson, full-doctrine Revelation Bible Seminar, and had also been studying personally with Elder and Mrs. Hallock.

The story began much earlier in New York City, where Roslyn grew up. The family was dedicated to seeing its members succeed in life (a doctor, a lawyer, and other professions are represented), but the children grew up with practically no religious instruction. Determined to be a small-town newspaper reporter, eventually Roslyn came to Stillwater as a free-lance feature writer for the *Stillwater Gazette*. Looking for stories of community interest to feature, she came across the announcement of the next SDA 5-Day Stop Smoking Plan, conducted periodically at the local hospital by Les Rogers. Although not a smoker herself, she became very interested in the Plan and in the church behind it. Not only did the 5-Day Plan receive a fine, front page feature writeup in the paper, but at the invitation of Les, she began to attend church.

Meanwhile, back in New York, in January, 1981, Roslyn's sister was baptized into the Adventist church. During 1982, tens of thousands of *Signs Digests* offering a free subscription to the magazine and free Bible guides were distributed by the New York churches, so she sent in a free offer card on behalf of her sister, Roslyn. In due time, the card came back to the Stillwater Church, where Roslyn was visited by one of the church laywomen, and given the Encounter lessons. At the time of the 5-Day Plan experience, Roslyn had begun to receive and to read the *Signs of the Times*.

This is, as Paul Harvey would say, "...the rest of the story". Just another incident illustrating how our loving God, in His perfect timing, puts varying circumstances together to bring a sincere soul to His truth.

A Long Hard Winter

Open House At Audubon

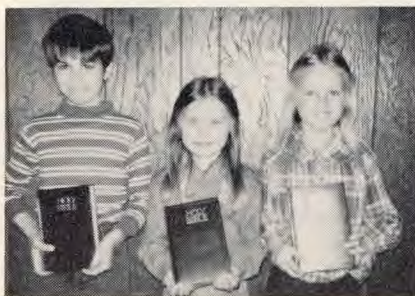

New Dictaphone System For Boulder

Boulder Memorial Hospital now has a completely installed Dictaphone system for all medical dictation and transcriptions accessed through the regular telephone system at the hospital, making it no longer necessary to use special transcription phones for the doctors to dictate medical data.

Special three-digit numbers allow access to the system for Operative reports, Medical consults, and dictation following patient discharges. There is a Fast Forward possibility, a Fast Re-wind, and a Hold numeral. Editing of the dictation is simple, thus allowing the dictator to review or play back his input. Another feature permits identification of priority material.

It is anticipated that the new system will expedite medical transcripts and information necessary for Medical Records.

She will oversee the work of ARU staff counselors and take responsibility for each patient's post-discharge plans. In addition, she will develop future education and treatment programs for the rehabilitation unit.

Mrs. Yarmat has had 20 years experience working with substance abuse treatment centers. After receiving her bachelor's degree, she worked at the Psychosomatic and Psychiatric Institute at Michael Reese Hospital in Chicago. She earned her master's degree and has worked as consultant or director for the Substance Abuse Unit at Truman Medical Center East and for Hilltop Corrections.

Mrs. Yarmat holds memberships in the National Council on Alcoholism, the National Association of Alcoholism Treatment Programs, the Greater Kansas City Chemical Abuse Council, and the Kansas City Association of Alcohol and Drug Abuse Directors. She is also a member of the Women's Philharmonic, the Board of Governors for the American Royale, and the Shawnee Mission Medical Center Auxiliary.

She and her husband, Dr. Avrum Joseph Yarmat, live in Mission Hills, KS.

The Work Of Linen Service

Linen touch almost everyone at Shawnee Mission Medical Center—baby blankets and diapers for newborns, bedding, towels, and gowns for patients, and surgical linens and scrubsuits for doctors and nurses.

According to Leota Bolin, linen service supervisor, over one million pounds of linens were processed last year. Mrs. Bolin says each patient used an average of 14 pounds of linens during their hospital stays in 1982. It takes more than the newest brand of detergent. Linen service's day starts at 5 a.m. when the "washmen", arrive.

Each of the three machines holds 400 pounds of laundry and is capable of washing 6 to 7 loads per day. In the usual one-hour cycle the linens are cleaned with controlled quantities of detergent and bleach in 175° degree water.

A single industrial dryer keeps pace with the washers supplying it, drying

each load in a mere 20 minutes. After being dried, the laundry is machine ironed, folded, and given any final hand folds.

Eighteen full-time employees and three to five summer student workers are responsible for all the washing, sorting, folding, and other assorted operations required to send out a clean load and prepare for the soiled load that arrives every 30 minutes.

Mrs. Bolin credits "organization and planning" for her department's ability to meet its increased demands. The service is subject to regular state inspection and accreditation by the federal government.

The budget for the linen service is proportionate to the amount of work produced. In addition to salaries, a typical monthly electric bill ranges from \$1,200 to \$1,400, steam and water is usually about \$500, and maintenance and repairs have sometimes gone higher than \$1,000. An allowance must also be made for replacing worn-out, lost, or stolen items.

Parcourse

The Parcourse is a one-mile fitness trail featuring 18 exercise stations along its track and is available free 24 hours a day at Shawnee Mission Medical Center.

The 18 stations are designed to exercise specific parts of the body while the sequence of exercises maintains balanced stress. Illustrated signs explain how to do each exercise.

Parcourse begins with stretching and flexing exercises to prepare the body for the more vigorous activities. The middle series of strenuous exercises works the major muscle groups toward strengthening and toning, and the final exercises gradually slow down the body and allow it to cool. These exercises are combined with walking, jogging, and running between stations.

Two systems in the Parcourse program help monitor the intensity and amount of exercise each individual requires. These systems are carefully explained on signposts. A sign is posted at each exercise station which recommends the number of repetitions for each of three different levels of fitness. This allows each person to work at his own pace and to measure improvement in physical condition through the increased repetition of exercises.

Program officials urge participants who want consistent results to use the course every day or at least three times a week.

After spending several years with Dana Cole & Company, Lincoln, Nebraska, Joy Barker has filled the post of accounting teacher in the Division of Business. Ms. Barker, a C.P.A., holds a B.S. degree in accounting from Union College.

The new dean of women, Marilyn Carr, comes from Modesto, California, where she taught music. She holds both a B.A. and an M.A. degree in music. She is married to Curtis Carr, Jr., and has two sons, Charles and Craig.

The servant of the Lord knew that her son Edson was not a paragon of wisdom in financial matters. But rather than recount his mistakes and misfortunes, she admonished him to be of good courage.

The Adventist church in North America has just passed through a great financial misfortune. We invested funds to earn means fast, only to find our expectations of making money unrealized. When writing about such investments, the servant of the Lord writes, "when their hopes are blasted, they suffer many discouragements in consequence of their unwise adventures." *Testimonies*, volume 1, page 226.

Truly, we have suffered many discouragements from such unwise adventures. But isn't it time now to say to one another what Mrs. White said to her beloved son, Edson, 71 years ago—"Be of good courage, the Lord is rich in resources." Letter #40.

sons God gave the remnant church members so much counsel on how to live and live well, how to invest and invest well, how to support the church and support it generously, was not only for the prosperity and growth of the membership in all the world, but also to keep the members from doing things that would bring them "many discouragements".

God does not want any of His family members discouraged. But if we engage in speculative enterprises, we will meet with lots of heartaches and discouragements. Let us not forget that in spite of misfortunes "the Lord is rich in resources". Let us each humbly call upon the Lord for "The meek will he guide in judgment; and the meek will

he teach his way." Psalm 25:9. Let God's people now say to one another, "Be of good courage."

Moses said to Israel: "Be strong and of good courage." Deuteronomy 31:6. Joshua said, "Fear not, nor be dismayed, be strong and of good courage." Joshua 10:25. David wrote: "Be

of good courage, and he shall strengthen your heart, all ye that hope in the Lord." Psalm 31:24.

E. S. Reile Accepts Invitation To Join Adventist Health System

At a Mid-America Union staff meeting on July 21, 1983, E. S. Reile, Mid-America Union Conference president, announced his decision to accept an invitation to join the Adventist

Health System, Eastern and Middle America as of August 1. At the time of the announcement, Reile did not disclose the nature of his duties with AHS. Reile was elected president of the Central Union Conference June 1, 1978 and served until the merger of the Northern and Central Unions in July, 1980. At the time of the merger, Reile was elected to serve as president of the newly formed Mid-America Union Conference.

During Reile's administration sev-

eral conference mergers were accomplished as well as the merger of the Union Conferences. These mergers have now resulted in a saving of more than one million dollars annually. These funds are now being channeled back into the conferences to help at the local level. Some of the funds are being used on the debt retirement of Dakota Adventist Academy. This was a necessary move in order for DAA to operate on its own without having the heavy weight of such a large debt.

There were ten conferences in the two unions prior to merger. Today there are six conferences in the Mid-America Union. The Mid-America Union office is operating with one less man in the office than were in the former Central Union office. During the time of the mergers, Reile served as chairman and/or advisor for some twenty-one constituency meetings.

During the past year, the Mid-America Union membership passed the 55,000 mark and continues to grow. Several plans for continued growth were initiated during Reile's administration. One of the most active of the programs is the "Pilot Church Program". This project calls for very active layman participation in the church and community. Churches that qualify as "Pilot Churches" are awarded certain financial grants to help with their soul-winning programs. Studies were initiated by Reile's

staff to reorganize the Union office staff in order to further reduce the number of office personnel and to help the organization to become more fiscally responsible.

During Reile's chairmanship of the Union College Board, a number of accomplishments are worthy of note. The student enrollment increased by 150 (875 to 1025) during the 1982-83 school year. This was accomplished during a time of declining academy graduates. EMPLOY (Employment Marketing Potential Leading to Opportunities for You) is an internship related program that provides financial assistance to students and also guarantees employment upon graduation. UNITE (Union Initiative for Total Education) provides financial assistance to students as a result of the combination of summer labor, parental help, student campus labor, and grants and/or loans. When certain qualifications are met under this program the college will provide the additional funds for the year's expenses. During the past year a computer terminal was installed in every dormitory room. This was a "first" in private colleges in North America, if not the world. The "Guaranteed Degree" program provides free tuition to any graduate who, after a year, is unhappy with his major field. He may return to Union College to pursue another major field on a tuition free basis.

Union College Student Industries has taken over the North American Youth Distribution Center which employs 18 students. The Center is exclusive distributor of Pathfinder supplies. Student Industries bought "Sabbath School Productions" from Southern California Conference, and is now supplier of feltboard and other Sabbath School supplies for North America. Radio station KUCV went to full power in 1980 broadcasting with 20,000 watts effective radiated power, covering Lincoln and vicinity with classical music.

Union College operates a computer service under the direction of Tom Becker which provides accounting and other data processing service to Mid-America Union, all six local conferences and Union College.

The aforementioned provide a partial list of the accomplishments for which Ellsworth S. Reile will be remembered in Mid-America. His colleagues wish for him and his wife, Norma Jean, every good blessing as they take up their new responsibilities.

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Unity and Survival

In the year 1873 a book appeared, authored by Uriah Smith and entitled *Thoughts Critical and Practical in the Book of Daniel*. In his interpretation of Daniel 11 the Review editor identified Russia as the king of the North, and the power described in Daniel 11:45 was the old Ottoman Empire. This mighty power of the Middle East was soon to come to her end and none would help her. Following the demise of Turkey "Michael" (Christ) would stand up (Daniel 12:1), human probation would close, and Christ would return in power and glory.

Smith's venturesome interpretation offered an exciting and dramatic picture of the events then current and on the verge of complete fulfillment. Russia and Turkey were at war and the seizure of Constantinople by the "King of the North" was a real possibility. The invasion of Turkey would throw the world into its last terrible agony. The end was near. Smith kept this forecast before the readers of the *Review*.

Uriah Smith spoke at the 1878 national camp meeting, in Battle Creek, Michigan, re-echoing what he had written earlier in the *Review* and in his book. The impact on the audience was electrifying. He went so far as to say that "the existing war between Turkey and Russia was probably the beginning of Armageddon." (Quoted in letter written by W. C. White to LeRoy Edwin Froom, May 12, 1930.)

James White took issue with the interpretation espoused by Smith and came before the people boldly identi-

fying the "King of the North" with Rome. Naturally confusion and a division of the people followed.

W. C. White, son of Ellen and James White, seemed to have been persuaded by Smith's interpretation defining the "King of the North" as Russia. In the same letter, W. C. White told of a conversation he had with his father, James White. "Father, I have just read Elder Smith's book and his exposition seems clear to me. Do you really believe that Rome is the 'King of the North?'"—*Ibid.*

His father said to him, "I think Elder Smith is going too fast in his exposition. I thought it was time to present something to check the current of belief that what is transpiring is the beginning of Armageddon."—*Ibid.*

In his seventy-minute address White did not mention Smith but he argued that the prophecies of Daniel all terminated with Rome. And this being the case, "the last power of the eleventh chapter which is to come to his end and none shall help him, is Rome and not Turkey as some teach."

Arthur L. White, grandson of James and Ellen, tells how the pen of inspiration intervened to preserve unity and insure survival. It is a choice exhibit revealing the wisdom and insight of the Lord's messenger.

"While the first part of James White's discourse was published in the *Review* and *Herald* of October 3, 1878, and was 'to be continued,' the last part was never offered. It was between the publication of the first article and the time when the second article would be

published, (October 17) that Ellen White was given the vision which led to a severe reproof for Elder White for taking a course that would lead the people to observe differences of opinion and to cherish lack of confidence. There were perils and hazards of our leaders standing in a divided position before the people. At no time did Ellen White reveal which man was right in the positions they held. That was not the issue. It was the importance of leaders standing together as they came before the people that was the crux of the matter." (in volume 3 of the manuscript, page 137.)

This historical experience has as much meaning for us today as it did 105 years ago when it occurred. James White could have been right in his interpretation of Daniel 11 but he was wrong in publicly introducing a controversial and different interpretation of the King of the North. White needed Spirit of Prophecy counsel to help him to see an even greater truth and that was that unity must be preserved if the church is to survive.

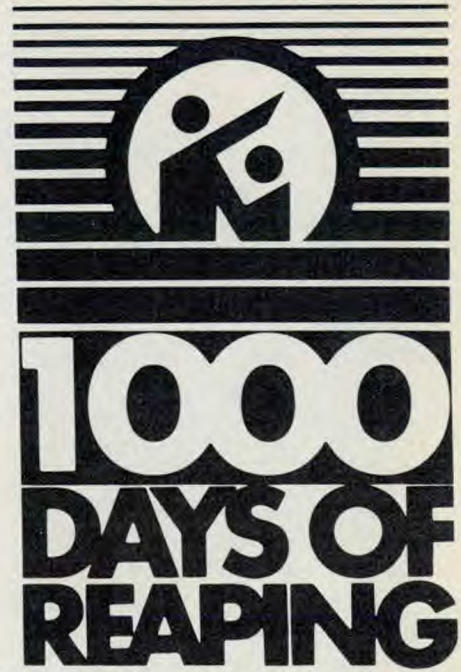

Another successful building project has been completed as Maranatha workers and helpers from far and near put the carpet down in the sanctuary and fellowship room, and landscaped the lot on the new Harvey, North Dakota church, Friday, July 22.

Work started on the 50 x 80 concrete slab the morning of July 6, and by the end of the 15th day, the building was completed but for a few finishing touches.
