



Dear Fellow Believers,

You, no doubt are familiar with the fact that for the Lord's work to succeed, there must be a cooperative effort of the laymen, church officers and

I must share with you a program that we have inaugurated in our Union under the direction of our Ministerial Director, Jim Cress and his wife, Sharon, who spend two weeks in an intensive training and study program with a limited group of

pastors and their spouses.

The program progresses something like thisprior to attending the soulwinning workshop, each of the pastoral couples have committed to conduct a series of evangelistic meetings in their own districts within the next year. During the twoweek intensive workshop, special emphasis is placed on the techniques of evangelistic preaching, working for decision, visiting in homes, and developing a comprehensive plan for stabilization of the new members.

Only eight couples are permitted to attend a workshop so that individualized instruction can be made available. Long hours are spent in practice and "role-modeling" typical situations. Each attending couple is also fully equipped with visual aids and a guide for daily activities that takes them step by step throughout the planning for the series, the conducting of the evangelistic meetings and the follow-up program. The visual aids allow each pastor to present a professionally illustrated slide program for each sermon. Pastoral wives are taught the techniques of presenting features in healthful living, coordinating the various support activities for the evangelistic meetings, visitation and counseling skills and how to share in the burden of training the laity for service.

Throughout the soulwinning workshops, special importance is placed on involving the lay members of the church in every aspect of planning, implementation and follow-through for a successful outreach. Thus the objectives of the series are "owned" by the entire congregation, not just the

pastor and his spouse.

Is it working? Just ask some who have participated in one of the workshops. Almost immediately after a recent soulwinning workshop, one pastor, his wife and church launched the program and have just finished their first series which was conducted entirely in their own church building. As a result, more than twenty new members have been added to the church and the lay members are asking the pastor, "When can we start another series?"

Workshops have already been conducted in Minnesota, Rocky Mountain, Iowa-Missouri and the Dakota Conferences. Pastors throughout these conferences are now laying plans with their congregations to begin the sequence leading up to meetings. Other workshops are being scheduled for each of our conferences with the possibility of conducting a workshop exclusively for lay member couples who wish to lead out in lay evangelism. One such lay couple who attended a workshop that Jim and Sharon conducted in another union held a series of meetings in a dark county that produced a new church of some thirty members.

I just believe that, with this kind of activity with the laymen and ministers cooperating in soul winning activities, we are going to see great things happening for God here in our union. Let's pray for this specialized type of

Christian Record: 85 Years Of Ministering To Blind And Deaf

In 1874, John Nevins Andrews, pioneer Adventist missionary, sailed en route to Switzerland armed with the Gospel Message. Some 25 years later, in 1899, the Adventist Church extended its missionary outreach to still another class of overlooked citizens desiring to hear the Good News found in Jesus Christ: the blind.

Thus began the ministry of Christian Record Braille Foundation. Owned and operated by the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists, Christian Record celebrates 85 years of ministering to the blind, and now the deaf Charles L. and Elaine Emmeking converse with Thompson Kay, also, during 1984. July 14 has been designated Christian Christian Record's coordinator of services for the deaf. Record annual offering Sabbath to help advance this unique outreach. Members on the World Budget are encouraged to support the Personal Giving Program.



Isaiah 29:18 identifies the dual mission of Christian Record better than any other text found in Scriptures: "And in that day shall the deaf hear the words of the book, and the eyes of the blind shall see out of obscurity and out of darkness."

Today, statistics from Christian Record reveal during 1983 over 75,000 sight- and hearing-impaired persons were served in 89 countries worldwide, the majority of whom are non-Adventists. Assistance rendered included braille, recorded and large-print books and magazines, Bible Correspondence courses, personal visitation, National Camps for Blind Children, lending-library services and full-vision books for blind parents with sighted children. In addition, glaucoma-screening clinics were held throughout North America to help save sight.

Introducing Jesus Christ to the blind and deaf has always been at the forefront of the free services provided by Christian Record. For Charles L. Emmeking, deaf since birth, it was God's Way Bible Lessons, supplied by Christian Record's Department of Services for the Deaf, that introduced him to the Remnant Church. He was baptized in January.

Charles is the first convert baptized as a result of God's Way Bible Lessons since Christian Record began distributing these in 1982.

Before telling about Charles' baptism, a brief background on his wife, Elaine, is essential. A registered nurse at Kettering Medical Center, Elaine, who has normal hearing, became interested in sign language through several channels. She finally enrolled in a three-month sign-language class offered at Kettering. Before completing the course, fearful that she would forget what she had learned unless she had someone with whom to practice, she was introduced to Charles.

Not only was Elaine able to improve her sign-language skills, but her marital search improved as well. Charles and Elaine were married in October, 1983.

Prior to marriage, the subject of religion was discussed thoroughly. Elaine, at 39, had been an Adventist since 21; Charles, 33, reared Catholic, had joined the Baptist Church because they supplied an interpreter for the deaf during services.

Charles sensed something special was happening with Elaine. Out of fondness for her, he agreed to study God's Way Bible Lessons. Elaine received a set of lessons also to study with him.

"The lessons were easy to read and comprehend," Charles signs as Elaine speaks for him. "I'm now thankful to be a part of the Adventist Church."

Services from Christian Record are sent to some 89 countries worldwide introducing Jesus Christ to the blind and deaf.

"Because of Charles' lack of the adult vocabulary, I wish the entire Conflict of the Ages Series were written in a simplified language similar to God's Way lessons," Elaine says. "And, above all, I encourage more hearing members to learn sign language."

Your prayers and support of Christian Record's annual offering July 14 can help make Elaine's wish a reality. Unlike Elaine, we can't promise every single person who learns sign language will meet Mr. or Mrs. Right, but you never know!

Iola Church Dedication

Under the leadership of their pastor, Lyndon McDowell, March 31 was a high day for the members of the Iola church, when their new building was dedicated free from debt. The treasurer, Elwin Dick reports, "With sacrificial giving on the part of

members, plus gifts from friends all across the country, along with an appropriation from the Kansas-Nebraska Conference and the proceeds from the old church building, we have never been in debt at any time during construction. Actually, right now we have about \$2,000 still

available in the building fund."

Elsworth Reille, Adventist Health Services, preached the dedication sermon, and the Act of Dedication was conducted by conference president, L. S. Gifford. Dr. E. N. Dick presented a history of the church.

The church body was organized about 1893, and the original building on South Street was used continuously until July 1, 1983. The first church school was held in back rooms of the church beginning in 1917-18, and continued there until it moved into a new building on the church property in 1973. It is a portable building, a gift from the public school system when it became surplus, and was placed on a permanent foundation.

Ground breaking for the new building took place on July 7, 1983. About 28 members of Maranatha Flights, International, came September 6, and the first services were held in the completed sanctuary on September 24, 1983. They were assisted by church members, approximately 47 non-Maranatha people from far and near, and 24 Enterprise Academy students who helped with the roofing.

Introducing The Executive Committee

The makeup of the committee is as follows: three conference officers, one conference departmental director, the principal of Sunnydale Academy, eight church pastors, and ten laypersons. There is a good distribution throughout the two states in the conference as you can see by the map showing the locations of the various committee members.

In addition to the conference employees the membership of the

committee includes two hospital administrators, a nurse, a social worker, a school teacher, a healthfood store owner, a telegraph operator and railroad agent, and a telephone company executive. This varied background provides wide experience and knowledge in dealing with the various issues the conference committee faces. The church offices held by this group are impressive. Five are elders, five are Sabbath School teachers, three are Personal Ministries leaders, three are school operating committee chairmen, three are finance committee members, and two are church treasurers. There are three ladies on the committee.

Another interesting and important bit of information about the makeup of this group is the old and the new. Of the twenty-three members, ten are new, having been chosen on April 15th to serve in this capacity, and thirteen were members of the committee previous to the April 15th constituency meeting. This gives continuity which is very important, but also the opportunity for new people to serve with fresh new ideas.


The work of the conference committee has to give general oversight to the work of the church in Iowa and Missouri, and includes the following: the firing and placement of pastors, the appointment of various boards and committees (such as the board of education and the academy board) . . . planning programs and campaigns to advance the work of the church and the conference . . . serving as an employee evaluation board to monitor the effectiveness of conference employees . . . a financial board to adopt and monitor the budget for the conference, and to develop financial policies and plans to fund the various projects carried on by the church and the conference.

The responsibilities and challenges of the Iowa-Missouri Conference Executive Committee are great. Your prayers are enlisted for the Lord's blessing and guidance on this group as they endeavor to plan wisely for the work of God in these two states.

Blood pressure/hypertension screenings were by far the most popular. Other screenings offered were blood typing, blood sugar levels, and "quick look electrocardiograms" in the ICU area. Vocational rehab offered a "hands on" activity testing manual dexterity and visualization capabilities. Bio-feedback offered "mood dots"—a small colored dot sensitive to temperature and moisture changes on a person's skin directly related to circulation governed by tension or stress. Occupational Therapy offered a "grip" test and Patient & Family Counseling demonstrated the Lifeline system available to individuals still able to live independently as long as they are monitored daily or have ready access to a "trouble" signal. The warm water therapy pool, cardiac rehab and sports medicine areas always draw much interest. The combination of the digital subtraction angiography with the cardiac catheterization lab state-of-the-art equipment combining high resolution video and cine, is the only one of its kind worldwide at the present time.

Comments were very postive from the visitors and many expressed surprise at the many services offered, the personal attention received, and the attractiveness of the displays and literature available. Remember, something special is happening at Boulder Memorial.

First Triennial Session Reveals Progress

Delegates representing the sixty-nine churches of the Dakota Conference met for the first triennial session to be held by the Dakota Conference since the merger of the North and South Dakota Conferences in 1981. Officers and staff re-elected were: Ben J. Liebelt, President; Errol L. Eder, Secretary/Treasurer; Kevin Swift, ABC Manager; Douglas Brown, Education/Youth/Health Care/NSO; Marvin G. Lowman, Personal Ministries/Sabbath School/Religious Liberty/Communication; Elmer C. Haas, Trust Services and Stewardship. Ron Miller will continue to serve the Dakota Conference as Publishing Director.

Elder J. W. Bothe, Associate Secretary of the General Conference, gave the devotional to open the session. After calling the session to order, President Ben Liebelt gave a

report of the progress of the Dakota Conference during the past triennium. "A total of 506 souls were added to the church in the Dakota Conference territory in the years 1981, 1982 and 1983. This shows an increase of seventy when compared to 436 souls added in the same territory in the years 1978, 1979 and 1980." Sixty-two individuals were reclaimed during 1981-1983.

Elder Liebelt pointed out several firsts that have taken place in the conference during the past three years. 1) An annual conference-wide soul winning seminar is conducted each year for laymen and pastors. 2) Approximately 25 Revelation Seminars have been or are being held currently in the

Conference. These seminars are relatively inexpensive, souls are making decisions for baptism and laymen have become involved in the program. 3) the P.R.E.A.C.H. Seminars have attracted several hundred non-Adventist pastors, associate pastors, priests, chaplains and nuns. 4) The first ministerial training course, held by James and Sharon Cress of the Mid-America Union, for pastors and their wives has provided some of the pastors with the training and inspiration to conduct their own evangelistic crusades. Some have started with promising success. 5) A Health-Care Seminar was conducted for the health-care professionals of the Dakota Conference.

Two churches were dedicated during the past triennium— Jamestown and Bowdon. A number of other churches were built during the last three years and await dedication, and several churches had major additions or improvements.

Errol Eder, Conference Treasurer pointed out that "a positive trend graces the start of a new chapter of the Lord's

work here in the Dakota territory." It is interesting to note that while the Dakota Conference contains only 3.1% of the Mid-America Union's population, the conference accommodates nearly 10% of the Union's church membership. This explains the relatively high member to non-member ratio, 1 in 252 to that of the Mid-America Union average of 1 in 745. "Probably the most impressive statistic is that while comprising only 9.7% of the Seventh-day Adventist population of the Union, the Dakota Conference is responsible for nearly 12% of the tithe. This illustrates the faithful stewardship of our constituents," Eder said.

Sabbath School/Personal Ministries Director, Marvin Lowman, pointed to the steady increase in Sabbath School giving over the past triennium. "Although our nation's

economy has sagged and inflation has caused diminishing of purchasing power, our members have increased their gifts year-by-year." During the reporting period, nearly \$700,000 has been given to missions by Dakota members. We rejoice also in the fact that 216 Sabbath School members were baptized during the triennium. Bible studies given lay persons numbered 4,688 in the past three years and our members have been instrumental in 235 baptisms during the same period.

The Voice of Prophecy, It is Written, Faith for Today, Quiet Hour, and Amazing Facts programs are being aired throughout the Dakota Conference. The gospel message is being proclaimed by radio and

TV in virtually every area of our conference.

Doug Brown, Director of Education/Youth, pointed to a growing work through the Pathfinder program and youth camps. "The committment of our conference to the educational and spiritual development of our young people is evidenced by the fact that in 1983 17% of the conference budget went to elementary and 11% to secondary education." Brown reported.

During the past triennium the Adventist Book Center was moved from Jamestown to Dakota Adventist Academy near Bismarck, North Dakota. A small ABC branch continues to function at the conference headquarters in Pierre, South Dakota. The bookmobile will serve the churches of the conference on a regular basis.

Ron Miller, Publishing Director, reported \$407,284.17 in sales by literature evanglists during the recent triennium. Nearly 60,000 pieces of free literature were given away.



They appeared to be an ideal couple, Dawn and Ken. She, a beautiful, soft-spoken young woman; he, an outgoing, good-natured surgery resident. Our first dinner in their home presented an idyllic picture almost. An attractive, thriftily decorated home, two lively, but very well-behaved children; a delicious meal; friendly, stimulating conversation.

But over time, subsequent visits revealed quite another atmosphere. Ken, though pleasant and amiable outside the home, frequently assumes an overbearing, superior stance when he comes through the front door. "I can't believe you could be so stupid!" "Clumsy, why don't you watch where you're going?" "I've shown you a million times! Can't you learn anything?" "You expect me to accept this?

Even a kid can do better than that!" "Sometimes I wonder if you have any sense at all."

Dawn feels she can't win no matter how hard she tries, so why talk about it? And without communication, their dreams of real intimacy have gone out the window. The truth is, no marriage can long survive as a happy union in a milieu of belittlement. Love and respect vanish in such an atmosphere. No one likes being put down. Few can even tolerate such frequent affronts to personal worth. When sarcastic, sneering quips come in the front door, love goes quickly out the back.

The apostle Paul points to a better way: "So then, go on comforting and building up one another" (1 Thessalonians 5:11, Basic English)

Home Cooking Schools Innovative Outreach Approach

Susan looked up, startled. Who would tap on her car window while she waited for a red light? When she saw who it was, she excitedly cranked her window down, "Hi Nancy! Just a minute while I park my car!"

Several months had passed since Susan had seen Nancy Pisarek, and the two women greeted each other with a hug.

Nancy is the wife of Auburn, California Mayor, Bud Pisarek. Susan is a student at Weimar College. Their friendship began when Susan conducted a home cooking school in the Pisarek's living room. The relaxed, informal atmosphere of the cooking school allowed for spontaneous questions and individualized instruction, but most importantly, it allowed personalities to be bonded together into lasting friendships.

Building friendships is an integral part of any outreach endeavor. "If one half of the sermonizing were done, and double the amount of personal labor given to souls in their homes and in the congregations, a result would be seen that would be surprising." Evangelism, page 430.

Those results are certainly being seen. Jeannie Carr, an instructor from Tennessee says, "A home cooking school is a very effective outreach tool. I found I could insert spiritual material or not depending on the openness of the people in the class, but we always had spiritual discussions." Susan Claridge conducted a fourteen-week class in nearby Rocklin. Her class members, like Jeannie's, regularly involved themselves in discussing religious themes. When an invitation was given at the close of the cooking school to begin a group Bible study, the enthusiastic response was overwhelming.

The home cooking school idea began two years ago with two college girls, Janice Brousson and Dorothea (Wade) Sarli, who were intrigued by the suggestion, "Some should labor from house to house giving instruction in the art of cooking wholesome food." Evangelism, page 527. They took it as a personal challenge and determined to try it.

An opportunity arose sooner than they expected. Within several weeks they found themselves in the home of a lady in their community who had an allergy to wheat. The plan was to teach her to make wheat-free bread. To the girls' great consternation, the bread refused to rise properly, but to their surprise and delight, she remained their friend! Subsequent visits encouraged the relationship, and now Mary regularly receives the missionary journal in the mail.

The goal of Janice and Dorothea was to not only give home cooking schools but also to eventually see the church at large use the idea as an outreach tool. Through the efforts of Earl and Dottie Allen, this dream was realized, and an industry was begun at Weimar Institute to package home cooking school kits. Now Seventh-day Adventists across the nation are using the home cooking school concept to reach their neighbors and friends for Christ.

Richard Ware, district representative for Christian Record Braille Foundation in northeastern Kansas, was honored recently for his ministry on behalf of the blind.



Pastor & Mrs. William A. Fagal were honored with a special reception at the Adventist Media Center on May 21st. The occasion was the 34th anniversary of Faith For Today.

In April of 1950, the pastor of the Brooklyn Avenue Church in New York City was commissioned by the General Conference to begin a television outreach for the church. The Fagals, with no previous

experience, had only six weeks to create and produce the program which began live on Sunday evening, May 21, 1950.

The first telecast elicited 66 mail-in responses, the number later grew to 10,000 responses to a single telecast.

Today the program is the oldest continuously broadcast religious program on television. Almost 30,000 people credit Faith For Today with leading them to the church.
