NOTES BY THE WAY.

THE Lord's work is going forward, and those who are most heartily engaged in labour for the spread of Gospel principles, are enjoying the richest blessing in their own lives. While visiting our companies at Kettering, Wellingborough, Hull, and Grimsby, I have rejoiced to note the willingness manifested by our brethren and sisters to take hold of active missionary work, when the subject is fully brought before them.

The company at Wellingborough has been largely left to itself for some time; but the members love the truth, and are looking for ward with much joy to the time when they can have the promised visit and help from Brother Ballenger. When we presented the needs of the medical missionary work, and asked the co-operation of all in circulating our health magazine, there was a ready response. Brother Hawkins, the leader, started the list by taking fitty copies, and the others either took fifty each, or promised to give two hours a week to the work, which is amply sufficient to sell fifty copies in the month

At Kettering, we were glad to find the company already taking a considerable club of papers, which they were not slow to increase. The leader, Brother Redhead, though, like Brother Hawkins, carrying on a large business which requires practically all his time, has found opportunity to do some work in introducing the magazine from house to house, and has met with excellent success. The company at Kettering have also secured 150 yearly subscribers, and are already beginning to lay plans for their School of Health, which will probably be held next month.

The little company at Grimsby is not behind in the good work. Brother Johnson, the only brother at present, is taking a hundred, and the other members, for the most part, are keeping close to the fifty mark. We had a precious season together Friday evening, as we studied the principles of the work and the message for this time. When the heart is drawn out toward suffering humanity, and the individual hears the call of God saying, "Son, daughter, go work in my vineyard," difficulties vanish away, obstacles are surmounted, and new courage is felt for active, energetic efforts to spread the good tidings of health by right living.

Fifteen hundred Christmas numbers of Present Truth and the same number of January Good Health, have kept the friends at Hull pretty busy during the last few weeks; but the Lord has blessed them in the work, and with the exception of a few copies, all these thirty hundred papers have found their way into the homes of the people, so that they are about ready for next month's work. leader, Brother Croft, is somewhat crippled in doing his full share just at present, owing to the illness of his wife; but the other members will try their best to make up for him. Sister Carlisle, the church librarian, is taking hold of the work with real enthusiasm, and we are sure that she will have the hearty co operation of all the members.

Let us all do our utmost to spread these lifegiving principles. We need a Sanitarium, and we are all longing for the time to come when we may have such an institution in good running order. Every copy of Good Bealth put out in somebody's home is that much help towards a Sanitarium; for people must be educated in these principles, and we must get in touch with the public through the magazine, in order to make the Sanitarium a success when it is started. Our brethren in America are helping us financially in the starting of bath-rooms and a Sanitarium; but they cannot do the work of circulating Good Health. We who are here on the ground must do that, and a very important part it is. Every one can help. We need the boys and girls as well as the older M. E. OLSEN. people.

OUR COLLEGE.

THREE weeks of the session are past, and even in this short time the students are showing good progress in their studies.

Our enrolment has reached thirty-five. There has been a desire manifested from the very first by all the students to improve every opportunity offered. The United Kingdom is well represented in the college, showing that churches are springing up in all parts, and supplying students to the school. Scotland alone is not directly represented, but there are those in attendance who have already expressed the desire to devote themselves to the work in Scotland; so we know that if students go there to labour, soon other students will come from that field to prepare to teach the Third Angel's Message.

The representation is as follows: North London sends eleven; Balham, three; Kettering, three; Southampton, Birmingham, and Manchester each send two; Birkenhead, Brompton, Cowes, Cheltham, and Westbourne Park, each one. Ireland sends two each from Belfast and Banbridge. Wales sends one. There is also a student from the Gold Coast, West Africa.

The greater part of the students are devoting the afternoons to canvassing for our papers and books, and nearly all are meeting with excellent success. Some have been able in that limited time to more than pay their way. In many cases, when it has become known that the canvasser is a student, an order is given that would have been refused under ordinary conditions.

Friday, Jan. 24, we held our first students' prayer meeting in the chapel. The Lord came very near and blessed as students consecrated themselves anew to His service. We are encouraged and strengthened when we remember that earnest prayers are going up to heaven from our brethren and sisters that the purpose for which the school was started may be fully realized.
