Our Sabbath meeting is growing in interest, and our Sunday evening meeting, which is a public effort, is being attended by quite a number not of our faith. Our hall is not very large; but we expect to need a larger one soon. We have got some cards to advertise our Sunday evening meetings, which we hope, with God's blessing, will help us to reach the people.

There is a great need for the message to be given in this city, hence the great responsibility that rests on each one here whom God has blessed with a knowledge of His truth, that they should live it out before the people. Pray for the work, and also that God may unite our hearts in love, so that we may be standing where God can use us to bring others unto the light of the Gospel of Christ.

We are glad to hear of the progress of the work in other parts of the Conference, and we read the Worker with interest.

We find there is also a great need here for trained workers in Medical Missionary lines, who, while supporting themselves, could be teaching healthful cookery to the well, and nursing the sick. Through the health work we are reaching nine families with the gospel of health, and seven patients are receiving treatment. These homes are visited from two to six times each week. We have nearly

every day to refuse persons who ask and expect from us the help they need. If we had a small sanitarium where these could come to, we feel sure this work would grow to large dimensions in this city, and be a means of reaching the people which no other work can reach.

WHAT HATH GOD WROUGHT!

DEAR FELLOW WORKERS:-

I want to tell you as briefly as I can what God has done in the Kettering church during the last month.

When Brother Ballenger came amongst us, he found a true representative of the Laodicean church—neither cold nor hot, just ready to be spued out—but the Spirit of God by him showed us our true condition; there soon began to be a shaking among the dry bones, and cries for help went up from first one and then another, until the whole church was down on its knees seeking for help. They are now rejoicing again in the truth, and it is music in our ears to listen to their testimonies of victories over sin, self, and Satan. We now have a new church with a new membership. Sixteen precious souls were buried with Christ in baptism, and arose from the watery grave to walk in newness of life. Ten of these were re-baptisms.

Shoute of victory are still going up. The Wednesday evening prayer meeting, held after the leaving of Brother Ballenger, was well attended, and it was good to hear the testimonies, as one after another got up to witness to the keeping power of God. One brother said that he did not

ever remember looking forward to the prayermeeting before, thinking that the time was long, but that he had looked forward to this one, showing the change that had come into his life and experience. We had the best meeting possible, and on the Sabbath the interest was maintained throughout, so that there was not time enough for all to to give in their testimony.

Oh, how different! My heart leaps for joy. A great burden has been rolled away, so that I cannot give expression to my deep gratitude to God. Prayers have been answered, and the reproach of the Kettering church has been rolled away.

And now as the cloud lifts, and more light comes in, we see all around us new responsibilities, and the command comes clear and distinct to the Kettering church, "Forward."

We are now all ready, though not in our own strength, but in the strength of God, to go forward and press the battle to the gates. Praise the Lord, the anchor holds! The victory is ours through faith, for we walk by faith, and not by sight.
