HOW TO HAVE AN INTERESTING MISSIONARY MEETING.

- 1. PLAN it carefully beforehand. The church leader and librarian should both get their heads together, and arrange a simple programme that will be bright, cheery, and instructive.
- 2. Get the young people in the church to help. Let them prepare five-minute papers on definite subjects, and read them before the company. Solicit the help also of the older members. Ask every member to contribute something to that evening.
- 3 Lay out missionary work for the members, and give them an opportunity at the missionary meeting to relate their experiences. Some, yes, almost all, can canvass for Present Truth and Good Health. They may not be expert canvassers, but they can go from door to door, carrying a message of love and hope to the people, and inviting their attention to the important principles taught in these papers.
- 4. Get everyone interested in working with our tracts. We should use hundreds where we only use one. When people are curious to know about the Sabbath and other phases of present truth, it is an excellent thing to hand them a tract, saying, "Here is something that will tell you all about it." Neighbours and chance acquaintances are all liable to be more or less interested. Hence every Sabbath-keeping company should have a lot of tracts on hand, so that the members may be supplied with what they need from week to week. A collection taken once a month, or oftener, would meet the expense.
- 5. One very interesting subject for study in the missionary meeting is our foreign missions. Take the whole evening occasionally for the consideration of the progress of the message, say, in the South Sea Islands. There is a very encouraging work going on there, and you would all be profited to know more about it. Take another evening to study the work in India, or in Africa, etc. The Missionary Magazine has most interesting articles

dealing with these fields, and if only a single copy of this magazine were taken in each company, it would prove a great help in making the missionary meeting instructive and enjoyable.

- 6. Avoid singing long songs, and having long talks. Everything should be brief, bright, and attractive, so that both young and old will thoroughly enjoy the meeting. Instead of one long prayer, lat there be several short ones. Have definite objects of prayer. We are told to pray for more labourers in view of the greatness of the harvest; we are also told to go into the field and work ourselves. Hence it is proper to pray for fitness for the work.
- 7. Make everybody thoroughly welcome at the meeting, and if any do not come, make them feel that you have missed them. The missionary meeting is a most important institution. We hope the time will soon come when no company will be trying to get along without such a gathering. The church of God is organised for missionary purposes. We are missing a vital part of the blessing which belongs to the people of God if we are not heartily engaged in work for our fellow men.
