THE CANVASSING WORK.

THE importance of the canvassing work is kept ever before me.

Many of our canvassers, if truly converted and consecrated, can accomplish more in this line than in any other in bringing the truth for this time before the people.

We have the word of God to show that the end is near. The world is to be warned, and as never before we are to be labourers with Christ. The work of warning has been entrusted to us. We are to be channels of light to the world, imparting to others the light we receive from the great Light-Bearer. The words and works of all men are to be tried. Let us not be backward now. That which is to be done in warning the world must be done without delay. Let not the canvassing work be left to languish. Let the books containing the light on present truth be placed before as many as possible.

Canyassers are to be educated and trained to do the work required in selling the books upon present truth which the people need. There is need of men of deep Christian experience, men of well-balanced minds, strong, well-educated men, to engage in this work. The Lord desires those to take hold of the canvassing work who are capable of educating others, who can awaken in promising young men and women an interest in this line, leading them to take up the book-work and handle it successfully. Some have the talent, education, and experience which would enable them to educate the youth for the canvassing work in such a way that much more would be accomplished than is now being done.

It was the providence of God which in the beginning of the Christian church scattered the saints abroad, sending them out of Jerusalem into many parts of the world. The disciples of Christ did not stay in Jerusalem or in the cities near by, but they went beyond the limits of their own country into the great thoroughfares of travel, seeking for the lost that they might bring them to God. To-day the Lord desires to see His work carried forward in many places. We must not confine our labours to a few localities.

Let young and old consecrate themselves to God, take up the work, and go forward, labouring in humility, under the control of the Holy Spirit. Let those who have been in school go out into the field, and put to a practical use the knowledge they have gained. If canvassers will do this, using the ability which God has given them, seeking counsel from Him, and combining the work of selling books with personal labour for the people, their talents will increase by exercise, and they will learn many practical lessons which they could not possibly learn in school. The education obtained in this practical way may properly be termed higher education.

THE GOSPEL EXTENSION FUND.

It was at the time of the General Meeting at Bath, four years since, when plans for more rapid extension of the work were under consideration, that the Gospel Extension Fund was first started. The object was the creation of a fund, from which to draw, to assist in the circulation of our literature in various ways, for which there was no provision made. During the past four years a considerable amount has been contributed and used to excellent advantage in aiding in different ways in the circulation of reading matter on present truth. But at the present time the fund is in arrears to the amount of £79 5s. 10½d., and must be made up as soon as possible.

The British Union Conference Committee, considering the matter, request that a general collection be taken up on Sabbath, September 27, to cover the deficiency, and to replenish the fund. By all the

friends of the cause coming forward with a liberal contribution, we shall be able to make up the arrears and have something on hand with which to go forward with the work.

In order that all may be advised of the matter, we would request that whoever leads the meeting in any place, make mention of this matter a number of times, so that all may have a knowledge of the time and object of this collection, and be ready with such a gift as the Lord may enable them to give for this branch of the work.

We have lately received an interesting letter from Sister Borrowdale, secretary of the "Good Health League" at Plymouth, and quote extracts from the same as follows:—

I have just been having a very interesting conversation with a gentleman in regard to our 'Good Health League.' He tells me that he is getting the Good Health from one of the stationers in the town.

We had a stranger for our Chairman at the last meeting. Hearing that he was a great Temperance worker, we arranged for him to take the chair, and sent him a programme. He wished me to send to the news off ce and have a reporter. The idea of a reporter frightened me, and I sent the card, but not till I knew it would be about too late. I had no idea who Mr. Pillar (the chairman) was, and to my utter amazement, I found just before the meeting that he was the master of the Si. Georges' Grammar School, and adds several letters to his name. I would not have thought of asking him had I known, so when I was introduced to him, I said that we were only amateurs who were trying to propagate principles which we believed were right. He was very kind indeed, but I did wish that someone who could represent the LEAGUE, better than I, could have done the talking. Everybody said they enjoyed the time thoroughly. Various questions were asked, and the Lord just gave me the right answers, and took away all fear.

I had a nice little stall of health foods and some that I had prepared myself that morning. I offered the foods for sale after the meeting, and gave away samples of wholemeal bread, crisps etc. All the foods were sold but one tin of Protose, and one box of Caramel Cereal.

Our Chairman expressed his pleasure at being with us, saying that he would help us in any way he could. He proposed that this thing be not kept in a nut-shell any longer, but be put into the papers in order that others who were longing and willing to know these things should hear of them.
